

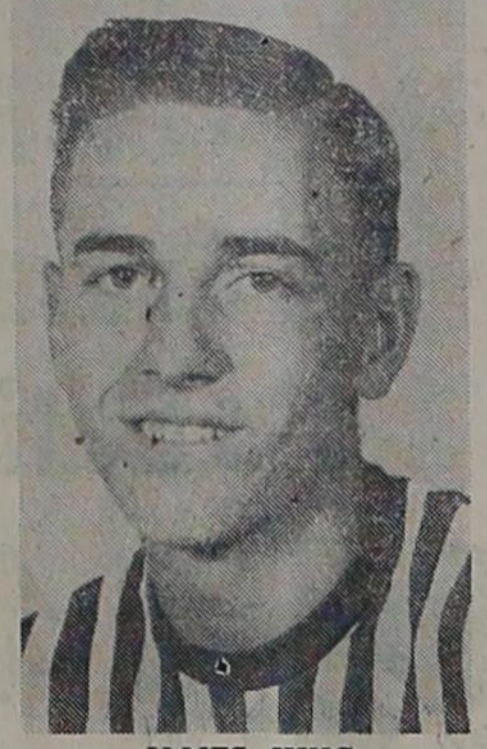

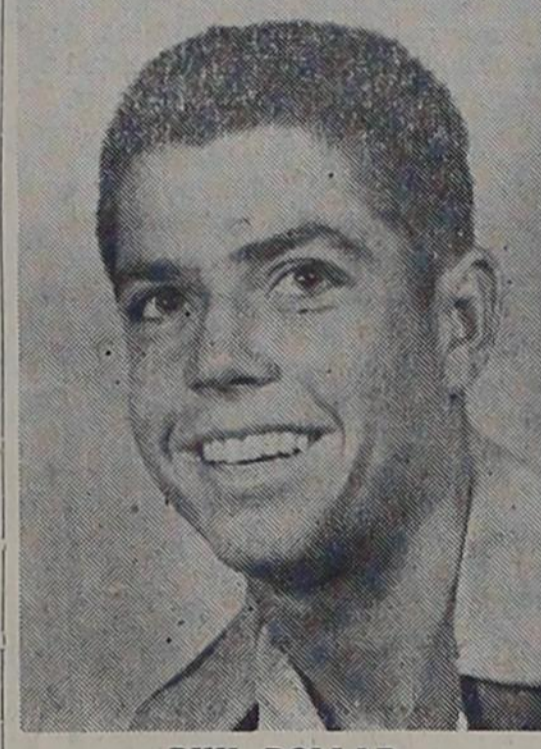
Seven Students Attend Boys' and Girls' State Paving Is Started

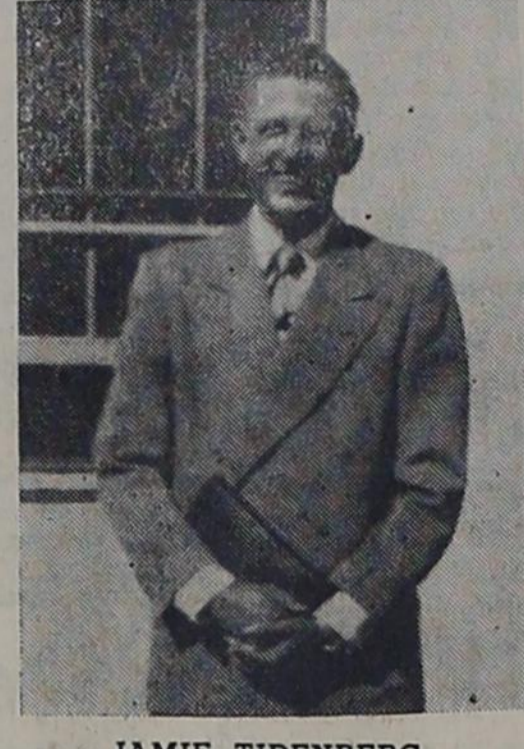

Texico Councilmen Vote Held Invalid

In an opinion from the attorney general's office, issued in Santa Fe June 4, the election of Joe Helton and Russell Johnson as members of the Texico city council was declared void.

Helton and Johnson received a majority vote in the municipal election held on April 1, but the attorney general ruled that their election was invalid because unregistered voters had been allowed to participate in the election.

