I made the mistake of asking Garret Blair why he didn't go deer hunting this fall. "I just didn't have an invitation," he replied.

Carl Davis and I discussed our bird-hunting days of years ago together. He could cover more ground out in the open field than any man I ever hunted with. It was with a great deal of regret to him that there will be no open season on quail in the Melrose country this year.

Thanks for the "get well" cards and visits from friends. And thanks also for the many bouquets of flowers that have lent an air of cheerfulness to an otherwise bleak hospital room.

Mr. and Mrs. Joe Blair called to inform me that they had a package of venison in the deep freeze awaiting my arrival back home. How wonderful!

Tharp Sells Farwell Gin To Drew Watkins

A transaction of immediate interest to local cotton growers this year is the sale of the Farwell Gin, formerly owned by N. L. Tharp, to Drew Watkins, Sudan cotton man.

The first bale this year rolled from the gin Tuesday afternoon, as the 7-man crew and supervisors worked overtime to ready the plant for full-scale operation.

Watkins, who says he is "no stranger" to this area, is openly optimistic about the future of cotton here. Tuesday he told The Tribune, "We've only gotten started growing cotton up here."

Watkins, a brother of Thad Watkins, a real estate dealer of Farwell, also owns the new Watkins' Gin at Lazbuddy which was opened this season. In addition, he owns one other in in Sudan.

"My wife will remain here to manage the Farwell business," he reports. His son is present manager of the gin at Lazbuddy.

The gin is equipped with four Continental 80-saw stands, Mitchell feeders, Hardwick-Etter burr extractor and Airline cleaners, and a Mitchell drying system. Capacity is rated at 100-plus bales per day.

Tharp, who has had the gin the past two years, personally endorsed Watkins as a "first-class ginner." He said, "I wouldn't have sold this gin to a man that I did not think would be an asset to the community. The only reason I sold the gin is because I know the cotton producers here need a gin on a full-time basis."

Tharp's own cotton was ginned last year, but the Farwell gin was able to gin very little for the public. The gin has been converted to an all-electric system.

Watkins announced that ample parking, in excess of 400 bales, will be available for growers. In addition, he says that cotton stored on the yard will be fully insured.

The Farwell Gin will now be operated under the name of Watkins' Gin.

Mobile X-ray Unit To Stop In Friona

Parmer County citizens will have an opportunity to avail themselves of the free services of a mobile X-ray unit of the Texas State Health Department.

Free X-rays will be made from 8 until 5 o'clock near the Friona State Bank Wednesday, Nov. 12, according to an announcement from Lucy Jones of the Friona Chamber of Commerce.

This will be the second time the mobile unit has visited the county, its first trip being in 1948. The x-rays are used to detect tuberculosis in its early stages, and has been found quite effective in this respect.

Anyone over 15 years of age is eligible for the service, and it will only take about one minute to have the x-ray made. It is not necessary for clothes to be removed.

An estimated 600 persons had x-rays made when the unit visited the county four years ago.

Parmer Raids Bailey Again For Supply Sets

Employees at the county clerk's office, who had to make a trip to Muelshoe last week for more absentee voting supplies, were back on the Muelshoe trail in search of more of the same Thursday.

Loyde Brewer, clerk said "Of course we thought we were supplied to start with, but we ran out twice." Even after borrowing two times from Bailey County, all supply sets were used.

One-hundred and three absentee votes were cast, 92 having been returned by Tuesday. This is an all-time absentee vote record for the general election in Parmer County.

Fourteen re-allocation ballots were filled out by absentee voters. All have been returned.

Ex-Student Association Sets Date For Banquet

The fourth annual banquet of the Ex-students Association of Farwell Consolidated Schools has been set for Saturday, Nov. 29, according to Wendol Christian, Association president.

In making the announcement, Christian called a meeting of all officers of the Association, and anyone who will be connected with planning the banquet this year, at the school house Tuesday night at 8 o'clock.

"We have a lot of work to do in order to get the banquet ready this year," said Christian. "We are very anxious to have additional help from people who know the names and addresses of former students of Farwell, Oklahoma Lane, and West Camp schools so we can get in touch with them."

Anyone knowing of such former students which are thought to be not on the mailing list of the Association, is asked to contact Iris Thornton, corresponding secretary, in order that those persons may be invited to the banquet.

Details of the banquet program are not complete. W. H. Graham Jr. has been engaged as toastmaster, but Christian requested persons who have ideas for numbers on the program now being planned to contact him or Graham at once.

