

There's often quite a difference in a cotton crop that has been planted with chemically treated seed and a crop that wasn't. Here's the differerice. With chemically treated seed, chances are good for better stands and greater yields because the chemicals kill seed-borne germs and protect the seeds against molds and fungi in the soil.

Without seed treatment, it is harded to get a good stand for producing a good crop, says E. A. Miller, extension agronomist of Texas A. and M. College. Unprotected seed rots easily in thee oil before it has a chance to germinate, especially if

Brown spots or cankers at the ground level or slightly below on a stem is a good sign of soreshin. Many plants will recover from this disease, but they are often late in developing.
