

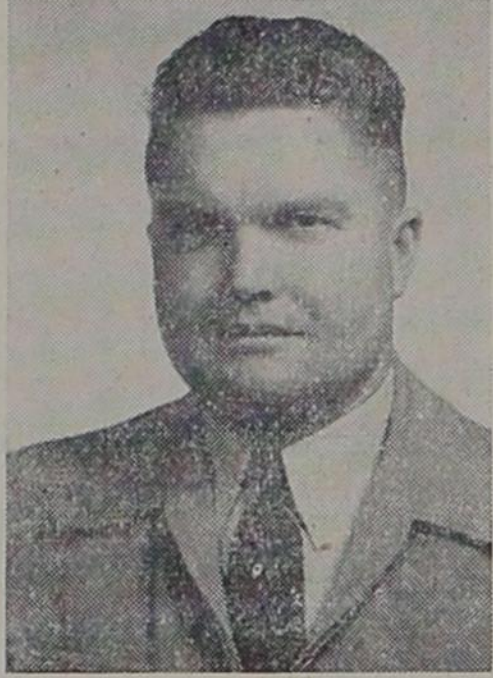

Jim was born in Wildorado, lived in Amherst for a while during his boyhood, and was graduated from high school at Memphis, Texas. 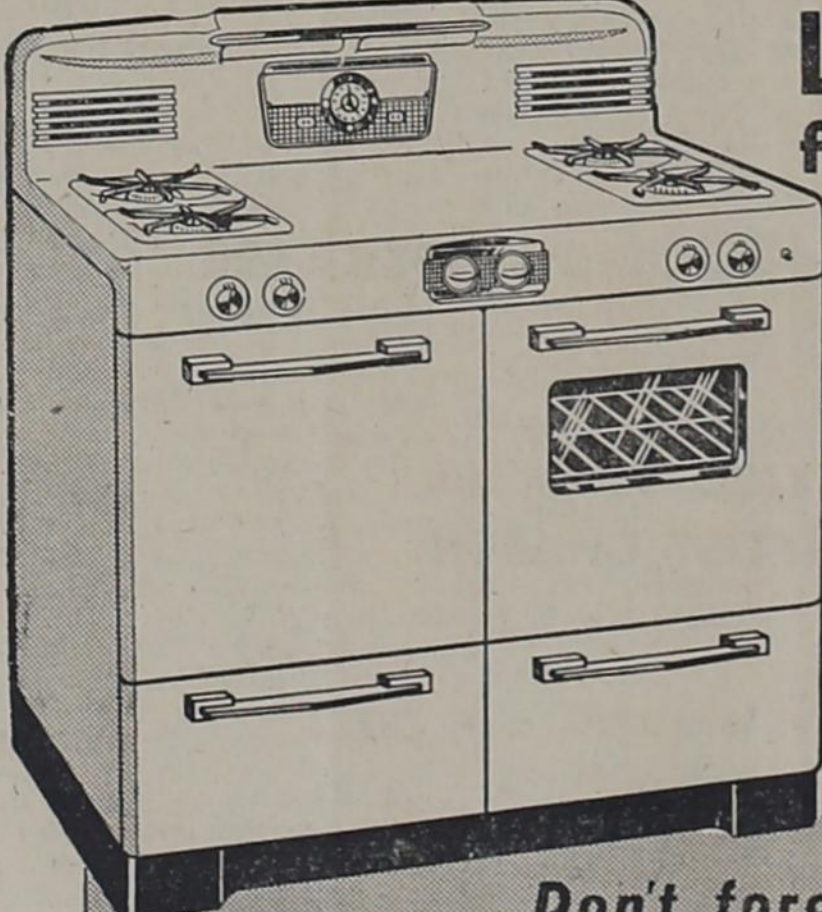

The ball see-sawed back and forth, then Friona made another touchdown and point, giving them 55 to Anton's 7.

Friona B team then entered the game. In a series of short gains, Anton made their second count of the evening. A three yard gain over tackle and a good extra netted another seven points for Anton; and in another 32-yard run, the visitors scored again; extra point was no good.

A quarterback sneak by Friona gave them their last score, and Anton went through the center for the final counter. Final score was 61-33 with the Chiefs on top.

