Wolverines Take State; Steers Win Bi-District

The years of frustration of always being a bridesmaid and never a bride ended for the Texico Wolverines Saturday night when a determined bunch of young men went out and captured the New Mexico Class A State Championship before the largest crowd ever in Wolverine Stadium.

In winning the coveted trophy the Green and White charges of Coach Dave Lynn made it look easy in shutting out the Tatum Coyotes 23-0. And the victory was especially sweet since the Coyotes had been the only team to have defeated Texico during regular season play.

The 9-0 Coyotes were probably favorites in the game, but in Saturday night's meeting, all records, stats, and sizes went out the window and it was all business for the Wolverines as they ended their season in the best possible way: by owning the state championship trophy.

To get to the finals the Wolverines had breezed through their district losing only to Tatum, then downed Reserve in an overtime match in the semifinals, and presto: state championship time again.

Texico had been foiled in its

previous attempts for the top prize, twice by Hagerman and once by Reserve, but no one could deny them all the marbles Saturday night, and now Texico owns the Class A State Championship trophy.

Meanwhile over in Texas, the Farwell Steers had, according to the daily newspapers and TV sportscasters, just pulled off the biggest upset in the area Friday night playoff action, knocking off the highly-favored Seagraves Eagles 21-13 in a game played at Plains. The Eagles had romped to a 48-18 win over Farwell earlier in the season.

Winning the bi-district crown is just the first step of six that lead to the state championship playoff game in Texas, and the Steers begin the second step of that trek tonight (Friday) when they play the McCamey Badgers at 8 p.m. at Mustang Stadium in Andrews.

No Farwell team in recent years has won the second playoff game, having been defeated in regional action the past two times they won bi-district crowns, and the current crop of Steers is looking to change that

record. Tonight's game is an Area Playoff game, the game that was added when the UIL ruled that the top two teams in each district would enter the post-season playoffs.

As Steer Coach Bruce Dollar says, "The word 'area' really has nothing to do with the teams which play each other. It's just the game you play before going to regional action."

The winner of the Farwell-McCamey game will play the winner of the Stratford-Haskell game in regional next week.

"The Steers knew they were going to win when they went to play Seagraves last week, and they feel they are also going to win tonight," the coach said.

"They think that was the first game of a new season and are ready for a whole lot more," he added.

For fans going to the game the following directions tell how to get to the stadium in Andrews:

Turn right off the Seminole Highway on to Mustang Drive. Go to 13th Street and turn left. Then the stadium parking lot may be entered from Avenue H and Avenue G. As Farwell fans will be sitting on the east side of the stadium, it is advised that they park near that side as it is difficult to get from the west side to the east side inside the facility.

Coach Dollar and all the Steers urge all fans to be on hand tonight to see them in their quest for an Area Crown and right to go to regional.

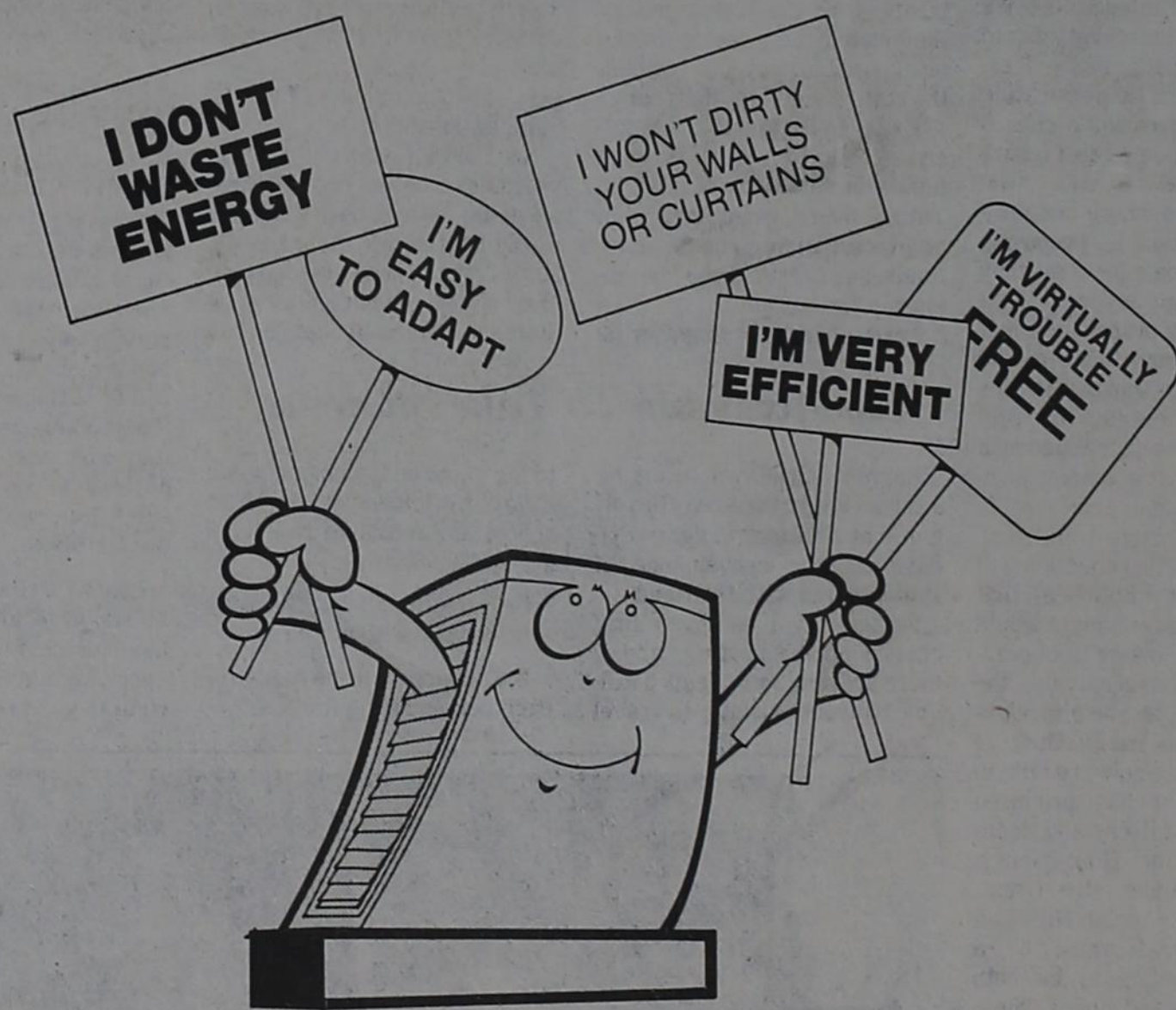
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Overall Race Tightens - -

As promoters of school spirit at Farwell High, we would like to take this opportunity to express our thanks to all who have supported the Steers this season and especially during the play-offs.

