## FROM THE HOPPER By HOP

I like Ike. Practically everybody likes Ike. He is a likeable fellow with an infectious grin, who gets along with folks. But does that make him presidential timber? Ike has intelligence and integrity and a lifetime training in a specialized profession. He is doing as fine a job in Europe as anyone could do under the circumstances — better than most.

But let's face it. The billions we have poured and are pouring into those countries are more than a little responsible for his success. And even so, the cooperation of our European allies is far short of what we had hoped—little more, indeed, than "token" participation.

There is nothing to show that his work there qualifies him to head our government. Who, for example, would send Taft over in Europe? Yet this is a job he would be better equipped to do than would be Ike to take over as president.

As between the two, there could be no choice on the basis of integrity and patriotism, nor for that matter intelligence. But on one point we had better take a long look.

Naturally, the men who promote Ike are the men he is most likely to choose as his advisers. There are not enough hours in the day for the president to carefully consider all problems upon which he must make a decision. He will have to rely to a considerable extent upon the advice of friends. Who will his advisers be?

We have probably already hit the all-time low in "government by cronies," but before we commit ourselves because we "like Ike," we had better scrutinize his closest associates. Of course, that goes for any candidate, but the winner of a "popularity contest" is seldom gifted with the "iron" to choose, and especially to reject, his admirers.

It is my considered judgment that Ike's enthusiasts, from movie stars to New Deal partisans, will hasten us down the road to socialism.

I like Ike, but I shall not vote for him, as far as I can see now. I am somewhat in agreement with the sentiment expressed by Josh Potts of Bovina last week when he observed, "I don't like to buy anything until I see what is in the package."

Ma Spurlin thought she was "in high cotton" recently when she took a vacation trip to Arkansas and Tennessee. But she is experiencing a sad awakening now.

While in Arkansas, she gathered up all the vines and shrubs for replanting around her premises, and since her return home she has put in long and tiresome hours in getting the plants reset. "I've just about used up all my garden space," she complains.

## County-Wide Officers Unopposed In Bid For Re-election To Office

With the deadline for filing application for place on the ballots in the coming Democratic primary election reached, none of the incumbent county-wide office holders drew any opposition in Parmer County.

Only two precinct offices in the county are being contested, with two candidates in the race for county commissioner of precinct No. 1, and three aspirants for the office of county commissioner of precinct No. 3.

Forrest Osborn is contesting E. R. Day for his job as commissioner in precinct 1, and E. R. Billingsley drew two opponents in his bid for re-election as commissioner of precinct 3, with B. V. Hughes and T. E. Levy entering the race.

The largest number of candidates for any one office is listed for the office of associate justice of the court of civil appeals, 7th district, with four aspirants filing for office.

Walter Rogers is unopposed in his bid for re-election as congressman, as is Joe Sharp, district attorney, who seeks re-election.

B. N. Graham of Farwell is the only candidate for justice of the peace in the entire county, and there are no candidates for any of the constable jobs in the county.

Jesse M. Osborn and Karl Lovelady, both of Muleshoe, oppose each other for the office of state representative of the 96th Legislative District. Harold M. LaFont and J. L. (Cont. on last page, this section)

## Texico Council Marks Time At First Meeting

With only two members of the council qualified to transact business, the Texico town council merely marked time at its first meeting since the recent election on Monday night.

Town Clerk W. L. Freeman said "they are awaiting the outcome of the Attorney General's decision" before taking up city matters.

Three new city officials qualified for office and assumed their duties. They were, M. C. Roberts, mayor; W. L. Freeman, clerk; and Sam Lewis, police magistrate.

Election of two councilmen, in the election held on April 1, has been submitted to the Attorney General after Dist Judge E. T. Hensley, Jr., held their election void when it was found that unregistered voters participated in the voting.

Hold-over members are Les Means and J. E. Stone. Joe Helton and Russell Johnson are the two candidates who received the highest vote and whose election remains in doubt.

## Seek to Keep Trades Day Alive in Cities

At a meeting of the businessmen of Texico-Farwell, held at the Legion hall last Thursday night, it was decided to attempt to keep alive the weekly trades day in the Twin Cities.

At present, it was revealed, only 13 businessmen of the two towns are supporting the weekly event, and it was agreed that more supporters of the project must be enlisted to assure the future of the drawings.

Additional contributors are being sought in order to keep the event active, it was stated the first of the week.

