FRIONA PATRONS WANT SITTING ROOM, APPROVE BOND ISSUE FOR NEW GYM

Census Will Start On April First

Patrons of the Friona school district, apparently weary of being cramped by inadequate space in both the school gymnasium and auditorium, flocked to the polls in a heavy sandstorm last Saturday to bond issue which will construct a new auditorium and gymnasium.

Approval of the bond issue on the final counting of votes stood 303 for as compared to 27 against. It was explained by Supt. Dalton Caffey that no raise in valuations or tax rate would be necessary to finance the proposed program. Under the Gilmer-Aiken set-up, it was pointed out, the Friona school this year is receiving \$30,000, and on the present \$1.50 tax rate, 34c would be sufficient to finance the building and remodeling program.

The overall project calls for three changes—elimination of the old auditorium in the present grade school building, construction of a new auditorium and gymnasium, probably under one roof, but separate units.

Space now devoted to the auditorium will be turned into four classrooms and additional rest-room facilities.

The new gymnasium will have a seating capacity of 1000, officials report, with sufficient room for each person to sit comfortably, which is a far cry from the present arrangement.

Under previous negotiations, the bonds have already been sold, and architects plans are now in the final phase with building expected shortly after the current school term is concluded.

March 31 Final Day For Old Auto Tags

Tax Collector Chas. Lovelace today reminded county motorists that Friday, March 31st, is the final day for obtaining 1950 license plates without paying a penalty.

The new 1950 tags must be displayed on all motor vehicles traveling public roads on and after April 1st. Attention was also called to the fact that all motor driven vehicles including motor scooters, were required to display license tags.

Clerks at the collector's office said today that they had been experiencing a rushing business in issuing tags the past several days, adding that many autos yet in the county remained untagged.

LOKEY IN HOSPITAL

Ernest F. Lokey, local attorney, is receiving treatment in a Clovis hospital for a heart ailment. Lokey, who is a former county judge of Parmer County, has been maintaining an office in Clovis the past few years. He was admitted to the hospital several days ago, following a heart attack.

The official 1950 census for the entire United States is slated to get underway on Saturday of this week April 1st, when workers in every county of the nation will begin the job of tallying all residents.

Walter S. Shaller, district supervisor, has announced from the Amarillo office that E. B. Noble, of Dimmitt, is the crew director for Parmer and Castro counties.

Special schools for enumerators have been held over the district during the past several weeks, at which time workers have been indoctrinated in proper procedure. The Parmer County workers attended such a school in Dimmitt the first of this week.

Taking over the job of counting noses in Parmer County are seven official enumerators, Noble announced. Mrs. Grace E. Whitefield and Mrs. Alfo F. Reeve will do urban work; N. J. Goodnough, Mrs. Mabel N. Crim, E. B. Choate, Miss Pat L. Ellison, Mrs. Jenoyce B. Ford and Irma Jean Harris, rural.

Chamber Commerce To Back Campaign For Stadium Fund

At a directors' meeting of the local Chamber of Commerce, held Wednesday night of last week, it was voted to back the movement for funds for a stadium at the Farwell football field.

Supt. Jack Williams said that already more than \$2500 had been raised for the stadium fund, and estimated that an additional \$2500 would be needed to construct a stadium of sufficient size to accommodate the crowds at local athletic events. Plans now under consideration call for a seating capacity of 1100.

Supt. Williams said that attendance at outdoor athletic events the past two years was only fair and he did not feel that the school's athletic program could shoulder the financial burden of erecting the stadium without the active support of the Chamber of Commerce.

Chamber officials agreed to back the movement and assist in every possible way to raise the additional money needed for the stadium. Plans under consideration now call for selling season tickets to athletic events, with a goal of not less than \$2500 raised by this means before the opening of the athletic programs of the school next fall.

Odis Huggins reported to the CC that there was a surplus in the Farwell street lighting fund, sufficient to put in an additional "four or five" street lights in Farwell, and he was instructed to proceed with installing these lights at the most needed locations.

Bateman Now With Roberts Seed Co.

Alex Bateman, ex-county agent of Parmer and Deaf Smith counties, is now associated with the Roberts Seed Co., in Texico, where his main duties will be working in the interest of dairy and poultry improvement.

Robert Bateman, son of Mr. Bateman, skilled in scientific mixing of feeds, will be in charge of all feed mixing and blending at the Roberts plant.