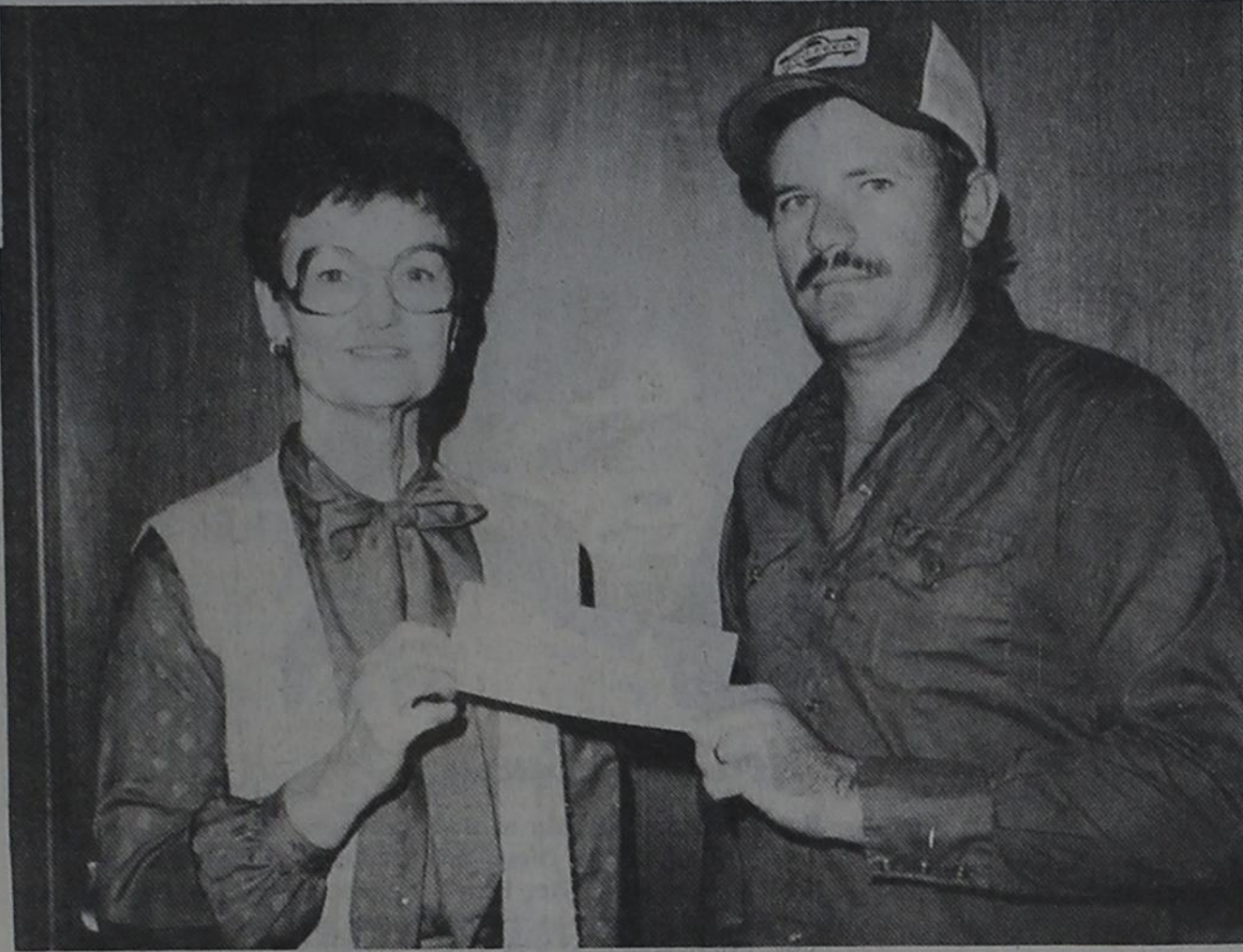
The businesses, Booster Club, school personnel, band, parents, and student body are truly "backing the Steers," and are contributors to their success.

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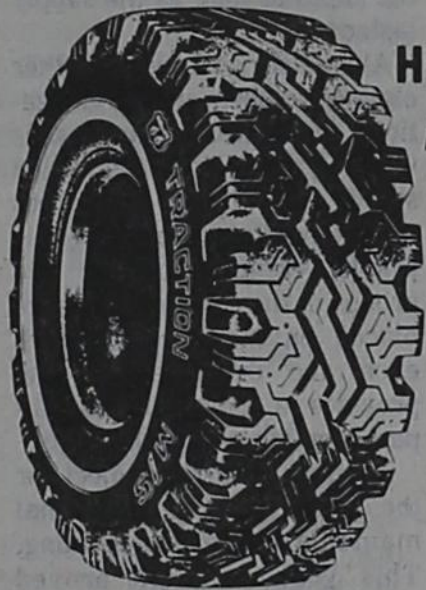


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Farwell Second Graders Present Play Wednesday

