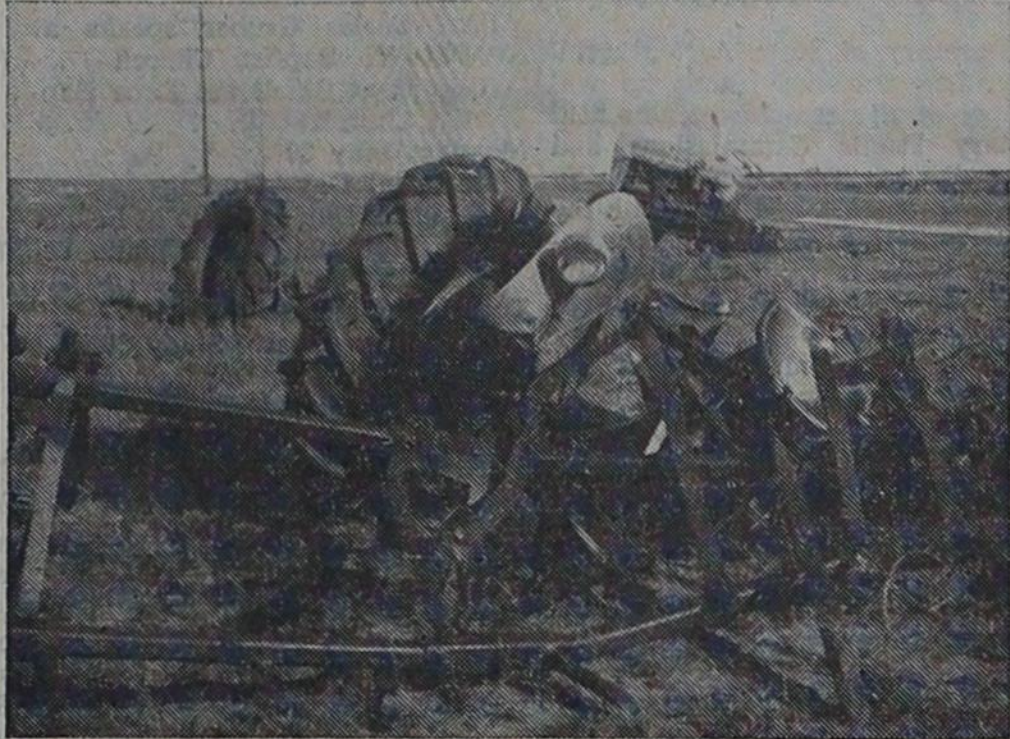

Man, Tractor Lose In Tiff with Truck

A Ford tractor doesn't quite compare with a semi-truck for brute force. At least, that's the way Burl Nix, young Lariat farmer, feels that week after a collision on Highway 70-84 Monday night.

Burl, who had borrowed the tractor from L. D. Rundell, was driving the tractor on the shoulder of the pavement, headed west, about 11 o'clock. He was on his way to a patch of sudan to do some rotary hoeing.

Burl looked around just as a large semi-truck, driven by E. C. Crow of Ft. Worth, plowed into the rear of the tractor, striking the tool bar and hoes.

Nix says he doesn't know how high he was thrown by the impact, but says he remembers looking down and seeing his tractor, broken into three parts, and the cab of the truck below him.

The young farmer somersaulted and landed in the midst of the wreckage, which was sliding down the highway. He was not injured, but bruised and skinned up.

"If I had found anything to hold onto while I was up in the air, I sure would have," he said after the wreck.

The engine of the tractor was still running after the wreckage came to a stop, and Nix walked over and shut it off. The truck driver, Nix said, had thought the tractor was a "one-eyed car," and had not seen otherwise until too late.

The front of the truck was damaged, but no serious injuries resulted to either of the two men involved.

The tractor was not insured.

Near Starting Time On Farwell Paving

Boosters of voluntary residential paving in Farwell this week were predicting that they are not far from being ready to start construction.

Odell Poteet, Ralls contractor and brother of M. H. Poteet, is reported "ready to go, just as soon as five blocks can be 'sewed up.'"

Agreements are being sought on the following initial projects: From Third Street on Avenue B to Seventh Street; from Fifth Street at Avenue B to C; and Sixth Street, Avenue A to B.

The Farwell Chamber of Commerce is pushing the project, and President Bob Brooks said this week, "We are hoping that when we get started on the first part of our paving, we can then obtain additional projects."

The C of C is working on the theory that once paving gets under-

way, "everybody decides they would like to have some of it." That, at least, proved to be the case four years ago when over 20 blocks were obtained through a voluntary system.

The Chamber has met with the city commission and obtained its approval of the paving project, and the city has accepted Ralph Douglas of Littlefield as an engineer to oversee the work. (He is also doing paving engineering in Texico.)

Douglas has made up specifications to which paving must conform before it can be approved, and the engineer will be responsible to the city for work which will be done.

The C-C head said it might be wise to explain to citizens the arrangement under which the project will be financed.

