Growers Fear Sharp Cutback in Acreage By W. H. GRAHAM Jr.

We've nothing official on it as yet, but anybody who knows anything about the outlook of Texas and Parmer County cotton for 1954 is expecting a severe allotted acreage setback next month, when individual quotas will be passed

Nationally, acreage has been reduced from about 24,000,000 to 17,000,000 acres. That's a national decrease of roughly 30 per cent. Comparable reductions are expected for state quotas, and of course, on down to county and individual



A Thought for Thanksgiving

In this bountiful country called America, where well-fed, well-clothed citizens are laying plans for a lavish Thanksgiving feast in a few short days, a square meal is seldom regarded as a luxury.

But it's not that way in some other parts of the world.

Word is coming back to the people of the United States-even Texico-Farwell and other small cities-of the pitiful plight of millions of South Korean people who have had their homes, the families, and their possessions taken from them.

For them, the future holds nothing but an empty belly, a shivering back, and a broken heart. They did not ask for war, yet war has come, and left behind it one of the worst-wrecked countries in the history of the world.

JeDon Porter, a local man, is stationed with the U.S. Army in central Korea. He is only a few short miles north of Seoul, caital of South Korea. He is in command of a company in an outpost near the neutral zone between North and South Korea.

His letters home tell of the indescribable misery of the Korean people. They are penniless, unclothed, and hungry. They are facing another terrible Korean winter without sufficient shelter, let alone clothing and food.

To Mrs. Mae Porter, he writes, "Mother, you simply cannot imagine the teririble conditions which these people face. Whatever you can get together-clothes, canned food-send it over and I'll see that these people get it."

She has responded with several shipments. Two or three organizations in town have also, but the need is far greater than these.

In Porter's company are several South Korean soldiers - "ROK'S." Their wages, says the local man, are eighteen cents per month." That's not dollars, but CENTS.

Before you sit down to another hot meal . . . before you buy a new winter overcoat . . . before you adjust yourself in a comfortable reading chair while the cold wind whips by your window . . . think of the people in the world who have not been so fortunate.



Secretary Benson Is The **Agriculture Whipping Boy**

The year of 1953 is almost at a close, and with ongressional elections once again coming forth ar, the political mud-slinging has already egun. There is always a certain amount of this ctivity in a two-party political system, we'll admit, bers of Farmers Union is shameful. Secty. Benson ut it looks like the boys are getting down to busness now.

One of the most severly castigated figures in govmment has been Secty. of Agriculture Ezra Benon. His reputation as a competent administrator as been so undermined by his political enemies hat he had just as well have been accused of being sympathy with the communist party by Sen. Joe IcCarthy.

A lot of people are predicting Secty. Benson is ot long for his cabinet post. We predicted it quite while back, though we never said we wanted him quit. It was simply an appraisal of the situation we saw it. Now things are looking worse for him very day.

Secty. Benson is a devoted individual. He was a ader in Church work (Mormon) when called to be ecretary of agriculture. He accepted his post only fter the insistance of President Eisenhower.

Secty. Benson, contrary to what is being cirulated, never guaranteed high prices for farm roducts when he came into office. Neither did e party which appointed him.

Secty. Benson is dedicated to a high level of agcultural prosperity, or as Sen. Hope of the agculture committee puts it, he will do everything e believes to be right to maintain this high level. It just so happens that Secty. Benson has never ccepted the philosophy that rigid farm support rices are desirable for either the nation or the griculture industry. His veiwpoint is that supports nould be used to avert disastrous market conitions, but he doesn't think any farmer should be nconditionally guaranteed a high profit for what e produces. Neither do we.

The caravan of farmers and ranchess that marchd on Washington recently represented a radical gment of American agriculture. We believe this spite of the fact that the move was conceived nd motivated by a nationally-prominent farming organization.

Typical of the asinine reasoning that was taken to Washington by the caravan was the statement of one man, "Benson, if you don't support cattle prices at 100 percent of parity right quick, you're as Parmer and Adjoining sure as hell going to hear from me and a lot of my friends".

The unreasonable attitude taken by many memis frank to say he knows of no way in which live cattle may be supported. You can't store a cow for three years in a concrete elevator.

To date no one has been smart enough to figure out what to do with surpluses of perishable commodities-save shooting cows and letting them rot. Secty. Benson has presented a plan for partial reorganization of the agriculture department. His ideas have drawn fire more because they were not completely understood than for any other reason. The key to a great many of our problems todayboth large and small-is understanding.

We who depend upon Agriculture for a livlihood have reached the time when we must "hang together or hang separately." When the farmer goes broke, business and labor go broke, too. That is a fact of history.


Now we have many problems in agriculture that affect all people in Parmer County. One of these immediate problems is the drastic cut in cotton allotments.

The national cotton allotment, at present, calls for a cut to 17,910,448 acres. It is proposed that this cut will allow production of 10,000,000 bales next year and wipe out the surplus. We of Farm Bureau say these figures are in error, as consideration was not given for cotton that would have been planted except for the drouth, and cotton that will not be harvested because of floods and other unavoidable disasters. Allotment of 17,000,000 acres cannot be expected to produce 10,000,000 bales of cotton. We advocate that we can plant 22,500,000 acres of cotton and STILL lower the surplus 2,000,000 bales. This increase would mean an increase in allotments for Texas from 7,304,000 acres to 8,989,600 acres, a gain of 1,635,600 acres.

Based on a yield of 200 lbs. per acre, and a price of \$150 per bale, this increase would have an approximate value of \$98,136,000 to Texas Cotton Producers. Parmer County would profit greatly by this increase of 20 to 30 per cent. Each acre is worth about \$60.

To you fellows who are not Farm Bureau Members: Numbers mean strength when it comes to legislative matters like this. There are now 550 paid up members in Parmer County, including business members. There are about 777 farmers in the county, which indicates that about 250 of you are not backing the attempt to obtain an equitable adjustment in this matter. \$10 membership dues right now could mean money to you and your neighbor next year.

Farm Bureau is the only organization in Parmer County, or in Texas, that can or will help you in problems of this nature, and many others. Each new






