This report was generally accepted as an explanation by most citizens, but there are a few who stoutly maintain that it was not a balloon; they saw it giving off a bluish gas. These people made their observations through binoculars.

## Call For Sign-Ups Given By Camp

Joe Camp, secretary of the Farmer County PMA, has reminded county farmers that Dec. 1 is the last day they may sign a request for assistance for the 1953 agricultural conservation program.

He says, "It is no longer possible for them to come in just before intending to carry out a practice to get prior approval unless they have completed the request for assistance and included the practice on the request."

In a letter to county farmers, Camp said, "The sign-up began about six weeks ago with community committeemen intending to contact each one of you and helping you fill out the form. However, the committeemen are farmers, the same as you, and they have been unable to contact everyone."

"Since it is necessary, if you wish assistance on any practice, to be signed up by December 1, it will be necessary for you to visit the county office and we'll help you execute the forms."

ACP practices for 1953 include construction of terraces, construction of diversion terraces, establishing a permanent sod waterway, subsoiling (deep chiseling), leveling land for irrigation, reorganization of a permanent farm irrigation system;

Application of potash and phosphate to legumes and grasses, growing a green manure or cover crop of summer legumes, establishing satisfactory cover of winter legumes, and establishing or improving permanent pastures by seeding adapted pasture grasses.

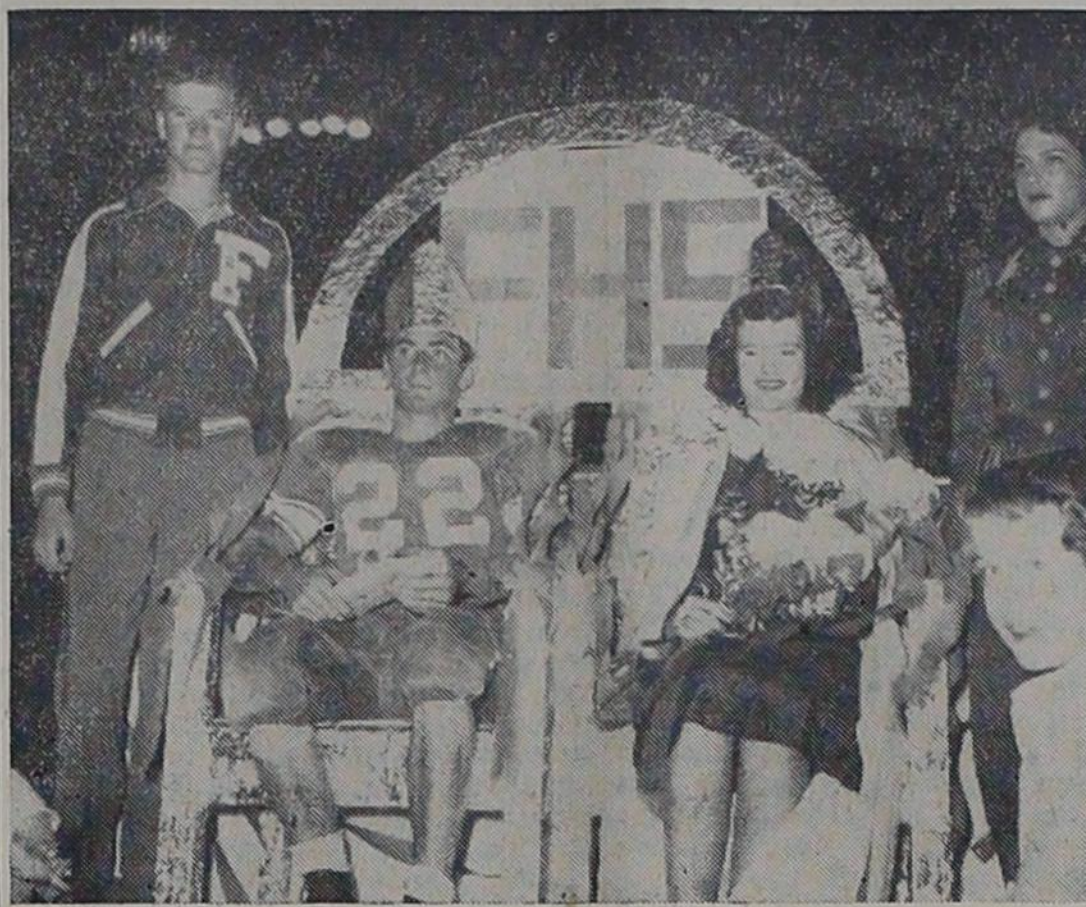
## Oklahoma Lane Xmas Program To Be Dec. 24

## County Hospital Has Annual Meeting

During the business meeting, Sloan Osborn was returned to duty as a member of the board of directors, with others including A. W. Anthony, Jr., Floyd Schlenker, Lee Thompson, and Pete Buske.

