Ralston Named New Castro County Extension Agent

Seth Ralston, county Extension Agent for Agriculture for Parmer County since 1978, has resigned that position to take the post of CEA in Castro County effective December 1, 1983.

Prior to coming to Parmer County, Ralston had served two years as assistant county agent in Castro County. In Parmer County he replaced Mack Heald who resigned from the position to go into private business.

Ralston's appointment was announced by County Judge Polly Simpson and Dr. Catherine B. Crawford, district director for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. The Extension Service is an educational arm of the Texas A&M University System, the U.S. Department of Agriculture and the

county Commissioners Courts cooperating.

Ralston replaces longtime Castro County agent Charles Hottel, who recently retired. Ralston is a native of Spearman and was graduated from Spearman High School in 1972.

He received an Associate of Science degree from Clarendon Junior College, Clarendon, in 1974. In 1976 he was graduated with honors from Texas A&M University, College Station, with a Bachelor of Science degree in agricultural education. At A&M he was active in Alpha Zeta and the Collegiate Future Farmers of America. He has done graduate study at A&M and at Eastern New Mexico University.

Ralston's hobbies are raising and showing livestock, hunting

and fishing. He serves on the swine task force of the South Plains Development Program, is a director-at-large of the West Texas Pork Producers Association, and is a member of the Farwell Development Corporation.

He is married to the former Anita Smith of Spearman. The couple has a daughter, Danna, and a son, Wesley, 6.

Church Of Christ Lesson Series Nov. 13-16

Farwell Church of Christ has scheduled a series of lessons on "Are We Accepting or Rejecting Our Responsibilities as Christians," November 13-16, announces church minister Ralph Gates.

Duward Lee of Denver, Colo., will be guest speaker for the event.

Morning lessons in the series will be "Going Forward: A Study of the Philippian Letter." Sunday worship services will be at 10 a.m. and 6 p.m. CST, and weekday services will be at 10 a.m. and 7:30 p.m.

The guest lecturer is a member of the teaching staff of the Bear Valley School of Preaching in Denver where he has been since 1976.

He was born in Dickens, County, Tex., and after graduation from high school worked in Albuquerque. He was married to Helen Hines of Ralls and they have three children.

After serving in the Armed Forces for four years, in 1949 Lee made the decision to spend his life preaching Christ.

While living at Bovina he attended ENMU at Portales where he earned a BA degree with a double major, Bible and

speech. While preaching at Lariat and after completing his BA, all academic work toward an MA was finished including research for a theses though it was never completed. Since that time he has done additional graduate work at Pepperdine and the University of Utah.

He moved to Grand Junction, Colo., in 1953 where his work included a weekly TV and radio program, and in 1958 he and his family went to Australia to work in the mission field for three years. Here he served as editor of a national journal, "Truth in Love," and also spoke on radio and TV.

The Lees continued in the mission field at Mountain Home, Idaho, spent some time

in Lucerne, Calif., and in 1967 moved to Salt Lake City, Utah, and in 1970 made the move to Colorado.

He made a six-week teaching tour to India and in 1975 was asked to go into the country of Ethiopia and help prepare church leaders for the inevitable communist takeover. He and his family were there until July of 1976. He says, "The early return was not anticipated, but much good was accomplished and the church is strong."

Since his return he has taught at the preaching school in Denver.

Everyone is cordially invited to the series of lessons to hear Lee speak.

Elizabeth Phillips, Student Council Sponsor, invites all residents of the area to this special program to pay tribute to our veterans.