Summer Program Will Begin Monday

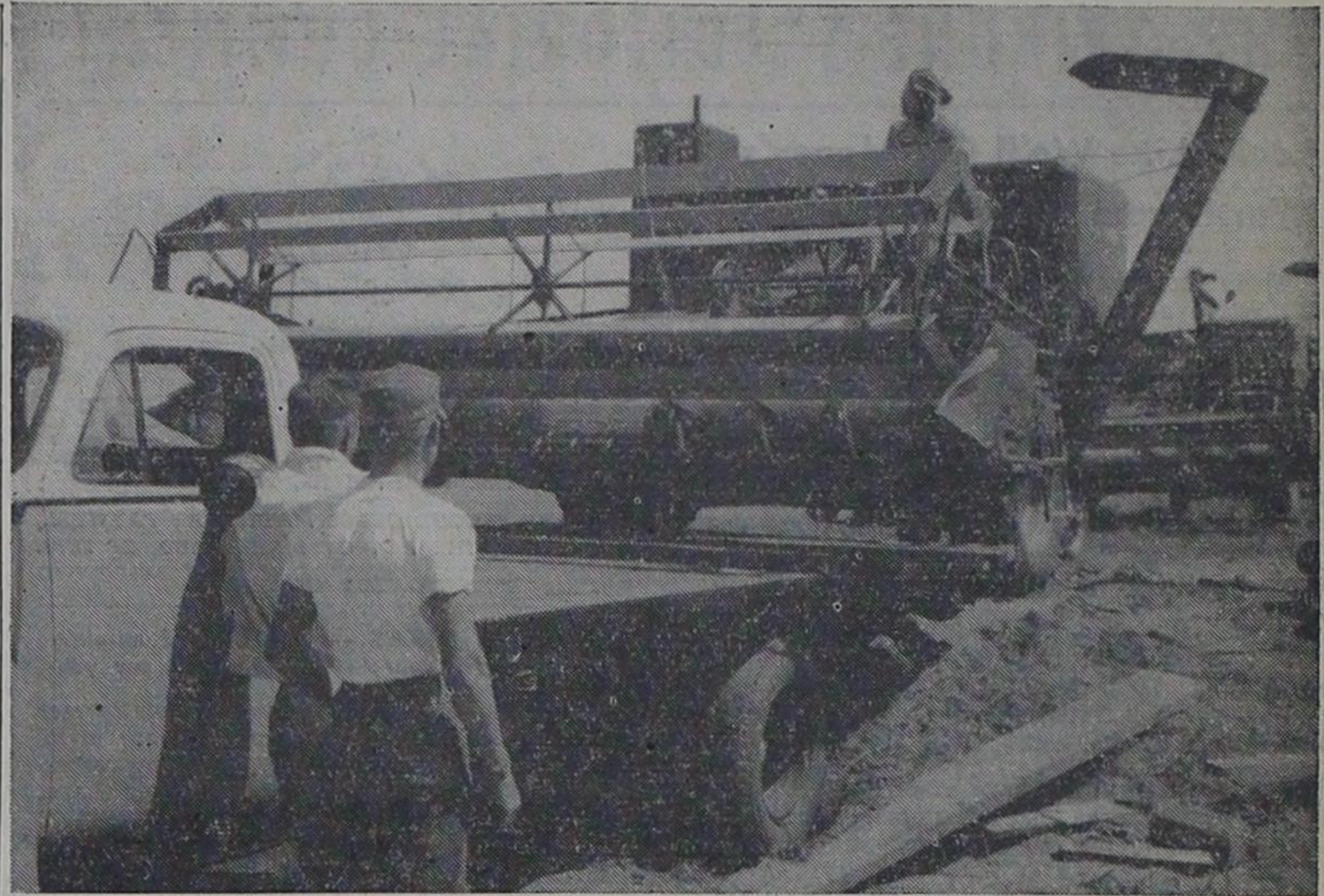
The tentative schedule for the biggest summer recreation program ever to be offered the youngsters of Texico-Farwell was an-

Parmar FB To Resist Allotment Changes

"The Parmar County Farm Bureau will do everything it can to block the proposed changes in allotting cotton," said Gilbert Kaltwasser, president of the organization, today.

There is currently agitation that the "trend" factor be reduced or eliminated as a means of determining cotton allotments. However, at this time, the county FB is opposed to any such change, says the president.

Kaltwasser explained how the proposals for the change originated:

Some time ago the Old Cotton Growers Belt Association, from the eastern part of the state, petitioned the state FB directors to recommend that reserves for trend, inequities, and small farms be reduced on a national, state and county level.

This recommendation was made to the committee on cotton of the American Farm Bureau Federation, but it failed to be accepted. However, the national group sanctioned the state FB to petition the state ASC committee to determine if changes could be made in Texas.

Apparently, says Kaltwasser, alterations in reserves can be made without legislative action.

He now understands that the District No. 2 director, Hub King of Brownfield, who is a member of a three-man cotton committee for the TFB, is seeking audience with the state ASC committee to "deal

with the matter. (Parmar County is in District 2.)

As King, who is also a state director, has not committed himself on whether he supports or opposes the changes, and the other two committee members are from the eastern part of the state, Kaltwasser believes the trend factor to be in danger.

He called on local Farm Bureau members who are interested in helping keep the trend factor alive for their county to contact King, outlining their positions.

Action should be taken soon on this important matter, believes the county FB head.

As an example of how much the reserves for trend, hardship cases, and small farms affect Parmar County, about 17,000 acres of the present allotment is from reserves set aside for these items.

If the proposed changes were in effect for 1955, Parmar County would have received 4,000 acres instead of 17,000 acres.

Commissioners, Farm Bureau Fight Extra 2-Cent Tax

The Commissioners of Parmar County, and the Parmar County Farm Bureau this week announced opposition to a proposed 2-cent increase in state tax on gasoline.

At the moment, the Texas legislature is distraught with ways and means of increasing revenue for the state. One of the most publicized movements is to increase the tax on gasoline another two cents per gallon.

Commissioner Forrest Osborn (Pct. 1) was instructed to wire Representative Jesse Osborn and state the opposition of the county commissioners against the plan.

