FROM THE HOPPER By HOP

I ran across something yesterday caught my eye. It was on the editorial page, written by Dick West, and concerned a revision of the present presidential electoral college, He has some very practical suggestions, as you will see. His editorial follows:

General Eisenhower's victory was impressive but it should not stop the movement to change the system of counting electoral votes.

The Electoral College should not be abolished. But the way that electoral votes are counted should be.

Texas has twenty-four electoral votes. If the Republican candidate gets 60 per cent of the vote in Texas, he ought to get just 60 per cent of the twenty-four-not all of the twenty-four. In that way, the party which loses gets credit for 40 per cent instead of for none.

Four years ago Harry Truman won the presidency, and in the winning there actually were more popular votes cast against him than for him. But in the electoral count he won by 303 to 189, and the headlines screamed "Landslide!"

The Dewey-Truman race actually Weather Hits Here was close. Truman led by only 2,000-000 out of nearly 48,000,000. A shift of only 50,000 votes out of 48,000,000 in a few key states would have thrown the race to Dewey.

General Eisenhower's victory doesn't necessarily mean that Republicans are a strong factor in Texas from here on. Mr. Hoover carried Texas, but whoever heard of the Republicans from 1928 until 1952? The Republicans didn't carry Texas Nov. 4. Dissatisfied Democrats did.

Jerry Wayne, whose second birthday was to have been observed yesterday (Wednesday) swallowed a washer while playing near the Smith home Thursday morning. He was rushed to a Portales hospital where physicians were unable to remove the obstruction.

Reading and Lighting and 'Rithmetic

Look what some figure-happy statistician just found out. From kindergarten through high school, school kids have to plow through a pile of books 18 feet high. A photograph taken of this pile of books would make your eyes ache.

Close visual work is hard on the eyes. A New York State survey of 83,000 students showed only one in 20 kids had vision defects at kindergarten age. By senior high, eye troubles affected six students in 20.

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
