# JUNIOR LIVESTOCK SHOW IS SATURDAY



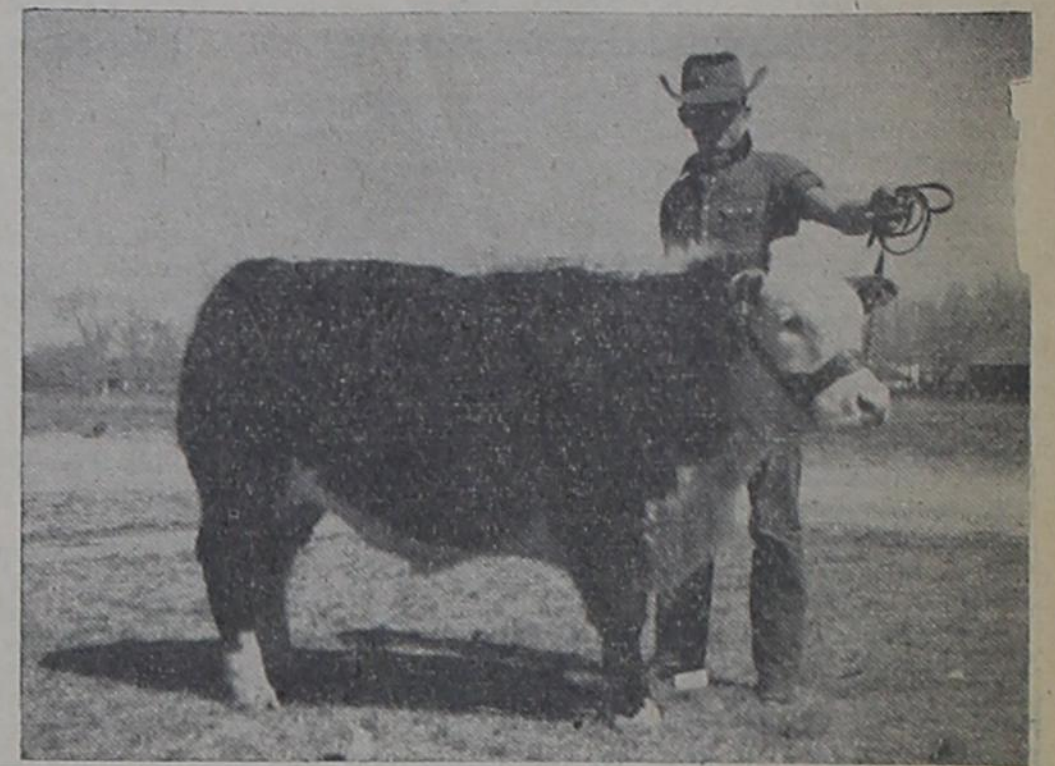
Parmer County's younger generation of farmers—the future leaders of the prime industry in this area—will show their wares at the annual county Junior Livestock Show in Friona Saturday.

allotments. Bruce Parr, president of the legislative committee, reported on the state lawmaking matters, reminding that the Texas Farm Bureau supported 30 measures, of which 21 passed; opposed six, of which none passed.

Raymond Euler, county service representative, and Ellison staged a question-and-answer session devoted to Farm Bureau insurance programs, and Parr introduced the speaker for the evening, Johnny Lynn of Radio Station KGNC in Amarillo.

Lynn entered into a very informal address, and with tongue in cheek, chided his listeners several times during the evening with gentle humor.

"I just got out of the Air Force," he told them, "and you know, I discovered a lot of changes had taken place when I got home." He paused, then said wonderingly, "I even heard that some farmers were buying their milk in town."

He developed his theme, saying it was his opinion that the farmers are "losing sight of some of the fundamental laws of economics." Lynn reminded his listeners that "the only true wealth is the good earth. All we have in this world comes from timber and crops grown on the earth, or minerals beneath it."

The speaker spoke sternly to the audience when he reminded them of the responsibility they had as Farm Bureau members. It was their duty, he told them, to keep themselves informed about what was going on in the world.

