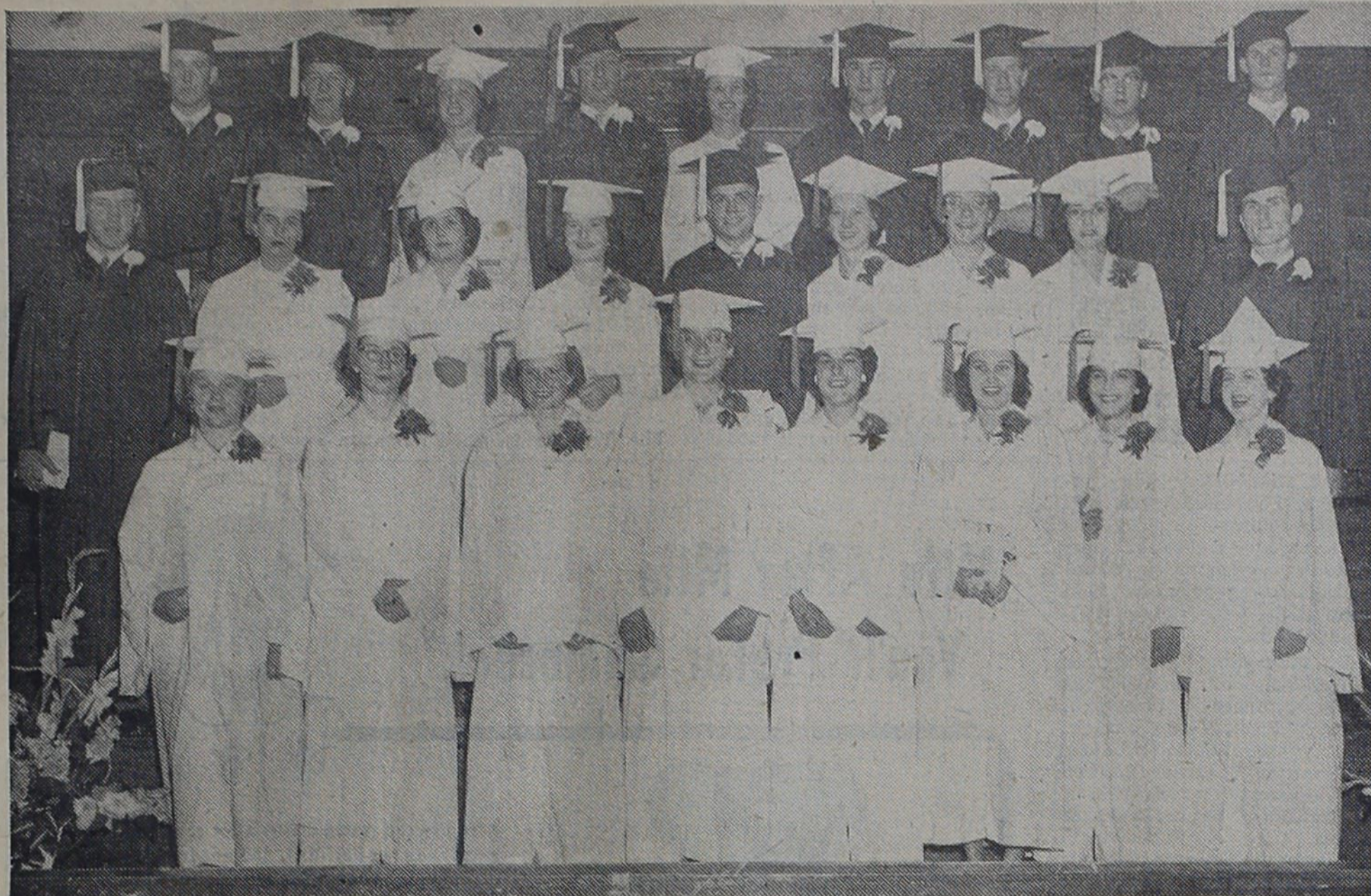

### Farmers Urged To Seek Permits

Several farmers who were issued permits for irrigation wells have not provided the log and registration data they agreed to when the permits were issued, according to Raymond Euler, Paramer County Water Conservation Committee chairman.

This latter data is necessary before the permit is legally approved, as it is promised in a statement on the permit signed by the applicant. There have been some reports of wells being drilled without permits. It is possible that in the future, such well owners will have complications requiring that they shut down.

