FROM THE HOPPER

A study of the returns in the recent Curry County primary election reveals the fact that the election laws in New Mexico are badly in need of an overhauling.

I make particular reference to the manner in which the county commissioners are nominated and elected, whereby the entire county votes on all the members of the board of county commissioners.

Under the present system, the heavy votes in Clovis determines who shall become members of the board, regardless of the wishes of the voters in the various precincts.

There is nothing just about such an arrangement. Each precinct should be allowed to choose its own representative on the board of county commissioners without interference on the part of persons who do not live in the precinct involved.

Such a system is nothing less than a rank injustice. It would be as fair to let Texas name the governor of the state of New Mexico.

I am told that New Mexico laws provide that county commissioners shall be chosen on a county-wide basis, and there is nothing that can be done until the New Mexico legislature changes the law.

Population centers over the state are unwilling to surrender this lever they have over the less populated sections of the county, with the result that Clovis, Albuquerque, Portales and the rest of the cities of the state will hold absolute control over those who shall serve as members of the board of county commissioners.

Election laws in Texas are a long way from perfection, but New Mexico could profit considerably by adopting the Texas system with reference to electing county commissioners.

The Amarillo News after devoting column after column of space in the interest of Gen. Eisenhower's nomination as the Republican candidate for president, Wes Izzard, noted columnist of the News, comes out and wants to know how the General stands on a number of important issues.

The News and Izzard in particular jumped on the Eisenhower bandwagon a long time ago, evidently without knowledge of the General's attitude on certain issues. Now he wants to know how the General stands, and in his column Tuesday, Izzard submits a batch of important questions he wants Ike to make himself clear on.

Foxy old Ike, shielding himself behind a cloak of military expediency, has not declared himself on many issues that the voters are entitled to know about.

What I can't understand is why Izzard hopped on Ike's bandwagon without first knowing his attitude regarding the questions that are now beginning to concern the News editor. A pretty good policy, I believe, is to at least look into the horse's mouth before making a trade.

And here's a letter from Rev. R. L. Butler of Munday, who served the local Methodist church as pastor for six years, during which time he endeared himself to a large circle of friends here.

After 40 years in the ministry, his old—but forever warm—heart, has shown the strain of a most active ministry, and he has been forced "out of the harness" by the advice of more than one doctor.

"I wonder just how it will feel on the morning of June 2 to realize that they didn't read my name for some appointment," he writes as he looks forward to the final day of his retirement when the appointments are read at the annual conference at Lubbock.

"This is a tragic thought when we come to the end of the way and face the future of uncertainty. But a man like Brother Butler can face it unafraid and with not apologies for a mis-spent life. He never shirked a duty nor missed an opportunity to be of service to mankind. He should have no regrets. The world has been made better by his untiring ministry and he can look to the future with a sense of satisfaction for his past labors.

"Well done, thou good and faithful servant."

Corrects 1951 Acreage Figure for Cotton

Joe Camp, secretary of the Parmer County Marketing and Production Administration, says The Tribune was in error last week when it stated that the cotton acreage in the county for 1951 was 21,000 acres.

Acreage figures compiled by the local PMA office for last year reveal that a total of 24,624.2 of cotton was planted on 195 farms in this county in 1951, Camp says.

"Cotton allotment acreage is a very touchy subject in this county," Camp added, "and we like to go by the records when dealing with these figures."

Non-Jury Criminal And Civil Matters Occupy 2-Day Term

Moving swiftly on both criminal and civil matters, Judge E. A. Bills disposed of most of the docket in district court here late Tuesday afternoon with the announcement that he would hold another session here in June.

The 60-panel petit jury that was called off Monday morning was dismissed without being used for services.

Opening the two-day session, Judge Bills first pronounced sentence in criminal matters that had been previously tried.

Bobby Gray and William Gray, who had previously entered pleas of guilty to theft charges, were assessed one year in the penitentiary on three counts, the sentences to run concurrently.

Alton Morgan, Milton Autrey and Foye Vincent were put on probation for two years. They had previously entered pleas of guilty to theft. Judge Bills further stipulated they were to pay for the damages incident to the theft charges.

In civil matters, cases tried before Judge Bills resulted as follows:

Damages in the amount of \$5000 was awarded A. S. Hill, father of Peggy Lou Hill, 12, and Lawana Sue Hill, 14, against Wm. H. Brereton. Lawana Sue was killed and Peggy Lou was injured when Brereton's car, in which they were both riding, overturned 3 miles east of Tiabon, N. M., on the night of Jan. 13. Brereton was stationed at the Clovis Air Base at the time of the tragedy and the girls were residents of Bailey County.