Lynn touched on other subjects, including the national debt, conservation of natural resources, and gearing farm output to demand.

He concluded his talk with "off the cuff" remarks about some of his experiences as a jet pilot in the Air Force.

## Oklahoma Lane Farmers All Pitch In To Help Neighbor in Time of Distress

Things were looking pretty rough for the Eph Young family of Oklahoma Lane three weeks ago when Mrs. Young fell from a truck near the farm home and was seriously injured.

The heavy vehicle passed over her legs, and in addition, she received a spinal injury when striking the ground.

For a while, her condition was regarded as critical, and for that reason, it was a case of stopping all the farm work for the Young family—and just as spring plowing time was upon them, too.

She has been receiving treatment in Amarillo, and her condition was such that Mr. Young, known as "Eph," had to stay at her bedside. She is reported to be improving now, however, and the family friends say they think she'll be all right in time.

Meanwhile, as all this anxiety hung over the family, the neighbors of the Oklahoma Lane community were not standing idly by. Last week, for instance, about half a dozen of Eph's neighbors knocked off from duties of their own, brought their tractors to his fields, and started work—all of them together. Within a matter of two days they had his land in good shape.

## Contracting Schedule Is Announced For Natural Gas Line To West Camp

March 17 was set as the date that a contractor will move in to start laying a natural gas pipeline south from the Pioneer Gas Company's main line near the Oklahoma Lane underpass to the West Camp area, a distance of about eight miles.

R. M. Curry of the company made the announcement that the company has completed the right-of-way easements for the line, and "barring bad weather or other unforeseen difficulties, the contractor will be moved in to start work March 17."

The line, referred to as the "West Camp Irrigation Feeder Line," has been causing considerable comment in the past few weeks, as have other similar projects that have been started elsewhere in the area.

The gas company propositions farmers to get together and agree for a minimum number of guaranteed tie-ons in certain areas, then lays a main, and it is the responsibility and expense of the individuals to hook on.

Johnie Williams, Farwell, one of the landowners involved in the West Camp project, said this week that most of the participants are "well satisfied" with the way the plan is going to work, adding that over 82,000 feet of tie-on line is now on order.

## Burglars Work Drug, Elevator

Parmer County's siege of burglaries continued unabated this week, as two more county businesses were broken into and entered, and one reported a loss of over \$1000 as a result.

Bovina Drug, owned by Frank Truitt, was entered some time Sunday night. Burglars rolled the office safe out the back door into the alley and were slick enough to "pick the lock," according to Truitt, who says the safe had been secured. Entry was gained through the back door of the drug store.

Cash and checks were removed from the opened safe. The preceding month's bus receipts, which were in the safe, represented the principal cash loss, Truitt says.

He added, "If anybody remembers giving me a check between February 26 and March 7, I'd sure appreciate it if they'd stop payment on the check and issue me another one."

The owner said he had insurance in the amount of \$740 which would partly cover his loss.

Elevator Hit, Too During the same night, Larist Grain and Seed Company's elevator office was entered, a small strong box was removed, and the next day law enforcement officials reported the box found about 2 1/2 miles east of the community.

The box had been opened, but nothing had been removed, according to Boone Allison, elevator manager, who said no cash was in it. However, the box contained valuable papers, including warehouse receipts, which remained intact.

A window of the office was smashed and the night latch on the front door was released, allowing the thugs to enter. O. D. Jenkins, employee, discovered the break-in Monday morning.

Saturday night, Elton Venable of Bovina had a spare tire stolen from his car. Whether this has any connection with other crimes in the area is unknown.

Rose Loot Returned A large portion of the merchandise stolen from Rose Drug & Gift in Farwell two weeks ago has been recovered by Sheriff Chas. Lovelace, who went to Laredo last week to question three persons who were figured to be involved in the robbery.

