

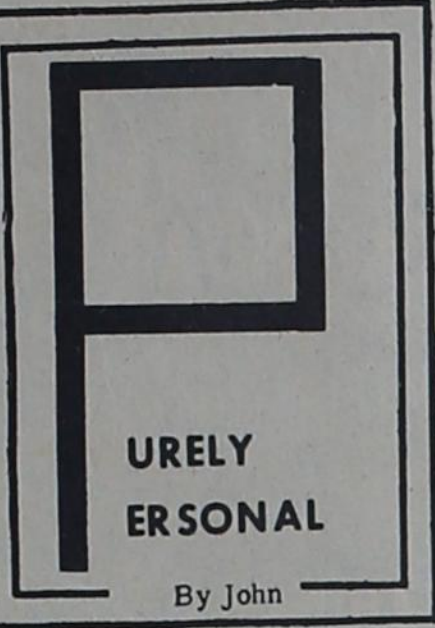

One of the bits of news coming from Washington over the last few months are the hearings on raising the cost of postage. The post office department, for the past number of years, has been running at a staggering deficit. It is felt, and rightly so, that this vital government service should be run on at least a break-even basis. We wholeheartedly concur in this viewpoint. Our predecessors in the management of The Tribune have been on record as favoring a rate for newspapers sufficient to pay their way through the mails. We also go on record as endorsing this viewpoint.

However, we definitely think that other users of the mails should likewise stand their fair share of the postal expenses. There are two areas of great loss to the postal department. One area is government agencies and congressional mail. It is amazing the almost astronomical amount of various kinds of mail from the myriad of government bureaus we receive. We are constantly deluged by mail from members of congress, not only from our district and state but often from congressmen and senators with whom we have no voting connection. This overburdening of the mails, as we see it, will not get any better and we feel that congress, in any fit of clearheadedness, will not limit itself or any other government agency in use of the mails.

The second big loss leader of the post office department is the vast amount of third class or "junk mail" that depends upon us like a blizzard. Now remember that many of the industrial and merchandising giants use this form of advertising. Therefore, it will take an exceptionally strong congress not to bow to the pressure that will be applied by these big mail users. As it now stands, your local country newspapers are in line to be the fall guy on this mail rate increase which will amount to 30 per cent or thereabouts.

Well, let me back up and say that as our costs of business go up, we must compensate for it by an increase in revenue. This means very likely by the end of the year we, as well as most all other country papers, will have to institute a raise in our subscription price. Therefore, as always, the consumer is the one who gets it in the end, literally and figuratively.

The area press and other news media have been full of news about the formation of Water Inc. The purpose is to explore means of importing water to the entire High Plains. This has generated a vast amount of interest and support from our locality which tends to obscure a more imminent source of water for the Twin Cities.

I refer to the Ute Dam Project which will pass just west of Clovis. Here is a project well underway with an engineering feasibility already established. This water is earmarked strictly for municipal use. Therefore, we will not be competing with agriculture for its use.

Texico and Farwell have finally made application for inclusion in this project. We consider this one of the most important steps in insuring our future growth that has been made in the twenty years we have lived in this community. This vital step is due to the foresight, energy and almost singlemindedness of one individual in our community, R. W. Anderson. We are sure that his farsightedness will mean more to the Twin Cities' future than many more widely publicized projects. Water is indispensable and this project can give our communities the municipal water supply to attract industry for future growth.

The meal, which will be catered by Underwoods of Lubbock, will be served for \$1.50 per plate. Everyone is invited to COME, enjoy good food and the fellowship of friends and make the acquaintance of some of the young cowboys and cowgirls who are in Farwell to participate in the AJRA Rodeo events.

Final performance of the rodeo is set for 8 p.m. Saturday night after which saddles will be presented to the best all-around cowboy and best-all-around cowgirl. In addition trophy buckles will be presented to the top winners in each of the age groups.

Kick-off for the event is a gigantic parade which is set to begin today (Thursday) at 5 p.m. The parade will form in the area behind the Farwell city hall (Little League Ballpark area). Tentatively included in the parade at press time were a band from Cannon Air

Force Base, the Mounted Quadrille from Clovis, Bovina riding Club, Drum and Bugle Corps from Clovis, twirlers, business floats and or decorated cars, decorated bicycles, mounted riders and a clown.

All businesses in town are urged to display flags and have window signs painted to welcome the visitors.