The audit report was given by Frank Sharmon, of Tulia, and special speaker of the evening was Supt. W. H. Willoughby, of Bovina. Willoughby pointed out that while Texas, in general, is at the forefront in agriculture, it's notably far behind in development of hospitals and schools, adding with pride that Farmer County is extremely fortunate to have its own hospital.

Dr. Paul L. Spring, hospital head, spoke briefly, relating the progress and work done by the hospital during the closing fiscal year, and following adjournment, refreshments were served to the attendants.

## RTA Lets Contract For Rural Offices

A contract for \$19,341 has been let by the directors of the Rural Telephone Association to Pre-Fabricated Structure company of Amarillo following a meeting yesterday at Hereford, announces Harold Carpenter.

The money will be used for the construction of seven system offices. Carpenter reported that 80 miles of poles are now up west of Hereford, and staking crews are busy on additional lines.

Land for a Bovina station has been purchased from L. T. Tharp, 3 miles north of that town.

## Peak Is Finally Reached In Cotton Crop Harvest

Every gin in Farmer County is on a 24-hour work schedule this week as returns from the 1952 cotton crop pour in from all over the county. By time this edition is in the mails, it may be safely said that harvesting will be pushing toward a mark of 14,000 bales in Farmer.

## Dial Exchange Building To Be Built In Texico

Announcement was made today by William H. Strickfaden, manager of The Mountain States Telephone and Telegraph Company, that his company has purchased property for a new dial telephone exchange on the southeast corner of the intersection of Hereford and Garwood Streets in Texico.

The telephone company plans to erect a new building on this property to house an enlarged telephone system. The present leased quarters used by the telephone company are too small to allow for the new, expanded dial system required to meet the growth of Texico and Farwell.

The enlarged dial equipment will be of the latest design and will provide services not now available to the company's Texico and Farwell subscribers. When the new equipment is placed in use, a full classification of service will be offered, including two-party residence and two-party business lines.

Construction of the new building in Texico will get under way immediately and is expected to be completed by approximately December 15. As of this date, work will start on installation of the new dial equipment involving thousands of feet of cable and hundreds of hand-soldered connections.

Installation of the new dial equipment here is in line with the telephone company's plan to meet the growing need for dial service in this community, Strickfaden said.

## Dedication Is Slated for Wednesday

Taxpayers of the Farwell Consolidated School District, who would like to take a look at how their tax money is being spent are issued a cordial invitation to the school property on Wednesday of next week, November 26th, Supt. Jack Williams said today.

For at this time, the brand-spanking new \$165,000 high school and cafeteria department will be formally dedicated, while at the same time, visitors will be shown throughout all parts of the school buildings.

The program is to begin at 2 o'clock, with Dr. Floyd D. Golden, head of Eastern New Mexico University, to give the dedicatory address on the porch of the new cafeteria, Supt. Williams added.

Musical numbers will be given by the school chorus of some 50 voices, in their first public appearance of the current term, Mrs. Erma Jobs, director, said today. The group is slated to sing Mendelssohn's "Cast The Burden Upon The Lord," and a Southern folk song, "Charlotte Town," ending their presentation with the school Alma Mater.

High school students will serve as guides over the entire school plant, the superintendent explained, adding that displays will be set up in the

various rooms by students and teachers. The new building, pride and joy of both faculty and student personnel, was occupied at the beginning of the current school term, after construction began in August, 1951. Raymond Griggs, of Clovis was the contractor, with Butler Breshear, Lubbock, architects.

Modern throughout, the addition to the school plant is brick on the exteriors, combining buff and Roman red in a charming style. Windows are the steel casement type with venetian blinds and the building is semi-fire-proof throughout.

The building is heated in the latest manner—none of the familiar old radiators for this—with an adequate supply of venting which can keep the temperature at an even reading even in the worst weather.