Turkey, dressing "and all the trimmings" will be served this year, and \$1.50 per plate will be charged. Membership dues in the Association are fifty cents.

At the banquet, the customary recognition will be given to the three oldest class members in attendance and the person who traveled the longest distance to attend the banquet.

Last year, Mrs. R. R. Hungate, Clovis, took oldest class member honors. She was graduated in 1916. Bonnie Lee Holland, Washington, D. C. traveled the longest; and Henry Norris, (1936) Lamesa, and Woodrow Lovelace, (1936) Farwell, had second and third places in the oldest class member division.

Parmer Follows Texas Trend

Telephone Co-op Starts Service

When the South Clovis automatic dial exchange of the E.N.M.R. Telephone Cooperative goes into service Nov. 8, it will be the first completely new exchange in the United States to be activated by a rural telephone cooperative under the new REA telephone loans program. A few existing telephone companies have previously put into service REA financed facilities to improve and expand rural telephone service in their operating areas but these systems were already providing some sort of service. E.N.M.R. will be operating an entirely new system in an area where there were no phones before.

To commemorate the occasion the E.N.M.R. Telephone Cooperative is planning a big celebration, according to Andrew Chitwood, president. Invitations have been sent to a number of states and national officials. The ceremony will be held in front of the Cooperative's new South Clovis automatic dial central office at 2 p.m. Saturday, November 8.

About 60 rural subscribers will receive service from the initial cut over of the South Clovis exchange, Chitwood explained. Six additional exchange areas, in the vicinity of Pleasant Hill, Ranchvale, Bellview, Grady, Weber City and Ragland are now under construction and are scheduled to go into service by the end of November.

Good progress is being made toward completion of other exchanges in addition to South Clovis, Chitwood said. Testing is starting on the Ranchvale and Pleasant Hill exchanges which together will serve about 170 subscribers. There will be no toll charge for subscribers on the South Clovis, Ranchvale or Pleasant Hill exchanges to call into Clovis or to call any subscriber within the three exchange areas.

Real Rain Falls Here, .35 Inch Recorded

Real wet rain fell on Texico-Farwell and this section of the High Plains Monday, sogging down movement of the cotton crop, but lightening faces of wheat farmers, most of whom have "dusted in."

But nobody seemed to be against the rain, which began as a light sleet early Monday morning, slackened off about 10 a.m., then picked up again in mid-afternoon as a light drizzle.

Most of the moisture came Monday night, but heavy clouds and light sprinkles held over Tuesday morning.

Lt. Ted Brock Awarded Bronze Star For Heroism

Second Lt. Ted E. Brock, son of Mr. and Mrs. Aubrey Brock of Bovina, with the 40th Infantry Division in Korea, was awarded the Bronze Star Medal for risking his life to evacuate wounded soldiers under heavy enemy fire. Lt. Brock is a Tank Platoon Leader in the 40th Division's 140th Tank Battalion in Korea. The Citation reads in part:

"While Brock's tank was firing at well-entrenched enemy objectives, accurate enemy fire stopped another tank. Brock maneuvered his tank into a towing position and then exposed himself in order to couple the crippled tank to his own. After Brock's tank had dragged the disabled tank to a safe area, Brock directed it back into the battlefield, which was then further endangered to friendly forces by enemy bazooka action. While attempting to evacuate stranded members of abandoned tanks, Brock's tank was set afire by a direct bazooka hit. Brock was pinned down by heavy automatic weapons fire. When the order to withdraw was given, Brock risked his own safety as he waved all tanks on, remaining to assist others. Brock then mounted the last tank as it left the battlefield."

Lt. Brock's wife, who lives in Roswell, New Mexico has just received a letter from Ted stating he is now out of battle, but had spent eight days and nights in his tank in battle near Triangle Hill.

Tax Statements Readied For City Of Farwell

Tax statements for the City of Farwell will be in the mails by Armistice Day (Nov. 11) announced Wilfred Quickel, city collector.

A delay, through no fault of the city commission, has held up preparation of the statements, he says, but payments may be made anytime between the date received and Feb. 1.

"As far as I know, no discount will be available for cash or early settlements," Quickel said.

The nation, Texas, and Parmer County seemed to be pretty much of one mind Tuesday—at least as they marked the general election ballot. Eisenhower and Nixon rolled up a staggering margin of better than 2-to-1 over Stevenson and Sparkman—1501 to 663.

Both constitutional amendments were refused by Parmer voters, the first 508 to 731, and the second 475 to 722. As this story is written, it appears that statewide the first amendment has a chance, but opposition is far ahead for the second.