Pct. 3 Commissioner Johnny McDonald, after the court session Monday, said, "We feel like the county should at least provide the right-of-way in cases where the state will come in and pay for the pavement." He said he believed that the participation of local government would be better than the state government.

He was referring to a proposal that the state would assist in the purchase of rights-of-way, if the 2-cent additional tax was made effective.

Counties are now required to

During his work at ENMU he has maintained a grade average of B. Pool will receive his BS degree at commencement exercises to be held Thursday, June 2, at 8 p. m.

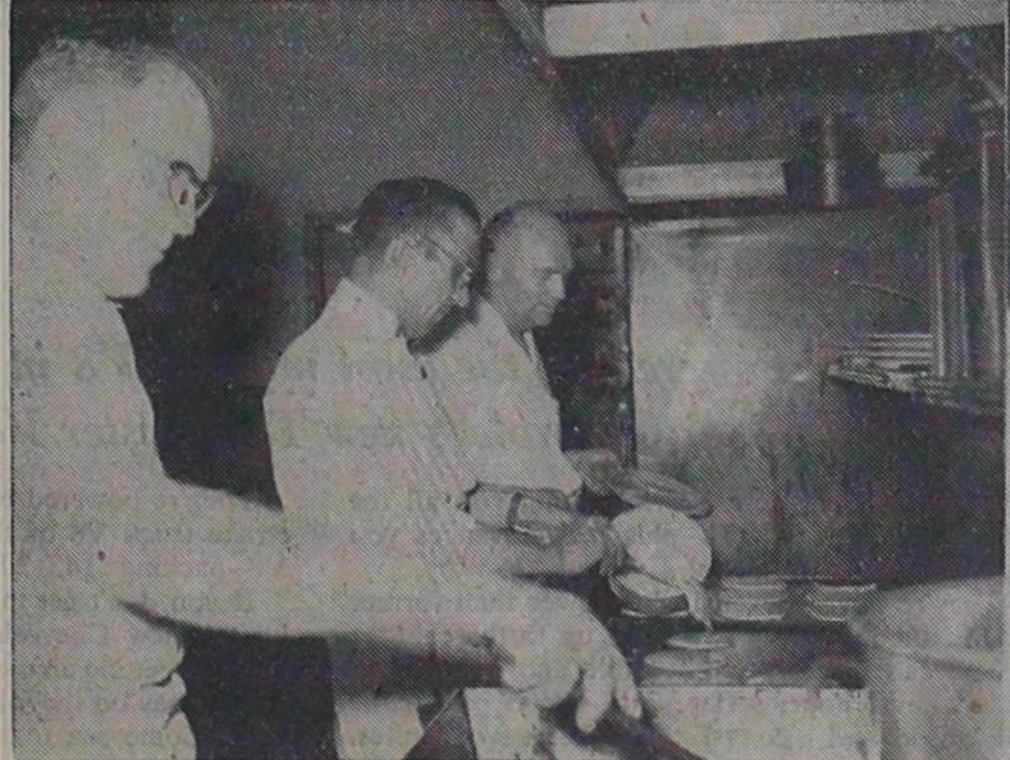


Rev. Gruber To Speak On Communism

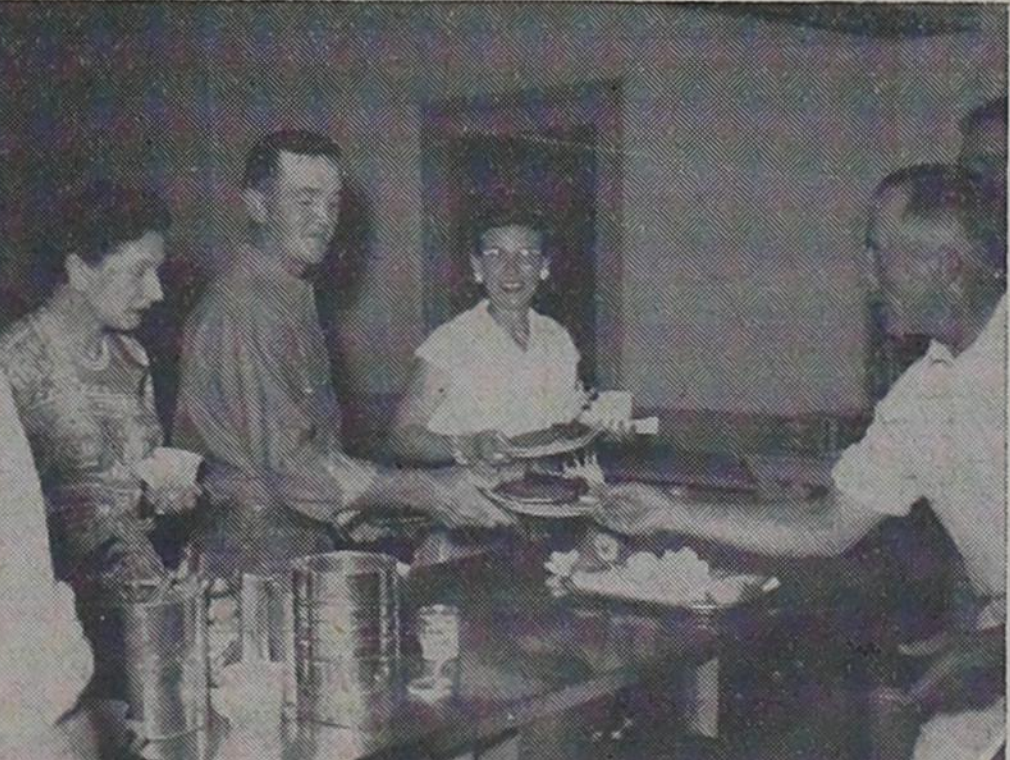
Rev. Gruber, who lived in Latvia under communistic government, will at that time, speak on, "Living Under Communism Rule."