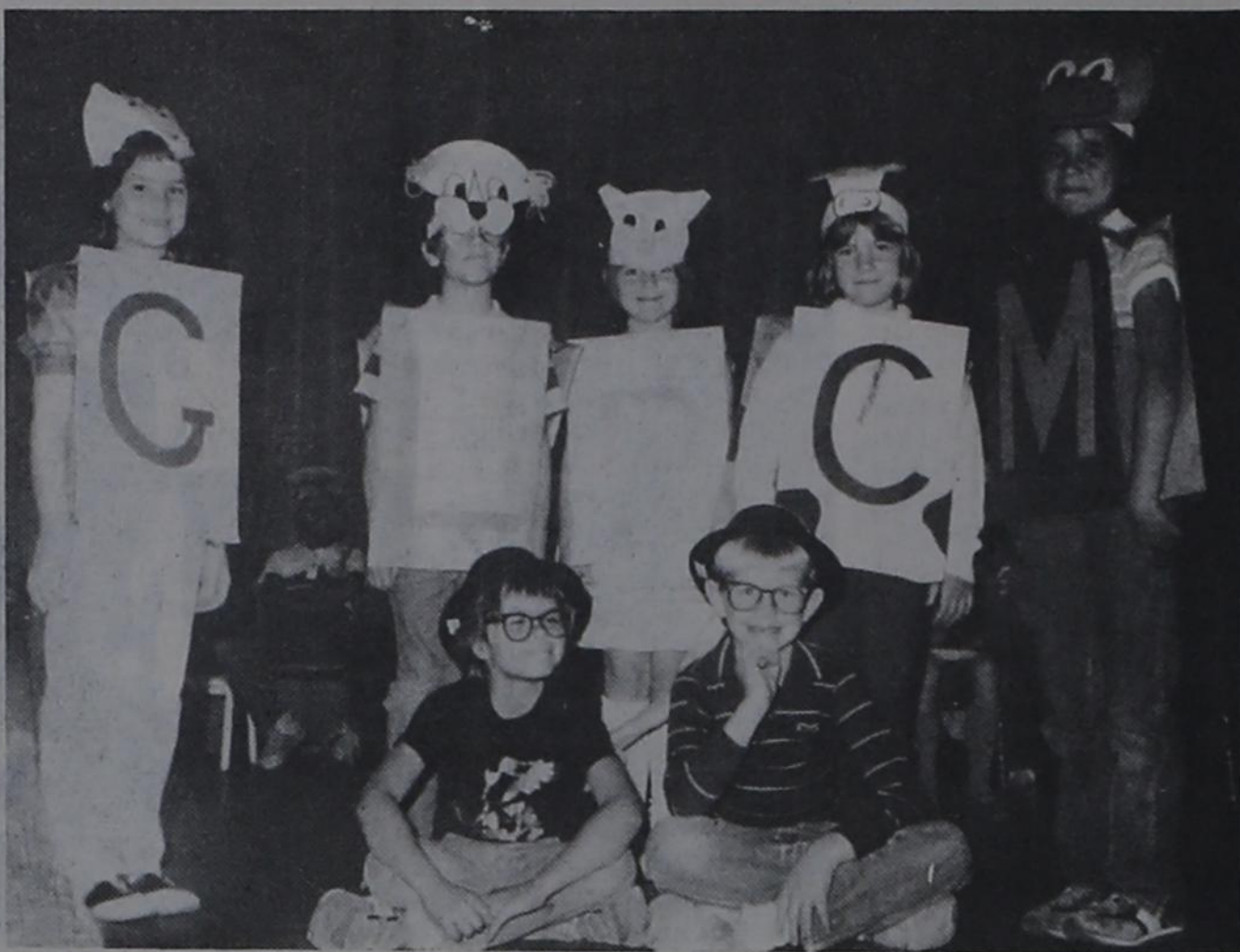

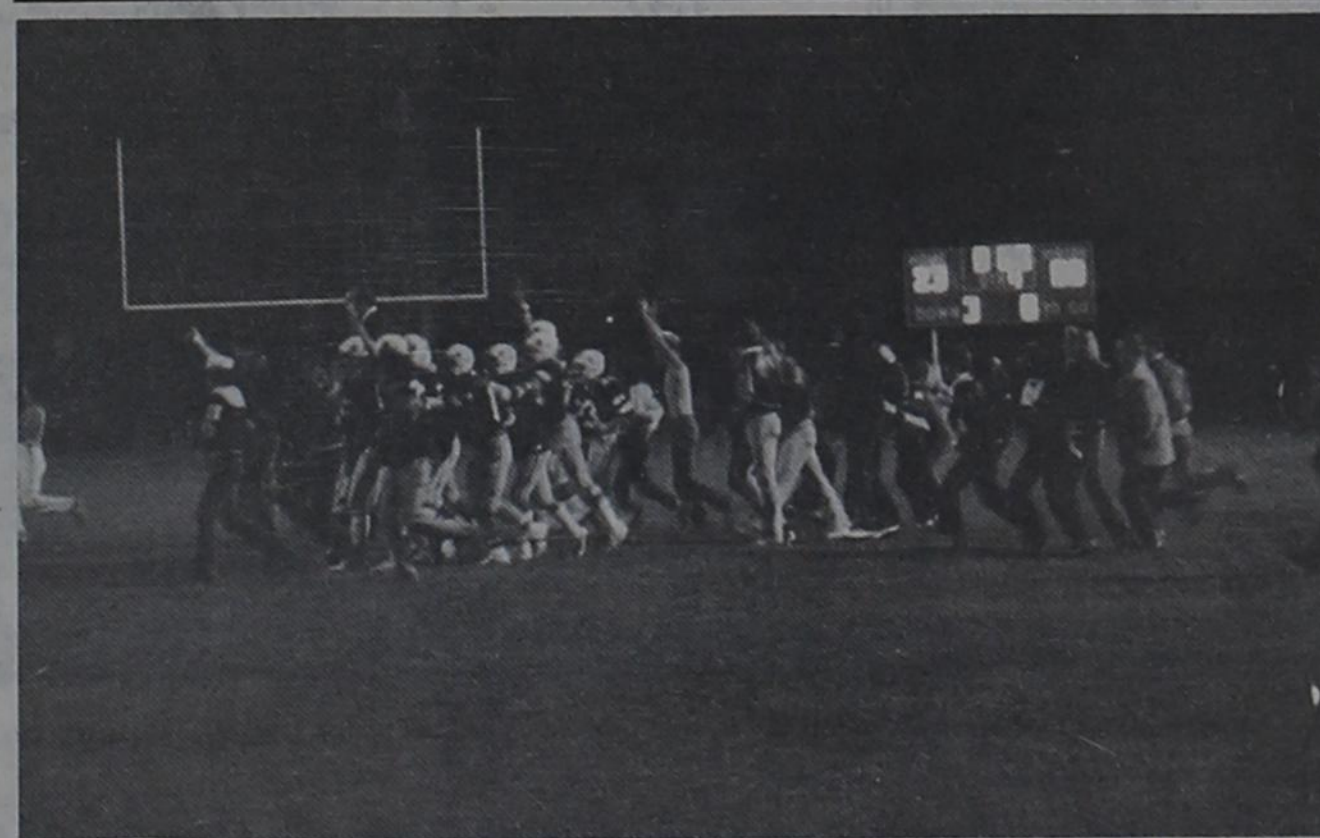

Eagle Feathers Fly As Steers Upset Seagraves

In a most emotional and dramatic game Friday night in Plains, the Farwell Steers surprised everybody except their fans and themselves by upending the highly-favored Seagraves Eagles to bring the Bi-District football championship back to Farwell for the first time since 1960.

Going into Friday's clash, the Eagles boasted a Number 8 ranking of all Class AA teams in Texas, the Number 1 rated defense in the area, as well as being picked by the Amarillo Daily News to win easily "... by at least three touchdowns..." over the Steers.

Also, the Eagles fondly remembered a 48-18 thumping of the Steers back in week number four of the '83 season. Realizing this, the Steers know they would have their hands full with Seagraves, but they also knew they could win. And they did just that, with a final score of 21-13.

In an outstanding performance that will be remembered for a long, long time in Farwell, senior quarterback Alan Eubank continually picked apart the Seagraves' defense with his precise passing to receivers Manuel Cantu, Roger Robertson and Kevin Owen. Eubank finished the night by passing for 203 yards and two touchdowns; and running for another Farwell score.

Also to be noted was the rugged defensive play by the Steers, who held the Eagles' offense to seven points in the first half, even though the Eagles penetrated inside the 20-yard line five times.

In the opening quarter, Seagraves moved the ball well, but were continually stopped by the Steer defense. On a fourth down on the 16-yard line, Robertson knocked down a pass in the end zone to prevent the score. Less than two minutes later, Robertson recovered a fumble on the five-yard line to continue to frustrate the Eagles.

In the second quarter on the Eagles 3rd and 4th possessions, Todd Christian recovered a fumble on the 20-yard line, and Eubank knocked away a fourth down pass in the end zone to stop the Eagles cold for the 4th straight time, on all their possessions.

On the Eagles' 5th possession late in the first half, the Eagles did manage to score on a 50-yard toss to Darren Griffin from Chad Floyd, which gave the Eagles a 7-0 lead. The Eagles pranced into the locker rooms feeling confident at half-time, not knowing what was yet to come.

In the third quarter the charged-up Steers wasted no time in gaining the momentum. On the opening kickoff, the Seagraves' return man had a little trouble controlling the ball, and was downed on the one-yard line. Seagraves executed two plays from the one, and on third down, Bobby Ford came up with the football after a fumble to give the Steers possession on the four-yard line.

From there Eubank easily ran across from one yard out to put the Steers back in the game. The two-point conversion attempt was missed, so the Steers still trailed 7-6.

With Seagraves in possession after the kickoff, the Steer defense really buckled down. Owen and Johnny Daniel made the stops on first and second down, and on third down with five to go, Daniel and Paul Fulcher combined to make the play for a no gain, which forced a fourth down punt.

