Cotton Acreage Cut To 28,239 for Parmer

Parmer County cotton growers got the jolt they had been expecting—and fearing—this week, with the announcement that the 1954 cotton acreage in the county will be reduced to 28,239.

This sounds bad enough in the face of the current planting, which was in the neighborhood of 95,000 acres, but it could have been worse. The base acreage over the five-year period (excluding 1949), was about 23,000 acres.

That 23,000 acres, reduced by

the national cutback of one-third, meant that Parmer County was entitled to only around 15,000 acres. An increase of 12,500 acres was permitted because of the county's recent heavy dependency on cotton as the number one cash crop.

The county's acreage, especially where drought has been severe, all of the allotments were not needed. Part of these unused allotments is where our county's extra 12,500 acres came from.

Individual allotments will be out shortly, probably in the mails by the tenth of this month. A cotton grower referendum, similar to the one held several months ago for the national wheat growers, will be scheduled Dec. 15.

The county's acreage allotment is to be based on the 1953 Parmer County cotton acreage. Under the cotton allotment system was in 1950, and the allowable acreage was about 5,000 acres.

WET WEATHER RETURNS TO AREA WEDNESDAY, WITH LIGHT RAINFALL

For the first time in several weeks, the people of this part of the Plains awakened Wednesday to find skies heavily overcast and a slow but steady rain descending. The Santa Fe depot reported 1/4 inch of rain.

The rainfall persisted until about mid-morning, when it stopped, and by noon, clouds were breaking up.

However, it remained partly overcast all day, and prospects seemed good for additional moisture.

This break was another shot in the arm for the healthy winter wheat of the county, and may give the last-minute boys a chance to sow a little more.

The drizzle put a halt to the frenzied cotton harvest, and stopped the combining of grain sorghums, although the latter crop is pretty much "in the bag" by now. However, cotton farmers report that they aren't in the least upset by the slight rainfall, for several reasons. The gentle fall of the rain will dampen the crop and stop harvesting, to be sure, but it isn't expected to hurt the grade.

In addition, it will give the county's hard-pressed gins a chance to try to catch up with the mammoth harvest. Most gingers are puffing behind from four to six days and yards are overflowing with loaded trailers. "This will give us a break on keeping some of our cotton in the county to be ginned," says Joe Jones, county agent. Quite a bit of ginning was being taken east and south simply because the rush in Parmer was too great.

More Social Security Whether You Like it or Not

Unimpeachable news sources have it that the president is out to broaden the scope of the Social Security program. Considering the political boiling that's understandable, but as usual, it looks like a lot of us are going to get it in the neck, wise whether we want it or not.

Mr. Eisenhower is requesting compulsory participation in the program for farm operators, farm workers, and doctors, lawyers, and other professions.

If you're a laborer or self-employed person, you already know the bitter pill of FOAB taxes, which wring dollars from your paycheck for "insurance" whether you want or need it or not.

If you work for wages, you can figure that the percentage of your check is going down the drain for Social Security. You pay 1 1/2 percent; so does your employer. However, how else can he afford this second 1 1/2 percent except as part of your wages? It is a real expense to him, the only difference being in who gets the money.

If you're self-employed, you really feel the pinch. Uncle Sam will notch you for 2 1/4 percent every buck you take in, up to \$3600. This means that most fellows in business for themselves pay per year out of their own earnings, besides paying for half (1 1/2 percent) of everything their employees owe on Social Security, and are forced to hold out and collect for Uncle Sam the other 1 1/4 percent from their hired hands' salaries!

Up for the same treatment soon will be the farmers, to name one group prominent in this area.

Here's our notion of Social Security: If it's such a wonderful thing, then why in heaven's name not let it be offered on a voluntary basis? We analyze retirement plans of private insurance companies, and decide that the government has nothing better to offer, then we would cut ourselves in. But no. We pay, whether we like it or not.

Revolution in Farming Appears Just Around the Corner

Prediction: If you think we had a big feed crop this year, brother, look out for 1954. The seasons are obvious. Farmer County farmers, cut back several weeks ago about one-fourth of their plowable wheat planting, have just been stabbed in the back—this time to the tune of a 60-percent slash in cotton planting for 1954 (as compared with the 1953 seeding).

