## School Tax Receipts Better Than Expected

Wilfred Quickel, tax collector for Farwell Independent School District, reported Wednesday that returns for 1952 taxes have "been better than expected since no discount is available."

Quickel, who is also employed by the City of Farwell to collect taxes, says that statements for city assessments have not yet been mailed to residents. The reason for the delay, he explained, is because it will first be necessary for the city commission, which sits as a board of equalization, to meet and set valuation for new property within city limits.

In addition, Quickel cannot legally mail statements on property already valued until after the commission meets and approves the present rate. "In all probability, the tax rate will remain the same," he says.

The collector also commented that there are "quite a few" delinquents for the city taxes.

## Voting Booms On Absentee Ballots

Absentee voting, which may indicate the number of votes that can be expected in the general election Nov. 4, is booming, according to employees of the county clerk's office.

By Wednesday morning, 46 voters had marked ballots as absentees, about half of them being by mail from out-of-town residents, and the other half from persons who will be gone on election day.

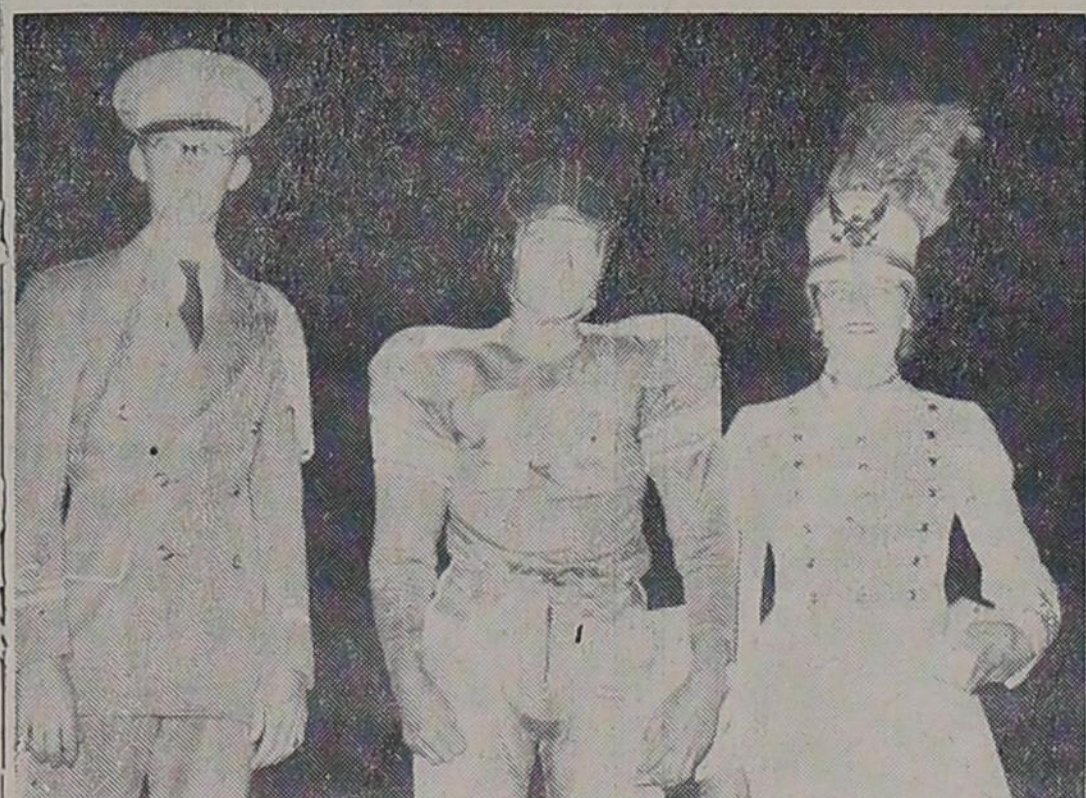
The voting, which opened on the 15th, will end Friday the 31st.

## Trades Day Reopened By Farwell Businesses

### Inexperience The Trick For Deer, Seemingly

Those guys on their first deer hunt who are so nervous they can hardly aim when they see a buck seem to make up for their inexperience with good fortune. At least that's how it appears now that local sojourning hunters are coming back from the wilds.

To illustrate the point, study the results of these two typical parties, one composed of Rev. C. M. Fields, Doyle Reddell, Jack McManigal, and Jack McCrary; the other of Lester Norton, Bert Williams, Lake Martin, Glen, Charles, and Bunk Phillips.

