in another one of the biggest doggoned hen eggs we have ever seen. As a matter of fact, we strongly suspect that Blackie has an ostrich somewhere in his flock that four agencies will be due, including December. he's never spotted. It might even be a dinosaur for all we know, to judge from the eggs he comes in

If your're interested, here are the astounding figures on the latest egg Blackie has brought in. It is 31/4 inches long, 71/8 inches around the middle, 81/2 inches around end-to-end, and weighs five ounces.

By comparison, he also brought in one of those little pullet eggs that weighs one ounce. It looks as though it came from a sparrow's nest compared with the big one.

Blackie has a lot of faith entrusting this egg to our care. He brought one in a couple of weeks ago that was about the same size, and we managed to break it-inside a borrowed car-and was that ever a mess.

This time we have very carefully set the egg up for display at our office and if you don't believe the dimensions, come in and check 'em for yourself.

Here we go on fish stories. again. The Henry Reynolds, who seem to be the most truthful fishermen we've seen lately, have just come back from the Costal Bend of Texas, and while down there they visited with the Walter Menefees at Corpus

You will remember the Menefees as the bunch that is always sending back pictures and stories of the big catches they make out in the Gulf from their yacht. This usually causes us land lubbers up here on the High Baldies to turn green with envy.

The Menefees even sent us some fish they called sheepshead earlier in the year to back up their stories, and it proved mighty good eating. since hearing the Reynehart we are beginning to wrexas the big catches.

Mrs. Reynolds caught a four-inch hard head cat, and Keith (Menefee) snagged only several small perch. Henry had the best luck with a haul which included a twopound whitefish and a crab.

Our cotton production canvass is going about so-so. We don't know whether to feel good or disappointed with results. About 650 inquiries were mailed out, and at the present time, we have about 200 or a few more replies.

Whether this is a good kickback on this type of survey we just can't say, as this is the first time we know that anything like this has ever been tried.

What we are trying to find out, of course, is how much cotton was produced in Parmer County last year--1953. Returns from the county gins give no real indication of how much we raised, since so much was taken elsewhere

for ginning. To give you proof of our contention that in-county gin tag figures are nowhere close, we cite one particular card which listed over 800 bales produced "none of which was ginned in Parmer County," according to

the grower.

He was not required to list this formation, he just volunteered formation for the grower. information, he just volunteered it. We suspect that there are many other similar instances, and it certainly would not take too many such examples to result in a big margin between what we ginned and what we produced.

Why is this being done? Many people have asked us. The best reason, we think--outside of plain curiosity-is to establish for Parmer County its righful recognition as a bona fide cotton produc-

Many newspapers and magazines of regional state, and national circulation publish figures on cotton ginnings county-by-county. This is generally considered a "rule of the

thumb" way of finding out how much cotton was produced. But it won't work out here--or at least it certainly didn't last

year--and we feel that the facts ought to be obtained if at all possible. Please-if you are a otton grower and have not returned your card, do so at your earliest convenience.

Uncle Sam Still No Model For Family Budgeting

Fathers and mothers are well acquainted with the responsibilities incurred toward their children insofar as setting examples is concerned. They, better than anyone else, know that they are the models of behavior for their sons and daughters.

This being the case, the conscientious mother or father is usually careful of what they do lest their actions be mirrored by their offsprings. Honesty, cleanliness, and humbleness are virtues taught in the home, and there are also more practical lessons picked up by the younger generation.

It is usually at home where a boy or girl learns to handle financial responsibilities. They either learn to pay bills promptly or delay them as long as is possible. They either learn to live within their incomes or to buy on time more things than they can possibly pay for.

Just as parents influence their children, so does the federal government influence individuals. And Uncle Sam, we are afraid, is not setting a very good example of how to handle money. Right now he is making about \$65 billion a year, and is spending about \$70 billion. This would not be so bad, except for the fact that he is already in the red \$275 billion, or more than four years of his total income. That is not a healthy situation.

Pledges by the present administration to bring the budget under reign were certainly commendable two years ago, and for that matter, they still are, but we are disappointed with the results. Congress has had to give in with a "temporary" clause allowing the budget to plunge deeper into the red than the \$275 billion limit.

Surely there must be something that the American people-or the world-can do without until we can get our budget back in shape.

Sounds Good, But Do You Think It Will Help?

Of interest to voters nation-wide is the recently publicized, and we presume recently organized, Fair Campaign Practices Committee, Inc., a group which is setting out to clean up senatorial election campaigns. That, we imagine, would be quite an under-

However, if they think that they may achieve any or part of their goal, we'll cheer them on, since Heaven knows that it's about time that elections get down to a level of some integrity. The Committee says "Nobody wants to take the spirit and kick out of political campaigning. It's the dirt we're after."

They are now circulating a "code of fair campaign practices" which contains seven vows supposed to keep campaigning on a respectable level. Steven A. Mitchell, head of the Democratic Party, and Leonard W. Hall, keeper of the Republican fold, have both affixed their names to it, and copies are now being sent to every member of the house and senate seeking election this year.

We thought that perhaps you might be interested in seeing what many campaigners are likely to solemnly vow, in order that you may watch with interest (mixed with disappointment, we suspect) the results in the next few weeks and months.

The proposed monthly sewer fee is \$1.50 for residences with four connections. A charge of 15c per connection will be added for residences having more than four connections.

SOME FACTS

YOU SHOULD KNOW ABOUT THE TEXICO WATER AND SEWER ELECTION ON OCTOBER 12TH

The election to be held on October 12 in the City of Texico to decide whether we shall or shall not have public improvements is one of vital importance to every person who is interested in seeing his community grow in a progressive and sensible manner. There are a number of questions that are being raised about this election, some born in sincerity, some not. Regardless of the type of question, however, we feel that there is a logical and honest answer to all of them.

Your city commissioners have spent many long hours planning this election, and they now are anxious to see that you, as a citizen, understand all of its rammifications. Every meeting of the commissioners has been open and public, and the criticism or comments of all parties has been welcome. The commissioners are doing their utmost to present to the citizens of this community a sound program for public improvement, which will result in higher standards of living for us all. First, we are anxious to make sure that you understand exactly what type of agreement is being made between the City and the group or groups who will, if the election carries, install our badly needed water and sewer system. One fact stands paramount above all others in this matter, and that is that these needed improvements, if built, WILL NOT RESULT IN INCREASED TAXES FOR ANY-ONE. No one's property will be mortgaged to pay for the cost of improvements. What this means is that the individual property or home owner will be fully protected regardless of what may happen to the sewer or water system.

The \$120,000 or less bond revenue that is proposed for these improvements will be secured by the improvements alone. This investment will be retired over a period of years by fees for the use of the systems. In case of default by the City, which is certainly not expected, the only recourse that would remain for the bonding companies would be for them to take over the operation of the systems. No loss of property to Texico citizens could ever result from such an arrangement.

The second point that we want to make certain that you, as a citizen, understand completely is the one of fees. Generally speaking, the citizens of Texico may expect to pay for their water-after the improvements are added-at about the same rates that they are now paying. The engineers that proposed the feasibility of this plan stated that the small user will pay slightly less for his water than at the present, and the big user will pay slightly more.