Mayor M. C. Roberts said Tuesday that it was his opinion that the hold-over members of the present town council—Les Means and J. E. Stone—would appoint Helton and Johnson as members of the council should Roberts fail to qualify for the office.

Mayor Roberts gave it as his opinion no action would be taken in the matter until the next regular meeting of the council on the first Monday night in July.

James King is to represent Texico at Boys' State, which began at Northern New Mexico Normal school, El Rito, New Mexico, from June 8 to 15, sponsored by the American Legion.

The M. C. Roberts Seed Co. and Furniture Mart of Texico are helping pay the expenses for the Boy's and Girls' State, for Texico.

The Lions Club of Farwell plan to pay half of the expenses for the Boys' and Girls' State which will help send Kayla and Buil to the meeting. The American Legion will send Bertha and Jamie to the State meeting.

Wes Izzard, editor of the Amarillo Globe-News, radio commentator and outstanding columnist of that publication, has accepted an invitation to be the main speaker at the Farwell Chamber of Commerce annual banquet to be held Friday night, June 27.

Carl Davis, vice-president of the local CC, stated today that the feed would be held in the high school auditorium, and plans were being made to feed the biggest crowd ever assembled at such a gathering in this city.

Arrangements have been made with Dock Maggart of the City Cafe to prepare the food.

In order to assure comfort for the large crowd expected, portable air-conditioners and fans will be set up in the auditorium for the evening.

Izzard has been given the privilege of choosing his own subject for his address. Chamber members are looking forward with considerable enthusiasm to Izzard's appearance here. His daily column in the Amarillo News is followed closely by a large number of readers in this section, who have never had the privilege of hearing or meeting this well versed editor on present-day issues.

CC officials predicted today that Izzard's appearance here would command a large turn-out. Tickets for the banquet are being offered by the band mothers and may be obtained at \$1.50 per plate.

John S. Potts, Bovina Pioneer, Near Death

The condition of John S. Potts, 79-year-old Bovina pioneer, was described as "hopeless" by family members early this week. He has been receiving treatment for cancer of the bladder in an Amarillo hospital for the past two weeks, and was returned to his home in Bovina on Tuesday.

Potts has been a resident of Bovina for the past 36 years. Some 30 years ago, he was elected as county assessor and served four years in that office.

In dismissing him from the Amarillo hospital his physician took the position that the patient would be more content during his final days at his home in Bovina.

Commissioners Buy Road Maintainers

The County Commissioners Court in session here Monday, approved the purchase of two new Allis Chalmers motor graders to be used on Parmer County roads.

One of the graders goes to Precinct No. 3 and the other goes to Precinct 4. The machines cost \$14,600 apiece. \$5,600 cash was paid on the grader for Precinct 4, and \$6,600 was paid on the machine for Precinct 3. Warrants were issued for the balance on each machine, with an order approving the purchase of the warrants by the Permanent School Fund of the county.

Two adjustments on tax valuations were approved by the Court, sitting as a Board of Equalization. Other business attended included the payment of current bills.

Charges Filed In Highway Death Of Palistine Mother

Charges of negligent homicide in second degree have been filed against Carlos Soliz 33-year-old Spanish-American of Morton, as the outgrowth of a highway crash that cost the life of Mrs. Johnnie Belle Smith, 27 of Palistine, Texas, on the night of May 29.

A complaint, charging Soliz with the death of the young mother, was sworn out here last Friday by Highman Patrolman J. A. Dumas of Hereford, who investigated the wreck.

The complaint charges that Soliz was driving on the left hand side of the highway at the time of hitting the car occupied by Mrs. Smith, together with other members of her family.

The crash happened just east of Black, shortly after midnight the morning of May 29. Mrs. Smith was dead upon arrival at the Parmer County Community Hospital in Friona.

Also injured in the collision were, Percy Hall Smith, 34, husband of the dead woman; Jeannette, 11-year-old daughter of the couple; and David, 6-year-old son who sustained a brain concussion and remained on the critical list for several days.

Mrs. Smith's body was shipped to Palistine, their home for burial. The Smith family had been in Hereford only a few weeks, where they were staying at a tourist court while he was engaged in day labor.

EMPLOYED AT FARWELL

Mr. and Mrs. John Milford of Ardmore, Oklahoma were employed as instructors in the Farwell school on Monday night. Mr. Milford will teach science and history and Mrs. Milford high school English.

The long-delayed street paving program for Farwell got under way the first of the week when D. & T. Construction Co., of Brownfield, moved its equipment and crew members here from Muleshoe, where they have been engaged the past several weeks.