On receiving the ball, Farwell marched downfield in six plays. Blake Kelley opened the drive

with a 10-yard carry. Two plays later Eubank hit Cantu on a pass for 34 yards to the 19-yard line. From there, Eubank again put the ball in the air. This time the pass was tipped by a Seagraves player, but Steer Owen kept his concentration and came up with the reception in the end zone for six. The Steers again elected to try for two points but were stopped, although the TD did manage to put the Steers out in front for the first time with a score of 12-7.

The Eagles added to the drama of the game by bouncing back with a 73-yard drive highlighted by a 40-yarder from fullback Gilbert Rangel, and a 10-yard run for the touchdown, also by Rangel. With the score bouncing back and forth, Seagraves momentarily regained the lead, 13-12.

Farwell, not to be outdone, trailed only for a few seconds. On their second play from scrimmage, Eubank lofted the football 30 yards downfield to Robertson who ran all the way for a 70-yard touchdown, which dazzled the Farwell fans. With that touchdown the Steers moved out in front for good, 18-13.

Seagraves finished the third quarter with the ball, but went nowhere, with Eubank, Daniel, and Owen making the tackles for the Steers. With a fourth down punt, time ran out in the third quarter of play, which had totaled 18 points for the explosive Steers.

Farwell then drove downfield to secure the game with a 27-yard field goal from Cantu. To start the drive, Eubank hit Cantu for a nine-yard gain, then Eubank ran for 11. Two plays later Eubank tossed to Robertson for a gain of 22 yards.

Moments later, on a third down and a long 15, Owen was on the receiving end of a perfect screen pass from Eubank, managed to keep his balance after being hit, and barreled for 25 yards and a crucial first down to keep the drive alive. On the next play, Eubank threw 24 yards to Cantu to the six-yard line. The Steers were held at that point, but did come away with three points after the Cantu kick. The score was then 21-13.

With 4:41 left in the game, the Steers had to stop Seagraves twice more. The Eagles ran short pass plays and managed to work 35 yards downfield. With 1:10 remaining, Cantu stepped in front of the Seagraves receiver to make his third critical interception in two games to give Farwell the ball.

The Steers ran three plays but only managed to work 11 seconds off the clock, and had to punt.

With 59 seconds left in the game the Eagles had to score, and run for two points to even tie the Steers, so they went into their "final seconds offense," attempting to throw quick passes and get out of bounds to stop the clock.

The intense defensive play of the Steers once again stopped Seagraves, and on the last play of the game, and what was the last play of the year for Seagraves, Fulcher and Benny Mesman blasted through the line and wiped out Eagle quarterback Chad Floyd, and then got up in time to see the last seconds tick off the clock.