Included in the 8,000-square feet of floor space—exclusive of the cafeteria—are three offices, six classrooms, two rest rooms, a library, book room and furnace room. The cafeteria itself is a boon to the student body, relieving them of dining in the old converted basement of the original building on the campus. "We're proud of it, and we want you to come and see it next Wednesday," Supt. Williams said, in issuing his invitation to the public.

Following the afternoon activities, school will be dismissed for the Thanksgiving holidays, with regular classes beginning again on Monday.

Still leading the six county gins in bales Wednesday was Guy Nickles at Lariat, who had turned out 4050 at 3 p.m. Watkins' Gin at Lazbuddy is a close second, and could have been out in front Wednesday.

The Lazbuddy gin had 3586 at noon Monday.

Peak For Most Cotton Most ginners believe that they are now in the peak of the harvest, or are just coming out of it. Yards at all gins were overflowing this week.

The rolls of the mechanical stripper is being introduced almost exclusively at this time for harvesting the crop. Nearly all seasonal labor has begun its migration from fields in the area.

Following is a break-down of production in Farmer in the six county gins:

**Laria.** (Wednesday, 3 p.m.)—4050 bales ginned, 575 bales on yard. Guy Nickles, manager, says peak has passed there, probably Saturday night when 667 bales were waiting to be ginned. "About 75 per cent of the crop is in," he says, predicting the harvest to last "about two weeks more."

The Lariat gin has just installed a Moss lint cleaner.

**Morrison & Ely** (Monday, 10 a.m.)—2530 bales. At Bovina, an estimated one-half or more of the crop was in at that time. They have been "snowed under since last Friday." There were 390 bales on the yard then.

Three-fourths of the Bovina cotton is stripped. Hand-pullers are looking for jobs. Average yield is from one-half to three-quarters bale per acre.

M. L. Shipp, Muleshoe, reports 1 1/2 bale yield. Buddy Jones, near Oklahoma Lane, is getting a bale an acre on some of his cotton. He has gotten 276 bales from 400 acres—hand-pulled.

**Watkins' Gin, Farwell** (Wednesday 2 p.m.)—367 bales. Gin has now run about two weeks. 80 bales on yard at time of report. Mrs. Edith Reeve reports peak not yet hit, but 24-hour crew put on Tuesday.

Frank Seale, 1 mile south Farwell, getting over bale an acre on 18 acres irrigated cotton. Bunk and Glenn Phillips, 6 miles Northeast Farwell, getting bale an acre on some hand-pulled cotton.

**North Plains, Friona** (Monday, 11 a.m.)—2394 bales ginned, 230 on yard. Wright Williams, manager, says peak of harvest is now. He expects to taper off in another 10 days. Nearly all cotton stripped. Boll pullers hunting work. Best yield: C. A. Fields, 12 miles east Friona, four-fifths bale first go-over, about 1 1/4 total yield.

**Mills & Fleming** (Monday, 11:30 a.m.)—3288 bales ginned, 400 on yard. O. L. McMurtrey figured peak would come Tuesday. Estimated one-third crop in. Averaging 130 bales per day.

Yields: Wesley Long, 4 miles SW Hub, over bale acre, hand and stripper harvested. W. P. Elliott, 1 mile SW Hub, nearly bale an acre stripped. Newman Jarrell, 1 1/2 miles S Hub, averaging bale per acre.

**Watkins', Lazbuddy** (Monday, noon)—3586 bales, 500 bales on yard. Doyle Watkins, manager, says ginning at peak now, guessed "about half" of the cotton in. Ginning about 150 bales per day. R. J. Steinbock, 1 1/2 bales per acre on 320 acres, hand-pulled.

Twenty-first in a series of informative articles revealing little known facts about well known people in and around Texico-Farwell and nearby communities. Our sole purpose is to promote better acquaintances—in the hope of promoting better friendships.)



Mr. and Mrs. Ben Smart, owners and operators of the Furniture Mart in Texico have been in many occupations in their married life, having been in business here for the past five years. Their experiences in various fields of endeavor have been just as varied.

Inez, Mrs. Smart, was born in Oklahoma in Roger Mills County. Her father was a soldier in World War I at the time of her birth. After his return the family moved to Texas. Inez was about a year old at the time.

Mr. Leitner began work for Magnolia Co. after his discharge from the service. Inez then spent most of her childhood in Spearman. The family then lived in Dalhart during part of her high school days, and eventually moved to Amarillo. Inez went to school there her junior and senior year and received her high school diploma there. She was married the next year after her graduation from high school.