The permit, properly executed, protects a well owner from such a possibility. Actually, the Water District can cause operators of wells drilled since Feb. 1, 1953, without a permit, to cease pumping.

It is illegal to drill any well that may produce 100,000 gallons per day without first securing a permit.

Moving, or even deepening an existing well requires the same permit as a new well. Any farmer who will provide the exact proposed location and existing wells and hi-points within one-half mile can secure a permit in less than half a day, normally.

The committee wishes to express its appreciation to the majority who have been very cooperative in completing their agreements, and asks that those who have not done so, comply immediately, so it will not be necessary to notify them individually.

There is a 120-day limitation from the date of issuance of permit until the drilling operation should begin. Extension can be secured by submitting to the committee reasons why drilling has not begun.

Secretary Benson has stated that he will make no final decision on 1954 wheat controls until the latest information is available.

The national acreage allotment for the 1954 crop must be that acreage, which, at the national average yield, will produce enough wheat—plus the carry-over and imports—for a normal year's domestic consumption and exports plus 30 per cent. This is apportioned among the States, then among the counties in the State according to average acreage seeded to wheat during the 10 preceding years.

Parmer County's wheat allotment is apportioned among farms on the basis of (1) tillable acres, (2) crop rotation practices, including acreage planted to wheat, (3) type of soil, and (4) topography.

Under the allotment program only producers who comply with their wheat acreage allotment would be eligible for price supports at full 90 per cent of parity.

### PMA CHAIRMAN RENEWS PLEA FOR PARAMER WHEAT REPORTS

More than half of Paramer County farmers are lagging in turning in reports on wheat acreage for PMA, it was revealed this week, after an appeal for information last week was apparently bringing little response.

Only 40 per cent of Paramer County farmers have turned in urgently needed information on their wheat acreage required by PMA to make equitable allotments in event that national wheat acreage allotments are proclaimed, Chairman Phillips reported today.

He urged wheat growers who had not yet done so to bring a legal description of their farm and the number of acres they had in wheat for 1951, 1952, and 1953, to the county PMA office at their earliest opportunity.

"This information is needed right away in order that each farm growing wheat in Paramer County might receive an allotment representing its fair share of a county allotment," Chairman Phillips explained.

**NEWS FROM THE FARM BUREAU**

For the benefit of Bovina people and others: The item printed in the Amarillo Daily News, dated May 13 was not authorized, was not sent in by Mrs. Gee, special reporter of Friona, and was incorrect in stating that, "members of Bovina Farm Bureau are opposed to an increase in teacher's salaries."

Bovina and other Farm Bureau Groups opposed only the methods of raising the money for the increase. (Teachers and school boards of this area also opposed HB 3.) To quote from local Farm Bureau news items of April 30th: "A letter from Senator Rogers was read, concerning HB 3, the controversial bill embodying an increase in teacher's salaries and means for raising the money. It was pointed out that this particular bill was not at all favorable to citizens of this area, because the increase in local ad-valorem taxes would far exceed the increase in teacher's salaries. A telegram from the Texas Farm Bureau Legislative office, and Parmer County Farm Bureau's telegram replying, were read in opposition to the one-fifth and four-fifths amendment attached to the teacher's pay, increase provision bill."

Incidentally, due to the failure of the Comptroller's ability to certify availability of funds for the raise provided in S.B. 24, H.B. 3, mentioned above is still pending passage with the one-fifth-fourth-fifths provision in it.

It is interesting to note that the Texas Farm Bureau Federation Office building was directly across the street from the large furniture building and another large building that were completely destroyed in the tornado. The Farm Bureau Building was not damaged beyond two plate glass windows being blown out. Phones continued to function, and Red Cross, other emergency aid etc, were centered there in the offices. We are glad the offices and employees were spared and that facilities were used to help in the emergency operations.