STOP THAT AD!

"I want to stop that ad I ran last week," said R. L. Green, who lives 8 miles east of Bovina, as he entered The Tribune office Saturday afternoon.

Green placed a 70-cent want ad in this newspaper with instructions that it appear two times. But one issue of the paper was sufficient to get the job done.

"I've done sold all the cottonseed I had and could have sold a lot more," Green related in telling of the pulling power of Tribune want ads.

Edgar Martin, head of the contracting firm, has been personally in charge of the work. He said Wednesday afternoon that it was his intention to rush completion of the program just as rapidly as possible.

The first undertaking will be the establishment of a proper drainage grade, to be followed by the installation of curbs and gutters. Work on this job was underway late Wednesday afternoon.

In addition to paving the streets already under contract, a new and wider driveway will be laid completely around the county courthouse.

At present, contracts for the paving of 7 blocks along Third St. have been signed. The contract for the four-block loop around the new residential section in south Farwell is also signed up and work was begun on this four-block loop.

Paving along Second Street was still hanging in the balance, Martin said, with a number of contracts still out. He expressed hope that these hold-out contracts would be turned in while he had his crew and equipment here.

Furniture Auction Sale Draws Crowds

Throngs of people were on hand Monday night to attend the opening of the big auction sale being staged by the Furniture Mart in their Farwell warehouse.

Tom Goodwin of the National Auction Co., Ponca City, Okla., is in charge of the sale. He moves at a rapid pace as he knocks off high class merchandise to eager bidders, and the sale is not allowed to drag.

Ben Smart, owner, said today he was throwing an \$83,000 stock of brand new merchandise on the auction block and the sale will continue each evening until the stock is sold out completely. The offerings run from what-nots to elaborate bedroom and livingroom furniture, every piece of it brand new and top quality merchandise that has been featured by the local firm.

Sales begin each evening at 8 o'clock, Texas time, and runs until the crowd begins to become weary. Another unusual feature of the auction is that terms are offered, if desired.

Asked today how long the sale will last, Smart replied, "Until the entire stock is sold; we have no definite quitting time." He felt definitely sure that the sale would continue through the rest of this week, however.

Water Conservation Stressed at Meetings

Tom McFarland, secretary of the Hi-Plains Underground Water District, discussed the underground water situation at two meetings held in Parmer County last week.

Some 45 interested persons attended the first meeting held at Friona on Thursday night, with only a small handful sitting in on the Farwell meet, held Friday night.

McFarland told the gatherings that Texas had the best water law in the 17 western states, and praised Sam Aldridge, and other attorneys for drafting the law.

"This law states that the water under your land is yours," and added that "this is the first time such has been put into a law even though we have always assumed everything lying under our land was ours."

He discussed the possibilities and the importance of recharging the underground water supply by means of creating lakes behind dams in the high plains country. "Naturally," he said, "water runs down hill and since we of this area are some 1000 feet higher than the caprock section, dams should be built in the higher elevations."

He estimated that the tax voted to carry out the conservation program would run about 25 cents per year on a quarter section of land.

"This law is a good one and our job is to use it and not let the state take control of the underground water." And he suggested that every land owner obtain a copy of the law at the county agent's office.

He cited the case of the State of Arizona, which has taken over the underground water, and warned, "Let's don't let that happen here."

"We have sense enough to run our own business, and we don't need the state or the Federal government telling us what to do," he said in conclusion.

McFarland, who was born at Littlefield, now has a two-well irrigation farm near Hereford, and his father is an irrigation farmer near Littlefield.

Texico Park Move Showing Progress

The playgrounds movement launched only recently by the newly-organized Texico Chamber of Commerce began to take on formable aspects early this week when the CC held a special meeting Tuesday night to hear the reports of the committees and check up on the progress made.

The most encouraging report made at the meeting was that Curtis Miller had been employed for the summer by the Texico schools as a recreational director for the young people of the community. Miller will direct recreational activities of the teen-agers and lend his support to supervising the construction of playgrounds equipment in the city park plot.

John Getz, secretary of the organization, reported that \$250.00 in cash had been subscribed for the purchase of playground equipment. In addition to the cash received, Getz said that a number of donations in the way of materials and labor were being received.

Installation of at least 2 stop lights along the highway that runs through town was discussed. Consideration of a motor patrolman also came in for an airing. Neither of the ideas were definitely adopted, pending further investigations.