The Steers captured the Bi-District title with a final score of 21-13 giving them the right to continue playing for their quest of a Class AA state championship.

The Steers will meet McCamey in Andrews, Tex., Friday night, in the area playoff.

An elated, but back down to earth Steer Coach Bruce Dollar commented this week that no one could really and truly realize just what a feat the 1983 football team had accomplished not just by defeating the highly-favored Seagraves Eagles Friday night, but by making it to that game at all.

"After all the negative things that have happened during the season, and all the adversities faced, they accomplished so very much just by getting TO that game, and then for them to know before they went that they were going to win it whether anyone else thought so or not, it was quite an accomplishment," the coach said. "And now they feel like this was the first game of the season and they're ready to play a whole bunch more."

Regarding the game itself, the coach said that the Steers certainly didn't generate much offense, only having about three really big plays, but that the defense probably could not have played any better.

"That was the lowest number of points that Seagraves has scored all season, and for them to have scored 48 on us in our first meeting, they certainly weren't expecting our defense to shut them down so effectively," he said.

"We gave up some yardage, but all night long the defense came up with the big plays to stop a scoring threat or to get the ball back."

And because it was such a super effort on the part of the entire defensive lineup, Coach Dollar said he could not single out any one particular player for his efforts.

"Those little, and I mean little, guys got out there and stopped the runners for losses, knocked down passes, just did everything required for a great defensive effort," he added.

On offense he named Manuel Cantu and Alan Eubank as the Steers of the Week.

"Manuel probably was the difference in the game. He caught five passes, made really crucial first downs for us, had a game-saving interception, and also kicked a field goal," he said.

"Alan probably played his best game of the year offensively and defensively, throwing nine completions of 14 attempts and also making big plays on defense," said the coach.

Roger Robertson had two completions for 83 yards and one TD; Kevin Owen had two completions for 48 yards and a TD; and Manuel Cantu caught five for 72 yards.

In the rushing category, Alan Eubank had 13, Paul Fulcher ran for 19, Blake Kelley ran for nine, and Kevin Owen picked up 17.

Regarding the upcoming Area 2A game with McCamey tonight (Friday), the coach said they were a big team with really tall players, several well over six feet.

"They are a different type team than Seagraves. Seagraves is a power team and McCamey is more of a finesse team; so we have to prepare for them and approach the game in an entirely different manner," he said.

The McCamey quarterback, Ray Zarate, is probably their best offensive player.

McCamey is 9-2 on the season, and was runner-up in District 7-2A, losing to Class 3A Crane and to district champion Wall who faces Morton in other Area 2A playoff action.

The team is coached by Buster Leaf, the man who coached the New Deal Lions when they beat Farwell in bi-district action last year.

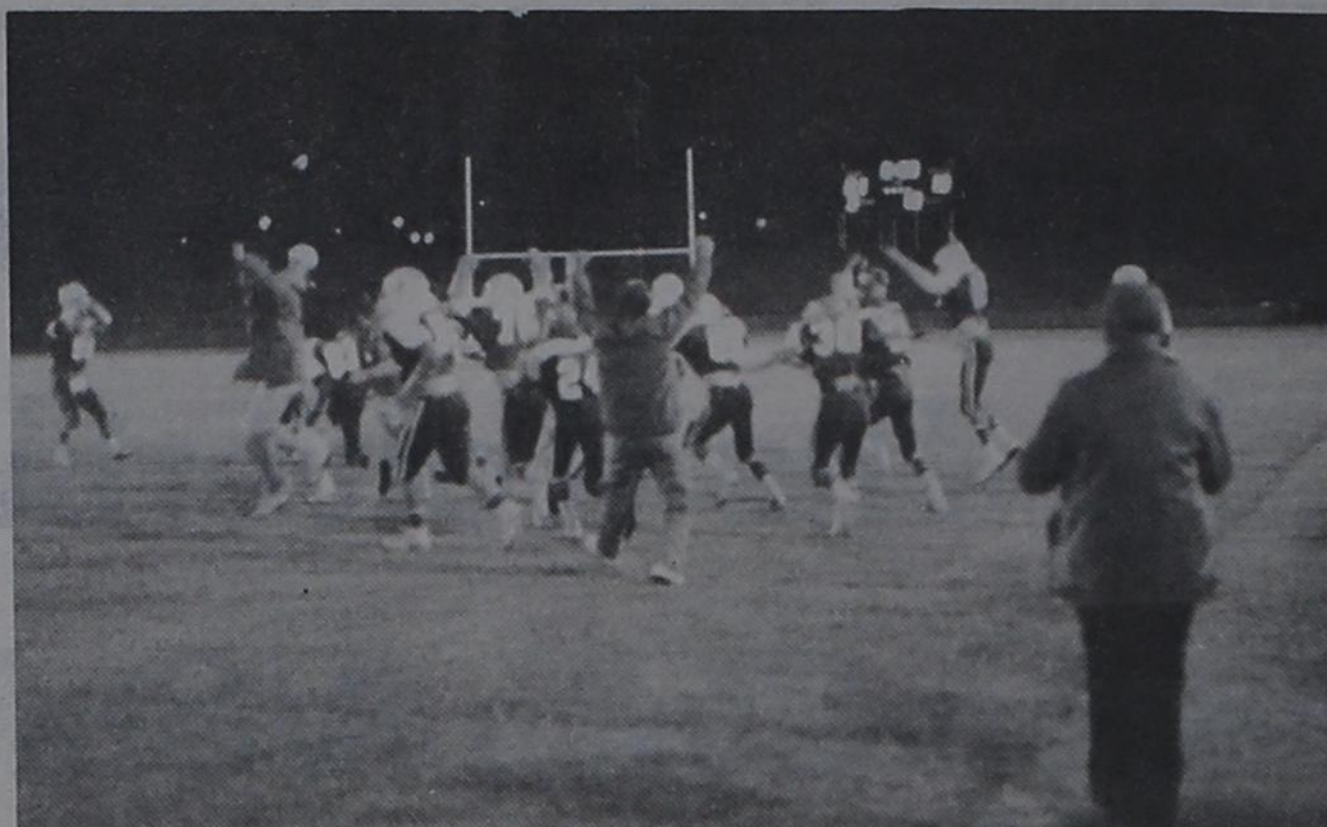
"We will be ready and anxious to meet them, and hope all area fans will come to Andrews to support us in the game," Dollar said.