Looks Like We'll Get Money's Worth from Texas Legislature

There probably wasn't a voter in Texas who didn't wince at the constitutional amendment to raise legislators' pay from \$10 to \$25 a day last year; but most likely, he thought about the high cost of living, and went ahead and did it.

One reason why he might have voted in favor of the pay raise idea was the 120-day limitation on pay. Just as everybody had expected, 120 days have lapsed, and the Texas congressmen are nowhere near being finished. In fact, their biggest problem—finances for bigger expenses—is yet to be hurdled.

Another national record for filibustering fell last week, as Lubbock Senator Corbin struck out against the administration's try for a 3-cent property tax to finance a water conservation program.

That's the fourth filibuster of the year already, and is the third time that a national record has been set. And there's no end in sight.

Yep, we're sure getting our money's worth this year, since no senator or representative is drawing a nickel of pay for all this hard work.

The Heritage of Your Country

Monday is Memorial Day. With war, or the threat of war, not so apparent as it has been in recent years, most of us are more likely to be more concerned with a picnic or some other holiday activity than with the cause for which Memorial Day was established.

Memorial Day is set aside for special commemoration of all the men and women who have given their lives in the service of their country, in order that you and this writer might enjoy the freedoms of America.

These words would not be written had it not been for those courageous persons, who have made the supreme sacrifice for the greatest country the world has ever known.

Farmers Aren't Only Ones Being Put in a Squeeze

Farmers have somehow gotten the notion that things are pretty rosy for all types of business except farming. 'Taint so.

Lots of good, old-fashioned American competition is making it tough sledding for other businesses, too. And we think it's a wonderful thing.

Likewise, farmers never appreciate the blessing of virtually weed-free land until it's infested with noxious growths that can reduce its value to practically nothing.

Combining Is Big Business for Local Harvesting Crew

Edd Hardage and Jack Spurlin, co-owners of an eight combine fleet of wheat harvest equipment, left Monday morning with a 14 man crew for their annual tour of harvesting in Kansas, Nebraska, Wyoming and South Dakota.

First stop for the harvesting crew will be in Wichita Falls where four combines are already located. The mile long procession of equipment includes eight combines, eight trucks, three trailer houses, three pickups, four cars and two sleepers.

Hardage says the force will harvest more than 12,000 acres of wheat on the tour before returning to Farwell around September 1.

Other stops scheduled for this trip include wheat acreages in Pratt, Meade and Goodlin, Kansas; Mitchell, Neb., Gettysburg, S. D., and points in Wyoming.

Traveling time between each of the stops on the schedule is about one day, according to Hardage.

Making the trip this year are Mr. and Mrs. Edd Hardage, Mr. and Mrs. Jack Spurlin and Donna Gayle, Mr. and Mrs. Gene Hardage, Don Pool, Preston Cain, Jesse Meeks and Truitt Hardage.

also making the trip, is carrying his boat in hopes that he will have some extra time for fishing.

Farwell has tallied almost 4 inches, Bovina 3½, and Friona 3½. The heaviest report so far is from the farm of W. J. Matthews six miles south of Texico-Farwell: 4.85.

Secretary of State To Reappoint Notaries

Secretary of State A. M. Muldrow, has announced that he will reappoint all persons who now hold Notary Public Commissions and that all such persons must qualify by filing an oath and bond with the County Clerk of their residence between June 1, 1955 and June 10, 1955. The law specifically requires County Clerks to approve Notary bonds and individuals should not send money or requests for commissions direct to the Secretary of State. All Notary matters can only be received by the Secretary of State after the County Clerk acts thereon.

Any person who has not heretofore been a Notary Public should apply to his County Clerk between May 1, 1955 and May 23, 1955, if he desires to have this application given prompt attention in the State Department, as the rush of reappointing all old Notaries may slow up the ordinary process of making new appointments and issuing commissions.

Secretary of State Muldrow said, "Each person applying for a commission as a Notary Public must be at least 21 years of age and a resident of the County for which he is appointed; exact names and permanent addresses should be given to the County Clerk in applying for a commission, as location of the Notary may be necessary long after he has notarized a particular instrument."

How many of you ever make bread puddings any more? We don't remember when we've seen a recipe for this once common dessert. In fact, we can't imagine why not. That used to be a treat at our house, but we would imagine that our mother hasn't made one in years. Of course, that was back when we had hot biscuits at every meal, and there was always plenty of cold bread to be used one way or another.

But we do have a recipe that fits the modern trend, and it is delicious. You don't have to be a hand with making good biscuits, you use lightbread for this one. Incidentally, this is a chocolate pudding.

2 squares unsweetened chocolate
2½ cups milk
1 teaspoon salt
½ cup sugar
2 egg yolks, slightly beaten
1½ tsp. vanilla
6 slices stale bread, cubed
1 egg white, beaten
2 tablespoons sugar

Add chocolate to milk and heat until melted. Blend with rotary beater. Combine salt, sugar and egg yolks; stir in chocolate mixture. Add vanilla. Combine bread and chocolate mixture and let stand 15 minutes, stirring often. Turn into greased 1-quart baking dish and bake in pan of hot water (375 F) for 40 minutes or until set. Beat egg white until foamy and add sugar gradually until mixture stands in peaks. Place on top of pudding and bake until delicately browned. Serve warm or cold.

