No Water Rationing Necessary With Use Near 1,000,000

Although Texico and Farwell water users are drawing down somewhere around 1,000,000 gallons of water on some of the hot days which they are having, no water rationing is in prospect for this summer.

V. C. Venable, water superintendent for the Texico-Farwell Waterworks, says that the 1200 gallons per minute which the plant can deliver under pressure is just about what it takes to supply the cities.

It is common for him to have to pump 18 hours per day, and this would mean an output of 1,296,000 gallons in a period of time. For storage, the company has 160,000 gallons in two tanks.

108 Degrees Read At AT & SF Depot

NEWS FROM THE FARM BUREAU

"In my opinion, there can be no definite change in the trend toward centralized, federal government, until the citizens of the states accept their obligations, duties and responsibilities by participating in the formulation and enforcement of laws," said Senator Andy Rogers at the Bovina Farm Bureau meeting Monday night. This statement was made after Mr. Rogers had pointed out the fact that Texas ranks third among states for self supporting taxes for state administration. The other two receive their revenue principally from gambling, contributed to by out-of-state people.

Ellison reported to the people on the action of Texas Farm Bureau President Walter Hammond last week when USDA again agreed to make loans on wheat temporarily stored in the open. The action this time was necessary because of actual storage shortages, and the market for wheat was dropping drastically. In 1949, the same action was taken to thwart the efforts of some grain dealers to buy wheat cheap while they claimed there was short storage space. The market immediately began to rise.

Reviving the "good old days" when Plains folks used to get together from a large area for a leisurely session of good times and relaxation, the Bovina Lions are sponsoring a big picnic and play day on Saturday, July 4th, designed to attract people from all over the county.

It is the most extensive program of the Community-wide type recreation announced in several years, and a large crowd is anticipated for the events which will begin at 4 o'clock.

Nothing fancy or formal is planned, the Lions relying on the old familiar stunts such as softball, terrapin, potato, and sack races, an old fiddlers' contest, a rolling pin contest, and a contest to see who can make the biggest mess with bubble gum.

The afternoon and evening of fun will be conducted on the Bovina school grounds, where facilities for all the mentioned activities will be prepared.

A picnic lunch will be eaten by participants beginning at 7 P. M. as they rest from the afternoon's games and prepare themselves for the evening contests.

Tables will be set up under the schoolground trees, and lemonade and ice water will be furnished by the Lions. They request, however, that those who attend bring their own lunches and cups.

Musical entertainment by local talent will be provided, and there will be cash prizes awarded the winners of the contests. Other games, as well as a schedule of events, will be listed in next week's Tribune.

Committeemen for the day include W. H. Willoughby and Bedford Caldwell, games; Al Kerby, hillbilly band and old fiddlers' cofest; Rev. M. D. Durham, quartet; C. R. Elliott, dinner arrangements; and Gene Ezell, lemonade and ice water.

No Increase Felt In Telephone Rates In Texico-Farwell

Telephone rental rates, which are on the increase in New Mexico again, have not been raised for the Texico-Farwell exchange, says W. H. Strickfaden, Clovis manager of Mountain States Telephone Co.

However, he was careful to emphasize that this was true at the present time only, and did not mean that rates would not be raised here eventually.

The New Mexico State Corporation Commission turned down the company's application for an increase last weekend, but the action had no legal "teeth" and the company has gone ahead with its rate increase, which became effective Tuesday, June 23.

So, Clovis and other New Mexico cities are receiving increases immediately, but the rate here will remain the same, at least temporarily. The reason for this is because of the unique state line-straddling position of Texico-Farwell, which means that it is necessary for rate increases to be sought through the Federal Communications Commission as well as the New Mexico SCC.

Files have been made with each of these bodies, Strickfaden said, but he has no idea how long it will be before a ruling is handed down.

In the meantime, the SCC in all probability will seek an injunction from the New Mexico Supreme Court to deny the increases already on the books for New Mexico subscribers. And while this process is going on, revenue from the increase will go into an escrow fund awaiting the decision of the Supreme Court.

Better Keep An Eye Out For the Family Budget

Private financing has come a long, long way in the last 25 years. It has gotten so easy to buy things on time that a lot of honest, hard-working people find themselves up to their necks in hot water in no time at all.

The suggestion, "no money down, 48 months to pay the balance" sounds mighty inviting to the low-income folks who would like to have some of the nicer things of life.

