## FROM THE HOPPER By HOP

A Dallas bank suggests that you join its 1953 Christmas Club and be prepared to meet your expenditures without any worry or trouble.

Personally, I am not worrying about Christmas money for 1953; it's the problem of 1952 that concerns me right now. If those financial geniuses of Big D have any suggestions to offer for the current emergency, I most certainly will lend them an ear.

And here's a letter from a Muleshoe reader, enclosing a lengthy clipping from some unidentified church organ, in which the writer denounces the new Revised standard version of the Bible.

I do not propose to get involved in the controversy, that seems to be sweeping the country. I have said and I repeat that I prefer the King James Version to the new R.S.V. But on the other hand a more modern translation would likely tend toward a better understanding for our modern age.

Critics of the R.S.V. take the position that it tends to deny the Virgin Birth, and cite as proof of that contention that Mary, the mother of Jesus, is referred to as "a young woman."

I fully accept the Virgin Birth; most assuredly Mary was a virgin, but she was also "a young woman." So, why get confused over these points of view? To my way of thinking Mary was both a virgin and a young woman. I think a beautiful young woman is God's greatest creative accomplishment, and in my mind all unwed young women are virgins, and are so accepted by me until, of course, I have been convinced otherwise.

Thanks to those who have brought me so many wonderful things to eat. You have been most generous and I am deeply grateful to each and every one of you.

The assortment of goodies has ranged all the way from turkey and dressing to a quart of well spiked egg nog brought in by one of the town's leading churchmen, although it was designated egg custard.

The covering of snow that remained on the ground for more than a week brought to the forefront some of the hardships experienced by old-timers of this region in past years.

Those who have been here that long, and there are a few of them still around, agree that the blizzard of 1904 was the most severe, although the cold spell following this blizzard did not last as long as the severe cold and snow of the winter of 1918-19.

Probably the fact that the early homesteaders of 1904 were not as well prepared for the onslaught in an unaccustomed climate contributed to their hardships.

Uncle Tom Randol, recalling the cold of 1904-05, says all the homesteaders depended on cow chips for fuel. Those were covered up under deep layers of snow the first night of the storm. All the Texico dealers ran out of coal, even though their sales were restricted to 100 pounds to the family. The coal supply at Bovina was somewhat better, but no family was allowed more than 500 pounds, regardless of the distance of the haul.

He says he made many trips to Bovina, with 4 mules to his wagon for his coal allowance. It was always late at night before he got back home, although he started out before sunup.

The severe cold, ice and snow of 1918-19 began late in November and the whole region was ice-bound until the following March. Aside from the railroads, the only means of communication was either on horse back or by horse-drawn sleds. Most farmers attached runners to wagon beds and used them as sleds.

Cattle died by the thousands from starvation. The jack rabbit population was almost wiped out.

Teddie's twin, Eddie, only a few weeks ago, suffered an attack of polio, but had no crippling effects. An elder son, Bobby, has also had intestinal flu, and suffered complications.

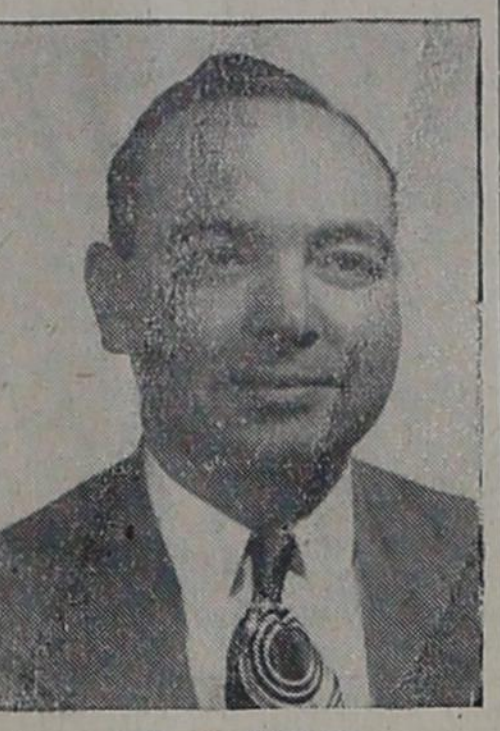
Freeman reminds citizens that taxes are due December 1. He also states that any business man who wants to get acquainted with the ordinance can either see Freeman or contact members at the city hall.

## Meet for Natural Gas Users in Irrigation Called for Bovina

Parmer County farmers who are interested in natural gas for irrigation use, are invited to attend a meeting in the Bovina School Auditorium Monday night, December 8 at 7:45, it has been announced. This meeting is announced by officials of the County Farm Bureau who have been negotiating for several months with West Texas Gas Company Officials.