Damage in the amount of \$1250 was also awarded A. E. Ward for injuries suffered by his daughter, Helen, in the same mishap.

Mary Jane Barker vs. Della Light, suit to clear title, was dismissed for lack of prosecution.

Martha Lee Donelson et al vs. A. F. Phillips Jr., suit for damages, judgment for defendant.

Santa Fe Grain Co. vs. Edd and Tom Moseley, suit on debt, judgment by default for plaintiff in the amount of \$2193.34, plus interest at 6 per cent from June 2, 1951.

The petition of Roy Threest Jr. for removal of disabilities was granted.

City Street Paving to Start by June 1

Chamber of Commerce Is Organized In Texico

Sponsored by the Mayor M. C. Roberts and members of the Town Council, a meeting was held Monday night at which time machinery was set in motion for the organization of a permanent Chamber of Commerce.

Some twenty-five business and professional men of the city gathered at the city hall in response to the invitation sent out by the Town Council, and lively interest in the project was manifested.

Temporary officers and directors were named to serve until the organization could be set up on a permanent footing. Supt. Agrie Jones was named as president; Leroy Faville, vice-president; and John Getz, secretary-treasurer.

Directors selected were O. S. Allred, F. S. Thigpen, Rip Snodgrass, Scotty Levins, Olen Schleuter and R. D. Williams. The directors were instructed to draw the constitution and by-laws under which the Chamber will operate and submit a draft of these articles at the next regular meeting to be held on Tuesday, May 27, at 8:30 in the city hall.

Secretary Getz stated that the directors would hold a meeting Friday night of this week to draft the constitution and by-laws for submission at Tuesday night's meeting.

Fred Phelps, secretary of the Clovis CC and C. O. Green, former president of the Clovis organization, were present and addressed the assembly on the benefits of a live chamber of commerce.

Among the projects outlined as needing urgent attention were additional water mains, street paving, highway work and a swimming pool.

Livesay Case Goes To Haskell County

The murder trial of Thomas C. Livesay, 30-year-old Amarillo smelter worker, charged jointly with L. D. Stevens, also of Amarillo, with the fatal beating of Joshua Blocher last August, has been transferred to Haskell County for hearing, Dist. Judge E. A. Bills announced here Tuesday.

Livesay faces a grand jury indictment in Bailey County for his part in the fatal beating of Blocher, 85-year-old hermit of Progress. The co-defendant, Stevens, was tried in Bailey County and given the death sentence.

Livesay's trial was transferred to Farwell, resulting in a mistrial when no jury was obtained after exhausting a venire of 120 men. Judge Bills then moved the case to Tulsa, where again efforts to obtain a jury were of no avail.

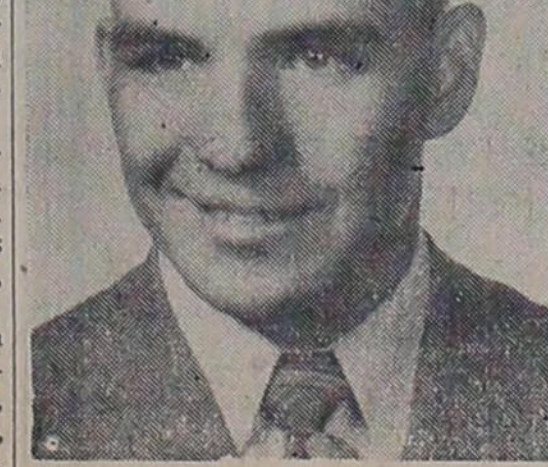
Livesay is now in the Parmer County jail, having been brought back here from Tulsa several weeks ago for safe-keeping. The date of the Haskell trial has not been set as yet.

Announce Farwell Honor Students

Rex Pool, son of Mr. and Mrs. Lenton Pool, and Delores Goldsmith, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Noble Goldsmith, have been named as top scholastic students of the senior class at Farwell schools for the past term.

Grades are determined on a four year basis; and average for the honor students were very close. Tabulations on Rex's grades were 92 plus; and points for Delores topped 91.

Asked if he had been striving for

the valedictorian honor during his high school years, Rex modestly replied "not exactly, I just turned all my work in." He admitted that he had hoped to receive scholastic honors, but he hadn't actually planned his work toward this goal during his first high school years.

The honor boy admitted that the competition was close. His average for his senior year, however, was a little better than 94.

Rex has been attending Farwell schools during his entire period of education, with the exception of a short while spent in Tahoka.

During his high school years, he has received other honors, and has received special recognition in track. Rex was the only Farwell student who was eligible to attend the state interscholastic league contests in Austin this year; and was entered in the mile race. He lettered two years in football, and three years in track. He was named "most studious" at Farwell schools last year, has served as class reporter, was a member of the debate team this year; and in the senior play cast.