As for Ben, he was born south of Farwell in Roosevelt County, "just barely over the state line." He lived in this area until his graduation from Farwell High School in 1933. He had received all his schooling, first through eleventh grade, in the same school.

Upon graduation, Ben then went to Amarillo Junior College and was

graduated in 1935. He entered the University of Texas in Austin, and when he left there, he only lacked nine hours having a degree in Spanish. "I always said I would complete my college work, but I never have," he says.

He had attended school for one semester after his marriage. At that time, Betty, oldest child of the Smarts was a baby.

First meeting for the Smarts was one Sunday afternoon in Amarillo when Ben was in junior college, and Inez was in high school. The young people were riding around that afternoon and Ben's crowd had talked to the group with which Inez was associated. A mutual friend introduced them. They didn't see one another again until about a year later.

Inez was working at a candy counter and Ben was working as a campaigner for a man who was running for state representative. "He came by the counter and asked me if my name was Inez, then asked me for a date," she says. Ben adds that he could remember her first name, but not her last. After that, the young couple began dating, and were married at the home of her parents in 1937.

Ben worked for two years, before going back to the university. Betty was four months old at the time. Both the Smarts were enrolled in classes at the university. Clark Walling stayed with the Smarts, and the three arranged classes so one would be with the baby at all times.

Inez and Ben also had other boarders to help finance their education. "I was a house mother for boys who were older than I," says Inez. Ben says he had worked his way through both junior college and university work. He washed dishes to pay his way while he was in Amarillo, and was a stenographer while in Austin.

Before graduation however, Ben was offered a job with the Texas Prison System for stenographic work, and accepted. "I was as far back in

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the penitentiary as I could get without actually being an inmate," he continues. At one time, he had 13 trustees working under him. The Smarts stayed there for 16 months, but were forced to leave because the climate aggravated Ben's asthma and hay fever.

The local man then went to work for Soil Conservation service at Amarillo, and later began duties for Santa Fe Railroad. After a few months he was an employee of Pantex Ordnance Plant.

Back in 1943, the Smarts, in partnership with a friend of theirs, bought an irrigation farm. They remained there only four months, then sold out to their partner. "In that four months, I lost 25 pounds," says Ben, "then I went to work for Santa Fe again and gained it all back." They recall that while on the farm they "had never worked so hard in their lives." They cooked on an electric roaster and a coal oil stove, "and really had some good meals," says Inez.

Ben stayed with Santa Fe for two years after that, but then had a chance to buy into a cafe. He had always wanted to be in business for himself and immediately made the purchase. His business was in Amarillo and he remained there for 10 months. Business built up, and to save money, Ben learned to cook and cooked the meals for the cafe. When he sold out his cafe business, Ben had \$1000 and went into the furniture business with two friends in Amarillo. By this time, the Smarts had three youngsters.

"I asked my former partners why they picked me to go into the furniture business with them," says Ben, "and they said because I had \$1000." Partners were John McCauley, who now owns McCauley Furniture in Amarillo; and J. Sadbury, who owns Furniture Mart, also in Amarillo. The three men were in business together for three years. Ben stayed there a year of the time, then came to Texico to manage a branch. At the end of a year, the partnership was dissolved and Ben became sole owner of the local store.

When they first arrived in Texico-Farwell, Ben and Inez lived in a three-room house outside of Farwell. "It was at the end of the war," says Ben, "and you couldn't find a place to live. We had no bathroom in our house, drove an old pickup truck and often had to walk, and really felt like pioneers."

Ben recently branched out again, opening a store in Clovis this time, but sold out only last week to the store manager.

The Smarts now have four children: Betty, 13; Steven Dale, 8; Carol Gay, 6; and Linda Lou, 4.