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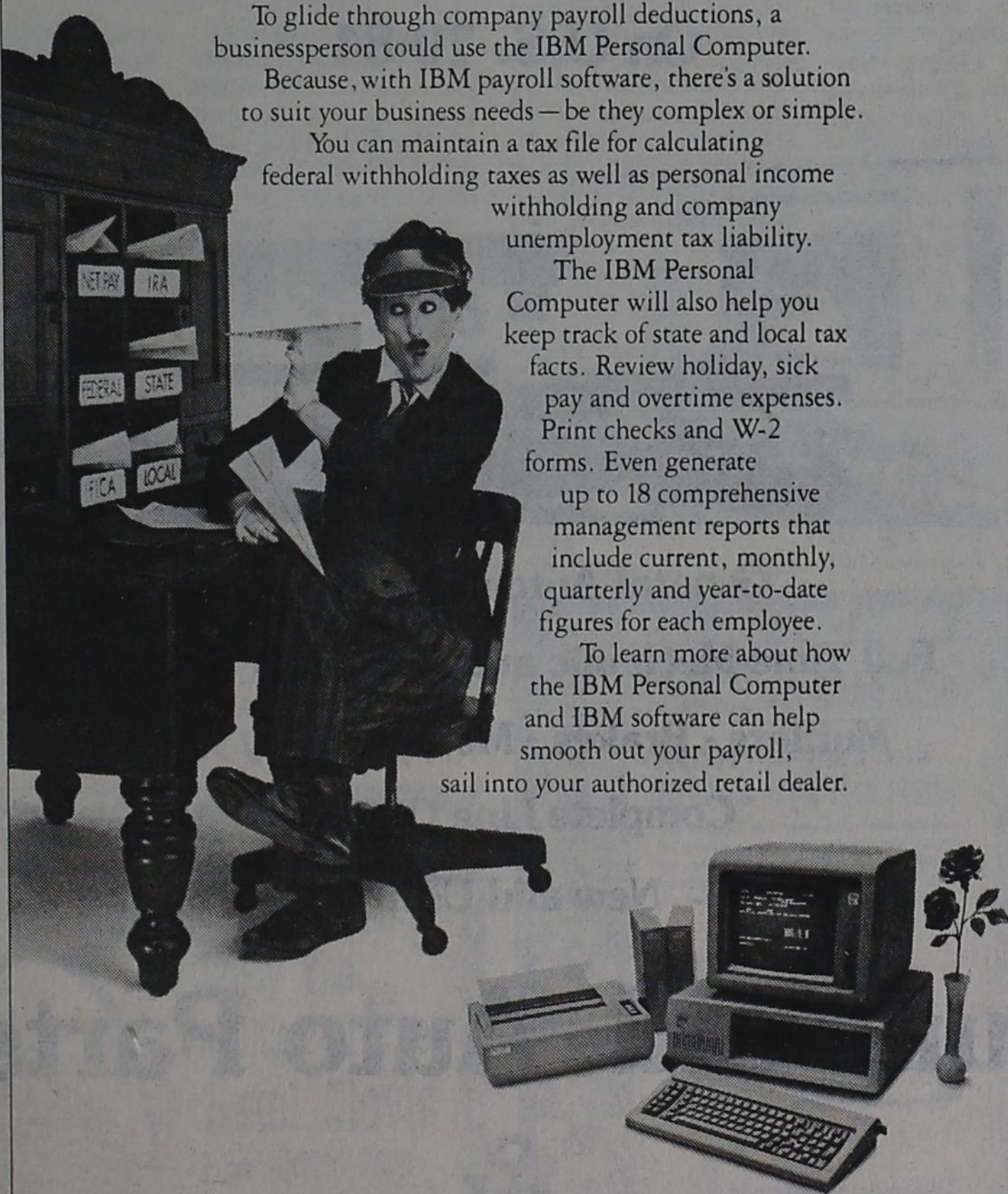
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HOW TO CARVE A TURKEY

Let turkey stand for 20 to 30 minutes after roasting—then try one of these easy carving methods.

TRADITIONAL CARVING METHOD



1. Remove drumstick and thigh—To remove drumstick and thigh, press leg away from body. Joint connecting leg to backbone will oftentimes snap free or may be severed easily with knife point. Cut dark meat completely from body by following body contour carefully with knife.



2. Slicing dark meat—Place drumstick and thigh on separate plate and cut through connecting joint. Both pieces may be individually sliced. Tilt drumstick to convenient angle, slicing towards plate as shown in illustration.



