## Crawley Bakery Back In Operation

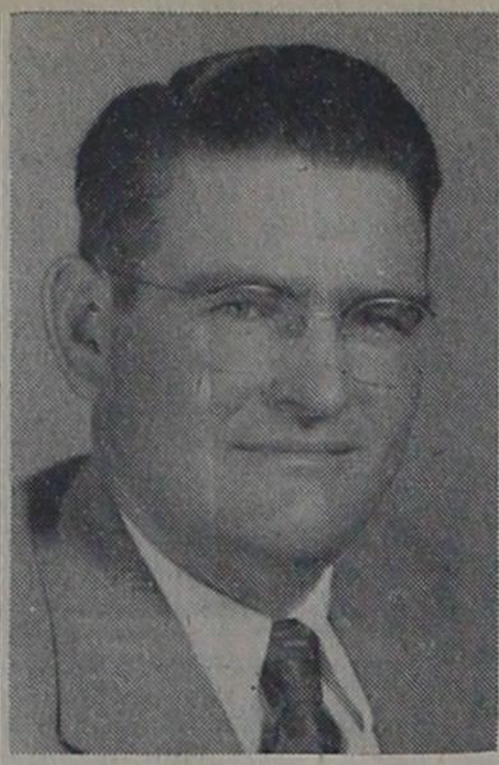

## Thornton In Race For County Clerk

Graham G. Thornton, a resident of Parmer County for 28 years, announced his candidacy this week for the office of county and district clerk, subject to the action of the Democratic primary in July.

Thornton, 32, is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Roy Thornton, long-time area residents, and this will be his first time to seek an elective office.

Because of his physical condition it will no longer be possible for him to continue farming, which had been his life-long vocation until a few months ago.

Thornton was born northwest of Texico in 1921, and the family moved into Parmer County four years later. He was graduated from Farwell High School in 1939, and attended Texas A & M college for a short time before entering the service.

He served with the US Army for two years and eight months during World War II.

In 1949 he married Ruth Bonds of Bovina, and after the war took up the operation of a farm northwest of Bovina. Mr. and Mrs. Thornton have one son, Mike, who is three years old.

Mrs. Thornton is a former instructor at Oklahoma Lane and Farwell Schools, but has not engaged in teaching since her marriage.

Concerning his candidacy, Thornton says:

"As a candidate for county and district clerk, I sincerely solicit your vote and influence, and pledge to you the best of my ability if I am elected to this office."

## H. L. Ivy Will Seek Re-Election To Post

H. L. (Henry) Ivy, incumbent as commissioner of Pct. No. 4, this week announced his candidacy for re-election in the Democratic primary in July.

# It's Deadline Time Again!

Parmer County citizens are faced with some highly important deadlines as the end of the month of January approaches. Of outstanding importance is the matter of poll taxes. They cannot be paid after the deadline of Jan. 31.

Sheriff Chas. Lovelace does say, however, that for the benefit of those who will need the service, his office at the court-

house will remain open until 10 p. m. Saturday night to receive poll tax payments.

After that time, late comers can still pay the tax by seeking the official at his home. "We'll take 'em up 'til 12 midnight Sunday," he said, adding that any application that is mailed in will be good if it bears a postmark of Jan. 31 or earlier.

Several other big items are facing citizens, too. They dis-

cover that their county, state, school and local taxes are due on Jan. 31, and must be paid on or before that date to avoid penalty. The March of Dimes drive will close out this weekend and every possible contribution will be needed to put the county "over the top" in 1954.

## March Of Dimes Near Conclusion

Results of the box supper in Texico are found in another story, but the biggest activity so far in Farwell was by the school children. With a goal of \$225 to meet, the kids worked and more than doubled their quota. On Wednesday of this week, \$564.31 had been contributed through the school.

The grades were divided into three divisions: first through the fourth; fifth through eighth; and ninth through seniors and the class getting the largest donation in each division was promised a chicken dinner.

Sophs had the largest donation in high school, and other top classes were the seventh and second, on a percentage basis.

With 419 enrolled in school, the donation average is more than \$1 per student.

The coffee, which was staged for men last year, will not be held this year because of so many conflicting activities. However, letters will be mailed to all attendants last year, asking for donations.