This finds us unprepared to produce much more immediately on a large scale and with present equipment and facilities other than maize. The acres that stand idle next year are going to be mighty few unless the Department of Agriculture declares grain sorghums a basic commodity and imposes acreage allotments.

The milo crop next year will be nothing short of sensational if Farmer farmers are allowed to

slide to this grain crop.

It seems that chance or fate or something is constantly at work forcing farmers in this part of the country to revolutionize their methods. They have had little choice in the matter.

Sheer competition forced the tillers of the soil to turn old Dobbin into the stable for good and plunk down several thousand dollars to mechanize their operations.

The drought has forced a large number of farmers to invest—and sometimes gamble—in an irrigation venture. The government has worn the pants lately when it came time to decide what to grow and how much of it—up to a point, anyhow.

A revolution in farming is surely on the way for this area of the High Plains, and it need not of necessity be dreaded. The effect of opening up underground water resources has been good.

The situation of the farmer once again finding that he's going to have to "spread out" a little with the old reliable cow, sow, and hen population in order to stay in business may likewise have a sobering and stabilizing effect on our agricultural industry, and prevent its becoming overbalanced.

It's All Our Own

We don't regard ourselves as the world's greatest editorialists (and neither does anybody else), but we're mighty proud of one thing: Whatever you read in these few editorial paragraphs is 100 percent home-grown.

To our sorrow, there is an increasing tendency for a lot of newspapers to "lift," "pickup," and "borrow," ideas from somebody else. That is nothing short of laziness, if not plagiarism.

This is not to say that once in a while somebody else (usually close-by), expresses something so much better than we can that we re-print it for the enlightenment of our readers.

But this is indeed a rare occasion for us, and whenever we do, we are scrupulously careful to ascribe the article's authorship. Pardon us while we pat ourselves on our conceited backs.

If you think you're having a tough time of it, talk with some of the folks who have been writing to the boys now in South Korea.

A Tribune subscription makes a dandy Christmas present. If the recipient doesn't like the paper, you can at least have the satisfaction of knowing that we sure enjoyed spending the two and a half bucks.

To make date pudding, dissolve 3 cups of brown sugar in 3 cups of cold water, in deep baking dish. Set aside. Then sift together, 1 cup sugar, 1 cup flour, 1 teaspoon baking powder and a pinch of salt.

Add one cup sweet milk and one teaspoon vanilla to the dry ingredients. Then flour one cup, chopped dates, and one cup chopped pecans. Add to dough mixture. Drop the dough into the brown sugar and water without mixing the two. Bake 30 minutes, about 400 degrees.

The brown sugar mixture then makes a sauce for the pudding in the baking process.

Home Economics Building Completed On School Campus

Recently completed, the home economics building is the newest addition to the Bovina school system.

Spacious rooms, built-in cabinets, and beautiful interior decorations are the eye-catching features. There are six rooms, a large entrance hall, and two ladies' lounges. Natural woodwork, panel doors, and asphalt tile floors are used throughout the building.

The outside double doors in the front of the building are painted a bright yellow. These doors open into a large entrance hall painted a light shade of cocoa brown. A built-in display case, with glass sliding doors, covers one wall. Beige asphalt tile covers the floor. A drinking fountain stands in one corner.

In the large room adjoining the entrance hall, the same color scheme is used.

The sewing room is a pretty shade of pink on the walls, white ceiling, and beige tile on the floor. It is equipped with new sewing machines and has large closets with built-in drawers. The sewing tables have not been received as yet.

An adjoining room is done in light green. The outstanding feature of this room is a large sliding door closet.

Pastel blue walls, grey tile on the floors, and a large walk-in closet with built-in shelves completely around it, is the plan of another room.

Elaborately equipped and attractively designed is the huge kitchen. The lower half of the wall is done in white tile bordered in a deep shade of blue. Lighter blue is used on the upper wall with white ceilings and grey tile on the floors.

The kitchen is equipped with all new appliances including both gas and electric models. They consist of four stoves, two refrigerators, an electric dishwasher, deepfreeze, and three electric mixers.