3. Slicing thigh—To slice thigh meat, hold firmly on plate with fork. Cut even slices parallel to the bone.



4. Preparing breast—In preparing breast for easy slicing, place knife parallel and as close to wing as possible. Make deep cut into breast, cutting right to bone. This is your base cut. All breast slices will stop at this vertical cut.



5. Carving breasts—After base cut, begin to slice breast. Carve downward, ending at base cut. Start each new slice slightly up on breast. Keep slices thin and even.

SIDE CARVING METHOD



1. Carving position—Place turkey on its side, breast away from carver. Remove wing tip and first joint. Hold tip firmly, lift up, and sever at joint. Set this aside for other dishes and leave second point of wing attached to turkey.



2. Remove drumstick—Slice dark meat off drumstick and thigh until thigh bone is exposed. Lift drumstick and cut off at thigh joint. Slice meat from drumstick.



3. Cut away thigh bone—Steady turkey with fork. Run knife point completely around thigh bone, loosening it. Pry one end up, grasp and pull free. With thigh bone gone, generous portions of dark meat can be sliced from turkey.



4. Slicing dark meat—Slice dark meat away from turkey just above removed thigh bone. As you work deeper into the meat, you will discover the "oyster." This choice piece may be lifted whole from spoon-shaped section of backbone.



5. Slicing white meat—Make deep vertical cut in breast just in front of wing joint to serve as base for all breast meat slices.



6. Breast slices—Start from center of breast and cut toward you, making large, even slices. When more slices are needed, turn turkey and repeat process. Remove stuffing from a hole cut under thigh.

On November 15 and 19, viewers of "The Creative Woman" will learn about sewing machine care and maintenance, and using oven cooking bags. Ann Silva and Kaye McCown, associated with Ann Silva's Bernina Sewing Center in Albuquerque, will discuss lots of money saving techniques home sewers can do to eliminate the need for calling a sewing machine repairman. They will also discuss proper needle sizes, what to look for in buying a sewing machine (both new and used), and ways to make a sewing machine last a lifetime.

Christy Kirk, home economist with Reynolds Metals Co. in Los Angeles, will also be on the show and will tell how to spend less time in the kitchen and have more time for other activities. She emphasizes using oven cooking bags, and will demonstrate several uses for

these bags. On November 17 and 20, the topics will include cooking rice, wall treatments and sewing tips from Stretch & Sew, Inc. Diane Duncan, home economist and spokeswoman for The Rice Council in Houston, will show four different ways to cook rice. JoAnn Less, Extension housing specialist with the Cooperative Extension Service in Las Cruces, will discuss several different wall treatments.

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In Bi-District Tonight - -

Steers Shut Out Longhorns For Perfect District Mark

On a wet and foggy Friday night in Hart, the Steers battled with the Longhorns and won impressively with a 15-0 shut-out. With this victory, the Steers are now 8-2 overall and 5-0 in district play, not having dropped a single district game in the last two years.

The first half moved slowly, as both teams struggled against the wet turf and slick footballs. But late in the second quarter the Steers took advantage of a Todd Christian fumble recovery on the 35-yard line. Running back Paul Fulcher moved the ball into Longhorn territory with short runs, which allowed sure-footed Manuel Cantu to cap the drive with a 27-yard field goal, just as time ran out in the first half. The Steers retired to the locker room at halftime with a 3-0 lead.

In the third quarter, the Steers wasted no time in gaining the momentum. Hart opened with the ball, but went nowhere, with the credit for the halt going to the Steer defensive unit on a fine effort. Bobby Ford, Todd Christian, Jesse Anzaldua, and Kevin Owen made the tackles for Farwell, forcing a Longhorn punt.

After gaining possession, the Steers drove 70 yards in nine plays. Blake Kelley and Fulcher opened the drive, each with good runs, followed by a gain of 21 by Alan Eubank. Kelley added two more and Eubank ran for another. On third down, quarterback Eubank went to the air, and picked out his leading receiver, Roger Robertson, who made the catch, good for 35 yards and a touchdown. The Steers then led 9-0.