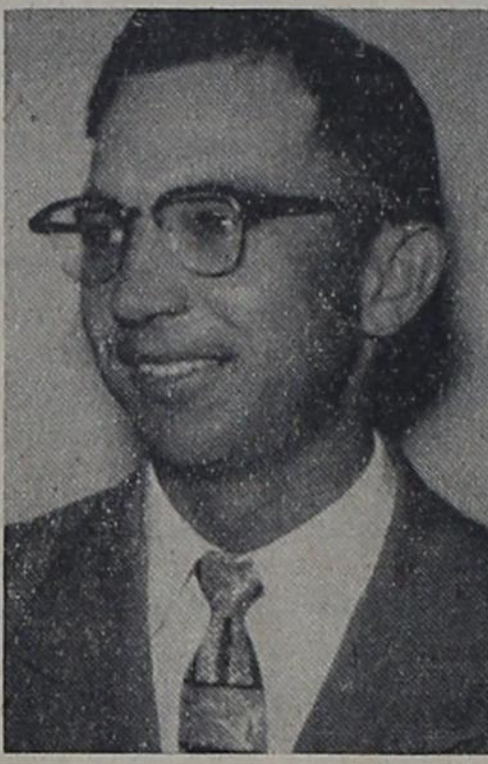
## Texico MOD Receipts Climb To \$300 Mark

## Moseley In Race For Clerk's Office

## Well Applications Still Piling Up For Parmer County

Parmer County's irrigation boom shows no signs of slowing up as the year 1954 is entered into, according to the records of the Parmer County water committee, a body which regulates well drilling.

Raymond Euler of the committee said there were 33 permits issued in a single evening this week, bringing a total of 245 that have been issued since April of 1953.

"The wells are not confined to any one part of the county," he said, "but are pretty evenly distributed over our entire area."

This is another indication of the county's ideal location with respect to underground water resources. It is possible to secure irrigation water for virtually every cultivated field in the county, which is something of a rarity.

Euler asked that farmers please note that the meeting dates of the water committee have been changed to the 1st and 3rd Thursdays of each month. These meetings will be for the purpose of issuing well permits.

## Erosion District Vote Saturday

### '53 Poll Tax Receipt Good for This 'Un

Parmer County taxpayers will decide Saturday whether they want to declare themselves into a wind erosion district. Any resident who has rendered property for county taxes and is otherwise legally qualified will be permitted to vote.

Eight polling places will be set up in Parmer County in much the same manner as the procedure used in primaries. Voting places:

- Bovina ..... American Legion Hall

The special election was called as a result of a petition presented by Parmer County farmers in December of last year. Paul Koeltzow, Rhea farmer, began the petition.

If Parmer County votes itself into such a district, it would mean that a farmer can be instructed by the commissioners to plow and care for his land if it appears to them to be blowing.

If he does not comply with their instructions, they are empowered to contract the necessary plowing, and bill the land owner in the form of increased taxes. Title to his

### SCD

Now is the time to think about the method that you are going to use for irrigation water application. Whether you use level benches, borders, or furrows, there are some things that you can do to help insure proper water distribution through the irrigated area. No doubt you have noticed most of the grain sorghum fields this last year. Near the ditch the sorghum was very good. About two-thirds of the way to the lower end, the crop produced much less. Then, where the water stands in the end of the rows there the crop was good.

This is probably due to improper water distribution. Usually proper water application of row crops requires more labor. I wonder if the increase in production resulting from proper application would pay for the extra labor

## NEWS FROM THE FARM BUREAU

By RAYMOND EULER

8,719,178 acres of cotton will likely be planted in Texas this year under revised legislation. 7,376,858 acres, the original allotment figure under which you received your allotment figures, were 1,342,320 under the new figure. We were not aware until recently, of the fact that some farmers thought the allotment they received was possibly final.

The Secretary of Agriculture and all legislators were stating almost daily that some adjustments would have to be made as soon as congress convened. Farm Bureau leaders, knowing adjustment would be made, were working steadily in an effort to reach an equitable agreement with cotton growers of the nation, that could be presented to the Agriculture Committee with reasonable expectation of adoption. The effort was very successful.

Included in the provision is the privilege of release of unused acreage of individual farms for reapportionment to other farms in 1954 and 1955 without the individual being penalized when future allotments are calculated.