Claude Rose, owner of the burglarized business, estimates that "about half" of the loot—as far as value is concerned—has been recovered. He said "about two-thirds" of the total number of stolen articles have

# THE TRIBUNE'S EDITORIAL COMMENT

## Water Will Hold Key For Southwest Development

That the abundance of or lack of water resources is to be a number one factor which will determine the extent of development of most areas of the Southwest, including this one, is a statement being made by more and more economists every year.

In seeking ways to overcome this limitation, we have heard advanced what could easily be considered as some "far-fetched" ideas about conserving and holding water resources of this part of the country. One in particular has been the "Gulf coast development project"—already looked into by the Bureau of Reclamation, in which it is proposed that a gigantic canal be constructed along the coastal plain of the Gulf area of Texas. This canal would extend from east Texas, clear on around in a southwesterly direction to the southern tip of the state.

The canal would be designed to carry water from the abundant rainfall area of East Texas to the arid and arid parts of southwest and south Texas. How this plan would affect we of the High Plains, perhaps more important than might be supposed. The idea is no more far-fetched or impractical than was the controlling of the mighty Colorado River with Hoover Dam, and the intricate and vastly expensive aqueduct system constructed to carry fresh water to the rapidly-developing areas of Southern California. Los Angeles would not be the third largest US city if it had not been for the construction of this dam. Neither would the Imperial Valley of California be the nation's leader in production of fruits and vegetables.

The proposed canal in the Gulf area of Texas would not directly affect the economy of we here on the High Plains, but its indirect action might be vastly significant. Such a canal, if tried and proven successful, might set a precedent for large-scale development of many other areas of the US, including our own.

Just last week, Guy Jackson, president of the Texas Water Conservation Association, suggested that it might be ideal to construct a system of diversionary canals from the Missouri and Mississippi Rivers (both of which carry far more water than it is possible for the territories through which they flow to make use of) toward several natural watercourses in North Texas which at the present are seldom used at maximum capacity.

What else might be proposed is sheer speculation, but one thing seems to stand out clearly: until such time as future years, with their scientific development of engineering technique, make available an abundance of water for all of the Southwest, we had better be scrupulously careful of our underground supplies—without which our farmlands would now be a desolate, drifting wasteland.

In the biographical sketches of the county's teachers last week, we noticed that several of them expressed themselves as being acutely aware of the teacher pay proposition.

## We Need Tax Reductions Now, But Not for Coupon Clippers

As this is an election year, and both parties are stumbling over themselves to come out first with a problem most pleasing to the taxpayers and hence the voters, there is at the present time a race between the Demos and Republicans for the sponsorship of tax-reducing bills.

Three major tax fields have been shown likely for a reduction next year; and they shape up like this: an increase in the personal exemption allowance of from \$600 to \$700 or \$800, a decrease of about ten percent in the taxes on corporate earnings paid through dividends, and the proposed reduction or elimination of several heavy excise taxes.

As to our sentiment in the matter, we heartily concur that all of these proposed revisions are needed, but we think first things should come first. Raising personal exemptions should head the list, we feel, because it is here that the most ridiculous assessment has been made, on the assumption that it is possible for us to feed and cloth ourselves and our children for \$600 a year per person. Anyone who examines the family bills knows better than that. Double the amount would be more reasonable.

We can see the case of the corporations, too, who are in fact suffering from "double" taxation. The company's earnings are taxed heavily, and then the profits that are passed out as dividends are again assessed individuals as taxable personal income. However, we think that this need is secondary to personal exemptions, because by and large, the persons who are receiving dividend payments from stock companies are not the persons who rely wholly on those payments for their livelihood.

We suggest to the national legislature: let's go forward first with a more sensible approach to personal exemptions before cutting taxes for big business!