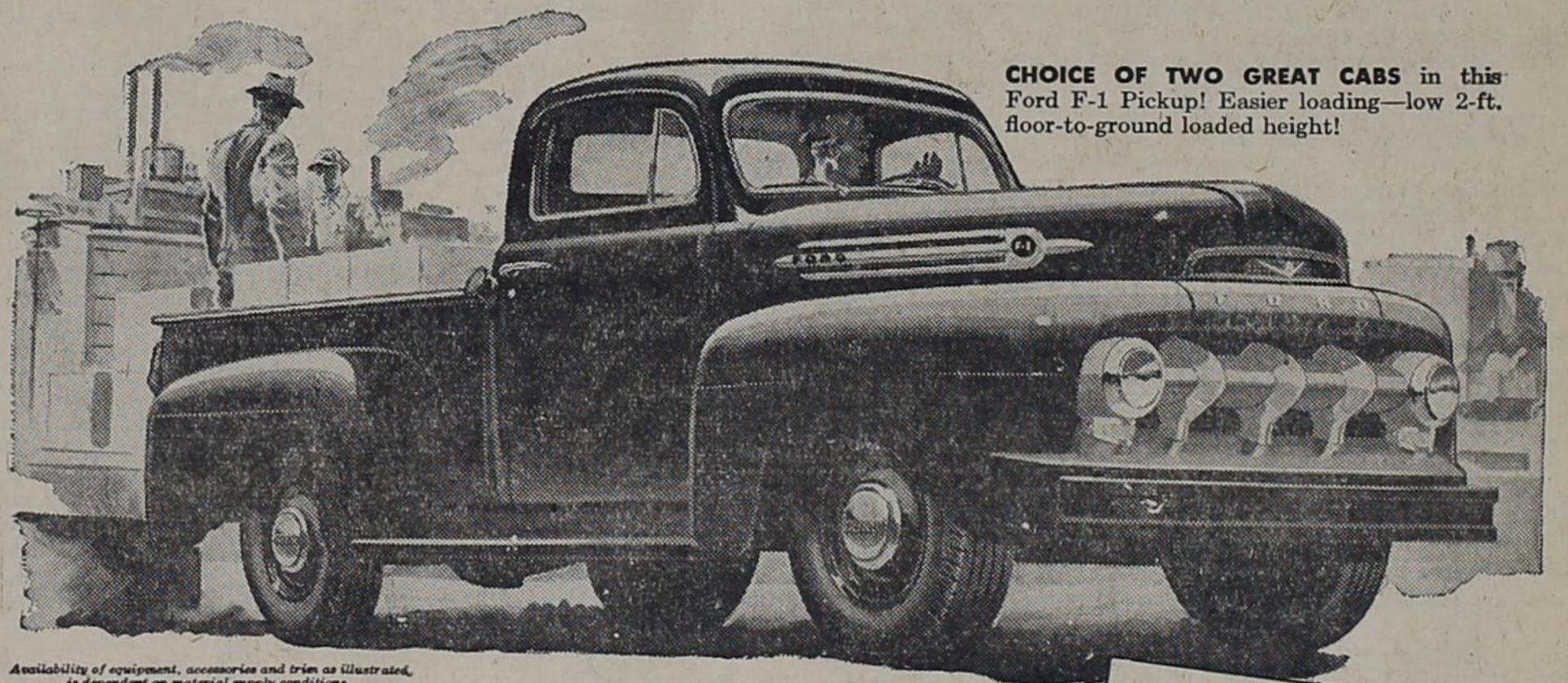

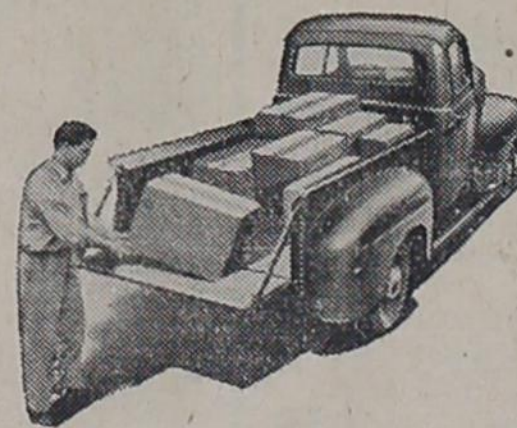

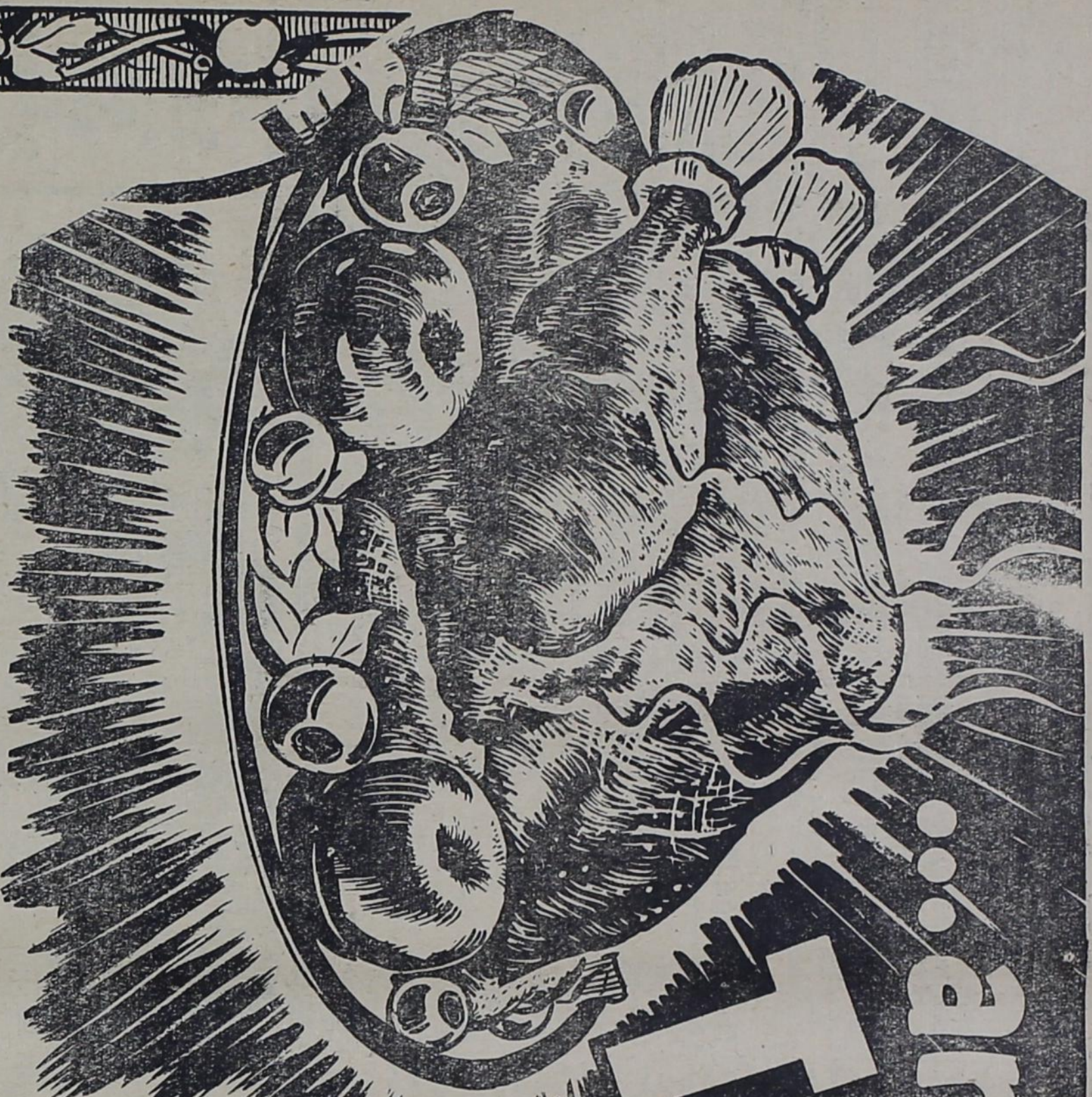

# USDA Estimates On 1952 Cotton Crop

A 1952 Texas cotton crop of 3,660,000 bales with an average yield of 174 pounds per acre was forecast by the Bureau of Agricultural Economics, U. S. Department of Agriculture, on November 10. This is 60,000 bales above the October forecast. It is expected that 10,114,000 acres of Texas-grown cotton will be harvested this year.

The forecast for the nation is for a 1952 crop of 14,905,000 bales or 492,000 bales above the October forecast. The average yield forecast for 1952 is 289.7 pounds of lint cotton per acre with 24,693,000 acres expected to be harvested.

The 1952 crop is expected to be about 1,000,000 bales short of the goal set for the nation and will not materially increase the amount of carry-over cotton at the end of the marketing season above the carry-over at the end of the 1951 marketing season.

B. F. Vance, State Production and Marketing Committee Chairman, reminds cotton growers that the cotton price-support program assures them of 90 per cent of parity for their cotton. In addition to support the price of cotton, the price support program provides assistance to growers who use it in orderly and systematic marketing of their crop.