Four double sinks line the outside wall surrounded by built-in cabinets painted white. A wide snack bar extends from the wall into the center of the room. The tops of the cabinet and snack bar are finished with white marbled tile.

Bright canary yellow is the color of the laundry room adjoining the kitchen. Grey tile covers the floor. The room is equipped with two new automatic washers and an electric ironer.

The building has a furnace room holding two large blower-type gas heaters.

Two ladies' lounges, one off the entrance hall and one adjoining the laundry, are most beautifully decorated. The front one has white tile on the lower half of the wall, bordered in black. The upper wall is finished in brilliant red. Built-in cabinets and drawers line one wall and are painted grey to match the woodwork and the tile floor.

The other lounge has grey tile bordered in red. The upper half of the walls is also done in grey, along with the woodwork, cabinets and floor.

The homemaking department was able to move into the new building on the school campus the first of last week. Although there is still much to be done to the building, they have the kitchen completed and the other rooms will be used this year as classrooms and will be furnished next year.

The girls are now working on linens for the new building and are busy washing windows, waxing floors, and getting everything into first class shape. They will serve food during the invitational basketball tournament and they are making preparations for this.

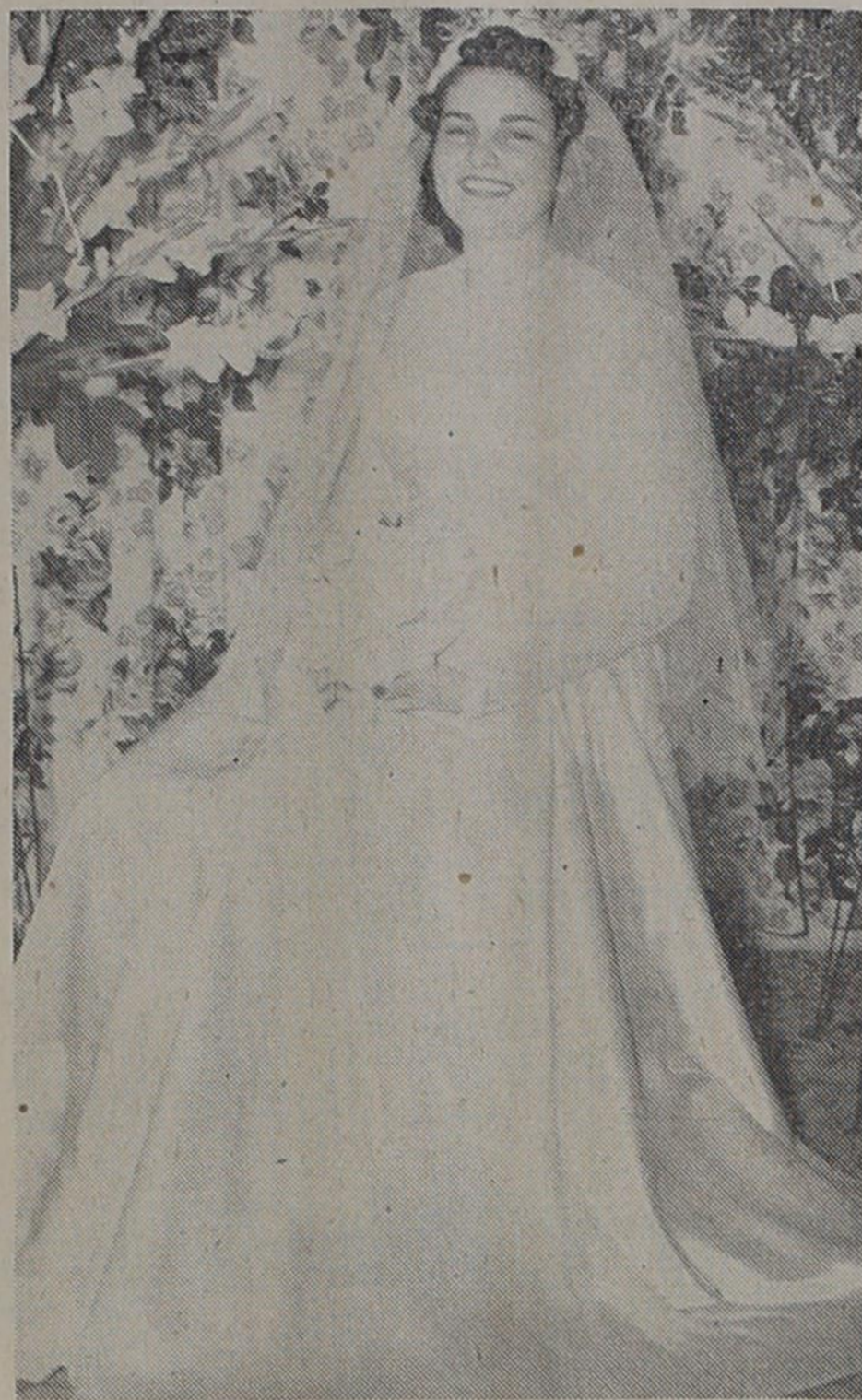

If you've never heard a parakeet talk, you haven't been in the Farm Bureau office lately.

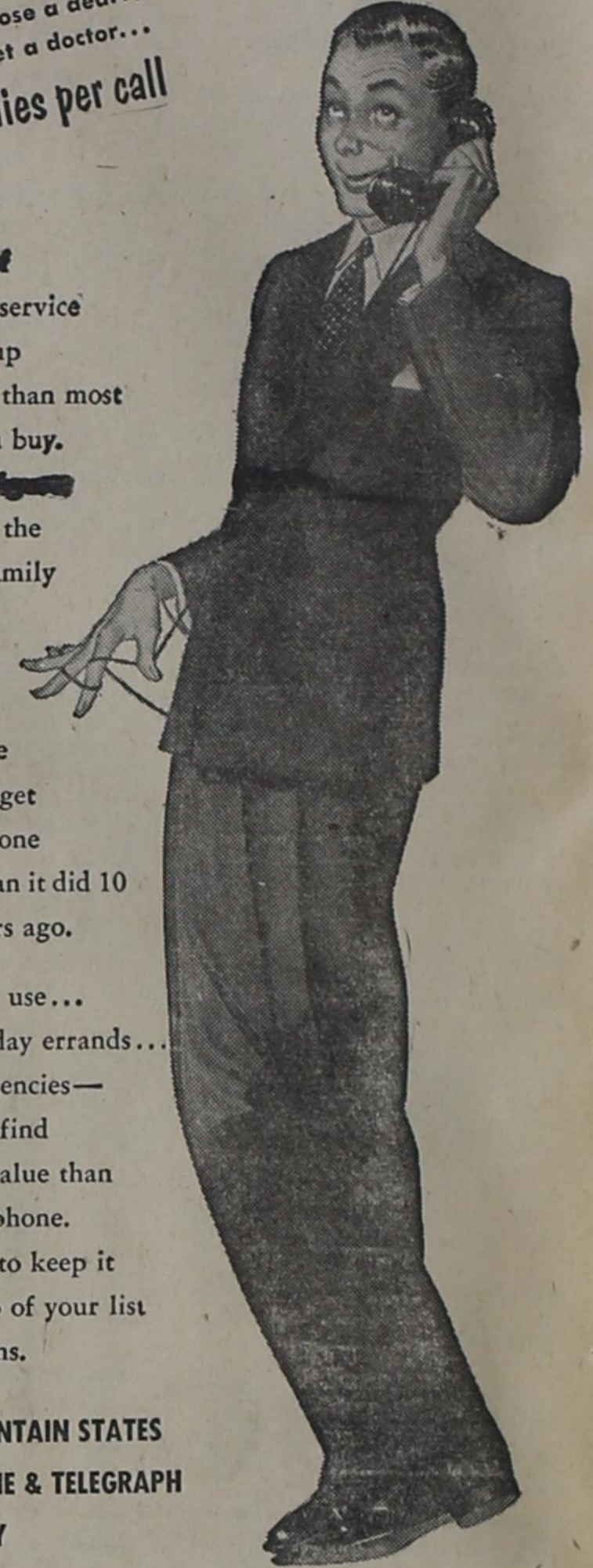
