



call his work the "science of weather modification." His representative, J. Sam Allen of Lamesa, wrote The Tribune this week after noticing an article several weeks ago to the effect that it was quite likely Plains people are "mining" their underground water resources.

Allen appears to be anxious to visit Parmer County and talk the matter over with any farmers, ranchers, or businessmen who might be interested.

In support of his work, Allen sent The Tribune a large number of newspaper clippings, both editorials and news stories, from papers published in Amarillo, Abilene, Lubbock, and San Angelo. All of these clippings lend support to the idea of increasing rainfall through the methods used by the Krick organization.

THE TRIBUNE'S EDITORIAL COMMENT

A Few Thoughts on the Truce With the Communists

Few indeed were the serious-thinking persons of America who did not breath a prayer of gratitude for the signing of a truce ending more than three years of holocaust on the Korean penninsula.

Irregardless of whatever mortifying concessions may have had to be made by the United Nations to effect the armistice, the thousands of mothers, fathers, wives and children of men who have been fighting in Korea are thankful today—thankful that their loved ones will no longer be maimed and killed by fanatical, brutal orientals who despise the very word "American."

This newspaper joins its voice to the millions whose thanks have gone up to the Almighty in a spirit of thanksgiving. It is truly wonderful that men have lain down their arms in Korea and bloodshed—on a big scale, at least—has halted. But the stark facts of what has been given for

this armistice, and what is yet before us on the road to peace, soon sobers the mind of Americans. When the truce was signed Sunday, there was no blowing of whistles, no honking of horns, no shouting, no running amuk in the streets. Even in large cities where mob hysteria could be expected following such a momentous event, there were

no demonstrations. No cheering.
Only sober faces. Most of them skeptical. Some of them sarcastic. What could you expect of a people who have time and again seen their country-the most powerful in the world-led like a homesick cow into the clutches of communist de-

We do not condemn the administration for accepting the terms of the armistice. Perhaps we should, but when we put ourselves in their shoeshaving the power to end the killing of American boys-we are afraid that we too would have agreed

to any conditions save surrender without honor.

We are sorry to report that in five years from now, we fully expect to look back on the signing of this armistice as one of the worst concessions we could ever have given the communist world. But for the present, well, it's wonderful just to look at the world through rose-colored glasses and naively believe the salughter of America's youth has ended.

Burnett Dairy Herd Classified

RIBBONS TO SPARE

One of the most important steps in the progress of Parmer County dairying-if not the entire statewas made last week, when the Brown Swiss herd of D. C. Burnett was classified by a man ranking high among the nation's dairy animal authorities.

Of the more than 120 Brown Swiss herds in the state of Texas, Burnett's is the only one which has received the distinction of being graded.

Aside from the importance of the classification itself, residents of this area will be proud to learn that the Burnett herd rated exceptionally well. Of 23 animals classified, lowest grading was "fair," and this mark recorded on only two cows.

On the other hand, Burnett's prize animal, Silver Creek Florence, rated a "very good" score; 10 cows "good, plus"; and 10 "good."

County Agent Joe Jones, in explaining the system of classifying, pointed out the strictness with which grades are recorded. "An animal is graded against 'perfection," he said.

The judge, one of the very few men qualified to grade five breeds of dairy cattle, was F. W. Atkeson of Kansas. His ratings are considered official to all dairy associations.

Others on hand to participate in the judging included Marvin Cruse, Brown Swiss field director of Beloit, Wisc.; O. C. Rose, secretary of the Texas Brown Swiss Assn,. Amarillo; and Martin Fulcher, a Brown Swiss dairyman formerly of Black, but now residing in Lubbock.

Burnett, whose Brown Swiss herd numbers about 50 registered cows has been working with the breed since 1947. He has lived south of Friona since 1922, moving