After the Cantu kickoff, Hart took possession, but lost the ball on a fumble on their first play from scrimmage. Making the recovery for the Steers was Cantu. Cantu, who played his first at defensive back since the season opener, was welcomed back and quickly made his presence known, with this fumble recovery on the 10-yard line, and two interceptions.

From the 10, the Steers needed three plays to increase their lead to 15. Kelley ran for four, Paul Fulcher burst for six more, and was stopped just short of the goal line, but on the following play Kelley crashed in for six points.

The Steers couldn't quite manage to score again, but did hold Hart motionless, with Cantu, Robertson, and Eubank all coming up with fourth quarter interceptions. The final score saw the Steers winning 15-0, for their only shutout of the regular season. By holding Hart scoreless, the Farwell defense finished up district play allowing only four touchdowns in five games.

Farwell will now represent District 5-2A in a bi-district battle with the Seagraves Eagles Friday night in Plains.

"Friday night's win over Hart made it 10 district wins in a row for us and we're real proud of that record. In fact, we've only lost two district games in the past three years," commented Farwell Coach Bruce Dollar after the game.

The win gave the Steers the clear title to the District 5-2A championship for the second consecutive year.

The coach said Manuel Cantu was back in the lineup for a full game for the first time since he broke his collar bone early in the year.

"He intercepted two passes, made one fumble recovery, and booted a 27-yard field goal. It's good to have him back," Coach Dollar said.

Paul Fulcher was the leading rusher for the Steers with 70 yards on 11 carries, all in the first half. Fulcher did not see any second half action because of a minor leg injury; however, he says he is fine this week.

Blake Kelley was the team's next leading rusher with 45 yards on 12 tries.

In addition to Cantu's two pass interceptions, Roger Robertson and Alan Eubank also each had one interception, and Todd Christian recovered a fumble.

The coach named Johnny Daniel as the defensive Steer of the week and on offense he named Paul Fulcher for that award.

Daniel tackled the runners for losses seven times and just played real well, the coach said, adding that Fulcher did a good job for playing only one half and had good yardage for his efforts.

Concerning the upcoming battle with the Seagraves Eagles in the bi-district match, the coach said the team is looking forward to the game and the guys are really up for it.

"We'll have to play hard and make no errors to beat them, but we've been looking forward to this and we'll do our best. We have improved greatly since we played them back in September. They'll be tough -- they're ranked in the top 12 Class 2A teams in the state, number eight in one poll and number 12 in another; so we have our work cut out," Dollar said.

Several Steers were queried on their feelings about playing Seagraves in the bi-district tilt. JOHNNY DANIEL: "We're feeling great and ready to get after them."

PAUL FULCHER: "I think if we do our best we can win. We're going to show them that we're a football team, and if they're going to win, we're sure going to make them work hard for it. We'll do our best, and hope everyone will come to Plains and support us."

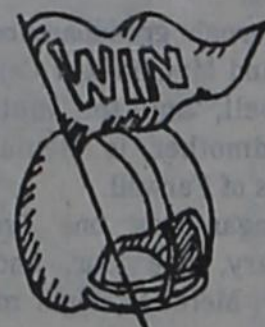
ALAN EUBANK: "I think we'll do well. We will need to play without mistakes, but I think if we do that and really do our best we can win."

MANUEL CANTU: "I'm ready!!! I think we'll do just fine. I feel fine and I'm ready!"

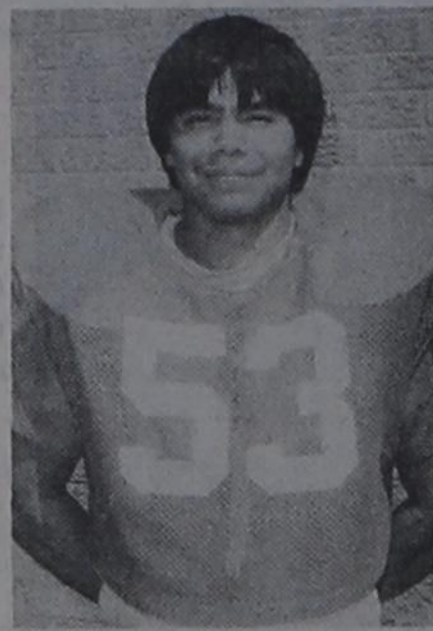
TODD CHRISTIAN: "It feels good to be playing them again.

