## **Showers Fall Here** When Mercury Drops

Reports from over the county indicate that the rainfall was light, and no damage or consequences from the hail, which was soft and mushy .

## 50,000 Acres Going **To Cotton This Year**

Parmer County farmers will plant the biggest acreage of cotton this year ever known in the county in the opinion of agricultural observers who were contacted this week.

Last year saw 21,000 acres go to cotton in this county for the record up to that time. Observers and PMA officials, while admitting they have no accurate figures available, are estimating that the acreage this year will be at least 50,000-or even more.



of advertising-both to this newspaper, and to them. The State Line Tribune, like hundreds of other newspapers, large and small, has only two sources of income. One of these is money derived from sale of subscriptions. This is a thinly-spread method of allowing a large number of people to help pay for the high cost of publication. However, the \$2.00 or \$2.50 that most people pay for 52 copies of this newspaper mailed to them will not absorb the bill for paper, postage and ink, let alone other far more significant items in the publication expense account. Therefore, the sale of advertising is turned to as a means of bringing the expense and revenue columns closer together. Advertising in The Tribune can be grouped into two large divisions: display and classified. There is considerable difference in the two, although they are utilized to serve the same ends. For practical purposes, one might say that the display (any advertising other than that carried in the classified column) is intended for businesses and professions, and the classifieds are intended for individual use. This is not altogether true, however. For instance, on some occasions a church or school chooses our advertising field to announce a meeting, social gathering, or some similar event. Practically always, they choose a display advertisement of moderate size which will be low in cost yet noticeable to many readers.



### How Much Does It Cost?

To tell how much advertising costs the advertiser, we had better explain its functions a little farther. If advertising is properly used, it should not cost the user anything at all. Advertising's objective is aimed at making advertising itself a desirable product at an attractive price. Consider the businessman who, cognizant of advertising's aim, has goods or services which he wants to offer the public. Through the use of advertising in our columns, he draws a good demand for these goods or services, thereby nullifying the cost of his advertising.

Display advertising is computed by this newspaper on a "column-inch" basis. The Tribune's rate is 35 cents per column inch. A column inch represents a space one column wide and one inch deep. Thus, an advertisement which is two columns wide and five inches deep will total 10 column inches, or \$3.50 per issue. Display rates for firms which do business through national advertising agencies runs 42 cents per column inch, but to the average local

## **Jones Urges Control Of Parmer Bindweed**

County Agent Joe Jones this week again urged farmers of this area to declare war on bindweed. The plant, which is known as possession vine, spreads by both root and seed.

Small lots of 1/2 acre or less are a constant source of infestation for surrounding area, so when bindweed is found in small patches, it should be eradicated, regardless of cost, Jones says. Once bindweed makes a erop of seed and the seeds are turned under, there is the possibility that it will take as long as 40 years to rid the group of the seeds, as the plants have been known to come up after such a long time.

Cultural practices to prevent the spread of bindweed should be followed, when cultivating through plots of the weed. However, before eradication can be accomplished, farmers will probably have to resort to either selective or non-selective herbicides. When non-selective herbicides are used, farmers should realize the rate it takes to kill bind weed and that it will leave the soil bare and unproductive for a limited perand that is used, Jones adds.

The Budget Bureau assembled d coordinated these revisions into new draft of a bill, not as yet remeased for publication. When this new draft was shown the Commission's Chairman, Dr. Morris L. Cooke, he is said to have blown up and refused to have the Commission s name attached to a bill bearing such little resemblance to the Commission's original proposals. He went to the President and obtained permission to release the original draft as it was submitted a year ago.