The county tax-re-allocation election, conducted separately from the general balloting, had a narrow squeak in the early returns, but went through 1082 to 738. Farwell and Oklahoma Lane refused the re-allocation measure in their precincts, but substantial affirmative returns from the rest of the county pulled it through.

Should the county tax re-allocation have been refused, it would have thrown legal and financial matters into a snarl until the Commissioners Court could straighten the matter out. It is quite likely that ad valorem taxes would have then had to be raised in order to balance the county budget.

Execution Postponed For Lester Stevens

Lester Stevens, one of two Amarillo men found guilty of the slaying of "Josh" Blocher 15 months ago, will sit it out another 30 days in Death Row at Huntsville. He was to die Friday night, but the Pardons Board recommended a 30-day stay of execution which was signed by Governor Allan Shivers.

Stevens' attorney is to present additional evidence in an appeal for clemency.

Thomas Livesay, the other convicted murderer, is now serving a life sentence.

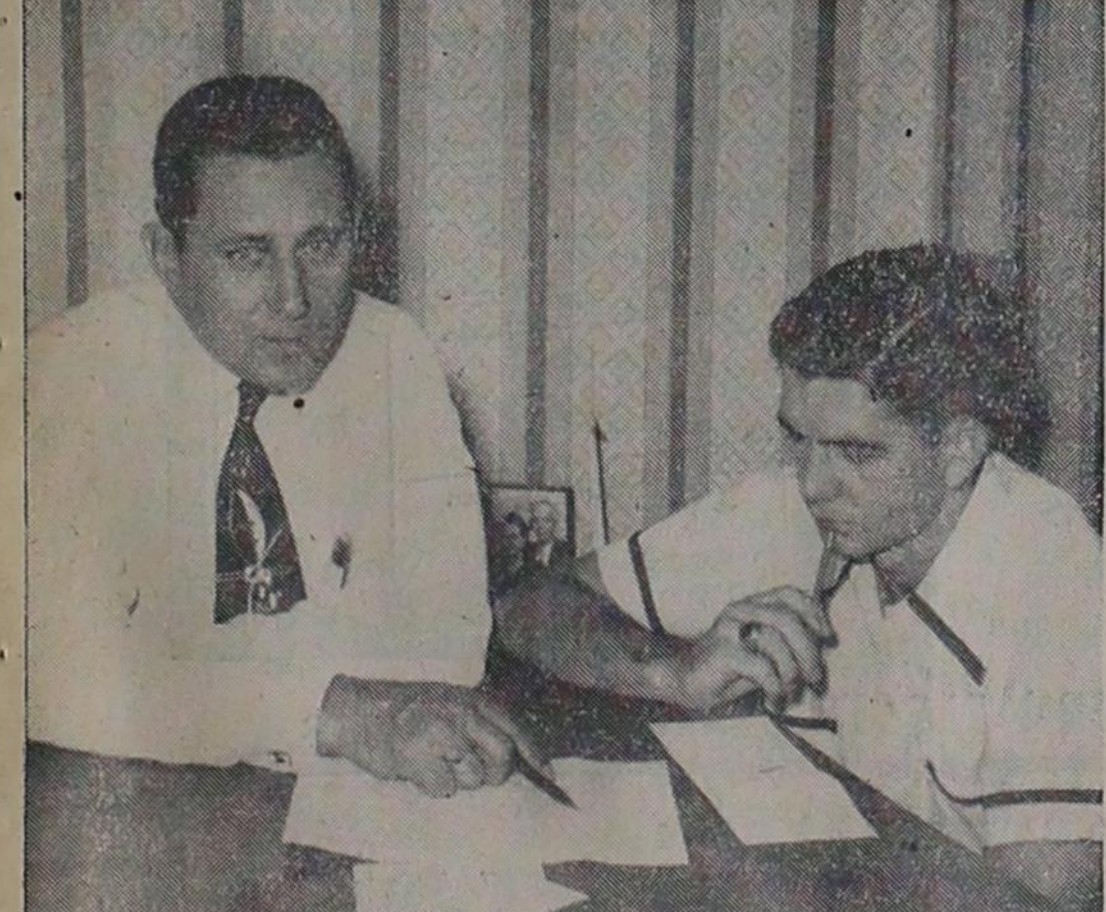

What Is in Store for Plains Irrigation?

TALK OVER WATER CONSERVATION

In the past two or three years, and especially the last two, there has been the development of a natural resource in Parmer County that has introduced an entirely new agricultural and industrial era to the county's economy. That natural resource, which promises so much to this and other High Plains counties, is underground water.