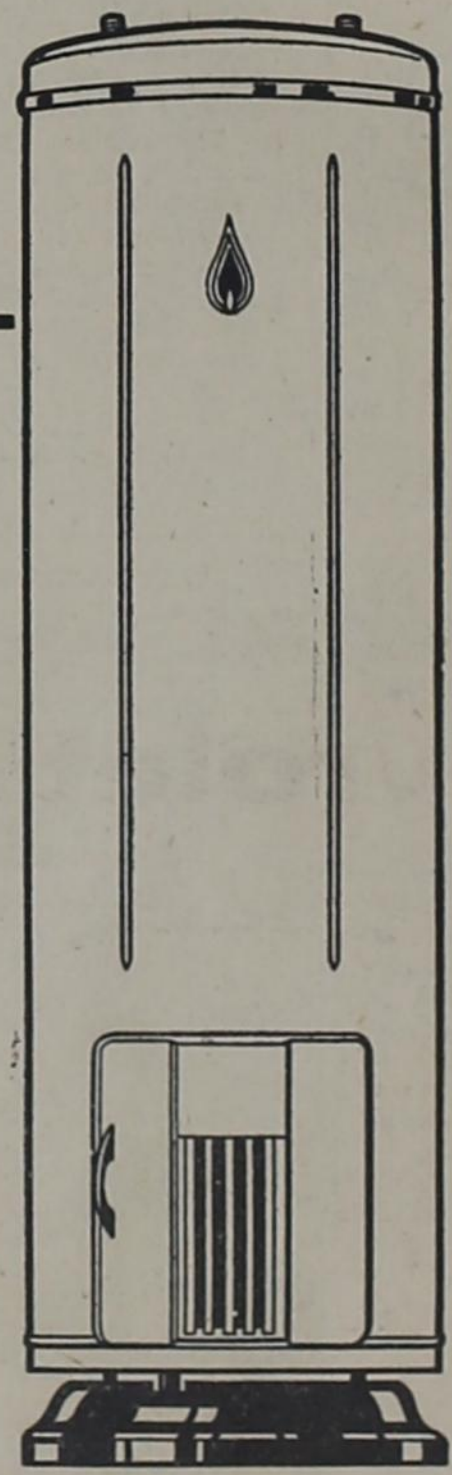

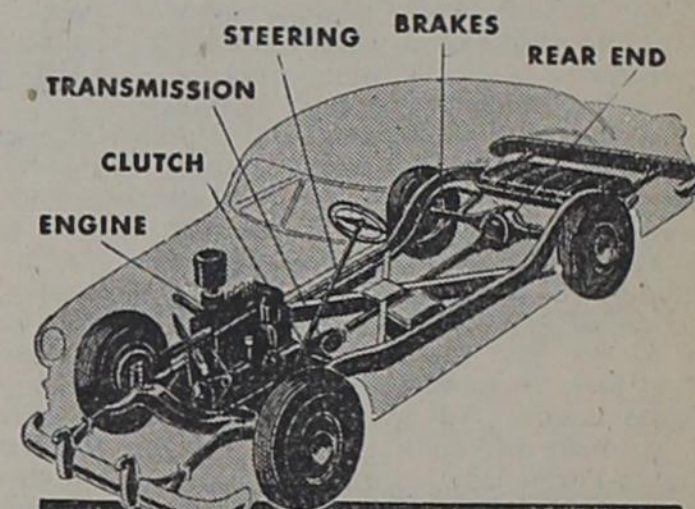

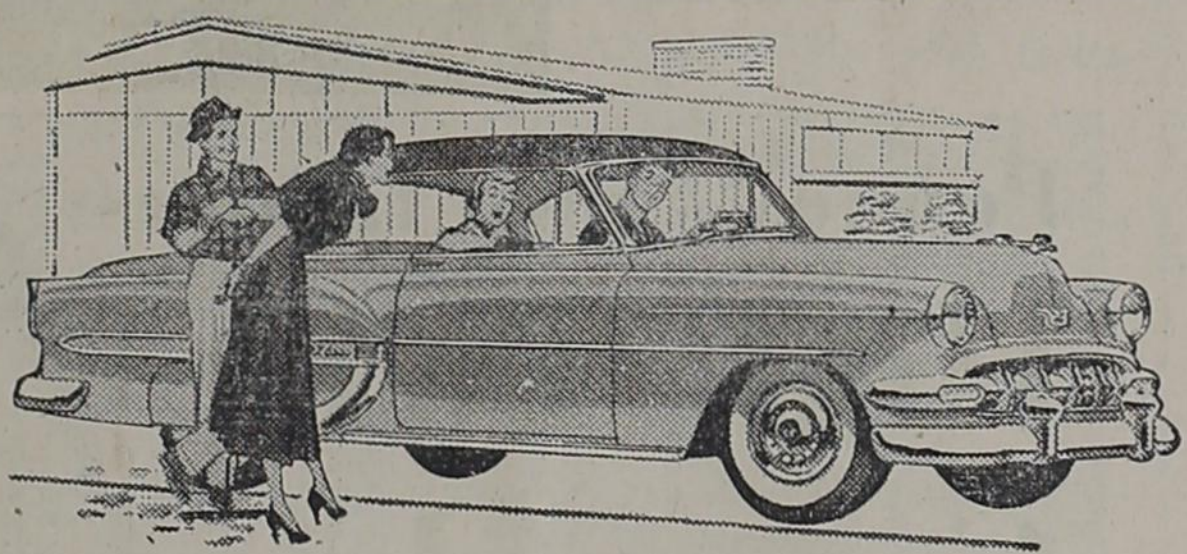

From the Parmer County

### SCD

A couple of weeks ago, I was down through the Levelland, Brownfield, Lamesa, Stanton area. It is still very dry there. Wind erosion has certainly taken its toll. Nearly every field has blown until it is "hummocky". In some fields there are large sand dunes. Between Brownfield and Lamesa, there is a field with a dune in the middle that is six feet high and 300 yards long. Dry weather has contributed to the condition of that area. However I wonder if their land use isn't a bigger factor than the drouth. Most of that area has a record of continuing cotton year after year for several years.

Our best defense against wind erosion is the use of crop residues or stubbles. Cotton doesn't particularly hurt the soil by what it removes from the soil. It hurts by not putting much back into the soil. Recent field tests show that machine stripped cotton often loses up to 90 times as much soil per acre as does a good field of grain sorghum stubble that is about knee high.

I know that during a drouth you can't grow good crop residues. However, if each year, we tried to see how much stubble we could leave on top of the soil instead of trying to cover it all up, we might have less wind erosion.

**NEWS FROM THE FARM BUREAU**  
By RAYMOND EULER

All Farm Bureau Insurance Services are maintained only for Farm Bureau Members in good standing. This is the policy for all casualty, fire, liability and hospitalization insurance. Life insurance is excepted from this ruling because of the long term contract nature. There has apparently been some misunderstanding about this.

Farm Bureau is a Christian, democratic organization of, by and for farmers and ranchers. Only those deriving at least 51 percent of their income from farming or ranching can be voting members. Others are welcome as associate supporting members, and are entitled to all services, but they cannot vote in the formulation of resolutions.

Every recommendation from Parmer County Farm Bureau to the State Farm Bureau has been adopted by a majority vote at annual convention time. No individual in the organization has the power or right to make recommendations other than those voted by the membership to any group in the name of Farm Bureau.

There has never been, and will never be, an increase in Farm Bureau dues in this county unless the membership votes for such increase with full agreement upon the use of such additional funds. (There is no indication that the directors will ever ask for consideration of such an increase. If the membership should make such a request, it would be voted upon.)

No member has ever made a suggestion to Parmer County Farm Bureau without receiving full consideration. If you have recommendations to make, they will be given the same consideration. All of our resolutions have come from the membership, and will continue to do so.

These administration policies are in effect in the county, district, state and National Farm Bureau. When a Farm Bureau Official speaks, as such, he must

speaking only in line with recommendations of the voting membership.

Consider this: Apply thine heart unto instruction, and thine ears to the words of knowledge. Proverbs 23-12.