# Sign Contract For Courtyard Paving

## County's Lone GOP Delegate Sent To State Uninstructed

Parmer County's lone delegate to the state Republican convention will go uninstructed, with a bias in favor of Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower.

That was the action of the Parmer County Republican convention, which met at the courthouse here Tuesday afternoon. Eight delegates were represented at the meeting.

Leo McLellan was named delegate to the state convention, and Vernon Estes alternate. Estes addressed the county convention and made a strong appeal for an instructed delegate who would favor Gen. Eisenhower. McLellan stated his position by declaring in favor of an uninstructed delegate.

The county convention also went on record as strongly opposed to "any kind of loyalty pledge."

When it came to deciding whether to send the delegate to the state convention instructed or otherwise, the vote resulted in a tie, with county Chairman McLellan voting off the tie for an uninstructed delegate.

Although not a delegate, Floyd Reeve of Friona, one of the county's staunchest Republicans, made a strong plea for a Taft-pledged delegate, declaring that "Eisenhower has not said what he stood for."

Mrs. Eloise Liles took issue with the veteran Republican and started to tell the assembly what Eisenhower said and wrote "while he was president of Columbia University..." at which point she was interrupted by Reeve who wanted to know, "How many long-haired New Dealers came from Columbia University?"

Mrs. Liles finally injected her sentiments by declaring, "I don't believe Taft is the man to put on the ticket and I'll never vote for him."

George McLean, another veteran county Republican and for many years chairman of the party in this county, spoke in favor of an uninstructed delegate by observing, "you have more power when you are loose."

"This uninstructed delegate is something I'm against," voiced Estes, adding that "it has got us in a hell of a mess," and such a delegate "hasn't got a chance" at the state convention.

Leo McLellan was named chairman of the meeting, and L. L. Bruns served as secretary.

## Texico Court Tries 13 Misdemeanor Cases

Sam Lewis, police magistrate of Texico, reports 13 misdemeanor cases filed in his court the past month; also one felony case, on the complaint of drawing and delivering a worthless check. The check and cost of court was paid and the case dismissed.

There were four cases of overloading on New Mexico highways, four cases of failing to stop at the port of entry for inspection.

These drew a fine from \$10 to \$25 plus cost of court. Lewis states that he tried five cases filed by New Mexico S. C. C. for violating Rule 10, section 68 of New Mexico statutes, operating without an S. C. C. permit, which drew a fine of \$50 and cost of court.

## Spud Shortage Not Critical Locally

With a shortage of Irish potatoes being felt all over the country, a check-up with local merchants revealed that no critical shortage has existed here.

Merchants report that the supply had been somewhat short, but not critical, and a limited supply of the popular tuber has been on hand most of the time.

One merchant reported turning down a shipment of potatoes over the weekend because they were not No. 1 quality. All dealers said that many out-of-town shoppers had been frequent visitors to their stores in search of "taters."

## Demo Delegation To State Uninstructed

The four Parmer County delegates to the state Democratic convention at Mineral Wells will go uninstructed. This was the unanimous decision reached here at the county Democratic convention late Tuesday afternoon.

In addition to being uninstructed, they will vote as a unit at the state parley. With one alternate, Pete Buske, being named as a "balance wheel" to vote off any tie that may occur in the caucus room at Mineral Wells.

Delegates named were Sam Aldridge, Sloan Osborn, W. M. Sherry, and Mrs. G. D. Anderson Jr. Alternates: R. W. Anderson, G. B. Buske, L. M. Grissom, and Frank Truitt.

All delegates to the county convention came as uninstructed from various precincts of the county.

G. D. Anderson was named chairman and presided at the county convention, and Mrs. R. W. Anderson was elected secretary.

If elected, Mr. Levy pledges himself to discharge the duties to the best of his ability and will appreciate any consideration shown his candidacy in the forthcoming primary.

### REVIVAL PLANNED

Date for the coming Texico-Farwell Baptist revival has been set for May 25 through June 8. Vacation Bible school will be held in the morning on the same dates.

The Parmer County Commissioners' Court, in an adjourned session here last Friday, entered into contracts with the D. & T. Construction Company of Brownfield for paving a loop around the courthouse, and 830 feet on Third Street, immediately in front of the county property.

## County Opens Way For Additional Paving

Parmer County opened the way for additional paving in and near Farwell early last week when the Commissioners' Court approved and sent to Dist. Highway Engineer S. C. McCarty two resolutions dealing with two separate jobs of paving.

