County Tax Collections "About As Usual" In '52

County and state tax collections are running "about as usual" this year, according to Sheriff Chas. Lovelace. He estimated that returns for October normally ran around 20 per cent, and this year seems to be no exception.

As has been customary, a deduction of three per cent may be made by taxpayers on bills paid to the sheriff's office in October, but this discount may not be made on taxes other than state and county. A discount of two per cent will be made for county and state taxes paid in November, and one per cent in Decem-