Of the first group, Rev. Fields and Reddell, both never on a hunt before, bagged big 11-point bucks—it was easy. McManigal, a veteran of many campaigns, worked hard for a four-pointer, and McCrary had to settle for a doe.

In the second party, Williams knocked down a handsome 13-pointer with one shot his second day out—running, hit through the neck at 250 yards. He had never before been on a deer hunt.

Norton got a nice-sized 11-point buck himself, but his kill was smaller than Williams'.

Nobody else in the second party got a smell.

## Annual Farm Bureau Convention Tuesday

The fourth annual convention of Parmer County Farm Bureau will be held in the Bovina School Auditorium Tuesday night, October 28 at 8:00 p.m. It is anticipated that this will be one of the best attended conventions in the history of the local organization, directors say.

Problems facing farmers, such as discontinuance of tractor gas tax exemption, increased freight rates, threats of state officials to divert funds now used for rural roads to build super cross-country highways, and threatened state ownership of the farmer's precious underground water are drawing agricultural people closer together in an effort to retain these things that have benefited them in gaining a higher standard of living than they have ever known.

Farm Bureau Leadership award pins will be presented to FFA and 4-H boys of the various county groups; certificates will be awarded to top membership solicitors; officers will be elected by ballot, and delegates to the State Convention in San Antonio chosen. Resolutions presented to the resolutions committee will be presented for approval before being sent to the State and National conventions.

Though members will receive individual invitations, the general public is cordially invited and urged to attend. Membership in the Parmer County Farm Bureau has grown steadily since its inception in 1948 from 70 to 578 members in 1951. This represents about 85 per cent of the resident farmers in the county.

Texico school faculty members are in Albuquerque this weekend attending sessions of New Mexico Education association. School was dismissed Tuesday afternoon, and will be resumed Monday morning.

Farwell merchants interested in reviving the Weekly Trades Day here which has been defunct about three months, met with directors of the Farwell Chamber of Commerce Monday night and drew up plans for another Trades Day project.

An agreement was reached among seventeen businesses in Farwell to sponsor the civic project, and the first Trades Day was called for this Saturday.

In a number of respects, this program differs from the old set-up. Awards, formerly made near the Santa Fe Railway off main street in Farwell, will now be presented winning persons on the vacant lot directly east of the Ralph Humble M-M business on Third Street. Ray Mears, a participating merchant, has volunteered to make the awards at 4 p.m.

Businesses cooperating in the new Trades Day event include the following:

Complete details covering the rules under which Trades Day will operate are available at any of the above named businesses.

Registrations for the awards will be made on a basis corresponding to the amount of retail sales interested shoppers accumulate.

Other business attended to by the directors Monday night included adoption of a motion to participate with the American Legion which is sponsoring a special observance of Armistice Day, November 11.

The Chamber requests local houses of business to close from 10 until 12 A. M. when the special program will be presented.

The question of on-the-street peddlers again was placed before the directors, with special emphasis on the problem of transient magazine "salesmen." The project was shelved, however, when those present agreed there was little that the Chamber could do because it does not have the legal jurisdiction necessary for such matters.

Shortly before adjournment, the matter of securing a night watchman for the business district was opened, but nothing concrete came from the discussion.

## County Tax Collections "About As Usual" In '52

County and state tax collections are running "about as usual" this year, according to Sheriff Chas. Lovelace. He estimated that returns for October normally ran around 20 per cent, and this year seems to be no exception.

As has been customary, a deduction of three per cent may be made by taxpayers on bills paid to the sheriff's office in October, but this discount may not be made on taxes other than state and county. A discount of two per cent will be made for county and state taxes paid in November, and one per cent in December.

