The feed wasn't doing nearly so well as the cotton, but they're going to have some grain and forage this fall just the same. Every newsman we talked with was prone to admit that it looks as though the drouth has been brok-

Shooting Is Apparently Accidental

Lovelace indicates that investigation is concluded for the time being at least, as officers find no evidence that might point toward murder in the inci-

A .22 caliber bullet removed from DeMent's head Wednesday afternoon is to be sent to crime laboratories in Austin, along with a rifle of the same caliber which was found lying under the prostrate man after he had

been shot. Ballistics tests will establish for certain whether the slug came from the rifle.

The shocting occurred about 8 o'clock Tuesday evening as DeMent entered his trailer house alone. Pete Braxton and Lefty Deaton, Black residents, heard DeMent's crees for help and found him shot and dying.

The bullet had entered his head just behind the right ear, passed through the head and lodged against the skull. He was rushed to Parmer County Hcspital, and later to Amarillo for special treatment, but died there. DeMent had borrowed the rifle from one of his brothers a few days previous, saying he wanted to shoot some ground





THE TRIBUNE'S EDITORIAL COMMENT

Giving Credit For What Has Been Done

Last week's remark about the President and his attempts to raise the national debt limit and to increase the scope of Social Security coverage were accurate summations of our feeling, all right, but in fairness, we'd like to review what has been done by the Republican administration at the half-way mark of its first year.

The budget approved by appropriation support is \$13 billion below the figures submitted by Truman (and \$11/2 billion below the present administration request).

Important to coastal states, of which Texas is one, the tidelands pledge has been kept. It appears that the administration is attempting to go through with some of its pledges for streamlining and economizing in the executive department.

A truce in Korea has been effected, although at the present time, there is very good reason to doubt that this particular type truce can be added to the black side of the Republican ledger. Time, of course, will tell.

Another instance which might well be regarded as "border-line" insofar as its desirability is concerned, is the routing of reds and pinks from high places. Joseph "Watchdog" McCarthy, naturally, has been the big squeeze in this department, and for a while, we thought he might be doing some good. But of late, it's very doubtful that his influence has accomplished much worthwhile, except to make the American public more conscious of the menace of internal communistic movement.

The harm done to decent people in some of the "investigations" has been irreparable. Was it

Lastly, the farm program: To us, it's essentially the same "new deal" dished out by the Democrats for 20 years. The basic theories behind the present farm program are a long way off base economically speaking. No one yet, no matter how well educated, has been able to outwit the law of supply and demand.

These, we believe, are the principal achievements and "maybe-achievements" during this hectic first six months of the Eisenhower administration.

More Water in Store For Plains Irrigationists?

Hope is frantic over at Hereford that a unique experiment in irrigation well drilling will open up a new and productive strata of underground water suitable for irrigating.

A 750-foot hole was drilled three weeks ago southeast of that city, where little shallow water is available, and to the surprise of everybody, it is

The hole was drilled through the "red-bed" formation, and water rose to within 75 feet of the surface. A 10-inch well draws it down to only about 100 feet. That's something to keep an eye on!

However, a similar test made over in Roosevelt County in New Mexico, near Floyd, flooked out. Monroe Mitchell paid in vain for a 1000 foot drilling which proved pretty conclusively that no water of any appreciable quantity is available at that depth.

Since he's in the Portales valley basin, he has plenty of irrigation water at the present time at about 120 feet. The thing that worries him is that some day he may run out. He had hoped for an ar-

The county relinquished permission to the City of Farwell its control just this week, with the provision that the city improve and maintain the yard in a prop-

For years, dumping privileges have been abused by residents, both local and non-local, and the point had been reached where something had to be done.

Farmers owning land adjacent the grounds were strenuously objecting to the way in which trash was either blowing onto, or being dumped onto, their property. The practice of some people who insisted on dumping on or along the right-of-way of the county road passing near the yard helped bring about the reform, too.

Now, city officials hope this unfortunate era is at an end.

The 38 acres owned by Parmer County will be added to seven acres lying north of the country road which is situated in an old lake-bed, and the new grounds will be fenced in.
