First "Flying Saucers" Seen in Texico-Farwell

The first strange air-borne object seen by a large number of people, and referred to as a "flying saucer" for want of a better term, passed Texico-Farwell last Friday afternoon.

Scores of people stood in the street and gazed at a shining silver object hovering in the sky southwest of the Cities. As time wore on, about two hours of it, the "saucer" drifted eastward, and disappeared in an orange glow when the sun set.

A report from Clovis AAFB officially designated the "saucer" as a weather balloon. This report was generally accepted as an explanation by most citizens, but there are a few who stoutly maintain that it was not a balloon; they saw it giving off a bluish gas. A 1952 Texas cotton crop of 3,660,-000 bales with an average yield of 174 pounds per acre was forecast by the Bureau of Agricultural Economics, U. S. Department of Agriculture, on November 10. This is 60,000 bales pected that 10,114,000 acres of Texas-grown cotton will be harvested this year.



Fourteen hunts for six hunters with a perfect kill of 84 deer. This is the record of a company of local hunters who came back last week from their annual stalking with the usual number of handsome bucks.

Jack White, Grady Pierce, Arch Green, Mac Johnson, Claude Thomas, and Leroy Hunton are the hunters this year, and White is one of the group that has been making the trip 14 straight years.

"We've camped under the same tree every year . . . havent missed getting out deer yet." White got a 6-point buck the

third day out. Pierce got a 9, Green and Hunton 4's, and Johnson and Thomas 8-pointers. The deer are noticeably smaller this year, White reports.
