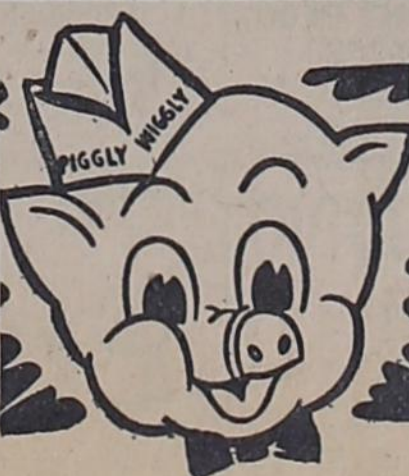
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Lazbuddie Homecoming Tomorrow

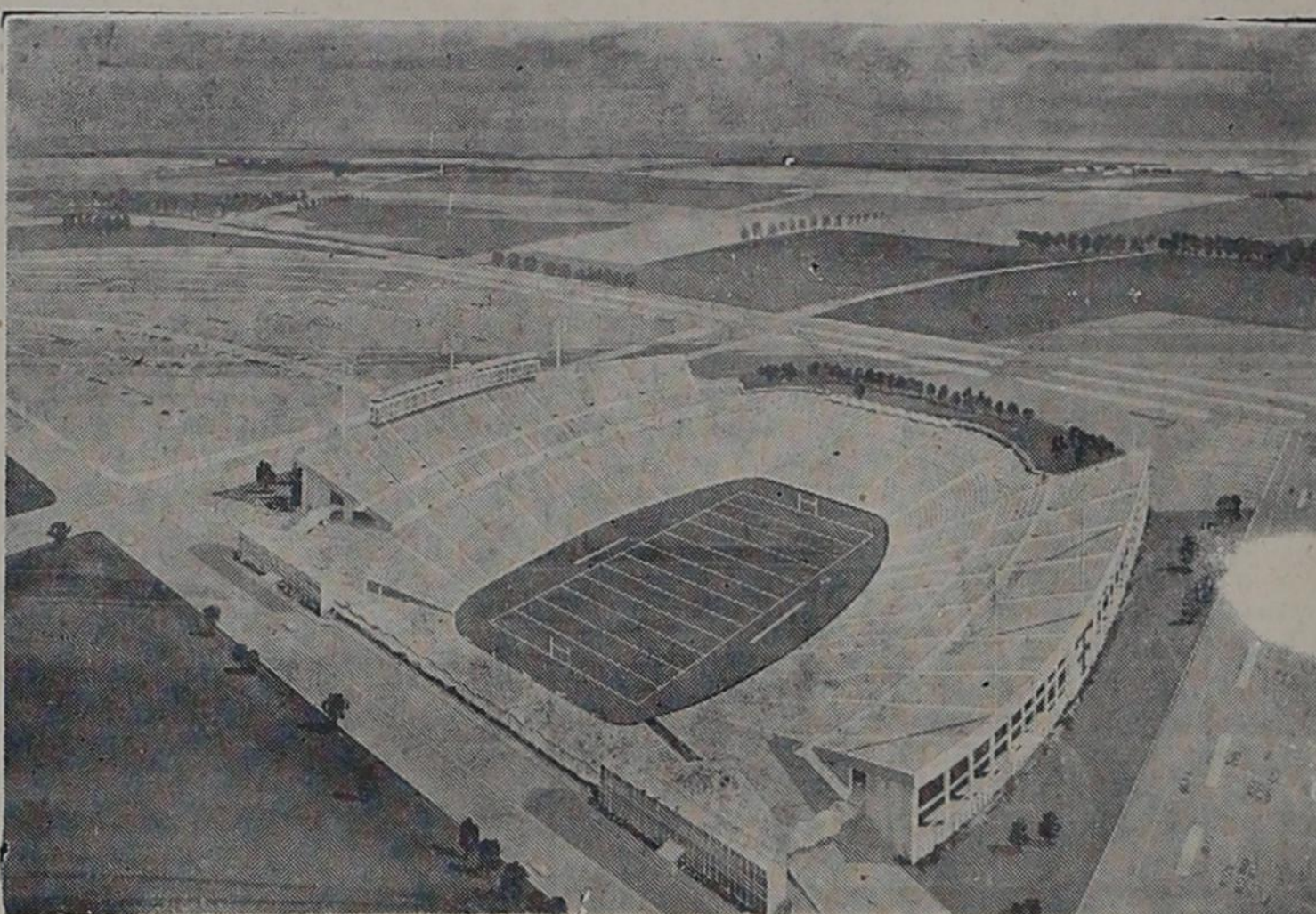

Other business for the commission Saturday morning, which was a short meeting for the group, went as follows:

A bid from K. L. Dodson was accepted for repairing and cleaning the city's paved streets. The amount of the bid was \$450 and work is to be completed by November 12, providing the weather doesn't interfere.

A brief discussion was heard on Christmas lights for the town and the city okayed payment of the electric bill on the lights after they are installed.

Concerning the installation of a water line under the Santa Fe tracks, the commission decided to advertise for bids on the project a second time. Only one bid was received the first time and a condition attached made it unsatisfactory.

extra point was kicked, making it 7-0, a score which remained until late in the second period.

The Cards recovered a fumble on the Farwell 45 to set up the second touchdown. It took them only seven plays to score from that point and the extra point kick was blocked, making the halftime score 13-0.

Taking the kickoff to open the second half, the Steers moved to one first down but fumbled on the 33 and Eunice recovered. It took Eunice seven plays to score from that point and they led 19-0.

Taking the kickoff again, the Steers started moving from their own 18. On the first play, Larry Pike shot through for 14 yards, but on the second play a fumble cost them possession on the 30.

A 15-yard penalty moved the ball back to the 45 and after two plays the Cards were faced with third and 23. The quarterback attempted a jump pass, but finding his receivers covered, came back down in his tracks.

About to be smeared by the Steer line, the back heaved a frantic pass which bounced off the chest of a Eunice receiver, over a Farwell defender, and into the arms of another Cardinal who was past the Steer secondary.

The ball carrier traveled all the way to the two-yard line before being hauled down from behind. On the next play the Cards pushed over for their final score and also kicked the extra point.