The idea of a community swimming pool with both Texico and Farwell co-operating in such a project, came in for discussion. That, too, was passed over for further investigation.

Assess Candidates For Primary Vote

The Democratic County Executive will meet here next Monday to begin laying plans for the July primary elections, it was announced here today by County Chairman G. D. Anderson.

The committee will estimate the cost of conducting the double primary and apportion the cost among the various candidates. Places on the ballots will be determined by lot, conducted by the committee.

Annual Dedicated To Mrs. Harry Whitley

Mrs. Harry Whitley of Farwell, was totally surprised when seniors of the 1952 class at Farwell Schools dedicated their 1952 school annual to her, but she was "terribly thrilled about the honor."

"I've had my eye on this senior class since they entered the fourth grade," says Mrs. Whitley, "and I still expect great things of them. She noted that usually when a class has been away from a teacher as long as the senior class had, they forget her, partially anyway. Mrs. Whitley had taught the students their fourth and fifth years.

"I especially love the '52 seniors," says the honored teacher, "but I never dreamed that they would dedicate their book to me." Mrs. Whitley has taught school in Parmer County for the past 19 years nine of which were spent in Farwell. She began her work in Farwell schools in 1952, teaching the sixth and seventh grades. She then instructed the fourth and fifth grades for two years, and from that time on, was first grade teacher. This is the first year that she has taught school, in quite a long while.

Mrs. Whitley was reared in Pilot Point, Texas, which is located about 18 miles from Denton. She attended college at North Texas State College in Denton and her first position was in Clovis.

One-Third Of Net Income Now Going For Various Taxes

While the volume of manufacturing sales in the nation is increasing, profits after taxes are dropping.

Noting this trend, which was revealed in latest Government statistics, the West Texas Chamber of Commerce today declared that "This is evidence that high Federal taxes on manufacturing businesses are reaching the point of diminishing returns both for the Government in tax revenues and for the American people in opportunity and jobs."

The WTCC said joint quarterly reports of the Federal Trade Commission and the Securities and Exchange Commission showed that in the 18 months between July 1, 1950 and December 31, 1951 the total net income after taxes of all manufacturing corporation in the country declined

steadily in each quarter, except one, even though total sales kept increasing.

These reports revealed that while manufacturers' sales of all manufacturing corporations rose steadily from \$48,600,000,000 in the third quarter of 1950 to \$54,300,000,000 in the fourth quarter of 1951, their total quarterly net income after taxes actually declined from \$3,700,000,000 to \$2,600,000,000 in the same period. The percentage of net income after taxes to sales dropped from 7.64 to 4.80 per cent.

The smaller manufacturing businesses of the country, taken as a group, were revealed in these reports as faring even worse. Over the same period manufacturing corporations in the asset size group of \$1,000,000 to \$5,000,000, which the reports listed in the category of small business, showed a drop in their aggregate quarterly net income after taxes from \$391,000,000 to \$156,000,000 even though their total sales rose from \$6,600,000,000 to \$7,300,000,000. Their

percentage of net income after taxes to sales decreased from 5.93 to 2.14 per cent.

The WTCC said, "A net income of as little as 2.14 per cent of sales simply will not permit a small manufacturing company to grow, or even in some cases to keep going."

The WTCC added that taxes for all governments, Federal, state and local, will take a third of the American people's net income next year, and more than three fourths of this tax "take" will go to Washington.

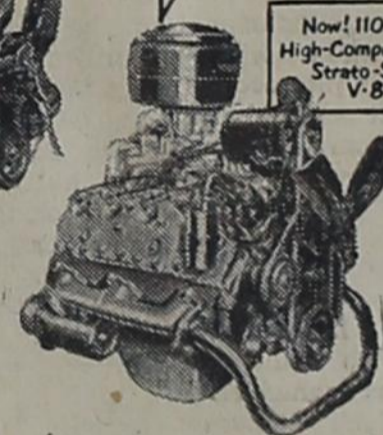
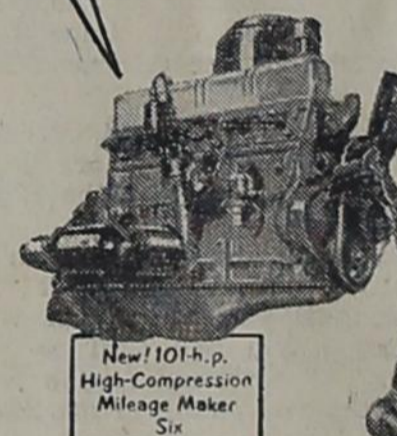

Importance of Leaving Plenty of Stubble On Wheat Fields Stressed by County Agent

By H. M. Knapp Curry County Agent

Wheat harvest in Curry County is only three to four weeks from being here, and now is the time to consider some of the things that you should do after the harvest.