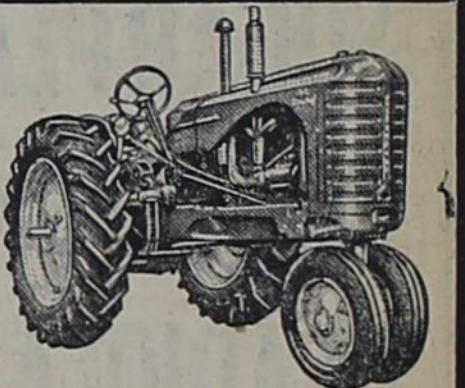

 Those who can pay cash for the improvements will submit a check for the amount required (it costs \$4 per footage front for a 35-foot street, including curb and gutter), and the check will be cashed and the money placed in escrow at Security State.
 The money will be released to pay the paving contractor when work has met the approval of the city, through Douglas, the engineer.
 In the case of property owners who will not be able to afford the cash outlay, their property titles will be examined, and a lien obtained on the property. Financial arrangements over a period of time can then be negotiated by the individual.
 Arrangements have been made with an established financial company which will buy property liens. This service is offered by the Chamber for those who desire it. Brooks says the only cash outlay which will be required in these instances is a lien recording fee—expected to be less than \$50.
 Brooks said this method has an important advantage over bond issues in that it would be necessary for the city to pay for examination of all property papers in the case of an election; whereas, under voluntary paving, only those who intend to borrow to pay for the paving will have this legal expense.

 out there actually being an increase in the number of tornadoes.
 Now, we do not suggest that no one should fear a tornado. It certainly would be foolhardy to stand

still and watch one approach, without making any attempt to get out of its path or protect oneself in some way.
 But we think the mass hysteria generated by a few excited reports last week is dangerous. Warnings from bonafide weather observers should be heeded.
 But excited outcries from amateurs who are prone to greatly exaggerate the seriousness of the storm, and to miscalculate the direction in which it is going, are more than a little likely to cause panic.
 And that's the last thing that ought to happen in ANY kind of a disaster.
 Maybe Felix Monroe has an idea or two to offer farmers this year who are looking around for some sideline activity which might turn up a little extra cash.
 Felix is a sheep feeder. He buys young ewes in late summer and fattens them through the winter months. Last year he did right well with about 300, he reports, getting not only the gain, but having a market spread of a few cents to help him out.
 Contrary to what some believe, feeding out sheep doesn't require an unusual amount of time and care—at least, that's what Felix tells us.

After the feeding operation is set up and ready to go, his flock only requires about 30 minutes of time per day. It's just a sideline for the local contractor, who says he has the time to spare, and finds the extra \$1000 profit at the end of the season "sure comes in handy."
 Felix says about \$2.50 a head is a pretty good estimate of what can be expected in the way of net profit on a feeding operation such as his. Maybe we should say labor profit instead of net. He doesn't charge off his own time.

Experience Proves Bench Levelling Pays Off Farmers

Farmers who have been irrigating for some time don't need to be told that the "lay" of their land has a lot to do with how they are able to utilize their irrigation water.

For this reason, plus others, great interest has been manifest within the past two years in bench levelling.

However, during the recent rainy spell which farms of the

area have enjoyed, another point in favor of bench levelling has made itself felt: rain water, just the same as pump water, can be best utilized on land that is properly engineered for its use.

Take the case of J. C. Redwine, for instance, who lives near the center of Parmer County, and is a cooperater with the Soil Conservation District.

His land has benefitted greatly from the recent rains because they were able to keep more moisture than is the case of land not as well engineered.

The pictures accompanying this story, together with the cutlines under them, tell this story graphically. The photos were taken by technicians of the Parmer County SCD only last week.

Says Melvin Swartz, "With a properly designed system of the type used by J. C., a farmer can utilize all the rain that falls on the land. He can get better distribution of his irrigation water without the loss of 'tail water.'"

What's more, says Swartz, "Land treated in this manner can be built up instead of being continually torn down by damaging rains."

The Parmer County farmer intends to plant cowpeas on this field this year to build up his soil, and to more nearly get rid of the little difficulties that arise in a new system of this kind. He plans to use this land for irrigated pasture and alfalfa at a later date.

"This farmer has done a wonderful job of improving soil conservation practices," says Swartz, who says that similar projects all over the district are doing much to improve farming practices in general.