He plans to attend Eastern New Mexico University in Portales, where he will major in electrical engineering. Asked about his reaction to graduation from high school, he says "I'm glad, but sad."

Light Frost Evident Here Early Monday

Early-risers report a light to moderately heavy frost appearing on car tops and windshields here Monday morning, with a lighter coating in evidence on rooftops.

Appearing here on May 19, old timers agree it is the latest frost recorded here in many years.

County Agent Joe Jones and other agricultural observers say there has been no damage reported to young crops, although tender cotton plants looked "rather sick." Jones explained that radiation from the ground kept the temperature from dropping to the freezing point reached on higher levels.

City Without Mayor After Resignation Of C. M. Henderson

The city of Farwell is temporarily without the services of a mayor, following the acceptance of C. M. Henderson's resignation at a special meeting held Wednesday night of last week.

Members of the City Commission said today they had a man in mind to fill the vacancy created by Henderson, but as yet the prospective new mayor had not given his consent to accept the job.

Henderson tendered his resignation some months ago, but it was not formally accepted until last Wednesday when a special meeting was held.

In a letter to the Commission, Henderson stressed that his resignation be accepted and asked that "you act upon this request at your earliest opportunity."

"To resign is a deeply regrettable incident of my life," Henderson further stated, and in a final statement addressed to the people of Farwell, he stated, "I will forever feel a deep sense of gratitude."

Ollie Boss Out Of Hospital Sunday

Ollie Boss, 70-year-old long time Texico resident, who has been under treatment in the Clovis Memorial hospital since March 1, was dismissed Sunday and returned to his home in Texico, where he has lived alone for the past several years.

Boss received a broken leg and other minor injuries on the night of March 1st, when he was hit by an automobile on the streets in Texico.

"When we got away, we just kept moving from one job to another until we have worked back to Farwell," he explained.

In addition to the street paving contracted inside the city, a 32-foot loop around the county courthouse will be paved by the construction company. To accomplish this, several trees will be removed and the present driveway widened an additional 14 feet.

Phone Co-op Bid Letting Thursday

Bids for central office equipment for the West Texas Rural Telephone Cooperative will be let in Hereford at 10 a.m. Thursday, May 22, according to Leo Forrest, manager.

Material for seven central office stations will be required for the 950 mile network that will serve 912 subscribers in Deaf Smith, Parmer, Castro, and Bailey counties.

Location of the seven stations are: between the Dawn and Progressive schools, near the Frio school, three miles west of Hereford, three miles northwest of Friona, three miles southeast of Friona, 3 and one-half miles west of Bovina and between Oklahoma Lane and Lariat.

January or February, 1953, is the target date for cut-over on the system to the subscribers set up during the middle of April. It is hoped that a contract for the outside plant will be let by July 1.

Estimated construction cost for the entire setup will be about \$811,000. The cooperative has been approved for an additional loan of \$361,000 and funds will be ready when needed for actual work.—Hereford Brand.

More Responsibilities Given Committee

Joe Camp, PMA secretary reports that the county committee is to be given more responsibilities. Under the 1952 loan and price support program, County PMA offices will be authorized to accept and process loan and purchase agreements, write sight drafts, retain custody of loan papers, accept repayments and schedule remittances direct to Federal Reserve banks.

The new plan places the entire operations of the loan program on the PMA County Committee and is designed to offer farmers better service, Camp says.

Timely Talks
FROM THE TRIBUNE
This Week:
Classified Advertising
Turning to the other division, let us consider the classified or so-called "want-ad" section of the newspaper. Classified advertising has a personal appeal not equalled by any other form. An average reader, not even classed as a "thorough" reader, scarcely inspects an issue of the paper without a glance at the classifieds. Classified advertising is a low-cost, simplified method of reaching the reading public. Anything under the sun can be the objective of a classified advertisement. Classified advertising is not used to any large extent in The Tribune, and it is possible that some people are overlooking an untouched field which could be beneficial to them. Noteworthy is the fact that classified ads in our column are repeatedly run by the same individuals, week in and week out. Next time you get an opportunity, you might ask one of these individuals what he thinks of classified advertising as a medium.
It is particularly significant that this explanatory statement appears now, because it was last week that began a new rate schedule for classified advertising. In some instances a classified ad will cost more than it has in the past, but for the common run, the rates will be about the same, and in some instances, even lower. The most important feature of the new rate schedule is uniformity. Heretofore, some advertisers have been charged more for their ads than others when they were after practically the same things. The reason for this is not deliberate dishonesty on the part of Tribune employees, but an outmoded, archaic system of accounting.
This is the way our new schedule works:
Minimum rate for any classified advertisement, regardless of size, will be 35 cents per week. Advertising will be charged on a 10-cents-per-line-basis. That is, for every line of advertising that appears in the classifieds, a charge of 10 cents will be assessed. However, if the advertiser permits his ad to be run for more than two consecutive weeks, his rate will be reduced to seven cents per line.
A very handy way of estimating how many lines a classified ad will take is to count the words in the ad and divide by five. The answer will be the approximate number of lines that must be paid for, and this is the method The Tribune will use for line totals. Again, we would like to remind you that classified advertising must be made on a strict cash basis. No ads over the telephone can be accepted. There is a very good reason for this. Tabulations Show Increase In Rain