Of the 280,000 acres seeded to wheat last fall it is estimated that not more than 20 per cent of this acreage will make a harvest, the other 80 per cent has been abandoned principally due to wind erosion damage.

The grain and straw yield on the acreage to be harvest will be light and it is therefore more important than ever to manage the crop residues in order to conserve soil and moisture. (See photo).

The proper management of these residues does not necessarily require special equipment which most farmers do not already have. The equipment which will do the best job of leaving the residues on the surface are sweep type as they do not cover or cut the residues into small pieces.

A dense stubble on the surface can be managed and it will eliminate serious wind erosion. Also to obtain stubble like this a good yield of grain was harvested.

Farming the stubble mulch way will reduce erosion, improve the soil and increase yields. This is something to strive for.

The earliest wheat reported in this area was received by the Roberts Seed Company at their Clovis and Portales elevators on Monday. Ray Ashbrook of near Portales delivered a load of 216 bushels to the Portales elevator, and second load of 150 bushels from the same field to the Clovis elevator Monday afternoon.

M. C. Roberts said that the Portales load tested 60 pounds and had a moisture content of 14.79, with the Clovis load testing 60 pounds and a moisture content of 13 per cent. Ashbrook was paid \$2.03 per bushel for the grain, plus a \$25.00 bonus for the first loads.

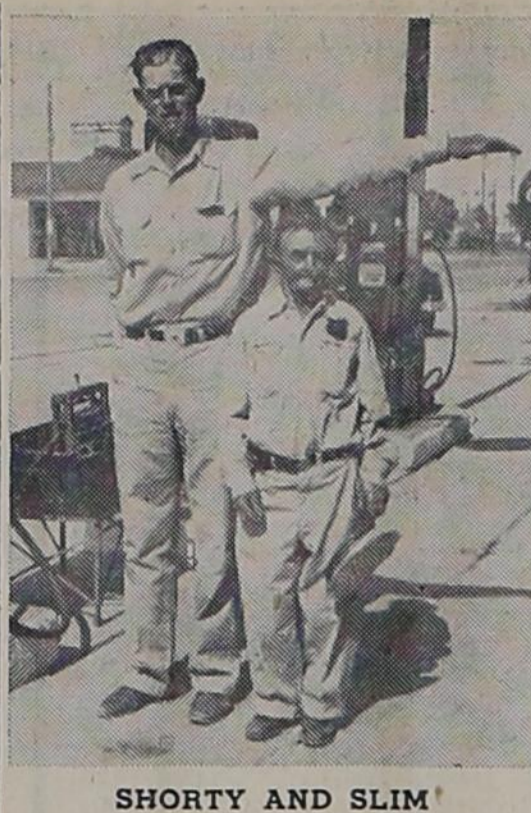

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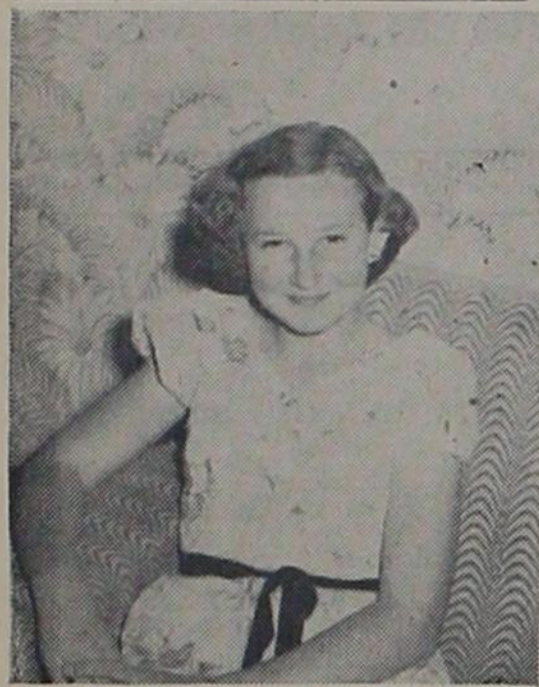
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Vacation Days to Normal Students Has Different Meaning to Two Polio Sufferers

School is out, and Texico-Farwell youngsters have a whole summer before them, to vacation, play, work a little, and relax and enjoy themselves. But for two local young people, summer means something besides swimming, picnics and hot

summer days of leisure. It means the two children will have a chance to heal and recuperate, and try to be in readiness for school, when it begins in the fall.