Spokesman of the evening will be C. L. Wall, president of West Texas Gas Company. Contracts are available which make it possible for users to pool funds for construction of a gas line to serve several patrons. Formerly, this practice was banned because Railroad Commission Rulings maintained that this constituted a distributorship in violation of franchise agreements.

Farm Bureau Officials emphasize that this meeting is one providing information, and that Farm Bureau will not participate in partnership arrangements beyond secretarial assistance requested at its office.

## Execution for Stevens Postponed for 5 Days

Lester D. Stevens, convicted robber and murderer of "Uncle Josh" Blocher, Progress reclus, is still alive this week following a 5-day stay of execution which was granted shortly before he was to die Sunday.

An attempt is being made to reopen the case on grounds of additional evidence that Stevens' attorneys say they can produce.

Acting Governor Ben Ramsey accepted a recommendation from the Board of Pardons and Paroles, since Governor Shivers was attending a presidential inauguration in Mexico.

Another method of locating the sale site is to go 11 miles west, one north, and one-half west of Muleshoe.

## Construction Progresses On Rural Telephones

### Dedication Services Held For Church

Opening services to commemorate the remodeling of the former Oklahoma Lane gymnasium into a Methodist church were held Sunday at the church, "and members were delighted with the outcome of the remodeled building," a spokesman says.

Several months have passed since the gymnasium was purchased to be made into a church. Since then, donated labor and money have been utilized, and the structure has been made into a large sanctuary, eight class rooms and a pastor's study. Future plans are to remodel the remaining part of the building into a fellowship hall and kitchen.

Sunday school was well attended the past week, but the huge crowd arrived in time for the worship service. The Progress Methodist church attended the opening services in a group. Old-time members traveled great distances for the occasion, a reporter relates. Mr. and Mrs. John Kloepper of Washington, old settlers of the community and charter members of the church, were present. He was on the board of trustees when the original building was constructed.

Vernon Willard, pastor of the church, was in charge of the service; with E. G. Snodgrass directing the music and Mrs. Bobbie Foster as pianist.

Hymns used were "The Lord Is In His Holy Temple," "Holy, Holy, Holy," "When The Roll Is Called Up Yonder," "I Love Thy Kingdom Lord," and the invitation "Where He Leads Me."

Roll call was given with every church member's name listed, and a special musical number was presented by Mrs. Wendell Christian, Mrs. A. L. Bandy, Belle Willard and James McDorman.

Sermon was entitled "We Are Builders Together With God."

### Further Plans Slated For Turkey Shoot

Members of the Justice-Williams post of the American Legion will meet Monday night to make further plans for a turkey shoot to be held December 14, Loyde Brewer, commander, announces. Meeting is to begin at 8 o'clock.

The shoot will be coupled with a match shooting for a new Smith and Wesson K22 pistol. Those entered in the match shooting will get five rounds at a 50-yard target with their 22's. No scope sights are permitted. Match entries are \$5 each.

Wilfred Quickel, Tom Wagner, Vernon Symcox and Charlie Thompson are on the shoot committee.

Project for the Legion for this year, is to pay off \$600 debt on the American Legion hall, says Brewer, and proceeds are to go for that purpose. Initial cost of the structure was in excess of \$10,000, in about 1947. "We would like to complete payments on the building, then do landscaping and walks," says the commander.

### Mrs. Leonard Watkins In Hospital With Polio

Word has been received here that Mrs. Leonard Watkins of Brownwood has been admitted to a hospital in Ft. Worth and her case has been diagnosed as polio. Mrs. Watkins is the former Theta Branscum of this city.

Her father-in-law, G. T. Watkins, reported early in the week that physicians had not yet determined what type polio Mrs. Watkins has contracted. Mr. and Mrs. Otis Branscum, parents of Mrs. Watkins, left Tuesday to be with their daughter, and the Watkins were to leave today.

Both Mr. and Mrs. Watkins have been enrolled in Howard Payne college in Brownwood, where he is studying for the ministry.

### Schools Resume Classes After Long Holiday

Both Texico and Farwell students resumed classes Monday morning after a long Thanksgiving holiday, due to bad weather.

The West Texas Rural Telephone Program in the counties, Deaf Smith, Castro and Farmer, is no longer a myth as workmen are now in actual construction of the telephone lines. At the present time, 575 miles of line have been staked by the engineers and the contractor has set 150 miles of poles. The contractor is working 35 men and running three crews digging holes and setting poles.

Recently, the Board of Directors hired Robert A. Bell, who will be in charge of the telephone program and assistant manager of the Deaf Smith County Rural Electric Cooperative.