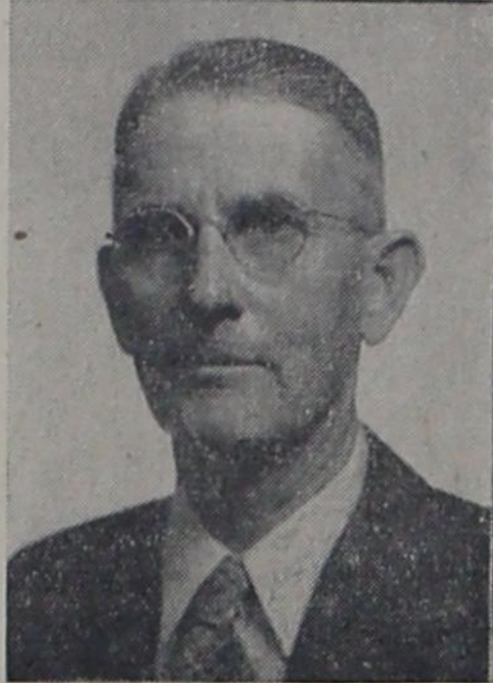

(Eighteenth in a series of informative articles revealing little known facts about well known people in and around Texico-Farwell and nearby communities. Our sole purpose is to promote better acquaintances—in the hope of promoting better friendships.)

Riley Boss of Texico has had quite a unique experience. He has lived in the territory of New Mexico, the state of New Mexico, Roosevelt County and Curry County, without ever moving off the Boss homestead south of Texico.

The local man explains that when his family first moved here, they lived in the territory and later the state, and then Roosevelt Co. was then divided, leaving the Boss farm in the new Curry Co.

Mrs. Boss has also been in Texico for quite a period of time, since back in 1918.

Boss was born in Trent, Texas and lived their until he was only six years old when his parents pulled up stakes and headed for Texico in 1902. Riley was the youngest child. He had one brother, Ollie, who also resides in Texico; and two sisters. Both are married now. Mollie is Mrs. Walter Meyer and Anna is Mrs. P. M. Owens. She has also remained in Texico.

John Boss, Riley's father, was a farmer. He and the older boys filed on a claim in Texico, and began their operations here, when the area was very sparsely populated.

Asked if he could remember much about the trip to his new home, Boss comments, "yes, and it was quite a trip for me and old Shep, my dog." He remembers that the animal had to walk most of the way and really had sore feet by the time they reached their destination. "I was the youngest and had to walk along and pick up cow chips to use for fuel," says Boss, "and how I hated to do that." He adds that he was afraid of stinging scorpions, "and I believe there was one under every cow chip," he adds.

Upon arrival, Boss's father traveled to Hereford to get the lumber to use for the dugout that was to house the family. They also bought supplies there. Later, supplies were available at Bovina and then in Texico. "We would try to kill an antelope ever once in a while for food," he says.

When the elder Boss would go hunting, if he had not returned by dark, Mrs. Boss would put a lantern out to help him find his way home. It was just a flat area and easy to lose the sense of direction.

Asked if anyone is still here who was in Texico in the early days, Boss recalls that Mason Neely's family resided here at that time. "It was rather lonesome for a while," he says, "because there were so few people, but when people began moving in,

everyone was a neighbor."

Boss has resided here all the time since 1902 with the exception of the time he spent in the army in World War I. He attended Locust Grove school, which was located southwest of town. As he grew older, he helped his father on the farm, and in 1924, after his marriage, began trucking.

The local man met his wife after he came back home from the army in September of 1919. She and her brothers and sister arrived at the Boss home to play dominoes and cards. The young couple began going around together, and in June of 1920, was married.

Mrs. Boss was born in Manbrino, Texas, close to Granbury and lived there until she was 16, when her family moved to this area. Her father was also a farmer. It was in 1918 that the family made the 18-day cross country trek by covered wagon. Texico was well established then, she says. She has three brothers and six sisters. Living in this area are: Mrs. Roger Grissom of Texico; Mrs. Lawson Williams, Mrs. Loyd Roberts and Cass Purselly, all of Clovis. Her mother also resides in this area.

She says the Pursellys had a grand time on their trip to Texico, "but, when we got here, we were really disappointed." Since that time, she has grown to like this country. Mr. Purselly farmed on the Neely farm about three miles south of town. The local woman had only been in Texico a year when she met her husband.

When the Bosses were first married, they lived on a farm, then moved to town in 1923. Since that time, they have been town dwellers.

He worked on the section crew for a while before going into trucking. For the past two years, however, he has worked for wages. The Bosses have lived in their present house for the past 21 years.

Mr. and Mrs. Boss have two daughters, Mrs. Wanda Kilgo of Albuquerque and Mrs. Lila Bennett of Portales. They also have two grandchildren, a boy and a girl, children of Lila.

The couple recall Texico when it was a boom town. "It was like a Wild West movie, but real," they say. They also remember the eventful "settling down" of the town. They report that many buildings burned, others were moved away, and the boom subsided.