Price supports on all eligible 1952 crop upland cotton is provided to eligible producers through loans and through purchase agreements. Growers who do not wish to obtain loans may be assured of price-support protection through purchase agreements, reports Joe Camp, PMA secretary.

Mrs. F. W. Ayres has been quite ill for the past few days.



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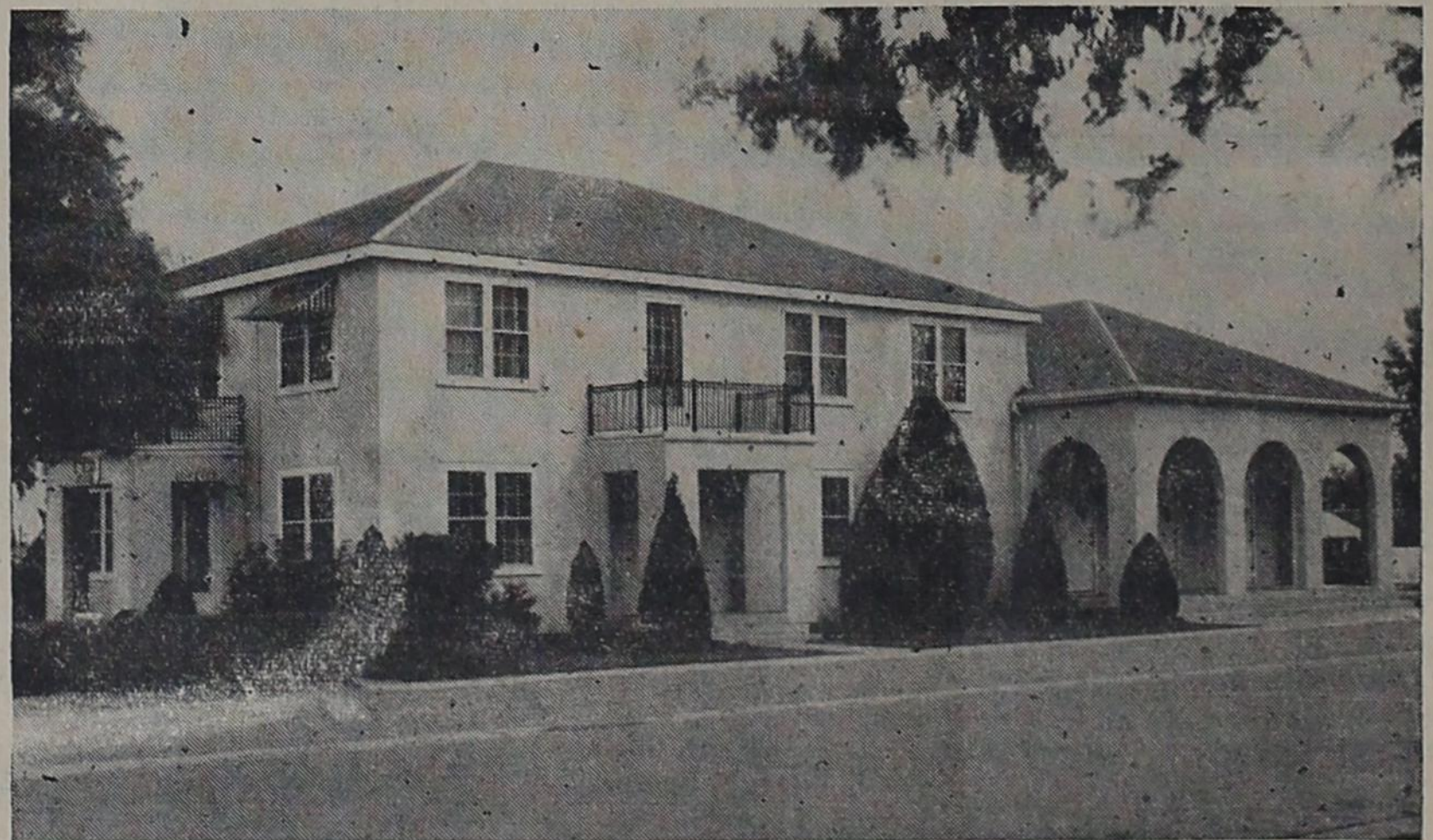
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
