AUSTIN—Texas insurance activity has boomed back into the news. This time it's a feud between the Board of Insurance Commissioners and Attorney Renne Allred, Jr. And it's destined for court action.

He charged in a public letter to the commission that he had been discharged after he refused to delete the name of a commission employee from a suit he is to file. The suit is against persons connected in fraud charges involving the Texas Mutual Insurance Company of Beaumont.

Laughlin C. Woodrow Laughlin, 79th District Judge removed by the Supreme Court and later voted back in the July primary, faces a suit attempting to disbar him.

The State Bar Association filed the suit in Alice through Attorney Earl P. Hall of Austin. It contains 11 counts against Laughlin, similar to the 12 charges by attorneys responsible for his first ouster from the bench.

Decision as to whether the attorney, a central figure in Duval County controversies, is to be disbarred will be left to a judge and jury.

Revenge was sweet for the Bovina Mustangs last Friday night as they trampled Friona's Chiefs into the dust 47-13. It was a win for which the Mustangs had longed since being upset 6-0 by the Chiefs last season. The game was played on the Bovina field.

Pacing the Mustangs was Darrell Read who accounted for much of the score, by scoring in each quarter. Donald Barron made the first score of the evening for Bovina when he plunged through for the final two yards, after a series of five first downs. Read made his first point of the evening by running the conversion.

Read then made a touchdown in the second quarter, from the three-yard line, and ran the conversion. Larry Ezell was the next scorer, running two yards, and Read ran the conversion.

First score for Friona was made by Wesley Barnett in the second quarter on a 28-yard run. Half-time count was 21-6, favoring Bovina.

Read made the most spectacular run of the evening in the third period when he charged 78 yards down the field for paydirt. Barron made the extra point. Friona also counted in the third period when Barnett again took the pigskin, and scored on a five-yard run. Jerry Houlette made the conversion.

Three Mustang touchdowns were results of the final quarter of the ball game. Scorers and yardage gained for the score were Neal Smith, three yards; Read, 18 yards; and Ezell, three yards. Barron made the conversion after Smith's touchdown, and the other attempts failed.

Final count was 47-13.