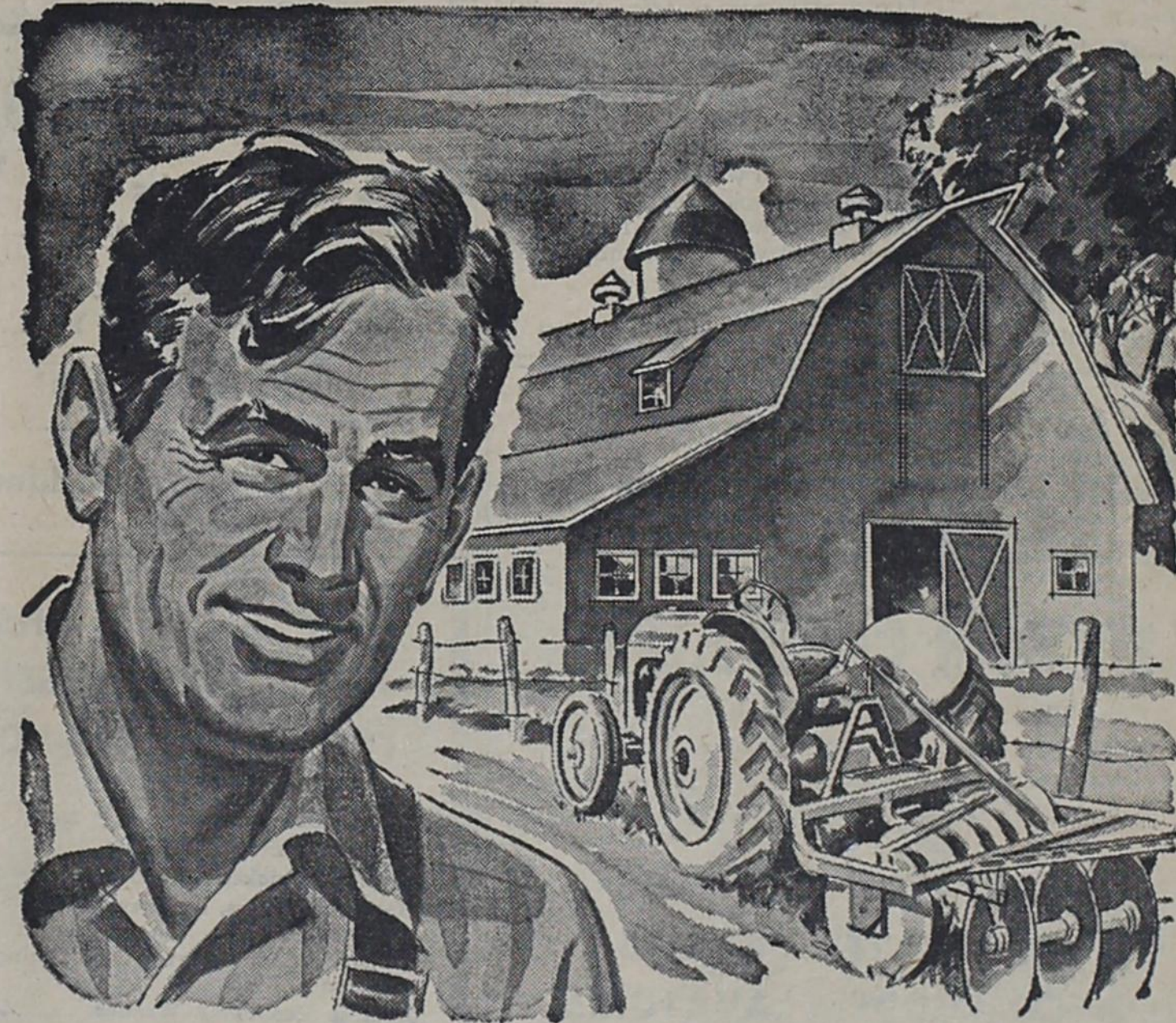

The tribal medicine man seems to have no effect in satisfying Chindee, the evil one, who is worshipped by the pagan Navajo. Superstition, fear and witchcraft are vividly portrayed.

**Agent Jones Gives Facts on Silage**

No less than three tons of silage should be put up for each cow in the dairy herd. That word comes from County Agent Joe Jones, and he adds, it's a good idea to double this amount to take care of the lean and unproductive years.

Yields from the best silage when properly fertilized, are usually heavy and large acreages of cropland are not required for silage production, points out Jones. But he explains, the crop must be planted, harvested and stored before it can be used and when moisture is available is the time to perform that first job—planting.

The county agent likes atlas sorghum Red Top, Honey for silage but he adds, there are other crops which also produce good yields and excellent silage. Atlas sorghum is adapted in most sections of the state and will produce from 10 to 18 tons of silage per acre depending of course upon available moisture and soil fertility. He says next to pasture silage is the cheapest source of feed for the dairy herd.

