the 11th hour of the 11th day of the 11th month in 1918. Inasmuch as that war was thought to be the "war to end all wars" the designation of Armistice Day was deemed sufficient at that time.

Congress again tackled the problem of national holidays and set November 11th as Veterans Day, deleting the term "Armistice." Today Veterans Day is a time that we honor those who served their country, particularly the living veterans. Memorial Day looks to the past veterans.

We have a goodly supply of veterans today. A few are still around from WWI and several million from WWII with a big representation from Korea, Vietnam, et al, still ready to defend the honor and freedoms of the United States.

Honor the veterans for they have given you a free, independent and prosperous United States of America. There will be more veterans as our freedoms are being constantly challenged around the world. ## Parmer Voters Reject Four Amendments

Parmer County voters seemed to be out of step with the rest of Texas voters by turning down four of the 11 Constitutional Amendments in the Tuesday

An early prediction of light voter turnout across the state came true, and in Parmer County, only 512 residents out of 4,261 registered voters went to the polls for a low 12 percent.

Across the state, early returns showed that all but two amendments appeared headed toward approval.

In the county, the four amendments failing passage were No. 2, replacing the \$10,000 limit on urban homestead exemptions with a one-acre limit; No. 8, which would have authorized tax-exempt status to certain veterans' and fraternal organizations; No. 9, authorizing the court judges to substitute for county judges in probate matters; and No. 10, which would have authorized cities to re-

Amendment No. 6 received overwhelming support in Parmer County as well as across Texas. It was the issue which would allow for the first time in Texas the garnishment of wages to make overdue child support payments.

The two propositions that weren't leading in early returns urged to attend their respective across Texas were No. 8 and No.

10.

# Steers, Wolverines Make Trip To Playoffs Again

The Texico Wolverines and Farwell Steers are both again in the state playoffs, Texico playing Tatum in the Class A state championship game Saturday night, and the Steers taking on the powerful Seagraves Eagles for a bi-district title Friday

For the fourth time since Texico reinstated its football program in the late 60s, the Wolverines will be playing for a

The Wolverines are hosting the 1983 state final game Saturday night at 7:30 MST and their opponent is Tatum, the only team to have defeated the Wolverines this year and the winner of Texico's Class A district.

Coach Lynn says that the Wolverines will be "a completely different team from the one that played Tatum the first time this year." Tatum outscored Texico 21-12 in their district meeting back on October 21, and the Wolverines are looking to turn the tables at

home Saturday night. Across the line in Texas, third year head coach Bruce Dollar directed the Farwell against; and No. 11, 298 for, 185 Steers to three straight victories to open the season, then lost on consecutive Friday nights to Seagraves and Friona, before rallying to win five in a row and end their second year without a defeat in district play.

For the first time since the 1958, 1959 and 1960 seasons, Farwell won back-to-back district titles, a fitting finale for their departure from Class 2A where they have played the past three years. Starting with next year's schedule, Farwell will compete in Class 1A according to the recent UIL reassignment.

Back in 1958 when the Steers were district champions, they boasted a 9-1 season and 4-0 district mark. They went on to beat Idalou 40-18 in bidistrict in a game played at Littlefield, but ended their playoff march in Buffalo Stadium in Canyon where White Deer beat Farwell 28-16.

Some of the members of the 1958 squad, coached by J.D. Atwell, were Joe Hughes, Owen Huffaker, Morris Reed, James Burleson, Robert Carthel, Doug Roberts, Dickie Williams, Gerald Christian, Larry McDorman, Phillip Berry, Johnny Lovelace, Carroll Hughes, Barthel Ford, Benjy Dial, Larry Jesko, James Ussery and Tommy Williams.

In 1959 the Steers again took the district title, but it was not as easy a task as the year before as they wound up in a three-way tie for the crown with Sudan and

Steer coach Dempsey Alexander won the three-way flip with a quarter he later called "ole Lonesome George" with which he also won the flip for home team rights with Idalou. The luck ran out after that as the Steers lost in bi-district to the Wildcats 27-18.

In addition to most of the 1958 roster, these names also appeared in the Steer lineup that year: Scotty Turner, Bill Owen, Jimmy Cain, Jerry McCuan, Jimmy Clements, Jerry Lovelace, Jimmy Hardage, and Charles Roberts.

The 1960 edition of the Steers romped through district without a loss to take the title for the third consecutive year and went on to meet Idalou once again in the bi-district playoff. This time the Steers were victorious by a 14-12 margin in what some fans remember as being a really exciting two-point conversion run on an unexpected handoff from Benjy Dial to Jerry Love-

Then the Steers faced the Stinnett Rattlers whose senior halfback Donnie Anderson was most of the reason they were the state's top ranked Class A team with 11 straight wins on the season. Donnie's brother Larry Anderson was the quarterback





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# HOW TO CARVE A TURKEY

Let turkey stand for 20 to 30 minutes after roasting-then try one of these easy carving methods.

TRADITIONAL CARVING METHOD



1. Remove drumstick and thigh -To remove drumstick and thigh, press leg away from body. Joint connecting leg to backbone will oftentimes snap ree or may be severed easily with knife point. Cut dark meat completely from body by following body contour carefully



2. Slicing dark meat-Place drumstick and thigh on separate plate and cut through connecting joint. Both pieces may be individually sliced. Tilt drumstick to convenient angle, slicing towards plate as shown in illustration.



3. Slicing thigh-To slice thigh meat, hold firmly on plate with fork. Cut even slices parallel to the bone.



4. Preparing breast-in preparing breast for easy slicing, place knife parallel and as close to wing as possible Make deep cut into breast, cutting right to bone. This is your base cut. All breast slices ill stop at this vertical cut.



5. Carving breasts-After base cut, begin to slice breast. Carve downward, ending

base cut. Start each new slice slightly up on breast. Keep slices thin and even.

SIDE CARVING METHOD



1. Carving position-Place turkey on its side, breast away from carver. Remove wing tip and first joint. Hold tip firmly, lift up, and sever at joint. Set this aside for other dishes and leave second point of wing attached to turkey



Remove drumstick -- 51 te dark meat off drumstick and thigh until thigh bone is exposed. Lift drumstick and cut off at thigh joint. Slice meat from drumstick.



3. Cut away thigh bone-Steady turkey with fork. Run knife point completely around thigh bone, loosening it. Pry one end up, grasp and pull free. With thigh bone gone, generous portions of dark meat can be sliced from turkey



4. Slicing dark meat - Slice dark meat away from turkey just above removed thigh bone. As you work deeper into the meat, you will discover the "oyster." This choice piece may be lifted whole from spoon-shaped section of back-



5. Slicing white mest-Make deep vertical cut in breast just in front of wing joint to serve as base for all breast meat slices.



8. Breast slicas - Start from center of breast and cut toward you, making large, even slices. When more slices are needed, turn turkey and repeat process. Remove stuffing from hole cut under thigh