Bell reports that the wire and material is on hand and the contracts have been let on the seven unattended dial stations. On November 17, 1952 the contract was let to build seven buildings to house these unattended dial stations. These will be the towns of Hereford, Friona, Bovina and Farwell. The automatic dial equipment to install these buildings will begin to be delivered in January. Just as soon as the buildings are completed, the installation crew should be ready to install the equipment.

Bell states further that men will start installing the telephone instruments and wiring the houses either the latter part of December or in January. George Stambaugh is working with Bell and asked that all people who are interested in receiving telephone service and who have not paid their equity to do so immediately, as he will be unable to guarantee immediate service unless the equity is paid before the poles are actually hauled. To all people who are in the area where the poles have not been set, he urges that applications be brought in immediately, and if the person has not paid the full equity of \$45.00 plus \$5.00 membership fee "that you do so before the poles are hauled by your place, in order to assure you of service."

At the present time, administrators anticipate that the telephone service will be available over the entire area in late spring or early summer, unless something should occur to delay the construction of the line and installation of the system; but at present it looks like a good bet for service to be available in May or June, 1953.

The system has been designed to take care of all persons who have paid their equity and who have paid the \$5.00 membership fee, however, anyone else may sign up now for telephone service before actual construction has gone by the location where telephone service is desired.

"We would like to repeat that telephone service is being offered in the rural areas around Farwell, Oklahoma Lane, Bovina, Friona and Hereford," Bell says. A subscriber can without extra charge, receive service in the automatic dial exchange in which this property is located by simply dialing his neighbor's number. He can also receive service on extended area basis into the community in which the majority of the people in the area wish service. For example: A subscriber living northwest of Friona can talk with anyone who has telephone service in Friona without extra charge. The monthly charge of \$4.75 will pay for his service into Friona, as well as into the area where he lives.

Should anyone have any questions regarding telephone service or in regard to equity or membership, he is asked to contact George V. Stambaugh or Robert A. Bell at the Deaf Smith County Electrical Cooperative's building in Hereford, Texas. "You may contact these men in person, or by calling 167, Hereford," it is announced.

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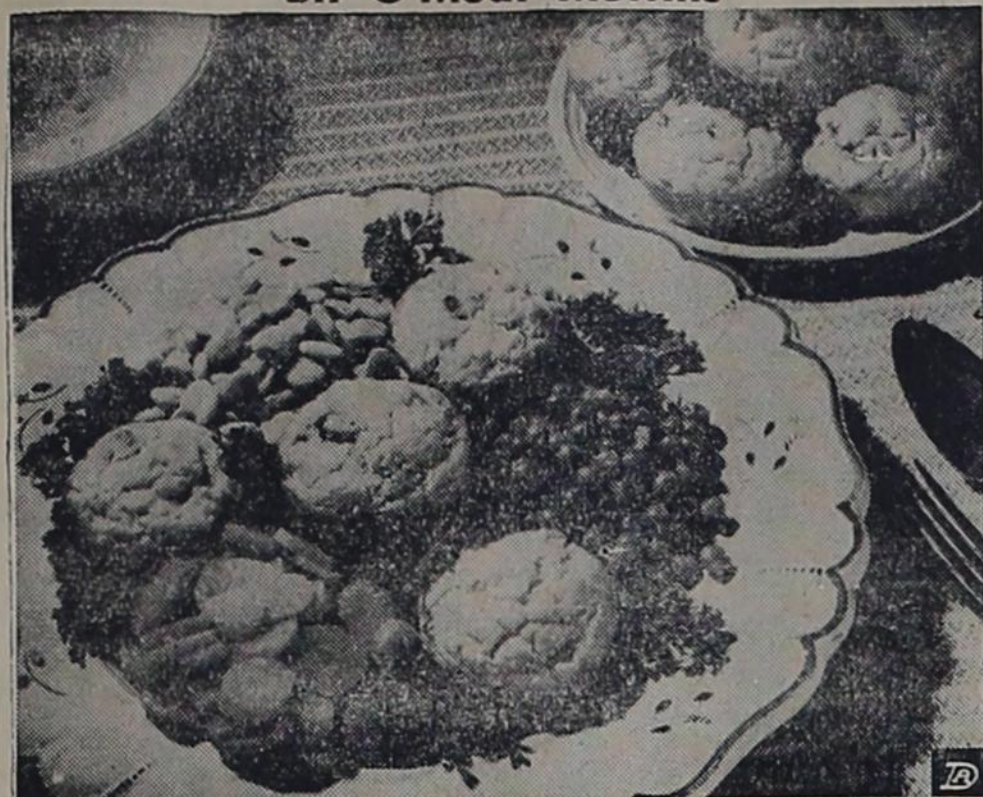

**Watch For Vitamin A Deficiency, Says Jones**

Present range and pasture conditions are conducive to the development of vitamin A deficiency among farm animals says Joe Jones, county agent. The lack of green feeds, over a long period of time, may result in a condition that is characterized in the early stages by night blindness and later by a loss of energy and appetite, swelling at the joints, rapid breathing, staggering gait, convulsions, nasal discharge, watering at the eyes and complete blindness. This condition, says U. D. Thompson, assistant extension animal husbandman of Texas A & M College is caused by a lack of vitamin A in the animals' rations.