In January of this year Carlos Nicolas, Farwell sophomore, was diagnosed as having carcinoma on the bone of his right knee. Since that time Carlos has been undergoing chemotherapy and radiation treatments at M.D. Anderson Hospital in Houston.

Carlos and one of his parents have been flying to Houston every three weeks for two to three weeks of treatments before returning home. (Their airline tickets have been provided by the Crippled Children's Foundation).

This past August Carlos had surgery for the removal of his right leg at the knee, and he now wears a prosthesis.

Five weeks ago Carlos had a second surgery, this time to remove cancerous spots from his lungs. He is reported by family members to be recovering nicely and is expected to be home by this weekend.

The Farwell High School Student Council is making plans to sponsor a dance-a-thon as a fund-raiser to supplement the near-depleted bank account set up for Carlos at the first of this year.

The dance-a-thon will be at the Farwell Community Center on Saturday, Dec. 3, from 3 to 6 p.m. in the afternoon.

Students from the high school and junior high will be making house-to-house solicitations for pledges for the dance-a-thon, and a Student Council spokesman asks that when they come to your door for pledges to please be generous.

"The money you donate will allow one of Carlos' parents to make the trip and stay with him while he is in Houston," the spokesman said.

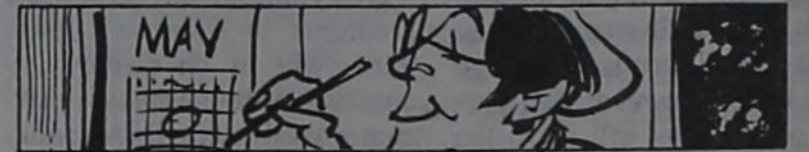
The dance-a-thon pledges will be for the number of dances that

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Host Tatum Saturday - -

Win Over Reserve Puts Wolverines In Finals

The Texico Wolverines used a diversified rushing and passing attack to come from behind to defeat the stubborn Reserve Mountaineers 20-14 in overtime Saturday night at Wolverine Stadium in one of the most exciting games Wolverine fans can recall in recent years.

The crucial victory put the Wolverines into Saturday's Class A state championship game against the Tatum Coyotes who are undefeated and ranked Number One in Class A. Texico's only loss for the season came at the hands of the Coyotes who beat the Wolverines 21-12 in a regular district match in October.

In the Texico-Reserve game neither team was able to move on its first possession, but on Texico's second possession, they quickly fumbled the ball and Reserve recovered on the 30-yard line in Wolverine territory.

Reserve quickly turned the Wolverine error into a touchdown as Gary Zuniga threw a 25-yard scoring strike to Jim Hidalgo. The PAT kick by Dway Larsen was good, and with 5:28 left in the first quarter Reserve had a 7-0 lead.

Late in the same quarter, using a single-wing offense, Reserve's Zuniga broke loose on a 30-yard touchdown run. The PAT was good by Larsen and at the end of the first quarter, Reserve led 14-0.

Most of the second quarter was a defensive struggle; however the Wolverines put an impressive drive together late in the half as they marched 80 yards on 10 plays.

Quarterback Brad Steward threw a 20-yard pass to Kevin West and a 10-yard pass to Terry Tubbs, and made a spectacular 20 yard run. Billy Bibbs capped the drive with an 11-yard run, the first TD ever scored on a Reserve team by a Texico team. The PAT run by Ronnie Galvan was good at the end of the first half of play Wolverine fans breathed a little easier since Reserve had only a 14-8 advantage.