Back in the early days, young people had numerous parties, and would play card games for entertainment. "There were dances some-

The local girl, who is a senior at Texico school, has been active in 4-H for five years, and has attended State meetings several times. This will be her first trip to the national meeting, however.

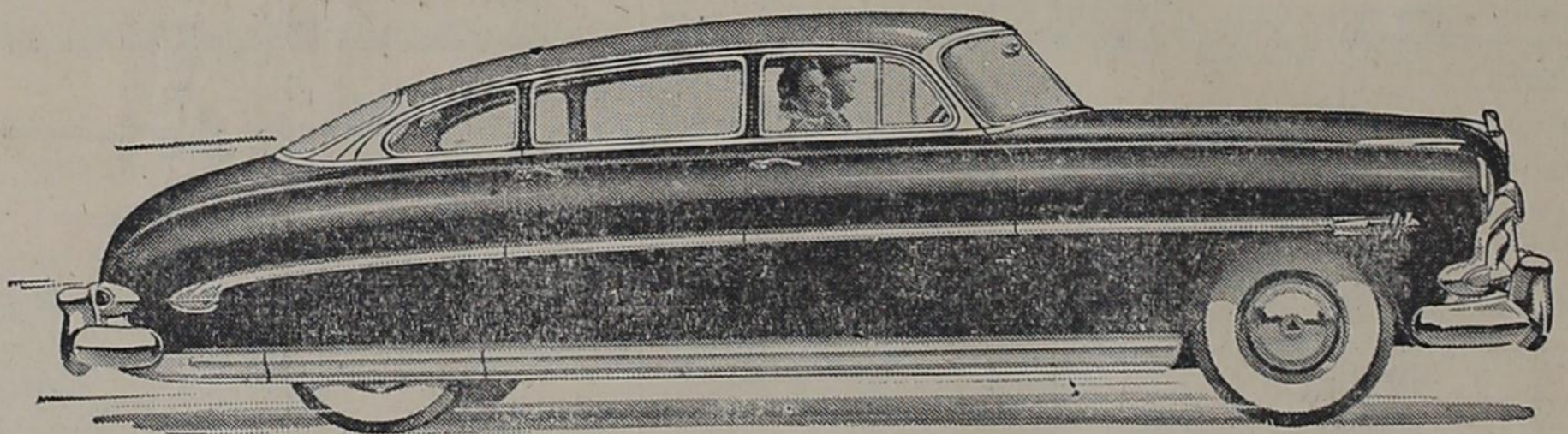

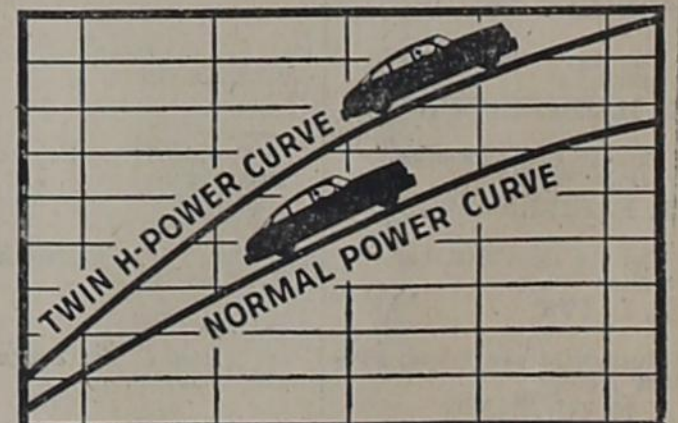

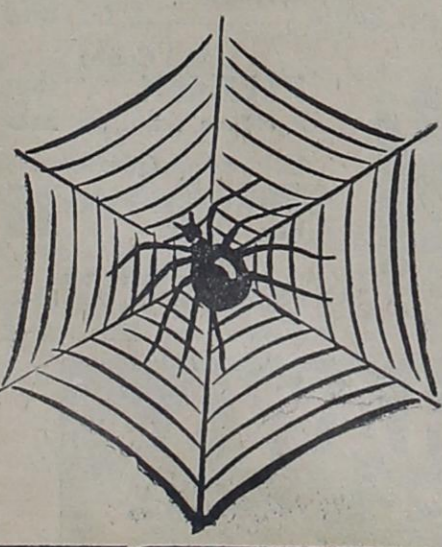

## Seniors Present Skit Entitled "Red Flannels"

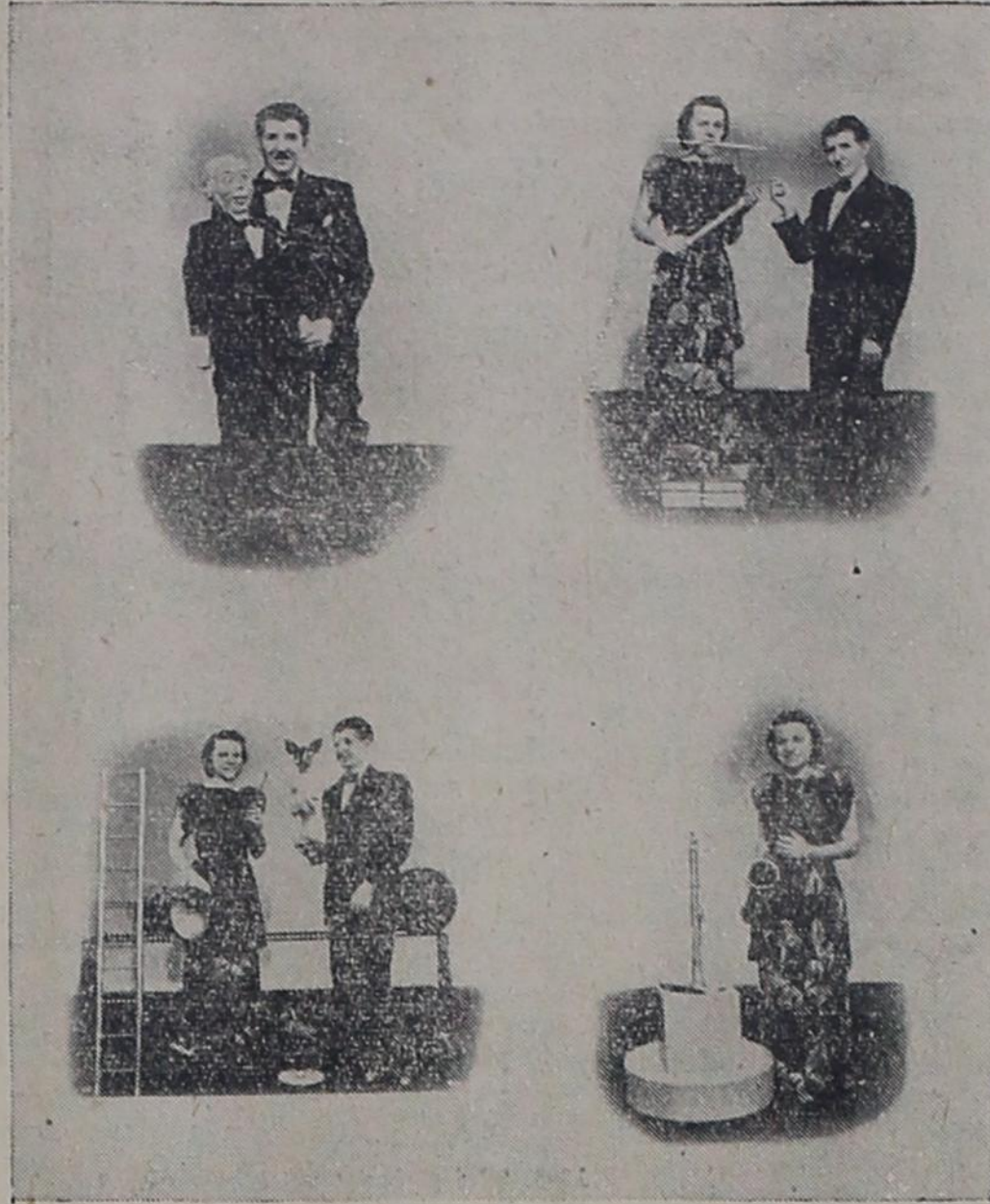
On Tuesday of last week at 9:10, members of the senior class presented their assembly program. They gave a one-act play entitled "Red Flannels."

## PROOF OF FAST, ECONOMICAL GAINS ON PURINA FAT CALF CHOW

A group of steer calves was started at the Bourbon Stockyards, Louisville, Ky., at an average weight at 366 lbs. The finished weight after 120 days on Fat Calf Chow was 641 lbs., an average gain of 275 lbs. per steer. Each steer averaged 2.3 lbs. gain per day, after allowing for a 22-hr. shrink period at the end of the test. Note that at the start of the test 82% were in the top two grades. You'll note that these calves were "foolers," because they actually graded out higher on the hook than they had graded on hoof.