Farm Bureau recommendations not accepted by the committees were: 1. One per cent of the national average reserved as relief acreage on small farms. 2. Authorization for the Secretary to count underplanting and abandonment in determining the minimum national

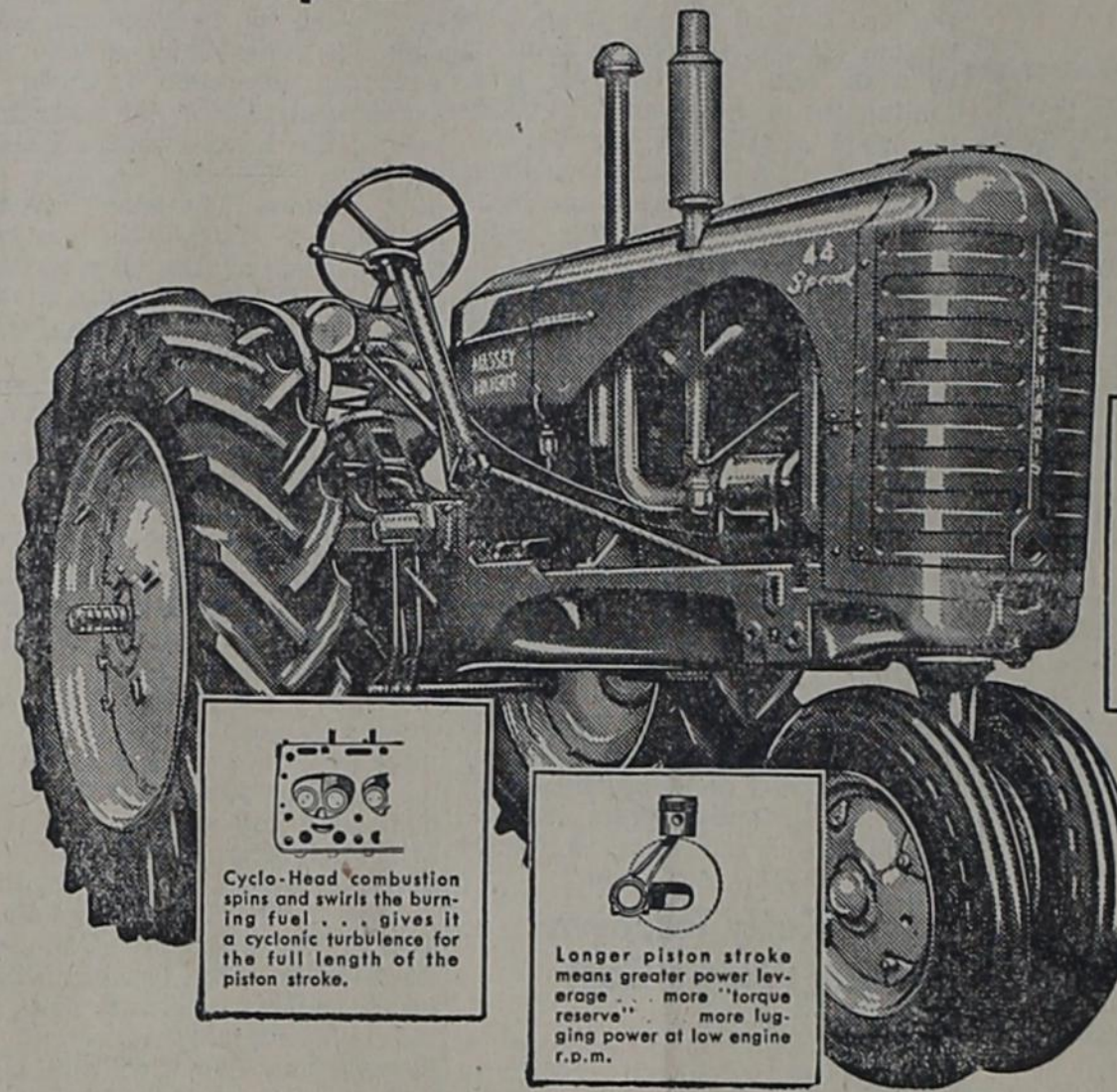

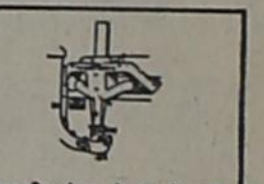

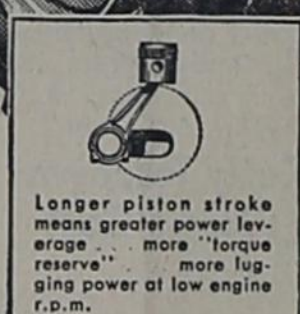