In the third quarter the Wolverines drove the ball downfield into Mountaineer territory twice but each drive was thwarted by Texico fumbles.

But while the Wolverines were still having problems generating their offense, their defensive squad rose to the pres-

sure and allowed Reserve no first downs in the entire second half.

With time running out and the home team still trailing by six, the Wolverines marched the ball 59 yards on 13 plays with Terry Tubbs pulling down a crucial fourth down pass and running the ball to the Mountaineer four-yard line.

Brad Steward then bolted into the end zone from four yards out.

The PAT kick by Terry Tubbs was no good and at the end of the fourth quarter the teams were tied at 14-14. Texico's drive had been aided by Reserve who drew two personal foul penalties and had two pass interference penalties as well.

In overtime, according to the New Mexico Athletic Association's newly-adopted tiebreaker rules, the ball was placed on the 10-yard line with each team having four plays in which to try to score. On the Wolverines' final play, Brad Steward plunged into the end zone from four yards away. The PAT was no good and Texico had a 20-14 advantage, and had moved into the lead for the first time.

The Mountaineers then ran their four plays from the 10, but the Wolverine defense held them at the one-foot line to give Texico the 20-14 victory and a chance to seek the state crown this Saturday.

Billy Bibbs led the rushing attack with 88 yards on 24 carries.

In the passing department Kevin West caught seven passes for 97 yards and Terry Tubbs caught four for 38 yards.

Leading tackler for the Wolverines defense was Doug Thornton with 12. Ronnie Galvan, Brad Steward, and Jeff Holland made 10 each.

Texico racked up 278 yards on offense while Reserve managed 124. The Wolverines picked up 17 first downs compared to eight for the Mountaineers. Eleven penalties of 107 yards for Reserve compared to Texico's six

infractions for 40 yards played a key factor in the game.

When Texico hosts Tatum Saturday night in their bid for the New Mexico Class A crown, it will be the fourth time the Wolverines have tried to obtain the state championship since football returned to Texico in the late 60's.

In their three other state championship attempts the Wolverines were defeated by Hagerman in 1978 by a 35-19 score and in 1979 were again beaten by Hagerman, this time by a 9-7 count; and in 1981 they were beaten by Reserve 14-0.

Several senior Wolverines played on the 1981 team that lost to Reserve, so Saturday's victory was especially "sweet revenge" for them. Last year the Mountaineers were the state runner-up.

In 1978 Texico beat Tatum 34-9 in the semifinal game played here, and in 1979 the Wolverines again beat the Coyotes 32-7 in a quarterfinal match.

Since the 1979 playoff game was played in Tatum, Texico automatically became the host for this year's championship game.

Admission to the final game, which is determined by the State Activities Association, will be \$3 for adults and \$2 for students. No passes will be honored.

Coach Dave Lynn said, "I have to give credit to all the team. They overcame a lot of adversity. When you're down 14-8 and you come back to win, it takes a lot of credibility on the whole team's part. The key to the game was in the second half when we came back and the offensive line controlled the game. Even though we did not score we kept it out of their hands."

"It was the best team effort that I have been around, and I am proud to be a part of them."

"There was a great turnout for the game and their support meant a lot to us. The champ-

ionship game will be played here Saturday night at 7:30 p.m. MST. It's going to be a good game and I'm confident on how it's going to come out. We're going to be a different team compared to the first time we played Tatum."

Coach Lynn recognized and commended the entire offensive line, saying that they were like the "worker ants. They hardly ever are recognized, but they are what makes the team."

Making up the line were Doug Thornton, who led all tacklers with 12; Jeff Holland, who had 10 tackles; Tommy Boarman and Charles Sharbutt, who each contributed seven tackles, and Ronnie Dunsworth, who had two tackles.

Big Lick Awards went to Terry Tubbs and Billy Bibbs on offense, and to Brad Steward on defense.

Billy carried the ball 24 times for 88 yards, had seven tackles, and one big play on offense, the coach said.

Terry had four receptions for 38 yards, made four tackles and also had a big offensive play.