The two young people are Fern, 12-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Percy Tipton, and John Gordon, 13-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Dale McCuan. Both youngsters are victims of polio and are to be entered in the Midland hospital and Carrie Tingley hospital in Truth or Consequences respectively, this summer in an effort to correct disorders caused by polio. Johnnie has curvature of the spine; and Fern will have an operation on her foot to allow her to dis-

pense with a brace which she has worn since her attack of the disease. It was on October 14, 1949 that John Gordon became ill. "It was such sudden illness," says Mrs. McCuan "John Gordon began feeling ill about 12 o'clock while at school and by 4 o'clock, he was very sick." His parents immediately took him to the doctor, and he was transferred to Plainview. The boy remained in the clinic there for 52 days, before he was released and returned home.

After waiting three weeks, John Gordon was permitted to return to school. He played football, baseball and entered in other activities. At the beginning of this year, after effects of the polio were noticed when the boy had curvature of the spine. He was taken to Carrie Tingley hospital in March and a cast was placed on his body, beginning at the shoulders and extending past the hips. He has worn the cast since March 3.

John Gordon was to go back to the hospital this past week, and stated that he did not yet know if the cast could be removed. He states that the cast is awfully hot; "and you should see me when by back begins itching," he adds. His mother states that she will take a straightened coat hanger, place a white cloth on the end, and put alcohol on it, and try to ease John Gordon's discomfort, when a part of his body which is under the cast, begins itching.

The boy doesn't know how long he will have to remain in Truth or Consequences, maybe all summer. The cast will be removed and doctors will check John Gordon's progress, but they may have to put another one on, the boy says. "I don't mind going back, if I can just take the cast off," John Gordon says. His chief desire is to get to go swimming during the summer. The hospital has two swim-

min pools, a theatre, library, and "the biggest electric train I've ever seen," the boy adds.

Johnnie wants to thank everyone who has been so thoughtful during his illness, and asks that anyone visiting in Truth or Consequences, come by to see him. Visiting hours are from two until four in the afternoon.

Since the doctor says Johnnie's spine is weakened and will not be totally healed for a long time, the boy has taken up various hobbies for entertainment. He builds model airplanes as a pastime, has plaited leather, and reads a lot. He hopes to do arts and crafts at the hospital this summer. The boy is an avid reader of mechanics magazines and studies them carefully. He also listens to the radio, but is distressed when he can't get the Amarillo stations in Truth or Consequences.

Johnnie completed all his school work for the past year, making A's and B's on his report card. He completed his workbooks and all assignments at home and will be in the eighth grade next year. One six weeks of work was completed while

Johnnie was in Carrie Tingley hospital, three teachers are maintained there, he says.

The polio patient is quite cheerful, though he states that he "would trade places with anyone." He told of various people who visited the polio hospital; and added that his parents would come down every two or three weeks to see him. But talking about his stay in the hospital, he added, "It seems like a year."

Johnnie explained that he is required to rest so much each day and to take exercises also; and there is never a dull moment in the polio ward, he states. "If you hear water running at night, be ready for a hot towel in your face" he laughs, stating that kids in the awards are always doing something. But he continues, "we get pretty homesick at times."

Fern contracted polio after John Gordon did, in September of 1950. She was also entered in the Plainview hospital for treatment, where she remained for 62 days. When transferred back home, she remained for a week and returned to school. Unable to walk the distance from the Tipton home to the school, the Farwell bus picked up Fern each day and returned her home in the afternoon. The Tiptons expressed their thanks to the school board, superintendent and bus driver for this assistance.

The local girl was to leave Wednesday for Truth or Consequences, where an operation is to be given on her foot right away. Upon further investigation, she found that the operation will be under the direction of Dr. Driskall at Midland. She will leave for the hospital about June 18. The girl says the procedure will be to set a bone in the foot, to enable it to stand her weight to the brace won't be needed. After the operation, Fern will wear a cast from her hip for six weeks; then a cast will be placed from the knee down for six weeks. The final six weeks, she will wear a brace.