It would be a waste of space and words to attempt to give an account of what the present two-year drought has extracted from the return of our dry-land crops—the same crops which have been a basic plank in this country's economy for decades. An account of this drought is not needed, because every man of agriculture, every businessman, every working man has felt the impact of the hundreds of cloudless days on the farmland of this county.

The stimulant that has driven on, sometimes relentlessly, the development of this natural resource has been without question the drought.

In spite of Parmer County's ability to produce dryland crops, as has been proven in past year of bumper wheat and other crop yields, in spite of the tremendous dry-land wheat acreage in the county last year, the bright star of High Plains agriculture is now irrigated cropland.

Changes Many Things
 To a person of casual interests, the only important difference he sees between irrigated and non-irrigated farms as he drives through the countryside is the difference in crop appearance and yields. He does not see the large capital

investment, the long hours of work when the crop must be watered regardless of what else happens. He does not see the concern in the mind of the landowner as he contemplates the future of his irrigation program and his farm. Irrigation farming is a life apart from any other.

Irrigation Booms Here
 In Parmer County, where the threat of another dry year is already with us, the rush for new wells is on. As an example of how rapidly new irrigation is being pushed into the county, this reporter drove on Highway 60 from Bovina to Friona last week, and saw four irrigation well rigs on location, tapping the tremendous underground resources we have.

Is such rapid development harmful? Or should more drilling be encouraged to provide more production per acre, more employment, a better standard of living? Who knows these answers?

Tom McFarland, head of the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District, was asked these and many other questions. There are few, if any, irrigation men on the High Plains do not have at least an inkling of what Mr. McFarland and the organization he represents stand for.

The High Plains Underground Water Conservation District is the only tangible link between the High Plains irrigation farmer and the specific interests of his group. This is the only organization that was created for and by his particular type of business. It is the only organization through which he can work to bring about local, rather than outside, control of his farming operations.

prospect of his plans for irrigation development being placed under state, or even federal, supervision. Every thinking well owner knows what this would mean, and he will have to make a choice for himself, or have his "choices" made for him in the not-too-distant future.

McFarland, as amiable an administrator as there ever was, consented to sit down with this reporter last Friday afternoon, and explain for four hours just what the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District (Let's call it the Conservation District) is, how it functions, and what its purposes are.

The Conservation District has two main purposes, McFarland says. These are (1) conservation of our water; and (2) to help keep control on irrigation practices on a local level.

Referring to the first purpose, McFarland warned, "Did you know that it is definitely established that we are pumping water from our underground reserves at a rate that exceeds recharge?"

He was then asked, "How do you know these things, Mr. McFarland? What authority can you give for such a conclusion?"
 "That statement," he replied, "is from the U. S. Geological Survey, which has drawn such conclusions from an accumulation of data kept many years. Generally speaking, we know that there is now being removed from our particular reservoir, (Cont. on last page, this section)