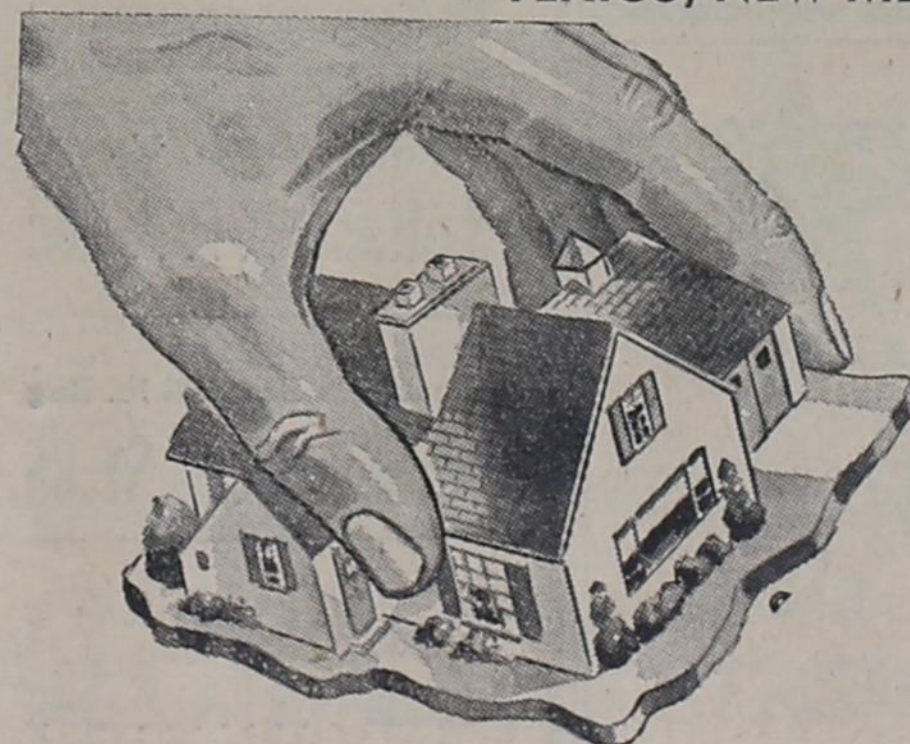

**Squeeze First Downs**

yards to go. Three times Farwell refused to kick out, choosing to run or pass the ball on fourth down, and in each attempt was successful.

One crucial first down came as the result of a penalty against Petersburg when the Steers were passing on fourth down.

Blossingame, tall back for Petersburg, played havoc with the Farwell defense in the last quarter, scoring twice and intercepting one Steer pass. In addition, he piled up considerable yardage in the middle.