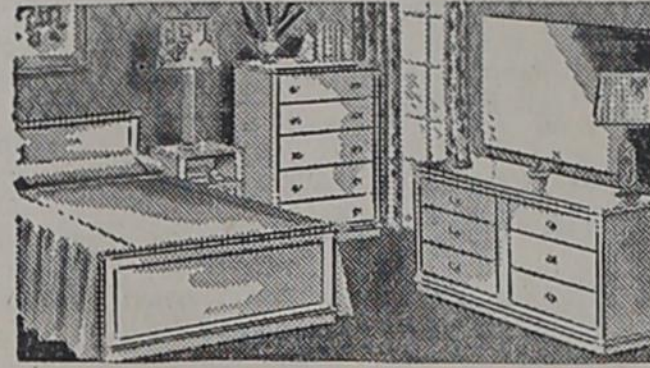

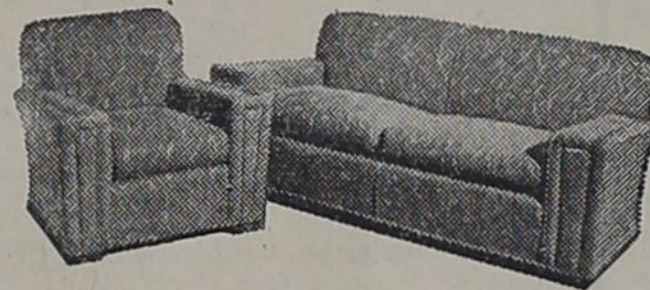

March 12 will mark the 42nd anniversary of the day in 1912, when the late Juliette Gordon Lowe, called together a group of girls in Savannah, Georgia to hear about the girl's guide movement in England. Twelve of the girls formed the first girl scout troop in the United States.

From this little band has grown the two-million member national organization. Theme for the 42nd Girl Scout birthday and Girl Scout week is "Know Your Neighbor-Know Your Nation." Local councils are planning to demonstrate this theme through such events as visits to historic sites or to new projects under construction, programs designed to recognize new citizens in the community, and special displays and exhibits.

One of the activities scheduled nationally is gathering of kits for Korea. The kits will be turned over to American relief for Korea, for distribution to Korean children. ## Bovina Homemaking Center Treats Visitors with Open House, Style Show

The new homemaking cottage was the center of festivity and interest for its Bovina students, parents, and guests last Tuesday night when the doors were opened to the public.

Because the cottage is being temporarily used by the voice and commercial classes and teachers, only a portion of its homemaking equipment has been added. The only completely equipped room is the kitchen.

Its dual-designed display cabinet in the vestibule was displayed with new kitchen equipment on one side and Easter and spring colors and materials on the other.

In the kitchen the display was a moist fluffy white frosted pineapple cake with a poster on altitude changes for baking with success in this area.

Following the show, the guests went casually through the rooms, viewing displays and new equipment.

Refreshments of rolled minced ham, salad, sandwiches, assorted cookies, and frosted fruit punch were served to the guests.

### Allan Wassom Begins Training

Fort Bliss—Pvt. Allan W. Wassom, son of Mrs. W. C. Wassom, Bovina, recently began eight weeks of basic training in the Antiaircraft Artillery Replacement Training Center at Fort Bliss.

The first eight weeks of basic training are spent on fundamental Infantry subjects like army drill, rifle, machine gun, and bazooka marksmanship, and familiarization with army technical subjects. This phase of training is climaxed with a one-week maneuver in the field.

Upon completion of the first eight weeks cycle, Pvt. Wassom will either be assigned for further training at Fort Bliss in the techniques of antiaircraft artillery, or he will be transferred to another Training Center for schooling in some other army skill.

Should he remain at Fort Bliss, his second eight weeks will see him learn the uses of various electronic equipment employed by the AAA-RTC. He will also be expertly trained in the firing of light and medium antiaircraft artillery at low-flying and high altitude aerial targets on the one- and one-half million acre Ft. Bliss ranges.