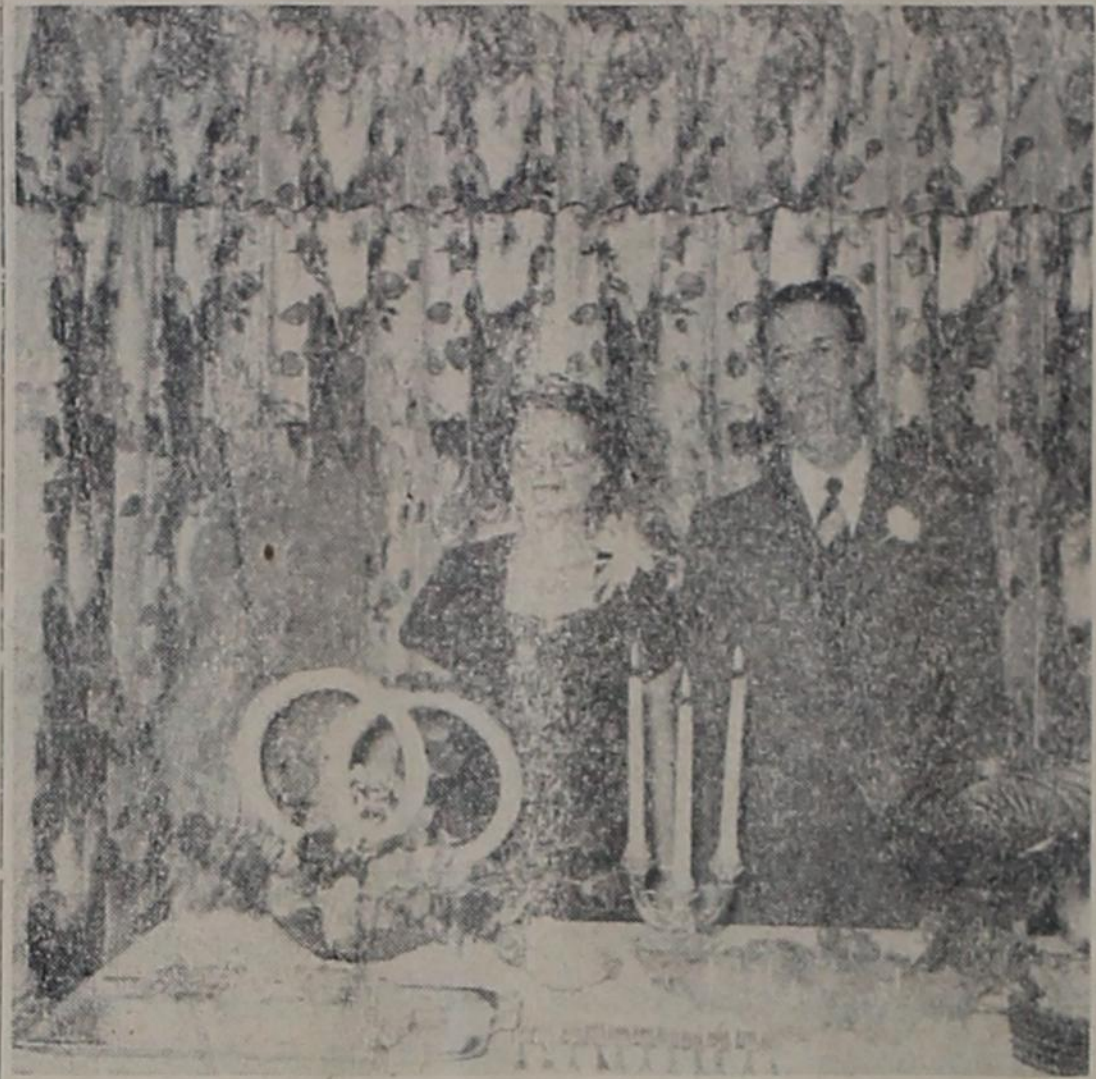

Cotton Growers Market Effects Farmer's Price

The way cotton growers market their crop will have a lot to do with the price they get says Joe Camp, PMA secretary. According to B. F. Vance, chairman of State Production and Marketing administration, most years, producers harvest and gin about four-fifths of the crop in the

three months of September through November.

He adds that if this large volume is put on the market at harvest time, the result can easily be glutted markets and lower prices. Last year, growers marketed only about half of their cotton during the three-month period and crop values were protected.

Camp points out that growers can protect their market through the government's price-support program. By taking out a loan on his cotton the grower can get immediate cash return. The loan may be paid off and the cotton sold at any time before the loan matures.

around four million acre feet of water per year. The rate of recharge varies, of course, but is believed to be substantially below this figure."

Roughly speaking, the boundaries of the reservoir from which Parmer County and many other High Plains counties draw their water are the Canadian River on the north, the Pecos on the west, the Edwards Plateau on the south, and the Caprock on the east.

It is extremely difficult to determine the boundaries of any underground reservoir such as the one we have, because our water is not "stored" water, but "percolating" water which seeps down and in a southeasterly direction through sand and gravel in search of its own level.

However, it is generally agreed that for practical purposes, the boundaries mentioned are fairly accurate.

Critical Period

This is indeed a critical period for irrigation in our District, agrees McFarland. "I know of several cases of wells in what we know as 'old' or 'developed' irrigation areas which never before have given trouble. This year some of the most thoroughly proven wells are going dry."

When water-bearing sands are drained in dry or unusual years, is it possible to re-charge these sands? Will the sands "hold" the water, or is it likely to escape before it can be returned to the surface when needed? These questions were asked the District director. He answered them.

"Yes, it definitely is possible to re-charge water sands, and in some instances is very practical. Take the city of El Paso, for instance. In the spring and summer when there is such a terrific demand for irrigation water from the Rio Grande, the city draws on underground water from its deep city wells.

"Then, in the winter when irrigation needs are diminished, water is pumped from the river back through the wells and into the sands around the wells. These wells are near Ft. Bliss. The program has been successful for six or seven years.

"Yes, sands seem to be able to hold their water for a reasonable length of time. This is best explained by the fact (again established by the U.S.G.S.) that water percolates through the sands at a rate of only about 100 feet per year."
