

### **Break Comes on Registration Check**

The most talked about, most puzzling criminal case in Parmer County for a long time left residents in a wide area, and especially around Friona, stunned last weekend, as the news went out that Watson Whaley, prosperous farmer living north of that city, had confessed to scores of thefts Texas Ranger, visited the Whaley over a period of at least ten years. Non-jury criminal cases are set to be heard by Judge Bills on the 28th of this month. Defendants pleading guilty to the charges will be tried at that time. Any who may plead not guilty will have their jury trials set at a later date.



### **Delay in Mail Delivery** Is More Than Inconvenience

tions was to refrain from "grinding our personal axes" in the editorial column of this newspaper. There has, however, appeared a situation which involved not only us, but hundreds of our readers, and at the same time seems to affect a lot of other people who are just now making remarks about it since we have brought the subject up.

We refer to the oftentimes poor mail service between this community and several neighboring cities, and cite the service between Farwell and -Clovis as an example in point. The drab 'appearance of last week's Tribune was due to the fact that we had six engravings (or pictures, if you will) that were delayed in the mail.

The delay of these engravings not only concerned the management of The Tribune, who were frustrated, disappointed, and short of time because the engravings upon which they had depended did not arrive when expected, but the time value of three of the pictures was lost, because "they concerned things that had just happened. This deprived our subscribers of news pictures they deserve and have come to expect in The Tribune.

The engravings in question were mailed at the post office in Clovis Tuesday about mid-aftermoon. They should have come to Texico-Farwell that night and have been in our box the next morning. If this package "carried by" the Texico-Farwell stop because the clerks on the train did not have time to sort the mail in the nine-mile run, then the package should have gone to Amarillo Tuesday night, and come back through here shortly before noon Wednesday. Just where the package went nobody seems to know, but the fact is that it did not show up here until Friday morning after the paper had already been placed into the mail.

In connection with this delay, we received a letter from the Clovis postmaster, Ed Manson, acknowledging the situation, and who set forth a plan which was designed to help correct the delay. We are grateful for his interest in the matter, and appreciate the trouble he has gone to, to look into it personally.

As a former editor of a daily newspaper, Mr. Manson is certainly qualified to understand the burden placed on mail patrons like newspapers when service to them is poor.

And as newspapermen, we ourselves are able to appreciate the fact that man himself is indeed



# How smart can machines be?

Back in the twenties there was a stage play about mechanical men, who repaid their creators by trying to wreck civilization. "Robots" have made people uneasy ever since.