He points out that research work conducted by the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station shows that cattle placed in the feedlot and limited to such rations as cottonseed meal, cottonseed hulls, white corn and other white grains are often affected by the condition. Following long dry periods, cattle placed in lots and on vitamin deficient rations may show symptoms of vitamin A deficiency in a relatively short time. Younger animals become affected sooner than the older ones.

Thompson says that calves born to cows which have been subjected to a shortage of vitamin A usually are in very poor condition at birth and unless placed on cows receiving adequate vitamin A, may die within two or three weeks.

Farm animals, he says, get most of their vitamin A requirements from carotene which is found in green range or pasture grasses and green hays. The carotene is changed to vitamin A by a process that takes place in the liver of the animal which is also the chief storehouse of both carotene and vitamin A in the body. Both carotene and vitamin A are destroyed when exposed to air and light. The process is hastened by high temperatures, however, heat in the absence of oxygen has only a minor effect, says Thompson. Large losses of carotene occur during the curing of roughages, especially when they are cured in direct sunlight. The lack of green color in hays or fodder means that a large percentage of the vitamin A potency is lost. This fact emphasizes the need for preserving the color in forages at harvest time.

Thompson says that research has shown that the addition of a pound of good green alfalfa hay to the daily ration will protect the animals from a deficiency of the vitamin when they are receiving a deficient ration.

To guard against any occurrence of the deficiency condition, he advises watching for night blindness. If symptoms of night blindness are noted, start feeding immediately from one to two pounds of good quality, leafy green alfalfa hay per head per day in addition to the regular ration.

Thompson suggests that you ask your local county agent for a copy of C-171, "Control of Vitamin A Deficiency in Feeding Beef Cattle". The bulletin contains information that can help you avoid trouble in the feed lot as well as on the range.