Mrs. Tipton said that Fern had

been examined by five or six doctors and all had recommended the operation for the youngster. They also cautioned the family to watch for curvature of the spine, noting that she has a slight weakness in the right hip.

"I didn't realize how much I wanted to have the operation until the eighth grade graduation," Fern says.

Fern has also kept up with her school work, though she has missed about a month of school out of the entire year. She didn't have to take Fern thinks she might be lonely while in the hospital this summer and asks everyone to write her. When she was confined to bed before, she enjoyed reading and working puzzles and other less strenuous activities. In Plainview, children would all gather around one bed and work together on puzzles, and Fern remembers an instance when eight children "piled on my bed as I read to them."

The local youngster hopes to be able to go to school next year. "The worst thing about my brace is that I couldn't run," she says. But she entered in activities, nevertheless; when children played ball, she umpired or some other phase of the game.

She too is quite cheerful about her recuperation, and is looking forward to coming home in the fall, without the brace.

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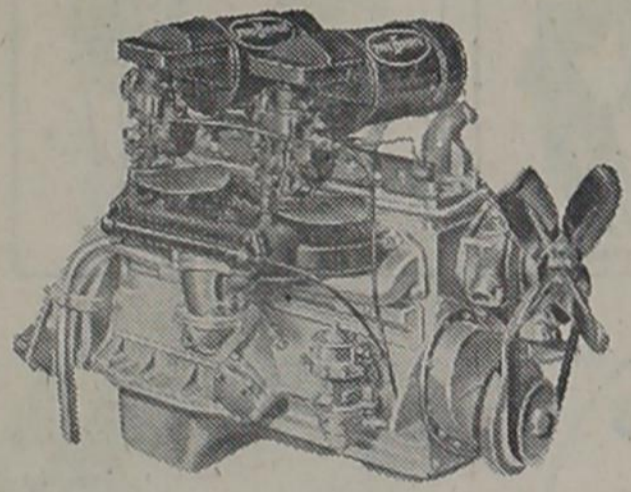
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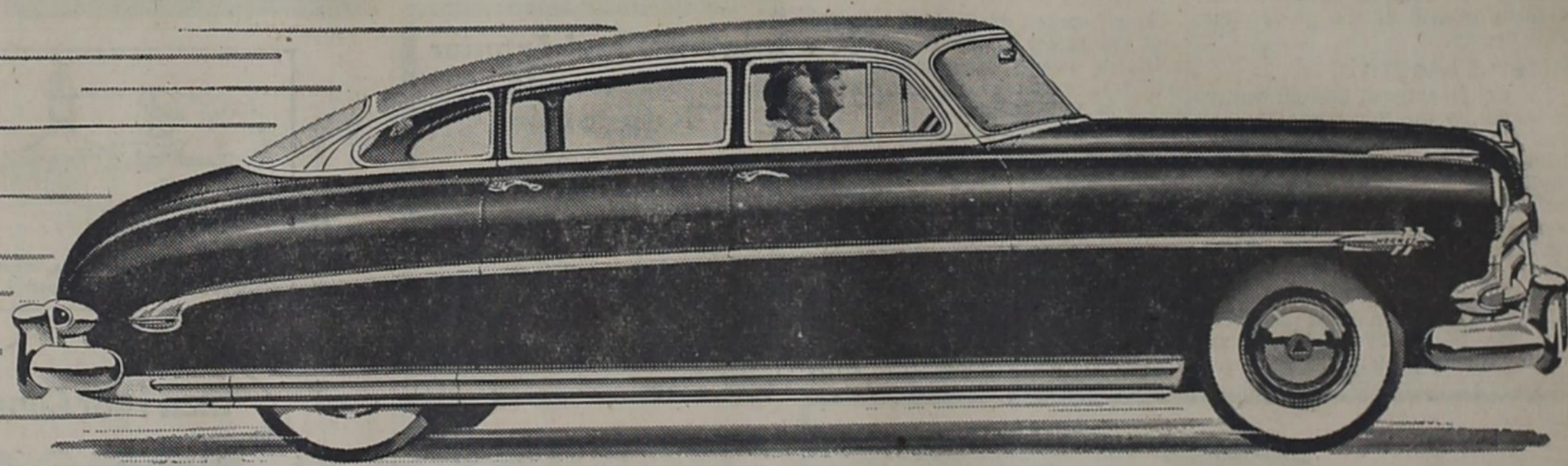
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