As a matter of fact, the financing plans which are offered the buying public have been a real help for getting families started in fairly respectable surroundings.

But the old human weakness of wanting more than can be paid for has proved disastrous many, many times in the face of such temptation.

Credit is just like a lot of other things today: Used moderately and with understanding it is one of the best things in the world. But when it is used to excess it can very easily wreck homes, businesses, and lives.

We've a Friend in Washington

Usually such titles as "secretary to the assistant secretary" give us a pre-conceived idea that anybody who would be one is a bureaucratic so-and-so in our national government.

Sometimes, that's true, we think, but there's one fellow in Washington with a high-flung title you want to remember: Lindsay Warren, who is Comptroller General in charge of the General Accounting Office.

It's his job to turn up all sorts of financial mis-cues in the federal government, and he's done a pretty good job of it. For example, he ran onto a case in which the U. S. paid an aircraft manufacturer \$9,972,000 more than it had coming.

Not everything is in big figures, though. He got back for the taxpaying public 50 cents which a government employee had used to pad his expense account.

We understand that he isn't a very popular man in Washington, but he certainly should have a lot of friends out here on the Plains.

Pastor and Builder To Head New Church

"People are going to build. We have no choice; but we do have the choice of what we build: more churches or more penal institutions," says Rev. Dewey Horton.

Rev. Horton, who has devoted his ministry to building churches, has accepted the position of new pastor of a new church, the recently-organized Farwell Baptist church. To help in their work, the Baptists will have a new building in which to have worship services and church programs. Rev. Horton who for the past few years has been architect for Southern Baptist association drew the plans for the building.

Rev. Horton's ministry began quite early in his life. One of his more memorable experiences came when he was only 22 years of age and speaking to 613 boys at Oklahoma State Reformatory at Granite. His audience was made up of young men between 18 and 21, boys about his own age. He learned that of the entire group, only thirteen were enrolled in Sunday School and only two were regular attendants.

It was at this time that Rev. Horton decided something was missing in the building program of most churches and decided to de-

vote his ministry to bulding churches. With about \$1 worth of dime store drawing tools, Rev. Horton in two and one-half years, opened church doors for Texans, Oklahomans and New Mexicans.

The new pastor is architect, evangelist, poet, carpenter, and salesman. Although he draws complete sets of plans from which standard blueprints are made, he has never owned a set of archi-

tect's tools. He hasn't had a course in architectural engineering but by figuring and drawing in the the school of experience, he has netted plans for over 1700 Baptist churches.

His conviction that attractive room church buildings make a difference is shown in results after a new church is constructed. Rev. Horton says that "God is no respecter of persons", explaining that it is not His will that country people worship in shacks, barns or dilapidated school houses.

Not only has Horton drawn plans for churches, but he learned to help congregations "cut corners" on building costs. First, plans cost them nothing, for the minister pays the blueprint fee. Included in a set of plans, is an estimate of the entire cost of material and approximate cost of labor.

He saves money in the material used not by using poor quality but by his established contacts over the state of Texas—men who cooperate by selling materials to churches at cost. Then members raise the building money. As for labor, "one of the best ways to develop Christian fellowship" says the pastor, is to work together on a new building. When man has put own sweat into an effort, he cherishes the product with more loyalty and zeal.

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Street Methodist church in Amarillo for 15½ years before beginning his assignments as architect.

Immediately after the experience in the reformatory, Rev. Horton had begun his building of churches, and about five years later, the Lord revealed to him that he would build in great numbers. But it was about six years ago, when the Texas Baptist State Board asked him to give up his church and devote his entire time to building of churches. He set his goal—"to assist in 50 buildings a year". But he underestimated the need. "In six years," he says, "I have had the privilege of helping begin and complete nearly 1800 churches, primarily in Texas, but also in New Mexico, Arizona, California, Kansas, Missouri, Oklahoma, Louisiana and Colorado."

However, Rev. Horton felt that he would be in the work only about five years, and at the beginning of this year, felt that he would again go into the pastorate. Through the providence of the Lord, I decided to come here, he states.

It will take a few weeks for the pastor to conclude his commitments, and after moving here, he will help any churches nearby who want his assistance.

Members of the new church decided Wednesday night to have a move-in and offering day the first Sunday in August, although the building won't be completed, the fellowship hall with 225 seating capacity will be in use.