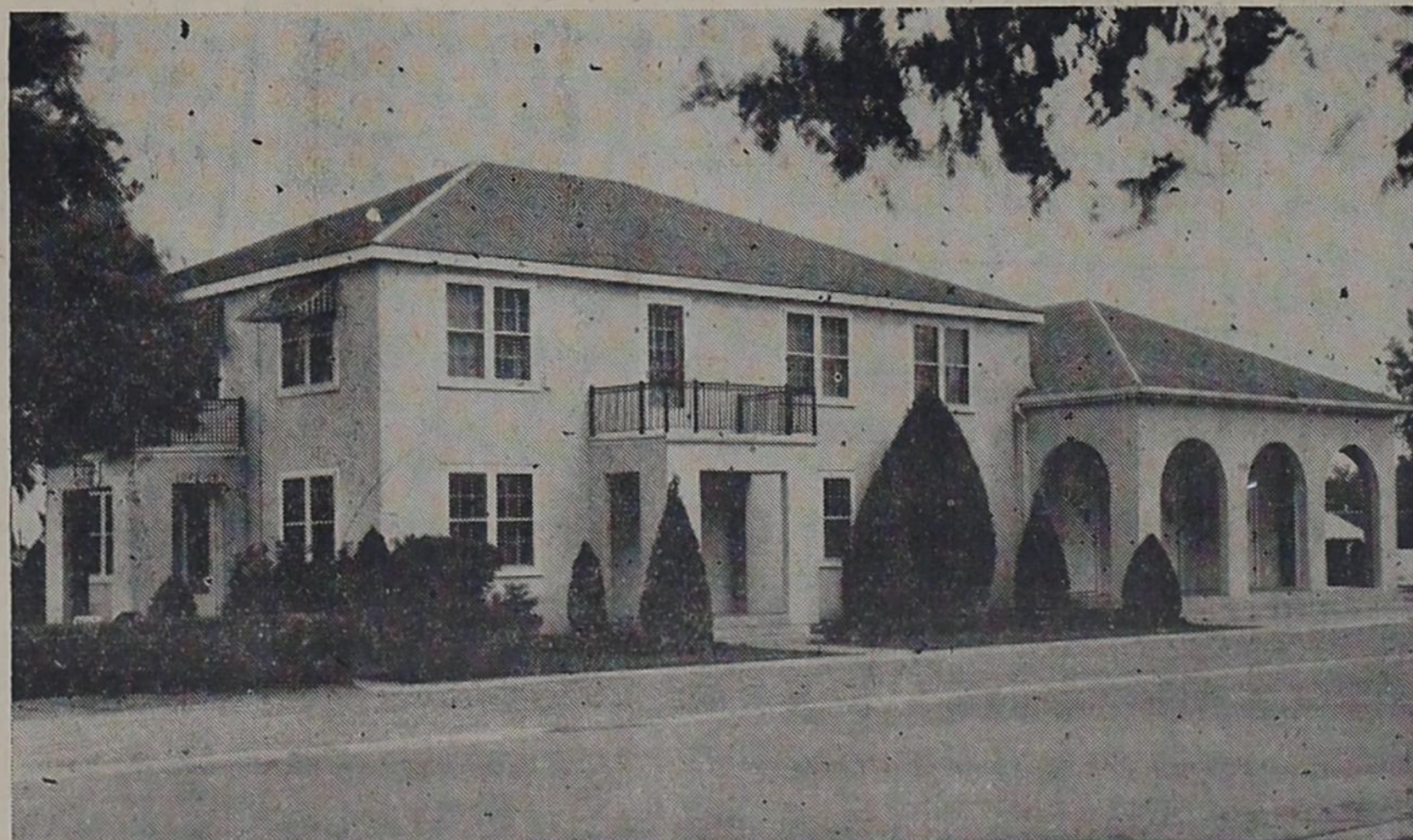

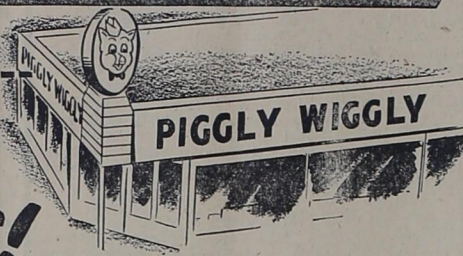

### Self-Feeding Mixtures Of Salt, Cottonseed Meal

Although livestock men differ in opinion as to the value of self-feeding a mixture of salt and cottonseed meal to cattle—particularly to breeding animals—the practice is growing in popularity, says Joe Jones, county agent.

The practice is aimed at reducing the amount of labor normally required for feeding supplements to range cattle. Mixing a high percent of salt with protein supplement or grain limits the amount of feed consumed when the mixture is fed free-choice. The value of this method of feeding depends on whether or not cattle suffer ill effects from a high intake of salt over a long period of time.

An experiment was conducted at the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, College Station, during the winter of 1949-50 to compare the results of hand-feeding two pounds of cottonseed meal daily with self-feeding a mixture of salt and cottonseed meal.

Thirty-five Angus, Hereford and Shorthorn cows were used in the test. They were divided into two groups as nearly alike as possible with respect to age, breed, weight and expected date of calving. The groups were run during the winter on two 200-acre Brazos county upland pastures. An abundance of dry winter forage was available, and the groups were alternated every two weeks to reduce the effect of the different pastures.

One group of 18 cows was hand-fed two pounds of cottonseed meal per head daily in feed bunks. The other group of 17 cows was given free access to a mixture ranging from 15 to 35 percent salt and to 65 percent cottonseed meal. Water was obtained from a stream about a quarter of a mile from the feeding location.

In order to limit the daily consumption of cottonseed meal to about two pounds, the beef cattle specialists increased the salt content of the mixture as the cows consumed more feed. As feed consumption dropped off later in the spring, the salt content was reduced.

The self-fed group consumed an average of 2.19 pounds of cottonseed meal and .95 pounds of salt per day over the 107-day test period. The hand-fed group received two pounds of cottonseed meal per day over the period.

Since the dry winter forage was low in nutritive content and somewhat unpalatable, the cows did not consume enough to maintain their weight. The average loss in weight per cow was about the same for both groups, 155 pounds.

Thirteen calves were dropped in the self-fed group and 12 in the hand-fed group. The calves from the salt-fed group averaged 164 pounds at 85 days of age.

Five cows of the salt-fed group scoured periodically. One cow started scouring January 16, was too weak to weigh January 27, and died February 6. No scouring was observed in cows of the hand-fed group.

The specialists concluded from this experiment that self-feeding mixtures of salt and cottonseed meal may cause scouring and death losses of breeding cows when the salt intake is one to one and one-half pounds per day and the pasture and water conditions are similar to those existing in this trial.

However, they think that this system of feeding supplements might possibly be practical under ideal conditions of feed and water supply. More experiments with the use of salt-cottonseed meal mixtures are now being conducted.