A painter will be available to paint the signs throughout the days Thursday and Friday.

### Mrs. Towns Services Held Saturday

Funeral services were conducted from the First Baptist Church in Muleshoe Saturday afternoon for Mrs. Verney (Mona) Towns, prominent citizen and dedicated worker in the First Baptist Church in that city. Mrs. Towns passed away in Lubbock Methodist Hospital at 1:15 p.m. Thursday, following an extended illness.

The Rev. Don Murray, pastor of Muleshoe First Baptist Church, officiated, assisted by Rev. Ralph Hovey from the First Baptist Church in Clovis. Burial was in Bailey County Memorial Park with Singleton Funeral Home directing.

Mrs. Towns, 49, was born at Lamesa, August 21, 1917. She was married to Verney Towns Dec. 24, 1933 in Lamesa and made her home in that vicinity until 1940 when she moved to the Texico-Farwell area. They made their home here until 1950 when they moved to the Muleshoe area where they lived at the time of her death.

In addition to her church work on the local level, she was active and well-known for services rendered on the state and national level. She was a member of the Board of Trustees of Wayland Baptist College, having been named to serve in this capacity at the General Convention of Texas Baptist held in Corpus Christi.

In 1963, she and her husband participated in the "New Life Movement" in Japan, as representatives of the Muleshoe First Baptist Church. She had served as president of the First Baptist Women's Missionary Union; president of the District 9 WMU for three years and as vice-president of the Texas WMU for three years, and also president of the Llanos Altos Association.

After their trip to the Orient the Townses sponsored an International student from Nigeria to Wayland Baptist College. Mrs. Towns was also chairman of the hospitality committee for "Women for Wayland" and also a charter member of the "Wayland For Women" organization.

In 1963, an outstanding trib-

ute was paid Mrs. Towns when the women who compose district 9 named their newly constructed lodge near Floydada Baptist Encampment the "Mona Towns Lodge." In bestowing this tribute the honor read, "This is an outstanding tribute to a great Christian woman." It is rather unusual to receive such an honor after one year as president of District WMU. But to those who know her best and work with her, recognize her as an unusual person."

Wheat certificate payments are being mailed each day to those producers who reported their acreages early. If you reported your acres early, look for your payment (in the mail) at an early date.

**AUGUST 15 IS FINAL REPORTING DATE - BOY! ARE WE GONNA BE BUSY!**

Only about 40 per cent of our farmers have reported their feed grain, cotton, and diverted acres at this time. This means, of course, that we are going to be quite busy from now until August 15 in order to handle all the rest of the reports to be made. We had hoped to be able to make all payments much sooner this year than we had in the past; however, we will not be able to do

this because of the lateness of so many in making their report.

**BY THE WAY:**

We remind you that your diverted acreage must be kept free of noxious weeds and not allowed to blow and cause damage to you or your neighbor's land. We will inspect your diverted acres shortly after August 15 for compliance purposes.

**LET US AGAIN REMIND YOU!**

August 15 is the final date for reporting acreages. If your report is not filed by then, your farm will not be eligible for program payments and other program benefits.

### Scout Troop 179 Visits Camp Wehinahpay

Camp Wehinahpay's fourth week attendance of 147 boys included 16 scouts from Texico-Farwell, Troop 179 embarked on its journey after an early Sunday morning church service in front of Farwell City Hall, conducted by Paul Wilkinson.

Seven days of camping included fellowship campfires, outpost camping, retreat ceremonies, merit-badge classes, and numerous advancement projects. Each of ten troops attending lived in individual mountain camps, with boys and leaders enjoying their own community and sleeping in wooden-floor tents. Meals were served in Conquistador Council's large dining hall, using "family-style" serving and seating.

# Australia, Land Of Opportunity

"Australia is truly the land of opportunity for those willing to go far away from familiar surroundings," believes Mrs. Bobby Gable who has been making her home in Australia since January 12 when she and her husband and two children arrived at Rock Hampton, Australia.

The Gables, formerly from Muleshoe, (Mrs. Gable is the former Janenne Lunsford of Farwell) make their home near the small town of Emerald (about the size of Texico-Farwell) in the state of Queensland. Their farm is known as Wadeleigh Place. Mrs. Gable explains that all farms have names and can be located in this manner.