Accepting a proposal of N. L. Tharp to pay the cost of paving a connecting link between Highway 60 and the state line, the commissioners agreed to provide the right-of-way as the county's only expense of the project. Tharp has offered to expend \$30,000 to \$40,000 for the connecting link and extension up north along the state line.

The Highway Department is being asked to do the work according to Department specifications.

In still another project, the commissioners passed a resolution approving a loop that would connect New Mexico Highway 348 with Texas Highway 70 in the city of Farwell.

The routing of the loop may run from the southwest corner of the Farwell townsite at the corner of First Street and Ave. G, thence east to Seventh Street to the school property, thence north to the intersection of Highway 70 inside the city limits of Farwell.

Actual routing of the paving is being left to "good engineering" practices of the State Highway Department, and does not necessarily have to follow the route suggested.

In asking the Department to pave this connecting link, it is pointed out in the resolution that already a truck route has been built extending Highway 348 to First Street and private funds are to be used in paving the entire street.

The resolution asks that these two projects be given immediate attention while paving crews are engaged in doing work in the county on the farm-to-market roads running from Oklahoma Lane to "cross roads" 8 1/2 miles north of Bovina.

### COUNTY BOARD MEETS

The County Board of Education was in session here Monday, with all members present. Only routine business matters were taken up at the meeting.

New bus driving contracts for the schools of the county were approved, and the board approved the application of the Lazbuddie school district to purchase a new 36-passenger bus.

Texico school students will be in school tomorrow (Friday) to receive grades, and complete the school year. Students were dismissed Wednesday.

The loop around the courthouse will be widened to 32 feet and will be built in accordance with specifications of the State Highway Department. The job includes removal of several trees and hauling on miscalculation material to be used as a base for the paving. The contracted price for this job is \$2400.

The paving along Third Street also will include curb and gutter and the work also will be done to meet State Highway Department requirements. Property owners along the west side of Third Street already have contracted to pay their share in paving this strip. The county's share, according to the contract signed last Friday, will be \$2200.

Edgar Martin of the D. & T. Construction Company, was here and presented the matter to the commissioners and signed the contract. He said that he expected to begin work on the two projects within 30 days, explaining that he had other paving jobs in nearby towns to finish before he will be able to move his equipment here.

The present blacktop strip along Third Street will be ripped up and the new paving widened to 40 feet, it is understood.

## Friona Boot Shop Object Of Thieves

Virgil Redding of Roswell and Gene Davis of Hobbs are being held in the Parmer County jail in lieu of \$1000 bond each, being charged with breaking and entering the Friona Boot Shop Saturday.

The lads were picked up Sunday in Roswell and Sheriff Lovelace returned them to this city Monday. Both lads signed confessions after being brought here.

In their confessions, they reveal they were let out of jail at Hereford Saturday, went to Friona that same afternoon, and broke open a rear door at the boot shop that night. In order to be sure they got boots that would fit, they admitted trying on the boots in the late afternoon before the attempted burglary.

They were scared away from the job and chased some five miles out of town, where their pursuer spied the license number of their car. Arrest followed the next day in Roswell.

This is the second time the same business has been broken into during the past two weeks. On the other occasion, some boots, riding quirts and other items were taken. The goods were recovered, following the arrest of a 16-year-old lad from Bellville, Kans., in Clovis.

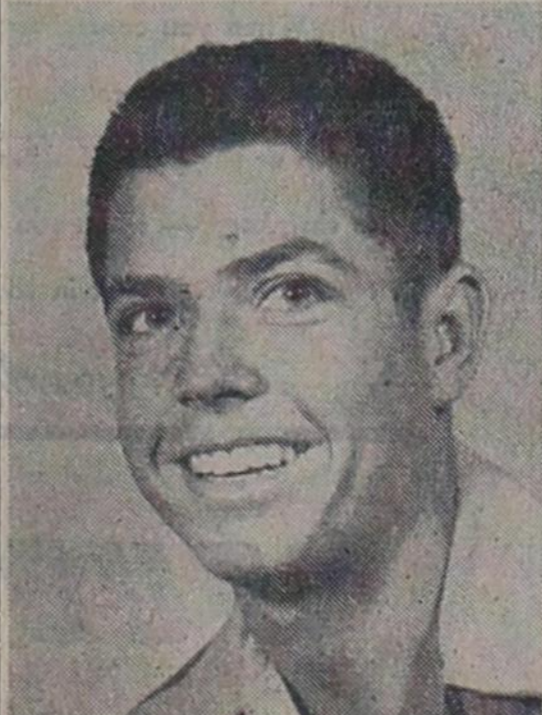

"Dangerous Business" Theme of Sermon to Texico Graduates

Sixteen seniors were graduated from Texico Schools this week, with baccalaureate services held Sunday night and commencement last night (Wednesday).

