Estimates that Parmer County would produce 60,000 bales of cotton this year seem more than justified in the reports of ginnings and yields this week, following a survey of cotton gins on Monday.

There are about 85,000 acres of cotton in the county this year, and according to average figures on yields, it may be conservatively estimated that the yield will reach or surpass the 60,000bale mark-an all-time record.

As of Monday, ginnings had passed the 11,000-bale mark and every gin in the county was running behind. Actually, the rush was just getting started, and all ginners expected to be "covered up" for some time if the weather holds fair.