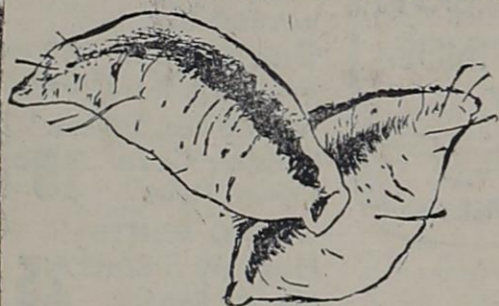

A group of steer calves was started at the Bourbon Stockyards, Louisville, Ky., at an average weight at 366 lbs. The finished weight after 120 days on Fat Calf Chow was 641 lbs., an average gain of 275 lbs. per steer. Each steer averaged 2.3 lbs. gain per day, after allowing for a 22-hr. shrink period at the end of the test. Note that at the start of the test 82% were in the top two grades. 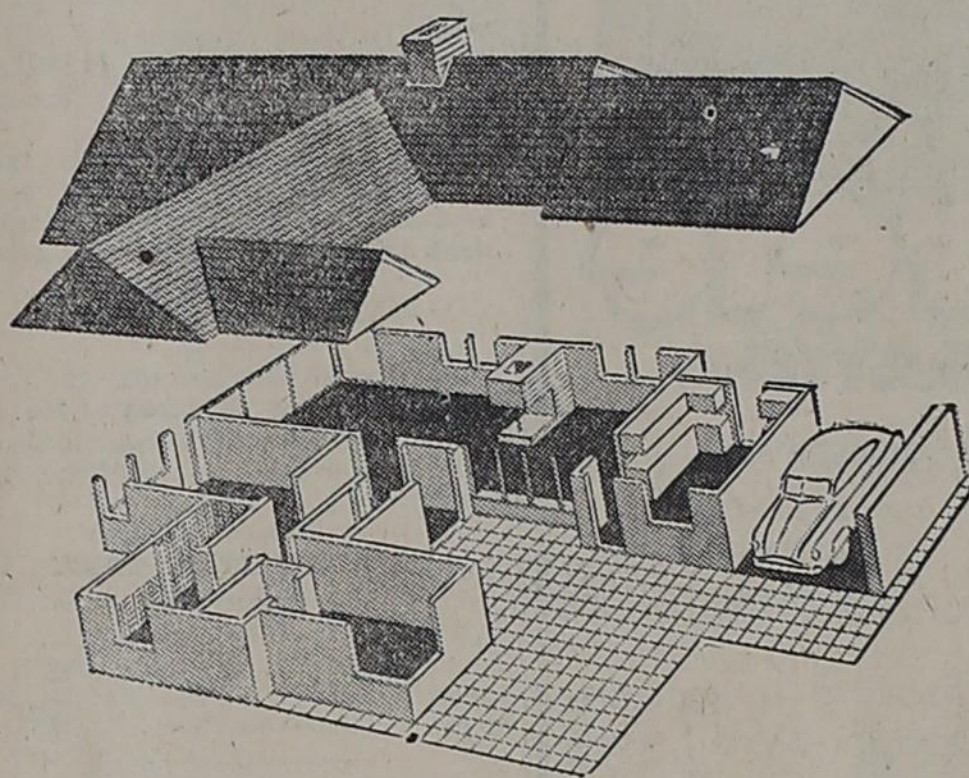