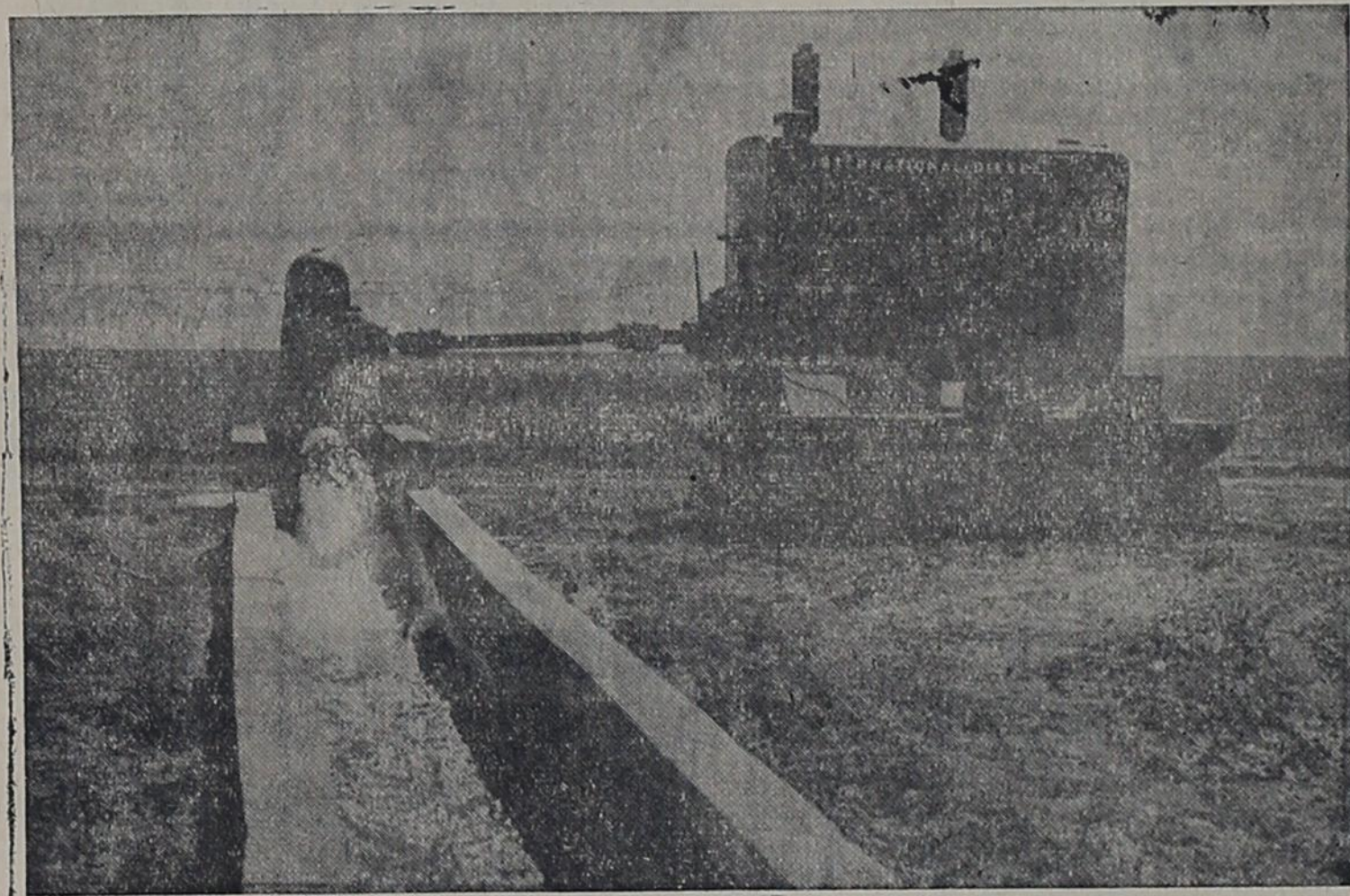

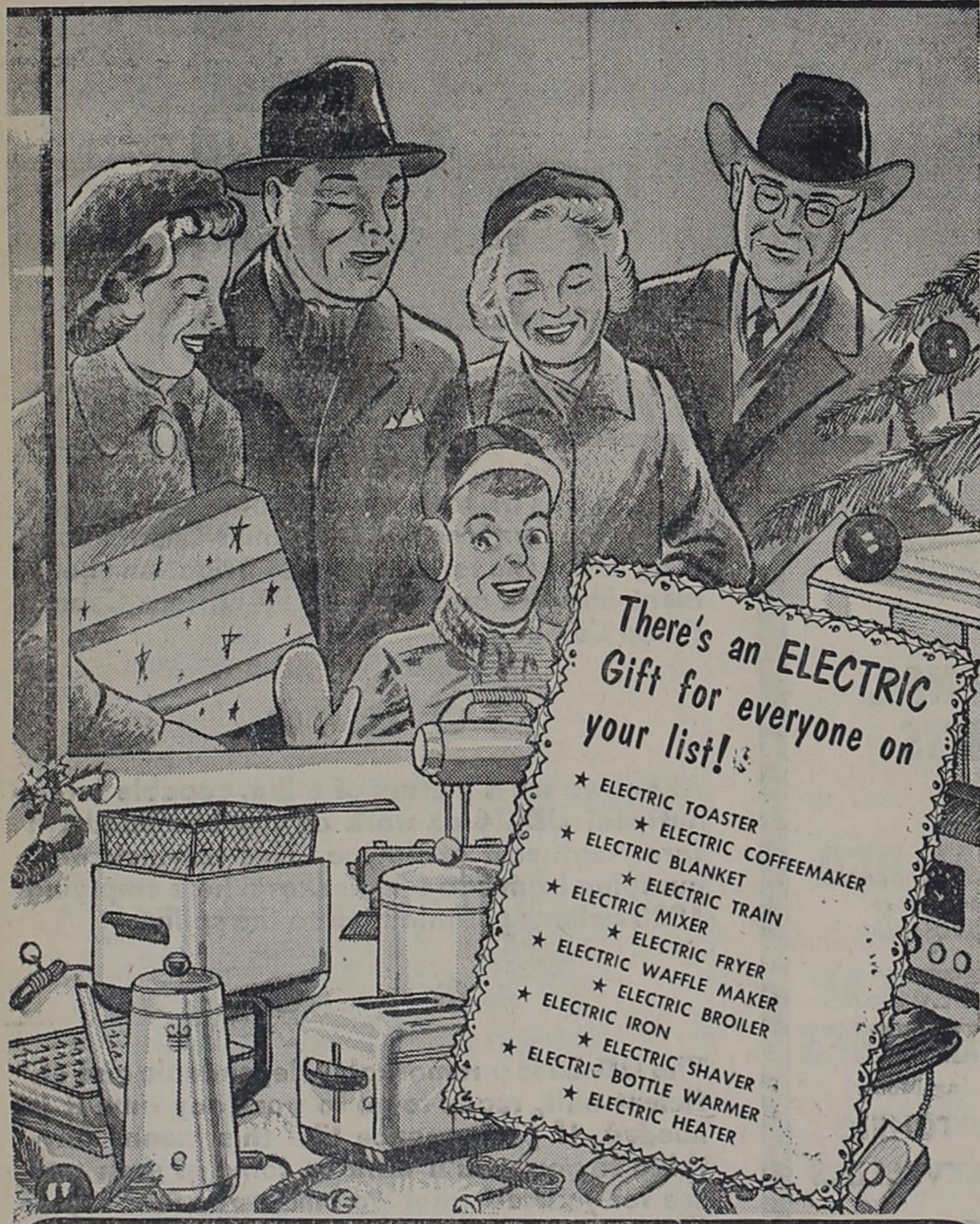

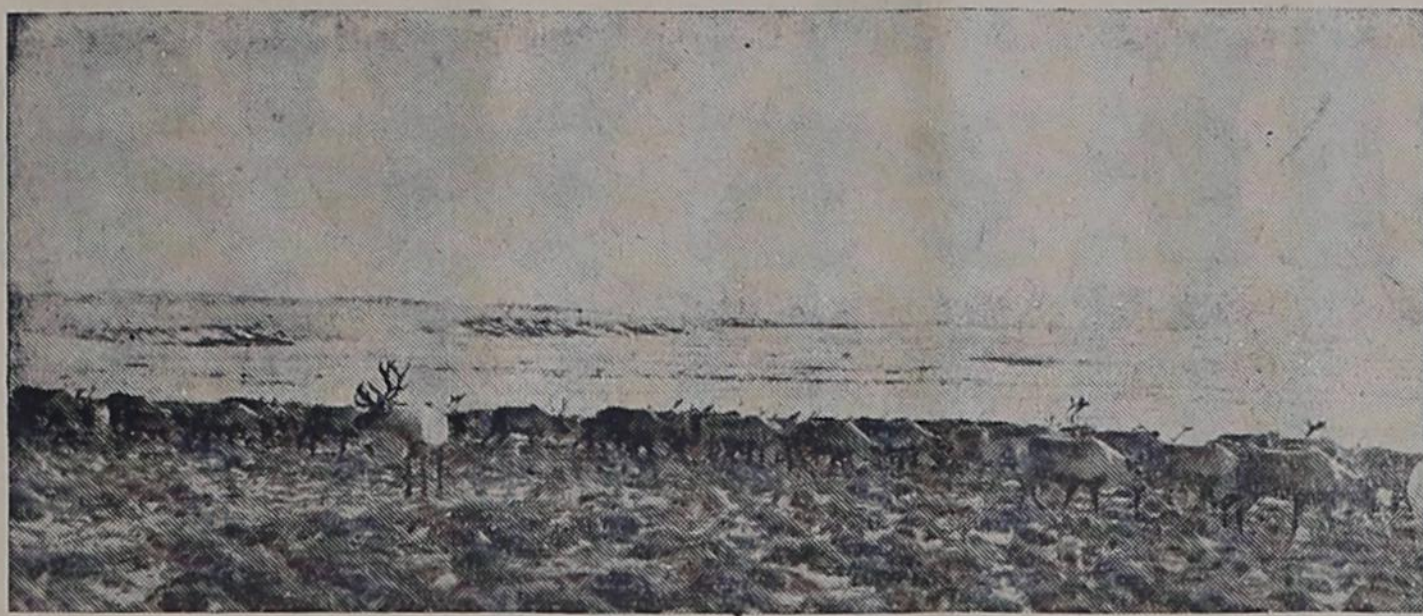

# Reindeer Fly South from North Pole

It is true, despite the doubts of the most flightily of children's imaginations, that reindeer fly down south from the North Pole once a year, with qualifications, of course. They fly down in C-46s chartered for the purpose by an enterprising Texan, and they don't actually come from the North Pole—but not far from it. Grady Carothers flies the animals here from north Alaska along the frozen coast of the Arctic Ocean.



And come Christmas season they prance along a 10-state itinerary to prove their noble purpose in life—that of drawing Santa Claus' sleigh. The reindeer parade will be here on December 17.

Although Carothers says the animals thrive on Texas weather, they are treated like aristocrats on the ranch. The 18-head herd lives in an

air-conditioned barn, and Carothers has planned to build another to take

care of the increasing herd.