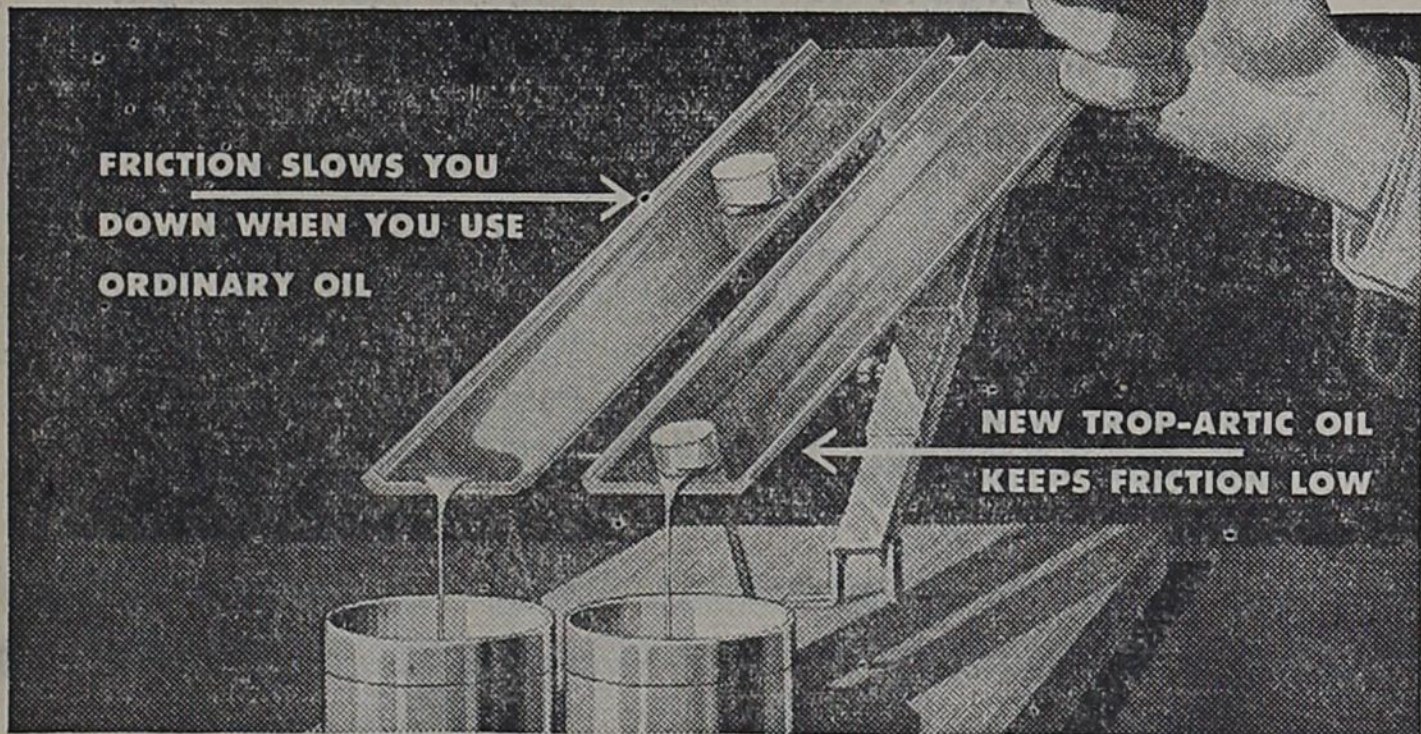

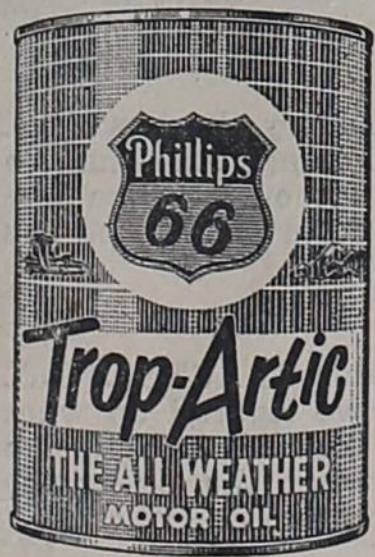

NEWS FROM THE FARM BUREAU

By RAYMOND EULER

Remember that when you receive a notice that your tractor gas exemption claims must be filed, you have a maximum of 30 days to take care of them.

This is your money only if your claim reaches the comptroller's office before the expiration date. Your wife, son or daughter can file the claim for you if you don't have time. We remind you wives again that you do not need your husband's permission to file this claim for him.

Just come in and state your desire and we'll take care of it for you. When the refund check arrives, you can either spend it or turn it over to your husband.

If you are a farmer, here is a question for you: do you want a law that compels you to pay a minimum wage to your farm hands of \$1.25 per hour? This is not a maximum, but a minimum scale.

We realize some hands are worth more than that, but we've heard some are not worth quite that

much, especially in some off-seasons.

At present, agricultural workers and employers are exempt from the minimum wage law, which is now 90c per hour. Gilbert Kaltwasser, your president, and Ralph Miller, your legislative chairman, have wired your representatives in opposition to this movement.

If you really care, we suggest you do a little writing on your own. If you need help, come by the office. James G. Patton and Walter Reuther are the chief components of the minimum wage increase and elimination of agricultural exemption.

Finland is buying 16,000 bales of U. S. cotton under the provisions of PL-480, a law championed by you and your American Farm Bureau. 3.7 million pounds of tobacco are also being purchased by Finland under this provision.

We were told last week that we might as well forget "what is right" when it comes to settlement of agricultural problems and remember that the group of greatest influence was the deciding factor, regardless of "right or wrong."

We are happy to note that we have seen and heard otherwise in many decisions reached by farm leaders and laymen.

Consider this: The blessing of the Lord, it maketh rich, and he addeth

no sorrow with it. Proverbs 10:22.

It flies because oppressed men sought freedom—in the right to speak boldly without fear—to vote at the dictates of their minds—to worship in the manner of their choice—and were willing to die for their beliefs.

At Valley Forge, at Chateau-Thierry and at Iwo Jima—wherever down through the years the need has arisen—Americans have said "I die but It lives."

Small wonder, then, that we as Americans, set one day aside as Flag Day. But in the expression of our respect let us fly worthy of the ideals for which Old Glory stands.

Flag Etiquette, the rules which have been formulated over the years for proper display of the Flag, forbids the flying of a flag that is tattered or torn. Flags that have achieved this condition should be destroyed by burning.

Tradition also says that it is improper to fly a soiled flag—it should be restored, preferably by drycleaning.

Water, Sewer Work To Amarillo Bidder

The Friona city commission met Monday afternoon at 2 o'clock in the city manager's office for the purpose of opening bids on the planned water and sewer construction.