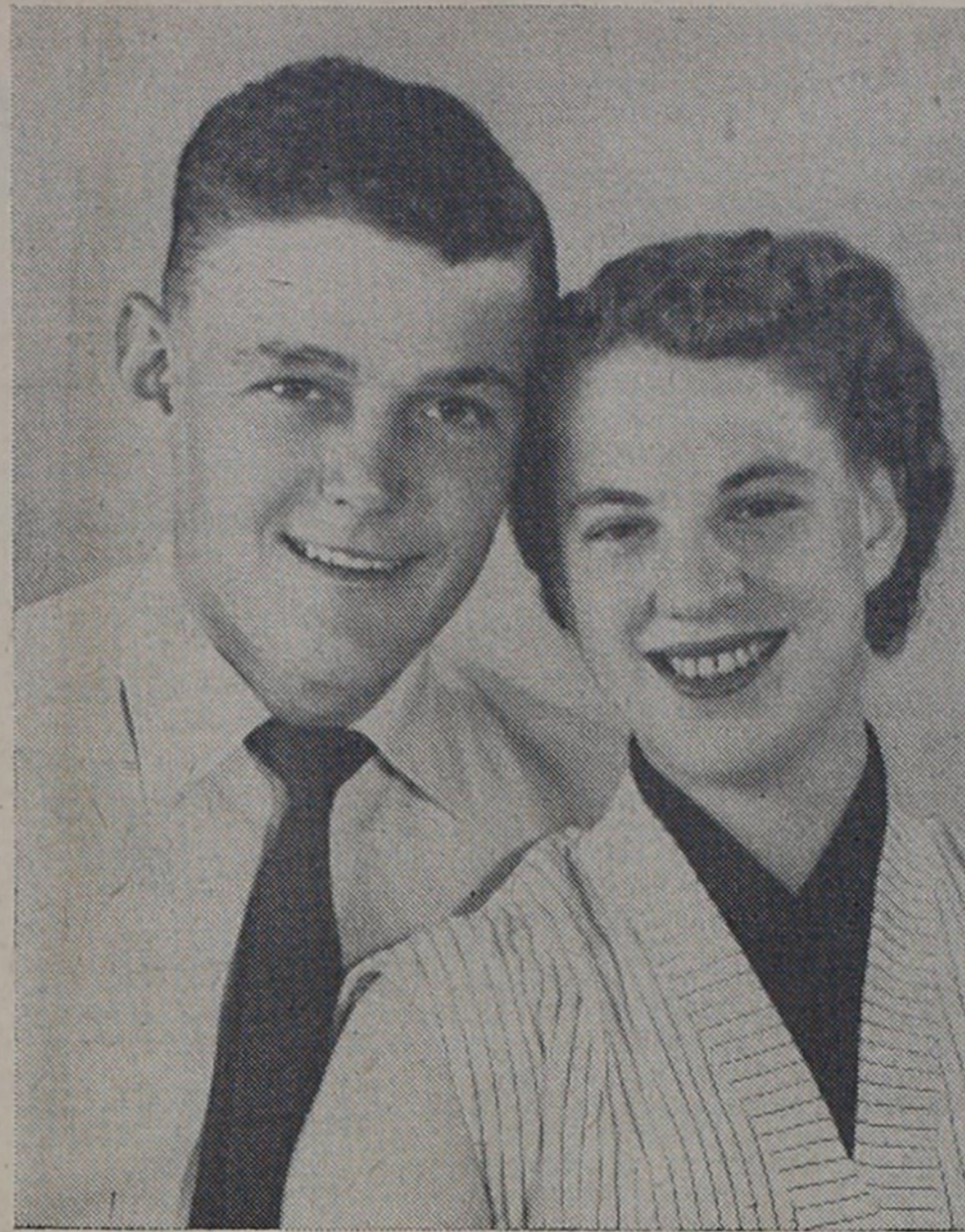

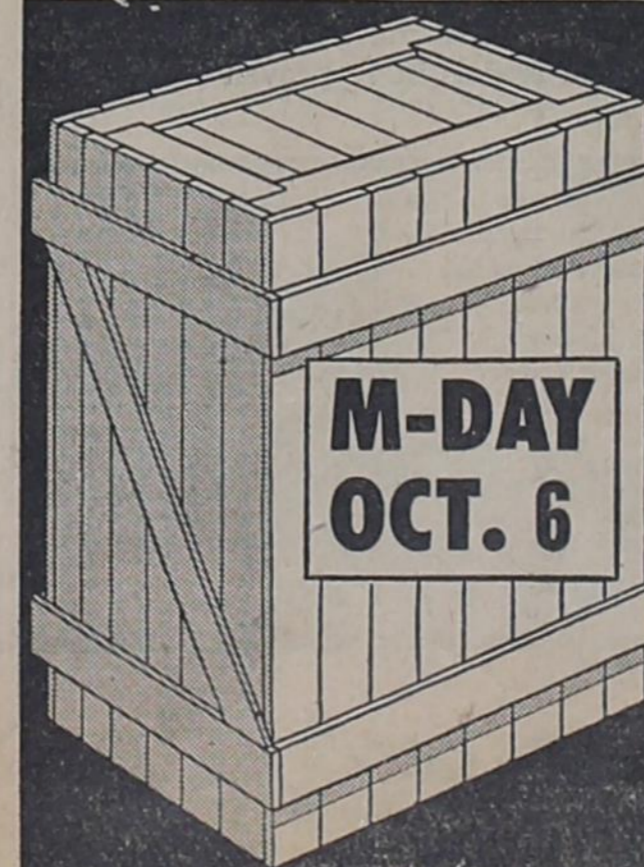