Mrs. Gable, who is presently visiting her mother, Mrs. Cora Lunsford, said, "We were made to feel at home at once by the Australians and have had tea or coffee in most of the homes of neighbors within the time we have been in the area. She explains that an Australian is a person whose ancestors have been in Australia for several generations. They may be Europeans, Asians, Americans or from various other places.

The Gables settled on a 10,000 acre farm 11 miles from Emerald on a paved road (one

of the few in the area). Three thousand acres of the land has been cleared and is in cultivation, however, the rest of the land is used for ranching. At a later date, the Gables hope to clear some of the additional land and also place it in cultivation. Chief crops are safflower and wheat, however, some maize is also raised in the area. Cattle are not fed but thrive on the lush grass which is on the open range.

Land in the area where the Gables live ranges in price from \$3,00 to \$35 per acre. The farm nearest the Gables (three miles away) is on the market for \$6,00 per acre, however none of the land has been cleared and Mrs. Gable says it would be usable only for ranching.

Contrary to what most Americans believe, modern conveniences are available in the area. "We have two bathrooms, running water and electric lights," explained Mrs. Gable, adding that each home has its own generator for the lights. Water used is rainwater and not pumped from the ground. Most of the area farmers use butane for heating and cooking. The Gables have TV, radio, and many other electric appliances and all

homes have phones (they are a must).

One thing which Mrs. Gable has noted about the area is that there are few window screens; however, the Gables have screens on their house. She explains that Australians test the purity of water in this manner, "If they are out in the 'bush' and come up on a pond of water (clear with nothing in it) they immediately conclude that it must be poisoned by chemicals from the earth and will not drink it; however, if it has wigglers or fish swimming in it, it is fit for human consumption and they think nothing of drinking it."

The Gables have found hospital and doctor facilities to be more than adequate although they have had no occasion to use the hospital facilities. One of the best cancer hospitals in the world is located in Australia. In fact, one doctor has explained to the family that it is much easier for an Australian doctor to practice in America than for an American doctor to practice in Australia due to the different educational requirements.

Schools have been found to be quite good, with discipline much stricter than in America. All students dress in uniforms.

Mrs. Gable explains that teachers demand - and get - more respect than in the American schools. The head teacher gives all tests for grading purposes; in this way he not only checks on the student but on the teacher as well. Many of the students (from outlying areas) live in a hostel (boarding house) and only go home for vacations. In most cases approximately 60 children are in each grade.

Students begin school at the age of five years and attend classes for ten years. At the end of that time they are given tests and some go on to classes for two additional years and then attend college; while others, not found to be college material, drop out of school (they are fitted for a trade) and go to work. Her children have found the math quite difficult since it is quite different to that used in the American schools.

Although the Gables drive 175 miles to attend church (there is no Church of Christ in Emerald) there are several churches in the little town near them, including Methodist, Church of England, Catholic and Presbyterian. Mrs. Gable explains that they are working toward getting a Church of Christ organized in the area.

The Gables have found the

mode of dress not too different from that to which they are accustomed except for the fact that all businessmen wear short pants, for comfort due to the heat which reaches 116 degrees for some three weeks in the summer. Ladies wear slacks and shorts less than in America and it is not unusual to see ladies shopping for groceries dressed as though for church with hat and gloves.

Although it is many miles from home (26 hours flying time) the Gables have found their new home to be in the midst of virtual paradise on earth with flowers blooming the year round, adequate rainfall and a mild season so that crops can be planted when the farmer so desires (not waiting for the proper season) and the friendliest people on earth. Many persons from the states are finding the opportunities offered in Australia too good to pass up and it is quite often that the Gables have visitors from the states. They have had visitors from Lamesa, O'Donnel, and Muleshoe, Tex., in addition to many persons from California, New Mexico and various other states.

