Interest Revived In New Mexico **Draw Project**

Area residents will be pleased to learn that members of the Curry County Game Protective Association have not "given up the ghost" on their work for a dam across Running Water Draw northwest of Clovis.

Interest was at a high pitch two or three months ago, but the project was apparently about "knocked in the head" when an appropriation of \$100,000 by the State of New Mexico for the dam was turned back into the general fund.

Since that time, however, the GPA has not been at rest. It has footed a \$1500 bill to employ Bill Hayes, Lubbock geologist, to run additional tests to see if the project is worth pursuing.

Findings up until now are "80 to 90 per cent favorable," reports Hayes. He and a delegation of Clovis men returned last week from Santa Fe where they conferred with state engineer Bliss and Gov. Meachem regarding the work.

There is available \$600,000 in a fund for the purpose of constructing small dams for "wildlife and recreational" purposes, and it is from this source that the Curry County men hope to procure a \$175,000 appropriation to go ahead with their dam north of Clovis. No Feed Yet For Parmer Farmers

Where to Unload Will We Major **Problem for PMA**

Parmer County ranchers and farmers, taking advantage of an emergency government program to make available feed at about onehalf the current market prices, have made heavy applications to the PMA office in the past week.

But it appears that they are in for some waiting before any of the feed will begin arriving in the county. "We have no idea," said Joe Camp, PMA secretary, "when we will receive a shipment of the feed."

By Wednesday noon, 75 applications had been made, amounting to 100 tons cottonseed meal, 100 tons cottonseed pellets, 140 tons corn, and 140 tons of oats.

Camp said he will notify all those applying just as soon as he learns when the feed shipments will be made.

These shipments probably will originate from Lubbock, where Pvt. Jerial Doolittle most of the feed is in storage. "It takes time to process the orders," Camp said. "They probably will ship what they are able to, to





EDITORIAL COMMENT

Fewer, Not More, Subsidies **Are What We Really Need**

The hue and cry set up at Dalhart last Thursday by a group of hard-hit ranchers from five Southwestern states may snowball into what will amount to just another tentacle on the federal octopus. And whose fault will it be? The taxpayers themselves.

It is difficult to believe that the thinking of any group could so completely reverse itself in a period of less than one year, but that seems to be the case, because over 500 beef producers from Texas, New Mexico, Oklahoma, Kansas, and Colorado have broken tradition for the cattleman and gone looking for a federal handout.

It is a fact that the system under which the cowman today produces beef is unlike that of any other industry. He is forced to purchase his "raw goods" such as feed, equipment, and labor, at prices which are virtually static because they are price-supported. Then, when his product is ready for market, it is sold at whatever happens to be the prevailing notion of the meat-eating public-the world over.

Sometimes this system doesn't really work too badly. The past 15 years, it has worked marvelously well-for the cattleman. The trick was to keep the supply just under demand, thereby guaranteeing a high price.

Speculators in cattle have been remarkably successful in so doing. They might still be were it not for the burnedup ranges in the Southwest which forced beef off to market in droves.

Contrary to what a lot of people believe, the present rock-bottom price cowmen are getting is not the fault of the government. The cattleman produced himself out of lucrative prices-it's as simple as that.

There is a faint hope that the Department of Agriculture next year will introduce a brand new price support plan for grains, as well as other commodities.