There was a total of seven bidders and the contract was let to H. B. Jordan, Amarillo, who entered a low bid of \$68,679.35 for both water and sewer projects.

His bid on Division I (water-

works), was \$42,256.40 and on Division II (sewer improvements), the bid was \$26,422.95. Jordan set a time of 90 days in which he will complete the job.

He will start the full-scale operation in about 60 days but he does plan to do some emergency water line construction in Friona. His reason for not being able to start full scale operation before 60 days is because of the delivery dates on the needed material for the job.

Jordan is not new in Friona, as he was awarded a contract in 1950 for water lines that were constructed at that time.

The next lowest bid was from Brodie Construction Company, also of Amarillo, for a sum of \$71,392.38. The commissioners also discussed the possibility of taking over the management of the Friona Cemetery. J. L. Marcum, local funeral home operator, was present and discussed the improvements that could be accomplished in Friona.

It was then decided that the Friona Cemetery Association would meet with the city commission this Thursday (today) at 4 p. m. in the city manager's office to continue the discussion.

Also included in Monday's meeting was the first reading of the proposed zoning ordinance followed by a public hearing at 3 p. m. This ordinance has been in the making since last July.

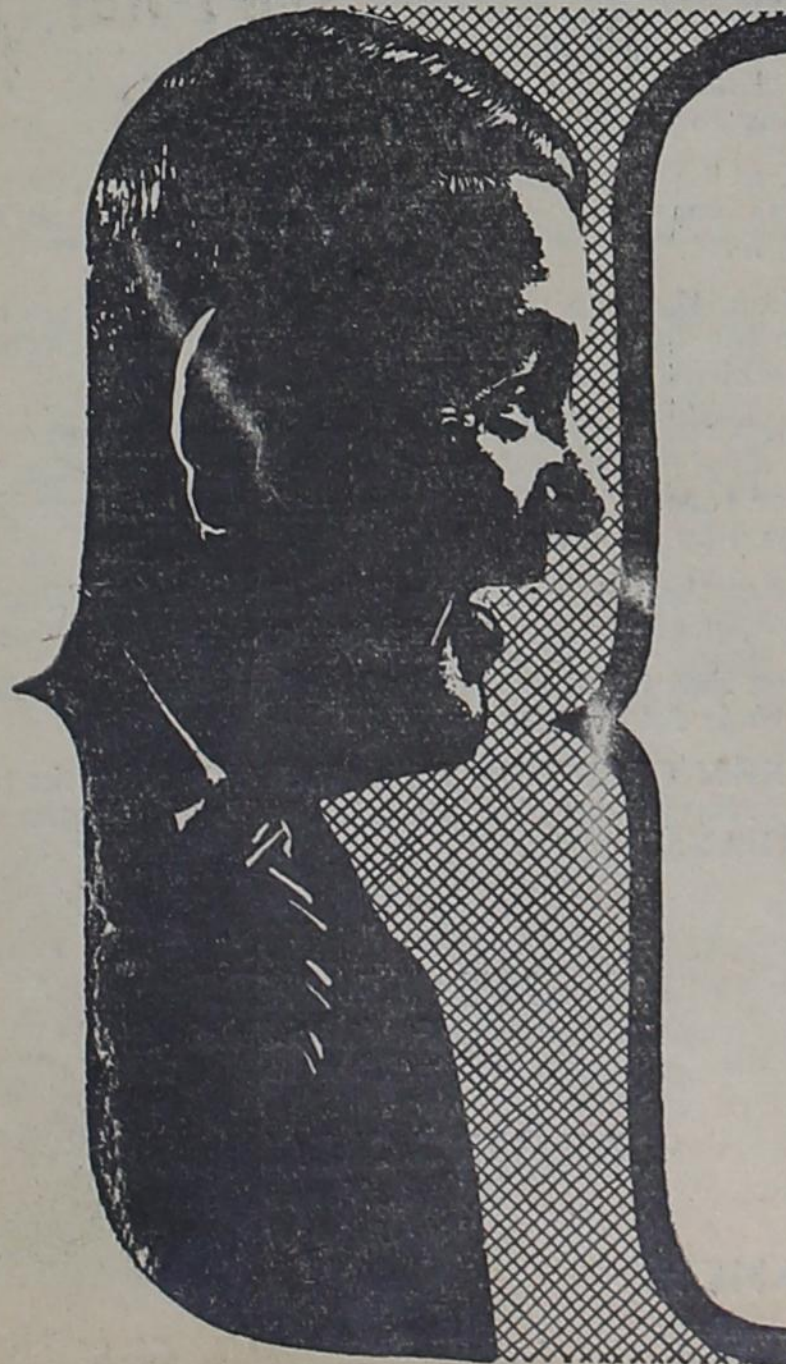

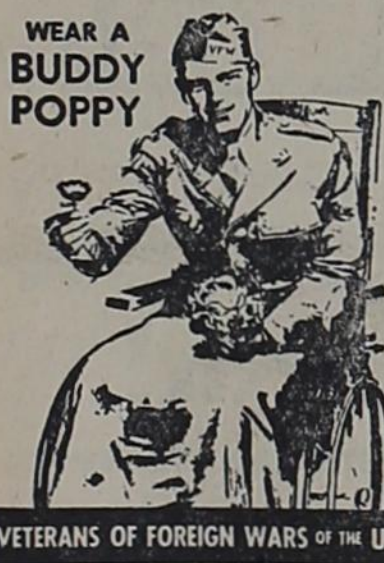

thirties when Joe Landrum was the mayor of Friona. The first fire chief was Howard Morris and along in the fall of 1930, the first 1000 feet of hose was acquired.

