tic (a decrease of about seven million acres), and there is speculation that he will recommend Congress increase that to 21 million. The percentages in the FB formula would automatically result in a figure of around 21 million acres of cotton, and for this reason, farm leaders feel they have a good chance of swinging Benson's favor to their program.