They are let out to pasture at night, when it's comparatively cool. Texas is hotter for them than it is for us because they are built to withstand temperatures of five to fifty degrees below zero—and in blizzards downwards of 75 below.

Their skin is thick and tough and their hair is hollow to give added insulation. But when you see a deer panting with his tongue hanging out you needn't feel sorry for the poor creature. A reindeer breathes like a dog, panting and all, and it is normal to him even in colder weather than Texans have ever seen.

The reindeer's diet staple in Alaska is reindeer moss, about the only thing that grows on his native pasture. But since it is too expensive to cart moss down to Texas all year, Carothers has weaned them onto an oatmeal diet, which they apparently enjoy equally well.

The reindeer moss is kept for medicine, although Carothers has found that penicillin will snap them out of pneumonia as quickly as it will a

human.

Every fall Carothers treks up to Alaska, where Eskimos help him walk down the animals he wants. The reindeer are kept in 20 herds, all but two owned by Eskimos, and all pastured in barren tundras miles away from a village. The territorial government, which strictly regulates reindeer exports, owns the others, with which it helps stock the Eskimo herds.

The deer are walked down and gathered in a corral, where Carothers ropes out his pick. Then they are loaded into big planes and flown to Texas for training as Santa-bearers. And then—Christmas!

## Skunks Can Mean Double Trouble

There is more than one good reason for staying clear of a skunk.

In addition to their offensive odors, skunks are also very susceptible to rabies, says the American Veterinary Medical Association.

In fact, skunks have been involved in many rural outbreaks of this disease during the past year. Other wild animals, including foxes, coyotes, jackals, porcupines, raccoons and weasels are also potential rabies-spreaders. Suspect any such animal that acts tame or friendly.

However, veterinarians say the real key to rabies control is vaccination of dogs. If dogs are immunized against this disease, a good share of the costly livestock losses caused by rabies can be avoided.

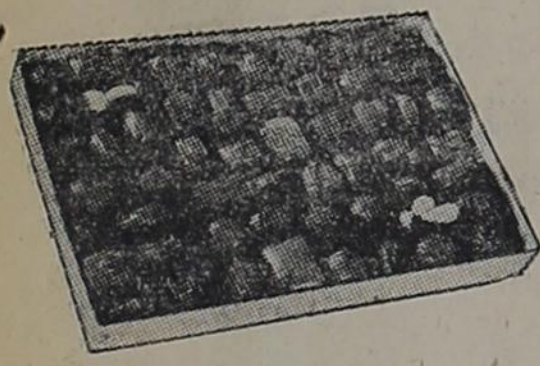