Atlas sorghum silage contains about 17 percent total digestible nutrients—that's the part of the feed a cow can actually use in producing milk—and from a yield of 10 tons that means 3,400 pounds of TDN and acre. In terms of milk production, Jones says that after a cow maintains her own body, she can produce 139 pound of 4 percent milk from 100 pounds of TDN. He figures from the 3,400 pounds of TDN a cow should produce about 4,700 lbs. of 4 percent milk from the acre of atlas silage. Take it a step further and multiply the local selling price in terms of milk, explains Jones. Deduct the original cost of the crop in terms of milk.

With hot weather, pastures will not generally provide all of the grazing needed by the herd and unless supplementary pastures have been provided, silage is the answer to the feed problem, believes Jones.

Use liberal amounts of fertilizer and harvest and store the crop right of maturity to get full value from it, says the agent.

The trench silo is the cheapest form for storing silage in this section of the country, and probably the best, Jones continued.

Beef cattle men will also find silage a great help in wintering and summering their cattle and should consider following the silage route also, he concludes.

**Deaf Smith Co-op Expanding**

TRANSFORMER; REPAIR FACILITIES

Deaf Smith Electric Co-Op at Hereford now has its own transformer and meter repair facilities with the opening of the transformer Meter Repair Division of Texas Power Reserve Electric Co-Op in Austin this month.

Texas Power Reserve, the state-wide association of rural electric Co-Ops located throughout Texas.

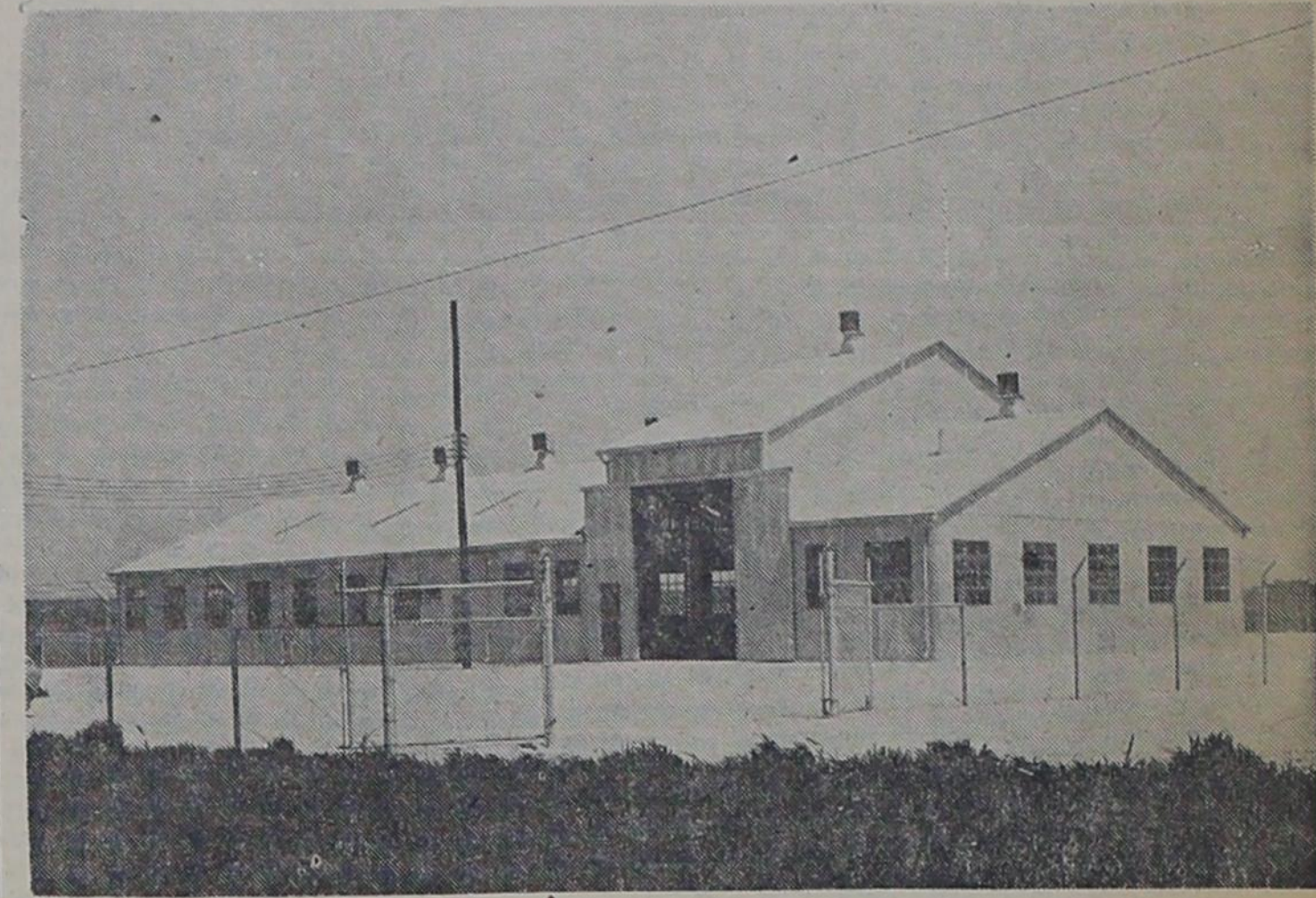
Manager Leo Forrest of the Deaf Smith Co-Op, who is also vice-president of Texas Power Reserve, says it is one of the most modern, up-to-date such plants in the entire country.