Baccalaureate was held at the Texico-Farwell Baptist Church. Peggy Rogers played the processional and recessional. Invocation was given by Rev. C. A. Hatcher, pastor of the United Pentecostal Church; and Rev. A. W. Harris, pastor of the Assembly of God, gave the benediction.

Members of the Methodist choir rendered two numbers, "A Mighty Fortress Is Our God" and "Be Still, My Soul," under the direction of George Hill.

Rev. Lance Hurst was speaker of the evening, discussing "Dangerous Business." Scripture was "As thy servant was busy here and there, he was gone."

He told seniors that so many people of today are busy with many things and at the end of the day, the supreme things are not accomplished. Therefore, he urged the group to live life in such a way that the most important things will be done.

He stated that the supreme folly was to be too busy with many things and to neglect and "lose your own soul." He continued that one of the greatest and highest privileges in the world is the opportunity to pray, yet if a person becomes too busy, time is gone.

Jones Urges Farmers To Kill Off Bindweed

Joe Jones, county agent, urges farmers of this area, to declare war on bindweed, and to control it before it becomes too widespread. The plant is commonly known as possession vine, spreading both by roots and by seed.

Much bindweed is found in small lots of 1/2 acre or less, which is a constant source of infestation for surrounding area. When the weed is found in small patches, it should be eradicated, regardless of cost, Jones states.

"There is a problem in any county where there is any bindweed," Jones states. Once bindweed makes a crop of seed and the seeds are turned under, there is the possibility that it will take as long as 40 years to rid the ground of the seeds, as the plants have been known to come up after such a long period of time.

Cultural practices that will prevent the spreading of bindweed, should be followed, when cultivating through plots of the weed. However, before eradication can be accomplished, farmers will probably have to resort to either selective or non-selective herbicides. When non-selective herbicides are used, farmers should realize the rate it takes to kill bind weed and that it will leave the soil bare and unproductive for a limited period of time. This depends on the soil and what is used, Jones adds.

"Now is a good time to get the bindweed, when the plant is actively growing," Jones states, "since the best time is when the weed is in the bud or bloom state."

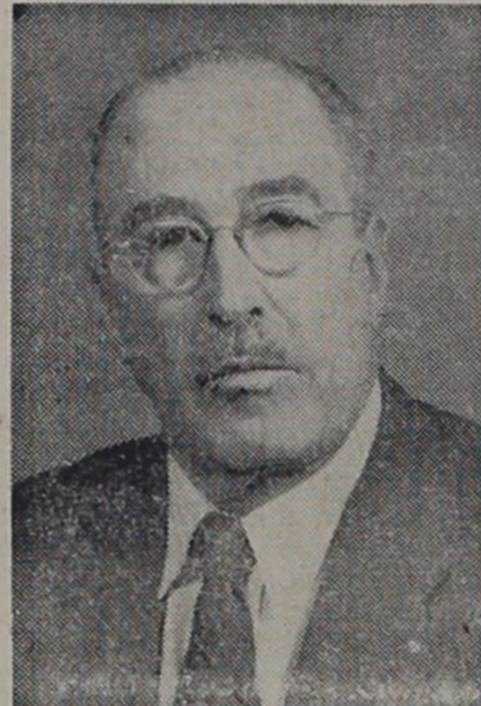

Seventh Court Civil Appeals Job Sought By Amarillo Lawyer

An Amarillo attorney, Hal Houston, has announced as a candidate for the office of Associate Justice of the Seventh Court of Civil Appeals. The incumbent, Judge Jim Lumpkin, is not a candidate for re-election.

Houston is a native Texan, having been reared in Houston; now lives in Randall County; and is practicing law in Amarillo. He formerly lived at Lubbock for several years, and married the former Lola Riley, of Quannah. They have one son, who is now a student at West Texas State College at Canyon.