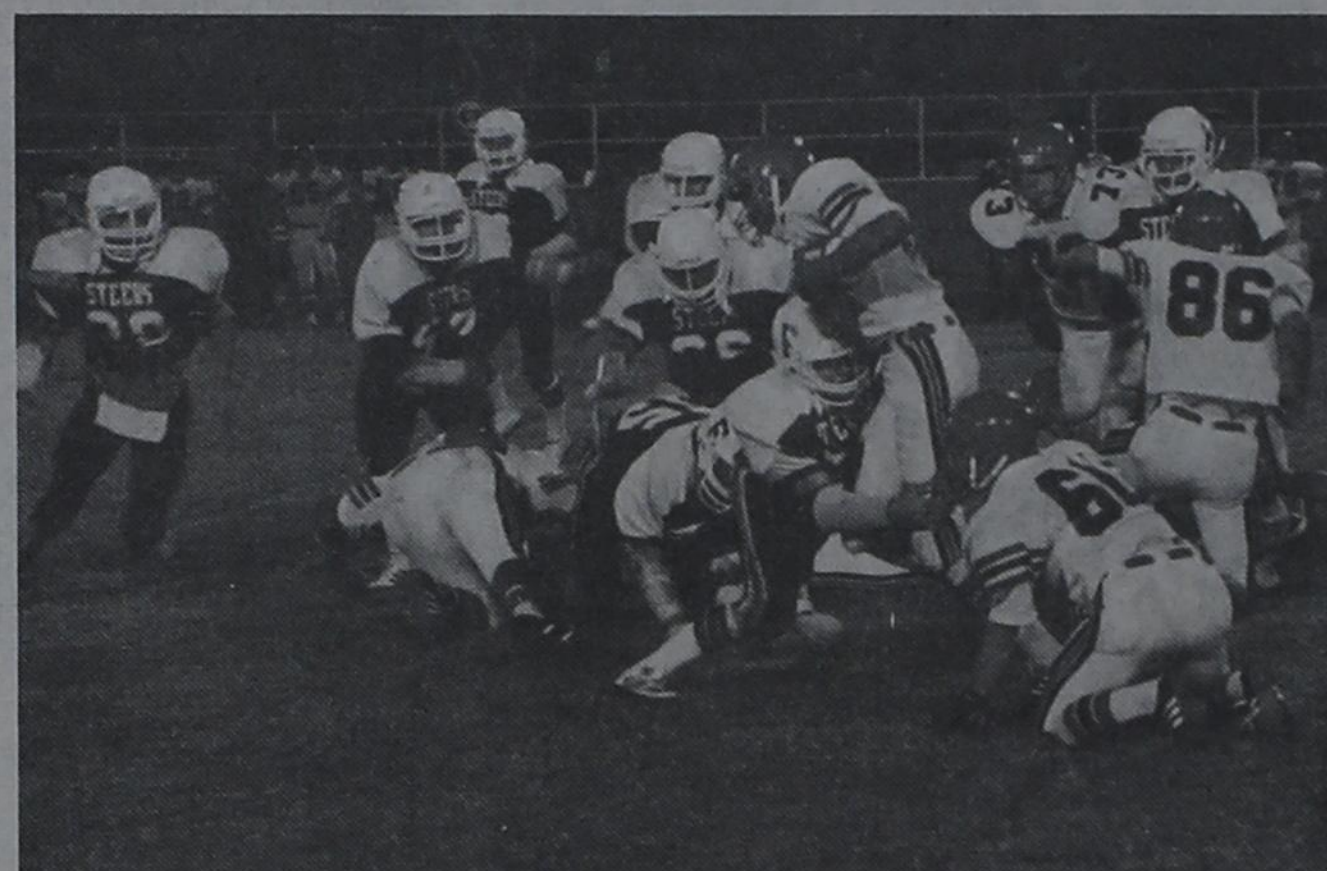

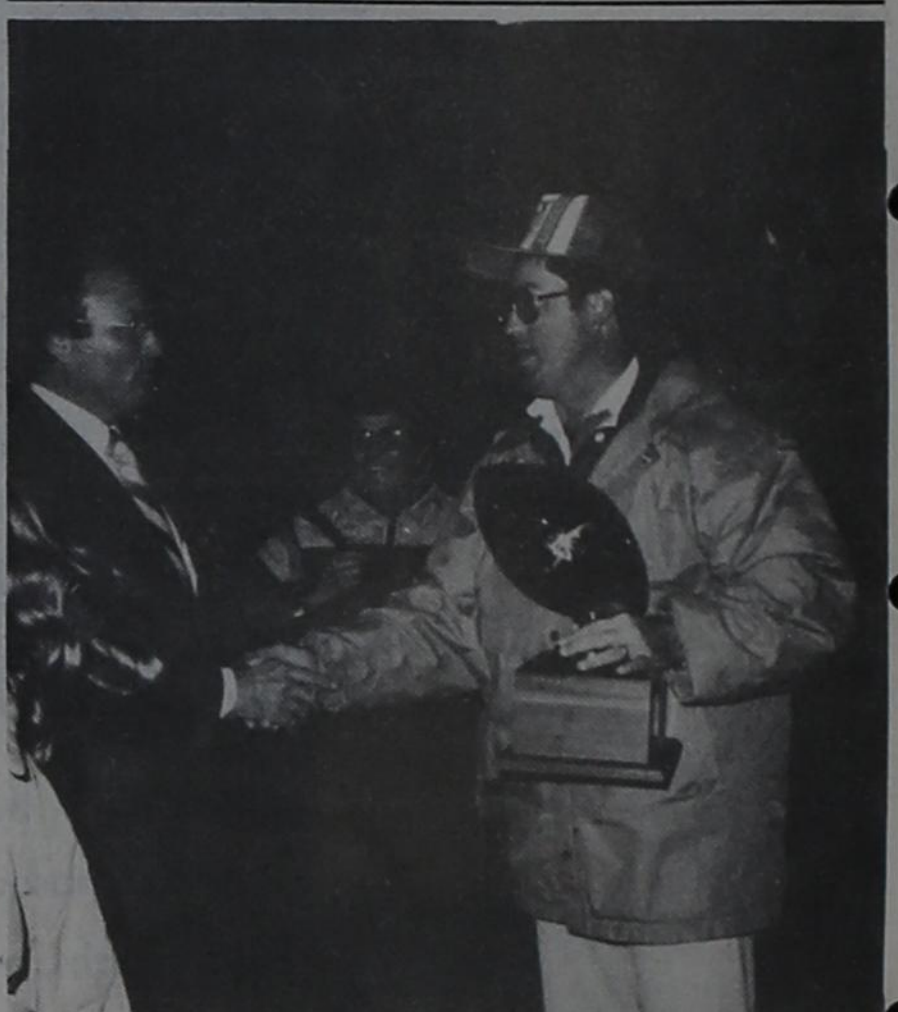

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Wolverines Shut Out Tatum To Capture State Championship

The Texico Wolverines won their first Class A state football championship in front of a capacity crowd Saturday night with an impressive victory over the previously unbeaten Tatum Coyotes.

The Coyotes received the ball to open the game but three plays later Texico's Joe Steward intercepted a Tatum pass at the Wolverine 38.

Texico was ineffective moving the ball and was forced to punt.

Late in the first quarter, Tatum was in a punting situation deep in their own territory when Tommy Boorman, 5-9, 205 pound Wolverine senior, bullied his way through the line and blocked the Coyote punt out of the end zone to give Texico two points and a 2-0 lead with 1:54 left in the opening quarter.

On the Tatum free kick, Brad Steward returned the ball back to the 35-yard line, but on the next play the Wolverines fumbled and Tatum recovered the loose ball.

The Wolverines survived a serious threat by Tatum when Jeff Holland and Charles Sharbutt tackled running back Larry Hilliard for a yard loss on third down. A fourth down pass fell incomplete and the Green and White took over on downs.

The defenses dominated the second quarter and Texico's slim two-point edge held throughout the first half.

The Wolverines received the second half opening kick and drove the ball 75 yards on 15 plays with impressive runs by Joe Steward and Ronnie Galvan.

Then Wolverine Coach Dave Lynn pulled out his bag of tricks as Texico ran a reverse on the six-yard line with Terry Tubbs carrying the ball. Tubbs dropped the football but managed to recover his own fumble in the end zone for six points. The PAT kick was good by Brad Steward, and with 5:08 left in the third quarter, Texico led 9-0.

On Texico's next possession quarterback Brad Steward threw to Terry Tubbs who made a spectacular catch while lying on the ground for a 38-yard pickup.

A couple of plays later, Ronnie Galvan, 5-8, 145 pound junior fullback, plunged into the end zone from a yard out for the TD. Steward's PAT kick was good and at the end of the third quarter, Texico had a 16-0 lead.

The Coyote offense moved the ball to the Wolverine 38-yard line in the fourth quarter, but on fourth down a quick defensive pass rush by Holland forced the Tatum quarterback to throw the ball incomplete.

Late in the fourth quarter the Wolverines put the game out of reach when Kevin West intercepted a Coyote pass and returned it 35 yards for a touchdown. The PAT kick by Stanley Cross was good and Texico had ended all scoring for the night.

With the comfortable 23-0 margin and two minutes left, Coach Lynn substituted freely and every player had the opportunity to play in the championship game. Texico finished the season with a 10-1 record and 3-1 district mark.