Brad rushed 13 times for 37 yards, scored two touchdowns, threw the ball 28 times for 12 completions and 135 yards, made good offensive plays, and was in on 10 tackles.

Coach Lynn said, "I am real proud of the way they played and was proud to be a part of them, but I felt that someone higher up was in control."

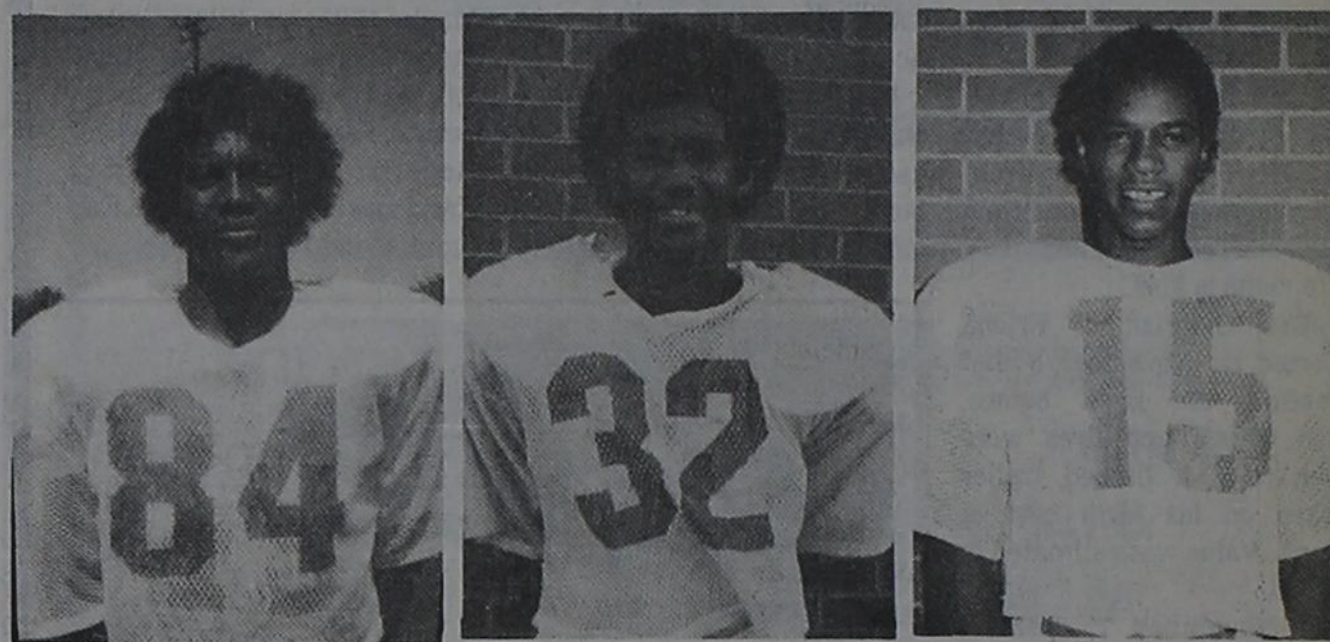