All of the equipment is specialized and was designed by Texas Power Reserve employees, Forrest continues, for handling all types, makes, and sizes of distribution transformers and large high-voltage transmission transformers.

The specially designed equipment is used to wind, treat with baking varnish, dry, and test transformers, as well as process insulating materials. The plant's bake oven is one of the few walk-in type bake ovens in the state.

The biggest job now in progress in the plant is a 333 KVA sub-station-type transformer from North Plains Electric Co-Op at Perryton, Texas. At full capacity, the plant can handle some 200 transformers per month.

The transformer Division's transportation facilities include a truck and trailer for pickup and delivery of transformers throughout the state. A hydraulic side-gate on the trailer facilities loading. The truck can carry more than 100 average-size transformers - about 22,000 pounds of



transformers at one time. Texas rural electric Co-Ops now operate some 125,000 miles of power lines in serving nearly 300,000 Texas farmers and ranchers. "They've long needed their own facilities for repairing their own transformers," says Forrest, "and this is it - the co-ops' own!"

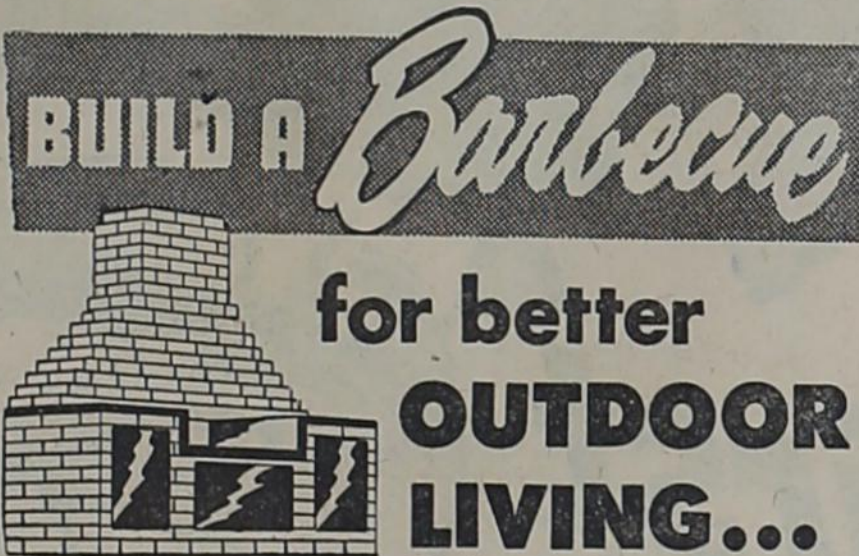

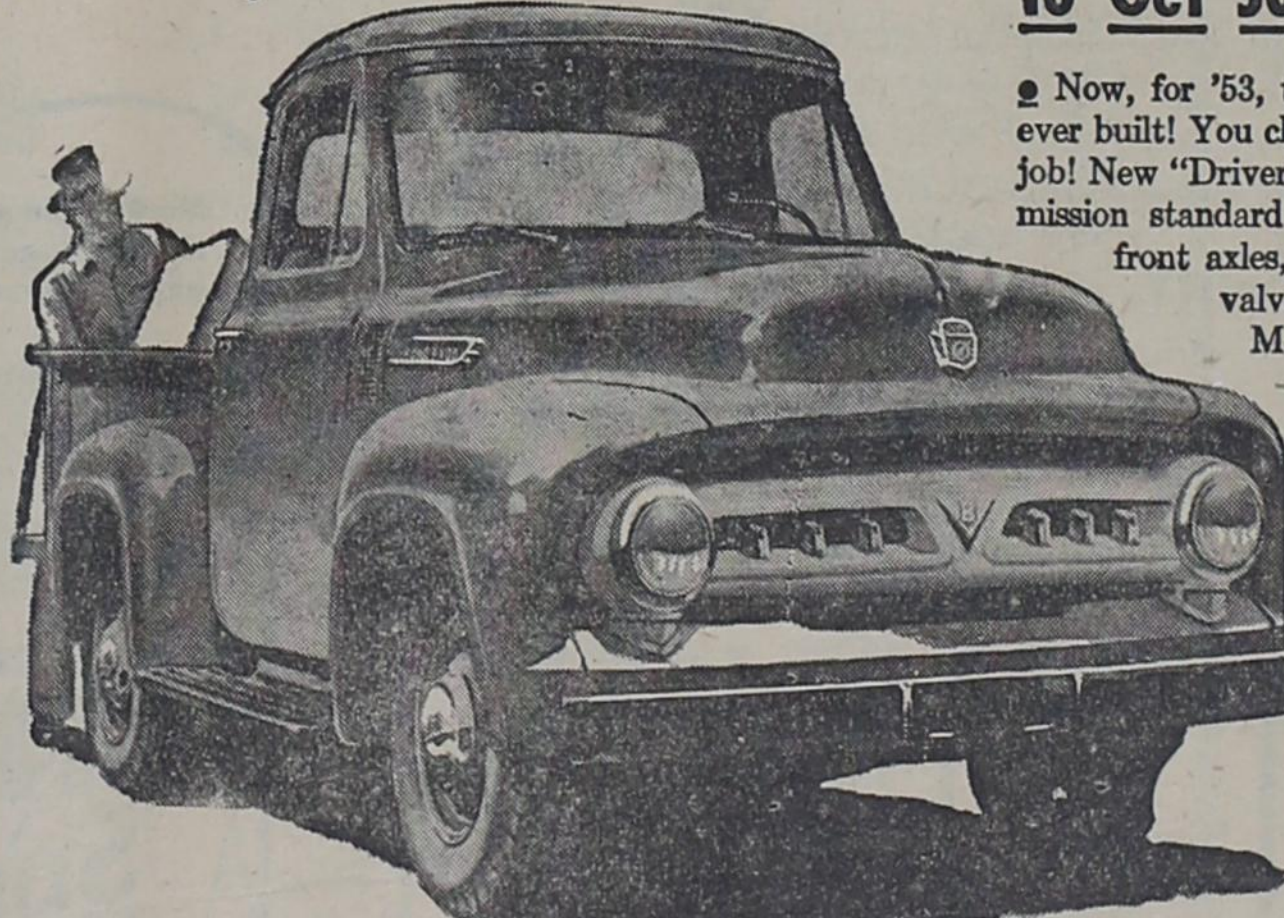

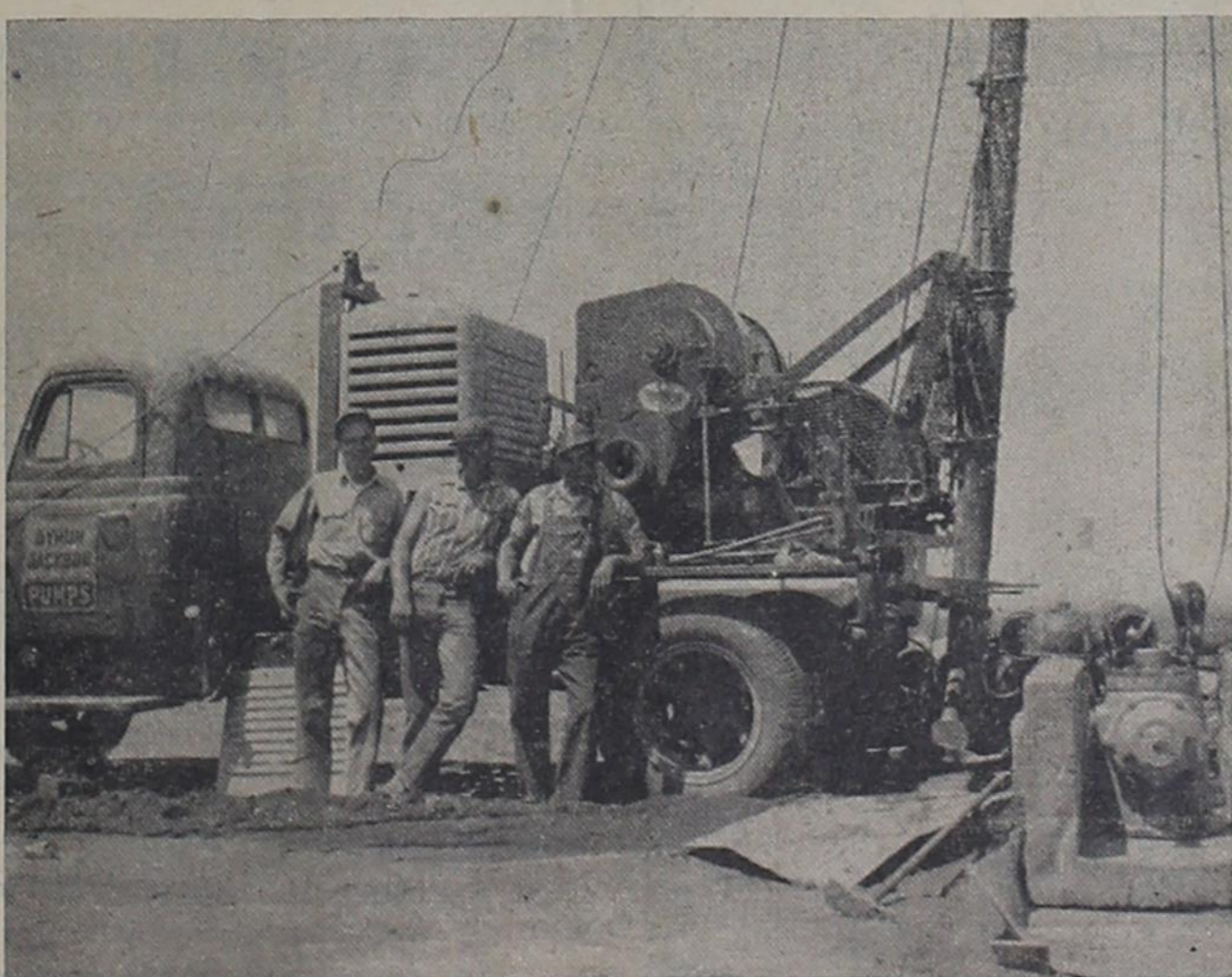

at Flagstaff, Arizona, in late afternoon, and checked into a motel before driving out to Oak Creek Canyon for an out-door supper. The drive was a beautiful one, and everyone really enjoyed it. A special feature of the meal was the cutting of a cake which Mrs. D. J. Brown presented to us before we left Texico. It was decorated with the class colors, green and white, with yellow roses on top along with the words, "Congratulations, seniors."

The next morning, we set out for Grand Canyon, and it was truly worth the trip. We were simply spellbound by the size and grandeur of this spectacle and most of us couldn't even imagine that the Colorado River could have cut this magnificent gorge out of the solid rock.

Proving themselves to be a unique group, this class bought rather odd souvenirs at the curio shop there. Let others buy postal cards and scenic folders, but not this class! The boys purchased water guns with the words Grand Canyon on the handle! This made the rest of the trip quite exciting, with their object being to see how often they could "soak" the girls with water. We took the rim drive around the canyon and ate our lunch at a picnic area. Then we went up in the Hopi Watchtower, and took a last view of the canyon through telescopes before leaving for Flagstaff.

We also saw the oldest house and viewed the newly remodeled capital building from the highway.

On the trip home, we stopped at the Blue Hole in Santa Rose for a final class meeting. Reports

### Spring Grid Practice Out for Classes AA, A, And B, Reports Jobs

A referendum showed that classes AAAA and AAA voted to have 21 days of spring football practice, and classes AA, A, and B and six-man schools have banned the spring practice entire, Shelby Jobs, Farwell instructor, says.