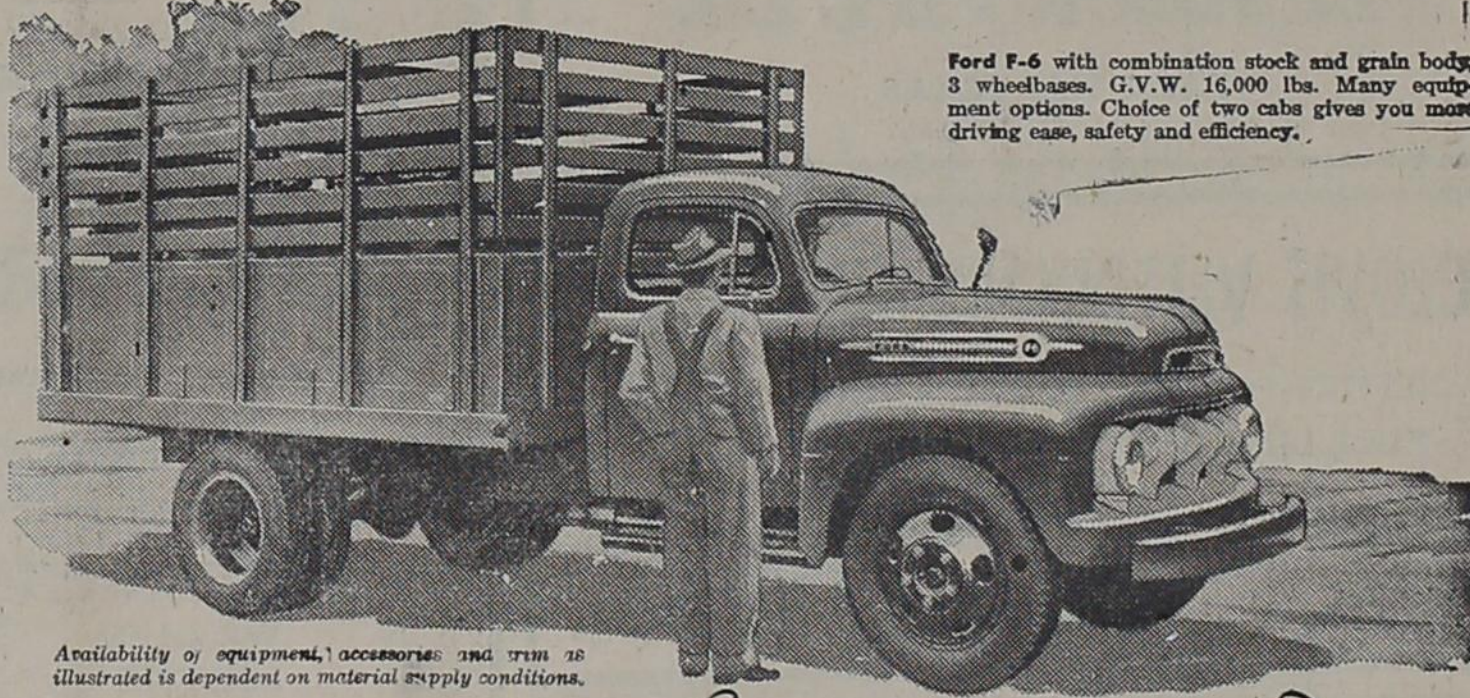

before a ladies' club. "And those ladies had been thinking about this thing," he said. "Why, they had pages of questions to ask me.

"One lady asked me bluntly, 'Mr. McFarland, do you think we're going to run out of water?' I told her, 'No, but I do believe that the water may all be gone for our children or their children a few years from now.'"

State, Federal Control?

Back to the question of whether state or federal control is imminent, McFarland went into a detailed recounting of the events of the past few years. On several occasions bills have been before the house of the state legislature which would in effect establish control of irrigation practice and development on a state level.

But that isn't the worst part of it, according to the District official. "Look at what's happened in some parts of California and Nevada and other western states. Out there water users lagged with organization on a

level to conserve their resources, and when they did, the federal government came in with this paramount rights' stuff and took their water away from them. They didn't condemn the land or anything like that — just took water rights away.

"Now, if you want to drill a well out there, you have to go through all that red tape. You see, it had never been established that a man who owned a piece of land owned the water which is under it. When he couldn't show legal claim to his water, that was that."

Fortunately, land owners in the High Plains District are exempt from any such drastic occurrence. Their claim to water which is under their land was definitely established when the state legislature of 1949 enacted HB No. 162, commonly referred to as The Underground Water Conservation Law.

Even though a land owner is given legal claim to his underground water, how he may use it can be quite another thing, as will be seen later.



After the evening service last Sunday, the pastor called for a prayer meeting to pray for the new building. More than 20 people remained for this season of prayer.

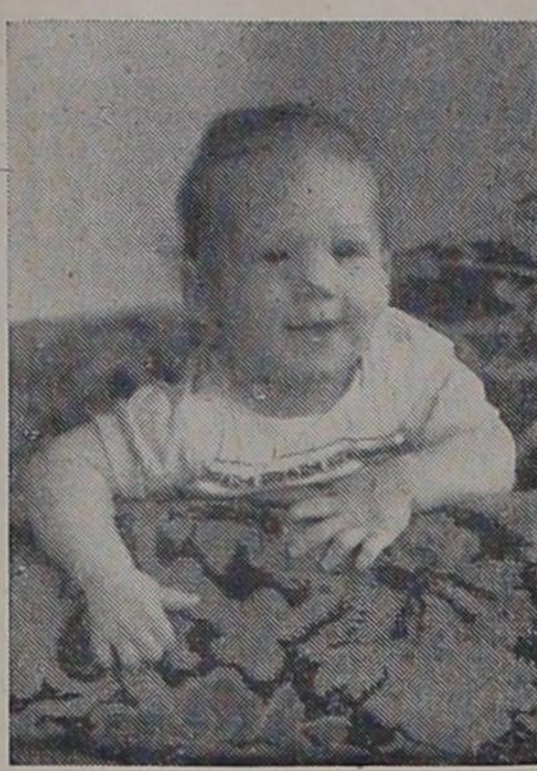

Bridge Building a Cinch for Army, Reports Lt. Nolan C. Rhodes in Letter to Mother

A recent letter, received by Mrs. A. G. White from a son, 1st Lt. Nolan C. Rhodes who is stationed at Mannheim, Germany tells of a problem they had while on a field trip recently, in which they had to build a bridge across the Rhine River. He states from the time they began this project, it was just five and one-half hours until they were rolling heavy equipment, tanks, bulldozers across the river. The bridge was 1070 feet in length and made of A-4 all Aluminum pontoon bridge.

To give a better idea, he states it took approximately 140 large bridge trucks to haul the component parts. In the actual construction, they used 500 of the company men and 150 men from the bridge company. This was just given to show what the men are trying out on their field trips. Lt. Rhodes conducts these problems in his company.

Lt. Nolan Rhodes and his wife have been in Germany since about August 1950. They have a boy named Steven, born last February. He asks his "Mom" not to worry about them, that they are well and happy and get to see so much of the country. They have gotten to vacation in various places in Germany, Paris, France, Venice, Italy and had a drive this summer through the Swiss Alps and on to Switzerland.

Lt. Rhodes served four years in U. S. Navy during World War II, got his discharge and went back to col-

lege. After receiving his degree from Texas Tech in the year 1950, he joined the army and was sent to Germany.