Defense provided the road to Texico's win since the Wolverines surrendered only five first downs and 92 yards total offense to the Coyotes who had beaten the Wolverines in their first encounter this year in October.

Tatum tailback Larry Hilliard, who had contributed 1131 rushing yards to Tatum's cause in their first nine games this season, was shut down by the Wolverines. The Texico defense allowed Hilliard only 65 yards in 16 attempts during the game. In the second half the Wolverines stopped Hilliard cold and he gained only two yards. In fact, the Coyotes were only able to muster 92 yards offensively for the night.

When Tatum keyed their defense on Billy Bibbs, who had been Texico's leading rusher throughout the season, the Wolverines turned to junior fullback Ronnie Galvan who gained 48 yards on 14 carries.

Statistically, the only place the Coyotes fared better than the Wolverines was in the passing department. Tatum completed four of 23 attempts while Texico only completed one of 10. A light wind that blew throughout the game may have been a factor in the low passing percentage for both teams since each had successfully depended on an accurate passing attack throughout the season.

The Wolverines lost only 10 yards in two offside penalties

while Tatum was penalized 10 times for 65 yards.

For Coach Lynn, winning "the big one" wasn't a new experience. Lynn coached the 1977 Hagerman Bobcats to a state title.

However, for the Wolverine team members, the experience of being state champions is an entirely new one. Texico has boasted three "bridesmaid" teams since football was reinstated in the late 1960's. In 1978, 1979, and 1981, Texico wore the title of state runners up.

The Wolverines ended three years of playoff frustration by winning their first Class A State football championship, 23-0, over the previously undefeated Tatum Coyotes here Saturday night.

"It was a total team effort," Coach David Lynn said, "The kids played super. They knew they could win this game and

they came out and played their hearts out. We went with a different defensive scheme, and the kids felt they had something to prove. They said they were going to stop Tatum and they did it. That was the key to the whole game."

Starting the second half Texico led 2-0, then in the third quarter the lead was increased to 9-0 giving them some breathing room.

Coach Lynn credited middle linebacker Doug Thornton and defensive ends Jeff Holland and Terry Tubbs with outstanding plays.

"We put pressure on them the whole game," said Coach Lynn, "And we got good coverage in our secondary."

"The kids were ready to play, and the week before the game there was a lot of determination on their faces. Most of our seniors had been a part of the team that lost the state champ-

ionship to Reserve two years ago, and they all played on the team last year when we lost our perfect season in the semifinals game to Capitan. Those kids really had something to prove to themselves, and they knew how much losing the big one hurt, said Coach Lynn.

