It had slipped our mind to mention last week that we were again taking in one of those newspaper conventions. This time, it was the West Texas Press convention in Midland.

A trip to the oil-laden wasteland of that part of West Texas is like a fairy tale. The country down there is beyond a doubt the most depressing sight on earth. As one fellow we know put it once, "All that land is doing holding the world togeth-

But the seas of sand, shinnery, sagebrush and mesquite are floating on a veritable sea of oil-the black gold of Texas. This precious fluid has transformed central West Texas from a desert wasteland to a hive of industrial activity.

The companies and the personnel engaged in finding and exploiting this valuable mineral have changed tiny ranching communities into gleaming, neat-as-a-pin cities. We don't know the figures, but we are willing to bet that in Midland a greater precentage of the cars are Cadillacs than in any comparable city in the world.

Many, many people down there have more money than they can count, and we watched with startled eyes the vast beauty of their plush residential section as we rolled through it.

The convention itself was fine, and we enjoyed ourselves, but a description of this would interest relatively few of our readers. Through trial and error, we have discovered that more than anything else, our readers seem to want to hear about how "things" are elsewhere than in their immediate communities. They want to know how much it has rained lately, how the crops look, and if the people look prosperous.

In answer to these oft-asked questions, we would say that things are HOT down in that part of the country. Some areas appear to have had sufficient rainfall to make a crop, but the majority of the farms in that sandy land are looking pretty rough.

Some conton will be made That is fairly apparent. A little feed will make it, but most of it is burning badly right now, or is already gone.

As we took the young'un over to Silverton to heckle his grandparents for a couple of days, we were able to drive right through most of the High Plains irrigated area. And we'll tell you right now, folks, that we wouldn't trade ten square miles of this country up here for ten counties down there even if they'd throw in all the oil wells.

You can almost draw a line south of Lubbock where the underground water begins to play out. All crops under irrigation here on the Plains look good-at least the ones we saw in passing through Parmer, Castro, Swisher, Briscoe, Floyd, Hale, and Lubbock counties.

We observed with anxiety how some of the wells were obviously growing weaker and weaker below Lubbock toward Seagraves. Wells pumping half of a six-inch pipe of water were common. Also, some abandoned wells were in evidence.

You don't find any water in the bar ditches down there. In fact, a lot of them think so much of the little water they do use that they hook it up to a sprinkler system. Crops under this type of irrigation were looking good, but they tell us that the labor involved in such an operation is enormous, compared to ditching.

A few fields that were seen burning up under the blazing West Texas sun had well sites on them, but no water came from the discharge pipes. These wells were dry. That is a sight to put fear into the heart of every farmer who has come to depend upon irrigation so heavily, and we earnestly hope that such stories will reach the ears of our own fortunate farmers here on the High Plains, in order that they may begin conservation of their water NOW, and not when it threatens to be exhausted.

As an example of the miracles oil has wrought in this dreary land, permit us to tell you a little of the small city of Andrews. We are well acquainted with the Roberts family, owners of the Andrews County News there, and we welcomed a chance to visit the little city since it was near at hand on our journey

## Shivers Lets Appointees Run Department

Opponents of Gov. Allan Shivers have many times repeated the charge that the governor "runs things at Austin with an iron hand," thereby implying that appointees and employees of the state government are merely yes-men or puppets, and subject to act only on the advice and consent of the governor. Such is not the case.

The governor has excercised good judgement in drawing near to him the best department heads possible, and they have come from all over Texas-not just from those areas which have given him voting strength. And these men are permitted to act of their own accord, as is proved this week by a letter on our desk from Marshall Formby of Hereford and Plainview, who was appointed last year to the state highway commission.

"Governor Shivers has never asked us to build one foot of any specific road," says Formby, in a personal letter accompanying a statement to the press. "He thinks the three commissioners should run the highway department without any influence from the governor's office, or any other office, or from any group."

Then, in his press release is the following: Formby said that Yarborough's recent promise to build a \$5,000,000 highway and bridge in Galveston county and along the Gulf Coast, if he were elected Governor, is an example of political promises that would eventually harm the fine Highway department in Texas. His full statement follows:

"I am deeply disturbed when I hear of the dozens of promises that Mr. Yarborough is making to the people offering to build new roads and bridges in various parts of the state.

"For more than a quarter of a century the Highway Department has been completely free of political road and bridge building. The Texas Highway Department has built roads and bridges based strictly on merit and need.

"Texans everywhere take great pride in the Highway Department, stressing the fact that there are no politics in it, and for the good of all Texas I sincerely hope that they can continue to have

"The present Commission has not spent one dime on a political road or bridge since I have been a member, and I know that the three members would never vote 15 cents to fulfill any political vote. (HJ 10). obligation."