He is a former railroad man, but due to injuries received in World War I, was not able to resume that employment. He was sent to Veterans Hospital at Muskogee while living in Lubbock, and there began his study of law. He graduated from the University of Oklahoma with a law degree and practiced there until he enlisted in the Army as a private in 1942. For many years he represented a mortgage investment company doing business in Texas, and became thoroughly conversant with Texas Corporation, probate and land title laws. He also represented several oil companies doing business in the Panhandle, North and East Texas, maintaining offices in Longview.

During World War II Houston graduated from Officers' Candidate School and was assigned to the counter intelligence branch of the Air Forces. Later, he was assigned to U. S. Air Force Headquarters in England as staff intelligence officer. At the end of the war he was assigned as Air Field security officer for U. S. Air Fields in the European and Mediterranean Theatres.

He was relieved from active duty in August, 1946, and returned to Dumas to re-enter the law practice, but was recalled a few months later,

and named civilian legal adviser to the U. S. High Commissioner in Austria. In this duty he supervised the management of all German properties in Austria, seized and held by the Allies as war reparations. As such, he advised the Conference of Foreign Ministers in their deliberations at London, Moscow, Paris and New York concerning German assets in Austria.

Houston was again released in 1950 and returned to Amarillo, where he again took up the practice of law.

# Local Dealers Foresee No Gasoline Shortage

Today as this was being written, there appeared little likelihood that the Texico-Farwell family will be deprived of the Sunday afternoon joy ride any time soon because of strikes in the oil industry.

Not one bulk house here seems to be duly concerned over present effects of the strike, although some admitted they hoped it could be straightened out soon.

This came as good news to local citizens who were reading in their newspapers stories of actually serious cutbacks in civilian consumption allowances. Purchase of aviation gasoline for private purposes is flatly forbidden until things can be cleared up, and commercial airlines have been weaned to 70 percent of the normal supply.

However, things still look pretty good here at home. Following is a breakdown of reports from local bulk plants, and service stations

which are not served by a local supplier.

Continental Oil Company—Mrs. Paul Wurster reports, "Our supplies are coming in without any trouble. Later on, the company may run short of crude, but things are all right now." The Farwell bulk concern is served out of Artesia, N. M.

Phillips Petroleum Company—"No, we aren't about to run out," says Joe Helton, manager. "We get gasoline from Pampa, and the situation there isn't bothered with the strikes."

The Texas Company—Mrs. Woodrow Lovelace reports: "Well, yes, we ran out twice last week, but it probably wasn't a direct result of the strike. There is enough gasoline, but our trouble was in transportation." The Texas Company's gasoline is trucked from Amarillo.

Gulf Service Station (no bulk here)—O. C. Pullam: "Strikes have-

n't bothered us here. We get our gasoline from Bovina in bulk but that gas comes from Sweetwater. Things are tied up on the Texas coast, particularly at Port Arthur, but don't hurt us here." Pullam also pointed out that shortages due to natural causes might possibly occur.

Large quantities of farm gas are being used at the present time, and place heavy demands upon transportation facilities that are partially impaired by the strikers' picket lines.

Panhandle, Pop Spurlin's Service Station—"They'll have to strike 30 days or more to hurt us. We have plenty of storage space."

Shamrock (O. S. Allred)—"No, we haven't had any trouble. Our gas is transported from Sherman and Dumas and is coming through okay."

tee, composed of one delegate from each precinct in the county, submitted the names of the delegates and alternates, and they were elected by acclamation.

Two resolutions, both originating in the Friona precinct, were read and adopted, with instructions that they be forwarded to the state convention. They were:

- (1) Resolved that more rigid economical practices be incorporated in our National government procedures, including discontinuance of subsidies for industry, farming, and all other enterprises when such subsidies are not actually in the interest of our local and/or National economic security.
- (2) Resolved that the delegation support and promote all effort to retain the title of Texas Tidelands within the State inasmuch as this title was assured in our original agreement when annexed to the Union.

## Extension Specialists Discuss Cotton Program

Approximately 80 men were on hand Friday night to hear cotton specialists of the Extension service discuss cotton production. County Agent Joe Jones was in charge of the meeting.

Fred Elliott of the service discussed cotton production, adapted varieties, seed treatment, cultivation, mechanical harvesting, ginning and other factors.