The coach would like to take this opportunity to thank the community, the cheerleaders, the parents, teachers, and everyone from this area for their support this season.

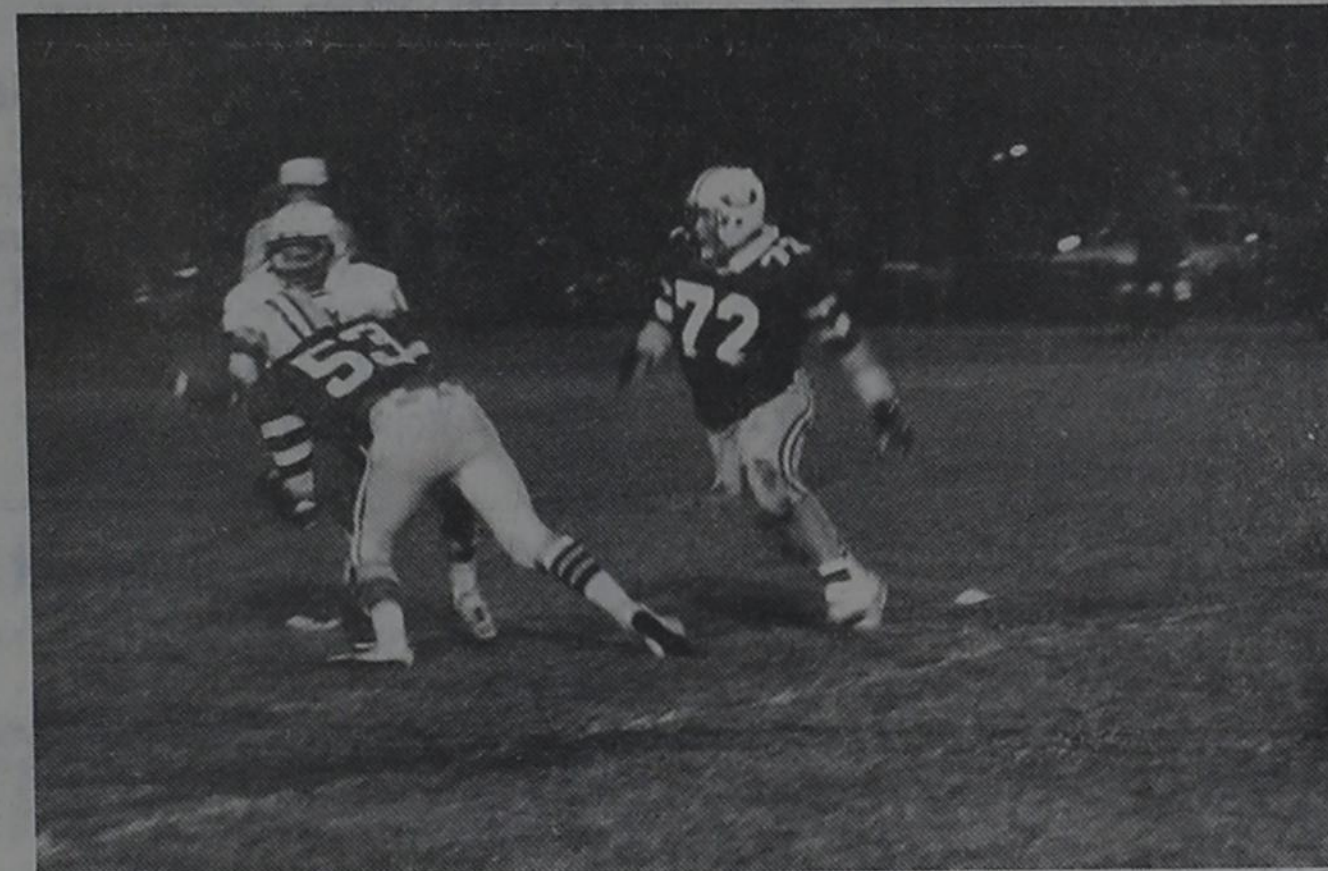
All-Region Bands at ENMU December 9 and 10, and will perform in concert on the evening of the 10th.

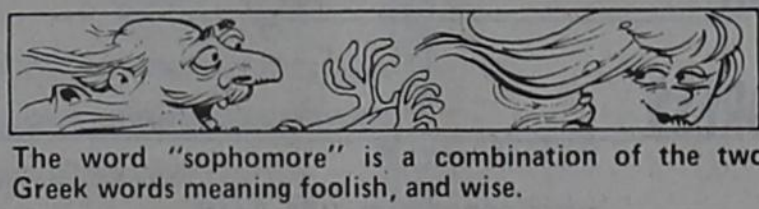

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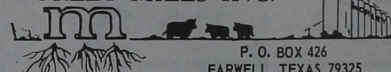
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Parmer SWCD Directors Attend Statewide Meeting

M.C. Osborn, Raymond Schueler, and Mike Miller, directors of the Parmer County Soil and Water Conservation District, and their wives were among the 1100 district directors in McAllen, Tex., Oct. 24-26 to attend the 43rd Annual State Meeting of Texas Soil and Water Conservation District Directors.

Others attending from Parmer County were Duval Burton of the Soil Conservation Service and his wife, and Mr. and Mrs. Webb Gober of Farwell.

Purpose of this meeting was to review developments affecting Texas Conservation programs. Twenty-two of the 23 resolutions considered at the meeting passed.

Speakers at the meeting included State Senator Grant Jones of Abilene who talked about constitutional amendments which appeared on the November ballot as well as other legislative actions of interest to conservation district directors.

Future trends in agricultural financing was the thrust of Federal Land Bank president Tom Benson's address.

Dr. Herbert Grubb, principle planner, Texas Department of Water Resources, talked about the state's water needs with respect to Texas' growing population.

Billy Griffin, state conservationist, SCS, presented a program on the "Conservation Connection" which presented the working relationship among local, state and federal agencies in the soil and water conservation program.

In speaking to the banquet audience of 915 persons, State Senator Bill Sarpalus received a standing ovation for his address on Americanism.

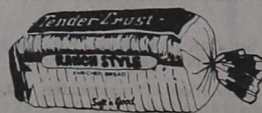
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