Unsung Heroes

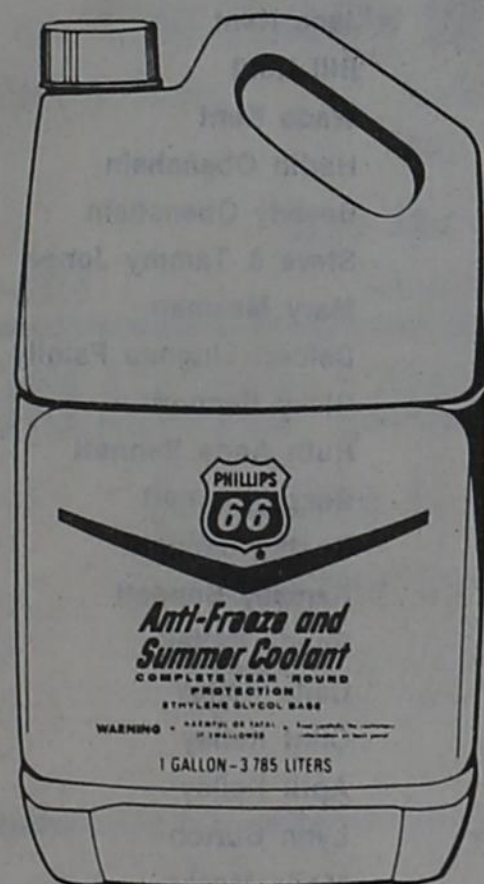

game against the Reserve Mountaineers at Texico. West caught seven passes for 97 yards in the Wolverines' 20-14 overtime win.

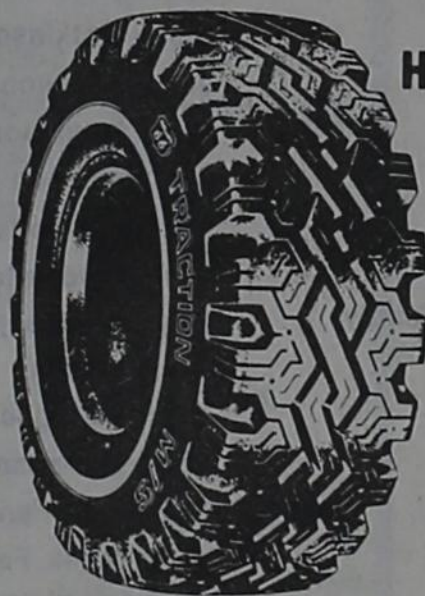
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

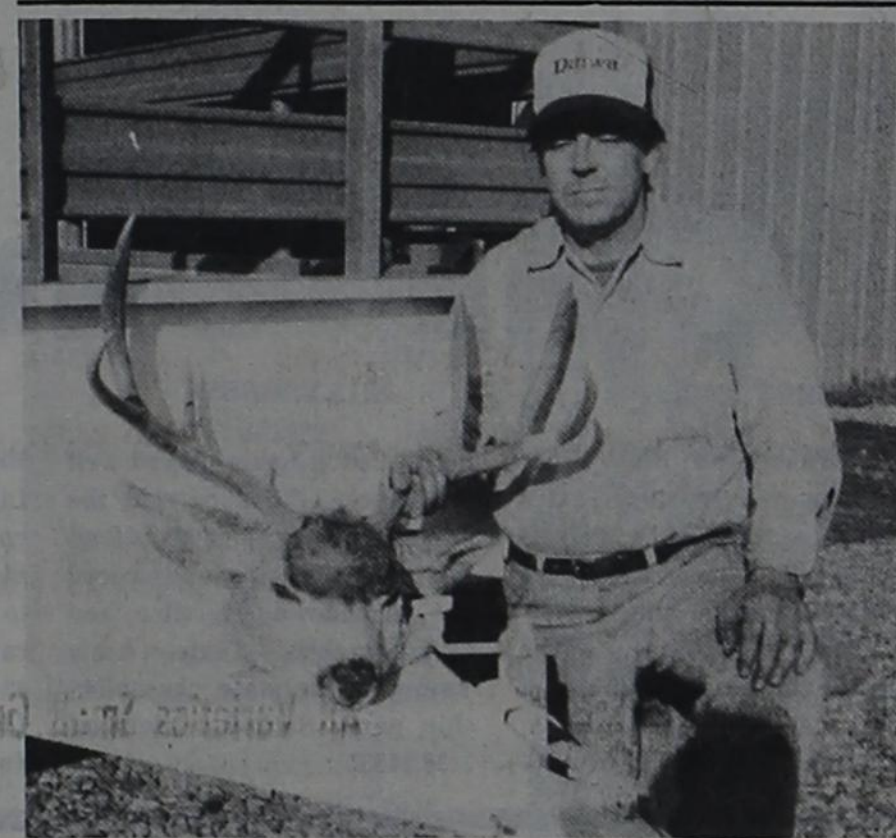