The theatre which was located on Main Street next to what is now known as the "old bank building," burned to the ground in 1933. It was shortly after this that the department acquired a truck which was given to them by Jerome Buchanan, operator of the local International house.

The truck given them was a 1929 International flat-bed.

Three years later the city was asked if a newer truck could be purchased and the city commission approved the plan. A 1934 Chevrolet truck was then acquired and the city paid it out in monthly payments.

There were times while the city was paying for the truck that they got short of money, but everything

worked out satisfactorily, says the present chief, Charlie Bainum.

Fred White, Bainum, Ray White, and a man named Michell then proceeded to build a bed on the '34 truck. It had no pump or cab, and the entire piece of equipment was all open. It also had a hand siren and the hose was supposed to be carried on it, but none came with it.

F. W. Reeve was the mayor of Friona at that time and shortly afterwards, Charlie Bainum was elected fire chief.

By working with the city commission, Bainum received permission to have the '34 truck overhauled. The bed was then dismantled and the truck sent to Ft. Worth where a pump was installed and a new bed to house the fire hose was added.

At that time, and up until the present building was built in 1950, the trucks were kept in any shelter that was available, to keep them out of the weather.

The department acquired the first of their present equipment in 1950 which is the '50 Chevrolet fire truck kept on the north side of the fire station building. This piece of equipment was sent in the fall of '50 to Anderson, Ind., to the Bowie Fire Equipment Company, for installation of a pump, and place was built to carry the hose. It was also painted at that time.

Chief Bainum traveled to Indiana to bring the truck back. He states that it took him five hours to get there and 55 hours to get back.

In 1952, the Rockwell Bros. Lumber Company was almost completely destroyed by fire. It was very shortly after this that the members of the department took a tour of the town and collected \$1200 in donations, in half a day. This entire amount was used to buy coats, helmets and boots for the members and this equipment is still in use.

Also, a 1949 truck was purchased in 1952 and the '50 truck was rebuilt. It was in 1953 that the portable light plant was purchased and in 1954 the department acquired a pick-up which is now used to carry all fire fighting equipment.

The department had the pick-up a year before it was rebuilt to carry present equipment.

This year, 1955, has really been a big year for the Friona Fire Department. It was this year that the department presented its first budget to the Friona City Commission for an amount of \$3400 and it was approved by the commission.

So far, \$1200 has been spent for emergency equipment and Bainum says that they plan to spend about \$2000 more before the year is out.

Some of the items purchased this year have been a 2-way radio (already installed in the pick-up), respirator, smoke masks, ladders, first aid kits, warning lights, salvage covers and mops and buckets.

The building now has sliding overhead doors and stores an extra 600 to 800 feet of hose besides what is on the trucks (1000 feet on the small one and 1200 feet on the larger truck).

There are two booster tanks on each truck which in actuality are for extra water in case there is not a hydrant near enough for the men to tie onto. The tank on the small truck has a 300-gallon capacity and the other tank on the larger of the two trucks has a 500-gallon capacity. There is also 300 feet of booster hose on each truck, says Chief Bainum.

Bainum adds that through the Red Cross, seven members of the department have completed and passed the first aid course which was conducted in Friona recently.



Modern Building Houses Department

This is the Friona Fire Department's modern building which was constructed five years ago. Before this building was completed, the equipment was kept in any shelter available. Before 1955 is over, there will be an addition made to the structure, and also the new city hall will be built on the same lot.

It was through this organization that the course was offered.

He also was very proud of the fact that, "Everything that the department now has in its possession is paid for." Most people will agree that he has a right to be proud.

Officers of the Friona Fire Department, other than Bainum are James Cunningham, assistant chief, and Weldon Dickson, secretary-treasurer; fire marshal for Friona is Roy Wilson and his assistant is Clyde Fields; the two captains (one for each truck) are Ralph Shirley and Ray White, and the two lieutenants are Ruben Taylor and Pete Hollis.

The total valuation of the department is \$13,778.98 but this does not include the depreciation on the equipment in the past year.

As a last note, Bainum says before the year 1955 is gone, the department will start construction of an addition on its present building.

The new city hall will also be built on the same lot. This will come as a result of a bond election held in the latter part of March which provided for these two additions.

Hope To Open Bank By First of October

If a charter can be obtained in the near future, Bovina is expected to have a bank by Oct. 1. This is the hope of local boosters who are pushing the project for a new bank, and who the past week were encouraged to see financial hurdles overcome.

Stock subscribers, which number from 50 to 60, oversubscribed the local capital commitment, purchasing 200 shares at \$200 each for a total of \$40,000.

In fact, some larger stockholders are being requested to release some of their shares so that the financing can be spread over a broader base.

A limit of 20 shares per individual was established, although at the present time, the largest stockholder only has 10. This is an indication of the widespread interest for a bank in Bovina, believe promoters.

The first of this week, several Bovina people drove to Dallas to confer with federal banking officials there, and to discuss plans in more detail with non-local persons who will be interested in the new bank.

They returned Tuesday with an optimistic report, saying that the banking commissioner has suggested that the local group go ahead with its plan for making a charter application.

Meanwhile, much groundwork already has been taken care of. In addition to working out finances, a location for the proposed business has been obtained and plans for a new, modernistic building are underway. Its cost is expected to be from \$25,000 to \$30,000.

Two investors from Hale Center (Hale County) and one from Carrollton are interested in the proposed new financial institution. The latter, formerly associated with a Petersburg bank, will manage the bank if present plans are realized.