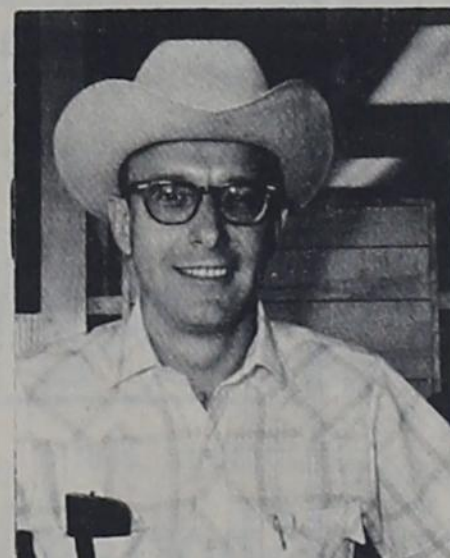

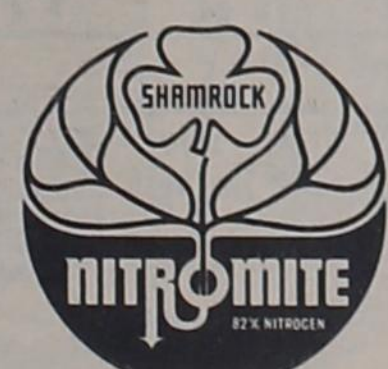

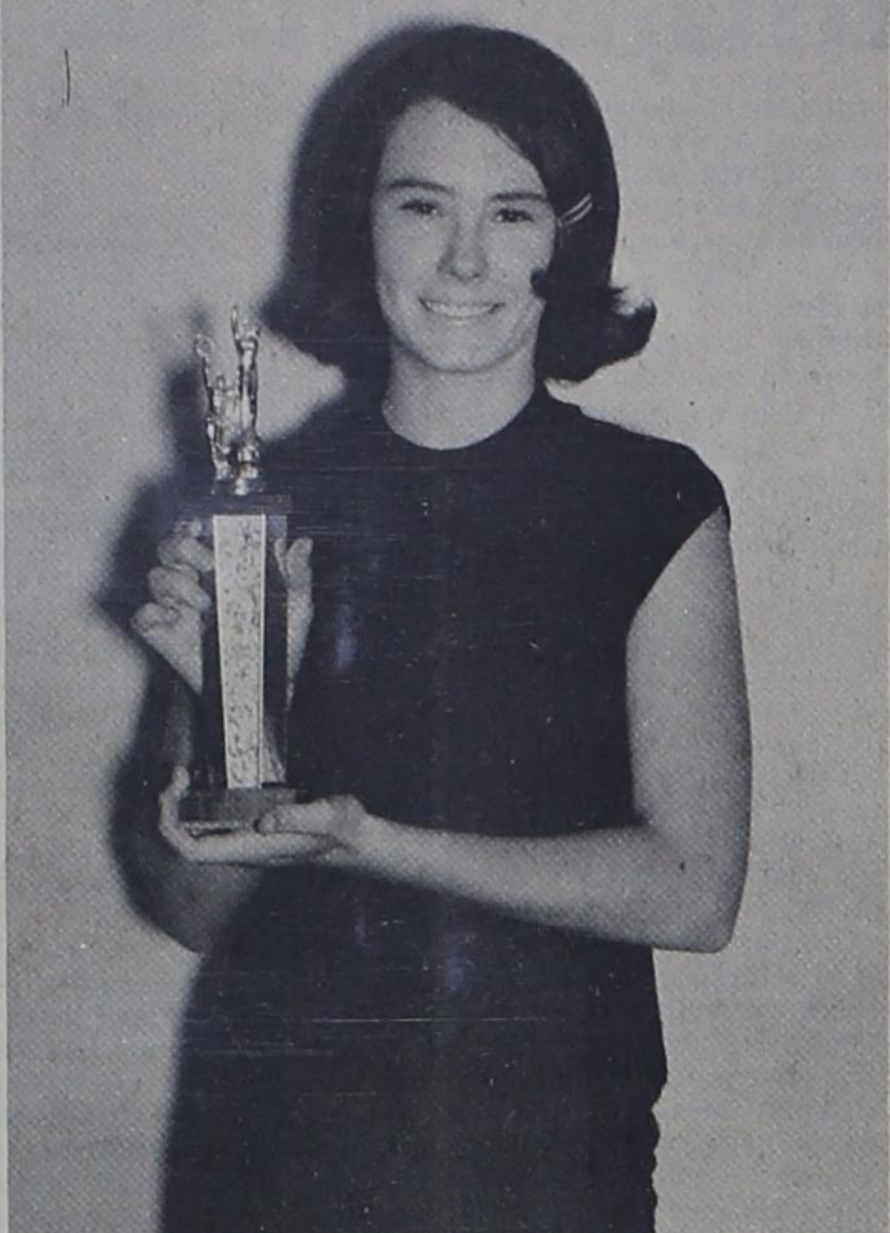