He talked about use of premerge, a material used to spray a 12-inch band on cotton rows during planting for weed and grass control. He stated, however, the practice worked well in heavy clay soils where cultivation was not so necessary for three to five weeks. He added that he did not recommend the practice where rotary hoes or some cultivation is required at early stages. In explaining, he said when the crust where the chemical is applied is broken, the effect is lost.

Allen C. Gunter, also of the service, discussed insect control, talking about both beneficial and harmful insects. He reminded farmers that in poisoning harmful insects, the beneficial ones also were often killed. He reported that insecticides are to be much less expensive this year.

## Camp Notes Increase In Permanent Pastures

Joe Camp, PMA secretary, reports an increase in permanent pasture seeding this spring. "When you buy your seed, be sure to get a sales receipt showing kinds of seed purchased, number of pounds, and germination and purity of seed, and signed by the sales representative," Camp cautions.

He then advises farmers to bring the receipts to the PMA office for prior approvals before planting the seed.

Naming some of the farmers seeding pasture this spring, Camp lists Ollie Williams, Farwell; Carl Rea and Bruce Parr, Friona; and Virgil Teague, Muleshoe.

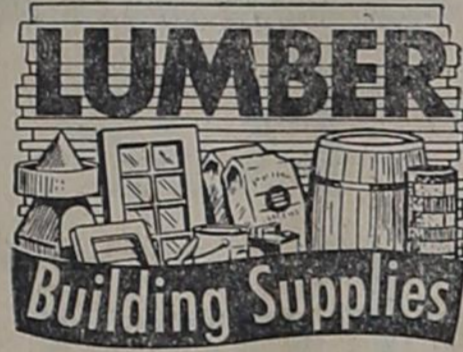

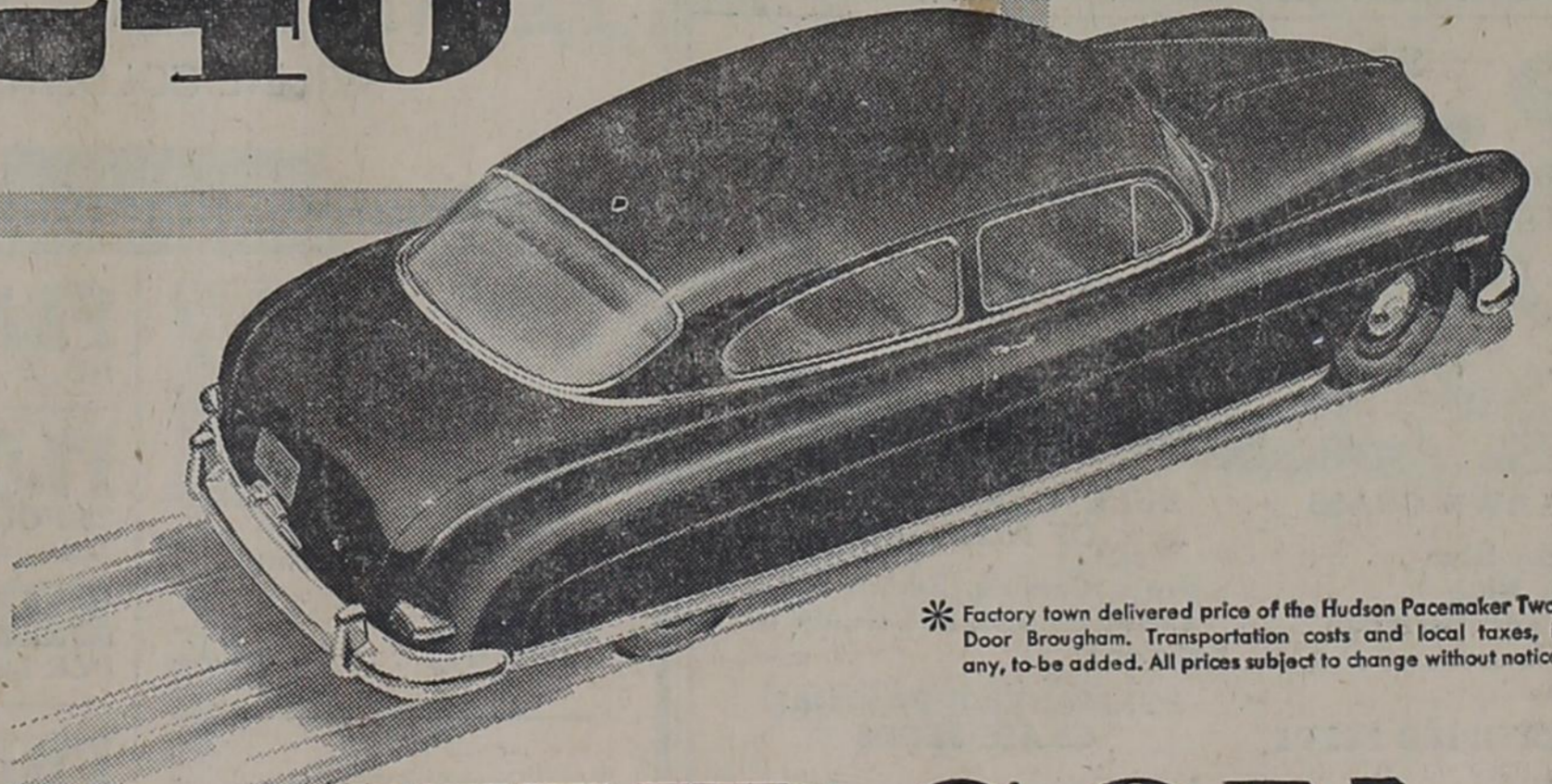

# Work Is Completed on New City Hall

The new city hall building has been completed and the different occupants moved into the building last week.

White of Bovina was the contractor for the construction and it was under construction for about six weeks.

The room on the southwest end of the building is used for the fire station where the fire engine is housed and where the fireman hold their meetings. The center office is occupied by the city and school offices with Mr. Homer Martin in charge of the combined offices. The utility room is used by the city water maintainer and the room at the northeast is the rental office and at the present time is occupied by the Rhinehart Insurance Agency.

The city office has been located across the street in a rental office belonging to J. S. Potts for the past three years. The fire station has been in the old McCuan building since it was set up about four years ago.

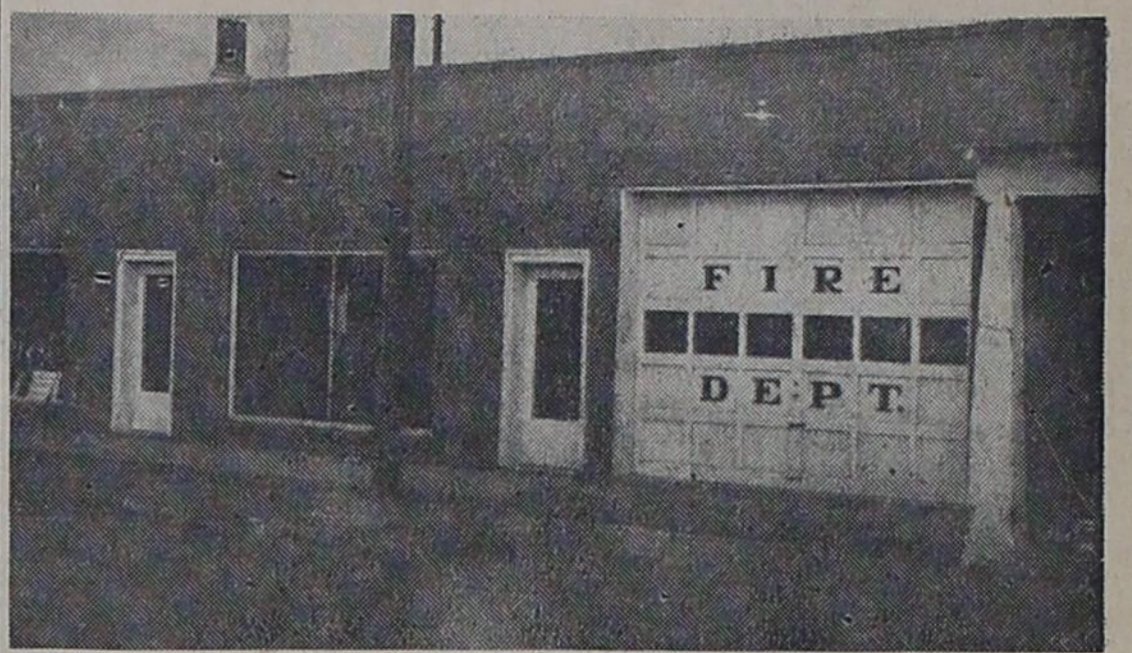
Tentative plans are in the making for a new educational building. The church needs more Sunday school space, and the new building would give adequate space.