In the same length of time, this immediate area has received more than three times as much moisture at the beginning of 1952 than was recorded the first four months of 1951, figures at the Santa Fe passenger depot reveal.

According to the Santa Fe records, approximately 4.72 inches of rain have already been received in 1952; while recordings at the latter part of April last year totaled only 1.64. In fact, the entire total of moisture for the year of 1951 was only about 13 inches. Average rainfall for Parmer is 16.23.

The largest percentage of rain for 1951 was received in May, when three separate showers added up to 4.61 inches of rainfall. The past month of April almost reaches this total, with about 4.22 recorded.

Last year, there were several dry months, including April and September with no moisture at all; and other months with very little recorded.

In January of both years, snow left some moisture in the ground

Two snows in January of 1951 gave about .50 moisture and a rain in February added up to one and one half inches precipitation in the first two months. Only .14 was recorded in March. Two separate showers in June helped the situation with 2 and one-half inches.

Rainfall was listed in July with 1/4 inch, and again in August with 1 and one-fourth inches. In October, nearly 1 and three-fourths inches were received; and a snow in November rendered about one-fourth inch moisture. Another snow in December added about an inch tabulation to the total.

A light snow began the moisture picture for 1952, and in February, about one-fourth inch rain was received. Another one-fourth inch was received in March, and it wasn't until April that the moisture picture brightened.

Bulletin Says Wheat Prospects Brighten

According to a farm labor bulletin released by Texas Employment Commission, production is currently forecast at 38,071,000 bushels by the Bureau of Agricultural Economics, an increase of approximately 10 percent over the April 1 indication, or a yield of 11 bushels per acre average on the estimated 3,461,000 acres remaining for harvest in the Texas wheat belt.

According to the bulletin, wheat prospects have brightened considerably during the last two weeks in the Littlefield, Muleshoe, Dimmitt and Farwell areas. An acreage yield is anticipated throughout the area. Beginning harvest date will probably be about June 15.

(Editors Note: Jane M. Gallagher, a candidate for the degree Doctor of Philosophy of the University of Oslo, Norway daughter of the Reverends Mr. and Mrs. George E. Meyer of the Congregational Church at Friona, Texas, writes her parents of General Eisenhower's visit to Oslo and of his speech before the student body of the University and thousands of others gathered on the "Green" to hear him.)

Dear folks,

The great day has come—the great day has gone—the great General "Ike" with his big smile and his kindly words made May 9 just that. He hadn't come to Oslo to make a speech. He had not intended to make a speech but he did, being prevailed on to do so. At 4:00 P. M. and not prior to that time it was announced that the General would speak at 4:30 and a record crowd gathered from everywhere, filled every available spot.

There were no MP's on hand as there are always otherwise are. The military hosts were present but they had their task. The General was forced to plow his way through the pack of people and "plow" he did. He didn't seem to mind it a bit. At one spot on his way through, he lost his hat. A beautiful old girl sitting on her father's shoulders that she might see "the great general," and looking down from her height not being able to see his face lifted his hat that she might see that historic smile. She did. The general quickly recovered his hat, gave the dainty little miss a smile all her own, and went on plowing through, working his way to the loud speaker, his grin flashing every instant.

How these Norwegian people loved that grin and the general. He was introduced by the president of the "studentsamfundet"—i.e. the student union—as "The next president of the United States." The general laughed it down characteristically and replied—"I don't mind a bit what you say about my past, but please the future—well there is still some question about that." He followed by saying to the student body of the University—"The future world belongs to the students of this generation."

He quoted Lincoln. He said "We of our persuasion must hang together or we most certainly will hang separately" in this present day world. "We do not want to push anyone around, neither do we want to be pushed around, and furthermore we have no intention of letting anyone push us around."

The general's speech was short but he made a marvelous impression. He was given a tremendous ovation. He has made a name for himself in Europe that won't be forgotten.