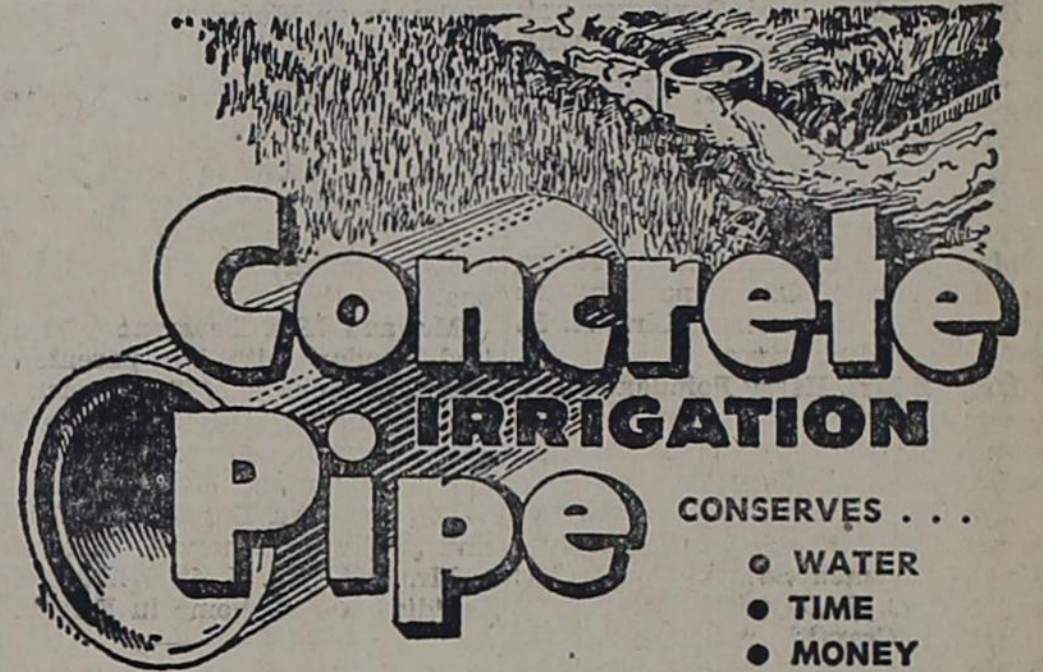

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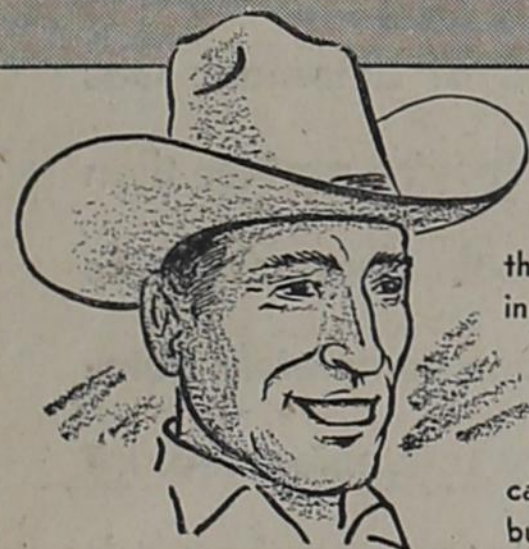

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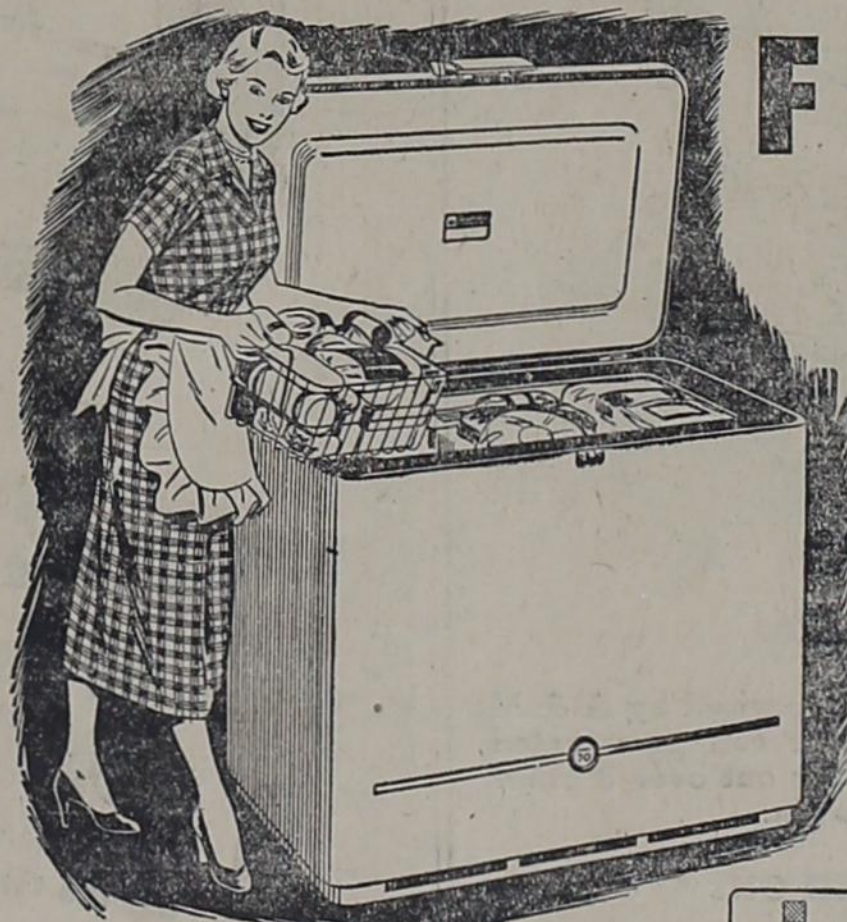