Deadline For Filing In Texico Election Set For March 31

Texico Town Clerk W. L. Freeman said today that Friday, March 31, has been set as the final date for filing for places on three ballots in the Texico city election, to be held on Tuesday, April 4th.

Copy for the ballots will be turned over to the printers on April 1st, Freeman added.

No names for places on the ballots had been filed with Clerk Freeman early this week.

Voters of Texico will select a mayor, clerk-treasurer, and three councilmen in Tuesday's voting. Terms expiring this year include Mayor Orval Francis, Clerk-Treasurer W. L. Freeman, and Councilmen Carl McCully, Johnnie Lewis and John Lockhart. Ray Mears is the only hold-over on the council.

The election will be held at the town hall with the following officials presiding: G. W. Atchley, Russell Johnson, Ray Mears, judges; Mrs. Perry Crawley and Mrs. Mae Means, clerks.

Call Special Venire For Rape Hearings

District Judge E. A. Bills was here Tuesday from Littlefield for the purpose of calling a special venire of 108 men from which a jury will be selected to hear two rape cases in district court on Monday, April 17.

Audie Humphreys and Gordon Thurman, both of Amherst, who were indicted by a Parmer County Grand Jury last October, will go on trial charged with rape. The offense is alleged to have been committed somewhere between Farwell and Lariat on the night of Oct. 26, 1949, against Miss Florence Sadler, 23, of Littlefield.

This is the first time a special venire has been called in Parmer County since the George Hamlin trial, brought here on a change of venue from Amarillo a number of years ago.

High Winds Result In Little Damage To Parmer Fields

Strong winds and dust that whipped this area for a 60-hour non-stop period beginning last Saturday morning caused very little soil erosion in Parmer County, farmers report here.

Fields suffering the heaviest damage were those that were denuded of all stubble where the land was being leveled in preparation of irrigation.

Those covered with stubble and struggling, drought-stricken wheat withstood the high winds in surprising fashion. Reports say that the most serious damage to wheat fields was northwest of Friona, and the loss there was less than was anticipated.

Farmers generally agree that much of the wheat is still alive after five months of dry weather and would respond to moisture.

Incorporation Vote Probably In April

The election to determine whether or not Farwell will become an incorporated city will likely be held during the month of April, it was revealed here today.

No definite date has been set for the balloting as there is much legal procedure yet to be completed before the election can be called. Field notes, setting forth the limits to be included in the incorporation have been prepared and local attorneys are now working on other legal phases of the election.

Primarily, the move was launched with the view of voting bonds to install a sewer system in the town.

NEW WALKS GOING IN

New concrete walks are being laid in front of the Hardage Hudson building this week. Some new and attractive signs have recently been added to the front of the building.

Parmer County 4H and FFA boys are planning their annual spring fat stock and dairy show for next weekend, April 7-8, with the show to be held in the show barns at Friona, it was announced today.

The affair has been enlarged this year to include dairy stock, having previously been limited to beef cattle and swine entries. J. T. Gee, head of the Friona FFA chapter, said on Monday, but entry in all class is still limited to boys who are bona fide members of some Parmer County 4H or FFA organization.

Gee stated Monday night that T. L. Leach, of the animal husbandry department at Texas Tech, had definitely accepted as a judge for the show, and Leach reports that he will likely bring L. M. Hargrave of his department, as another judge. Ribbons and cash awards will be given in all divisions of the show. Dairy animals, swine, and breeding cattle in the beef division will be judged on Friday, with the beef stock group being rated on Saturday.

Finale of the show will be the auction sale, held at the barn, on Saturday afternoon, officials report.

In the swine division the rules state that three or more of the same breed will constitute a class, and if there are only two entries in a class, breeds will be combined. Exhibitors may enter two hogs in each class; gilts in the fat hog class are ineligible for gilt ratings. Fat litters will consist of five or more weighing 160 pounds and up, the litter owners may also exhibit a pen of three fat hogs from the litter with two to be shown as individuals.

Swine classes include:
1. Fat barrows, 160-225 lbs.
2. Fat barrows, 225-lbs. and up.
3. Fat litter, five hogs, 160 pounds and over.
4. Pen of three fat hogs, 160 lbs. or over.

5. Open gilts, 160-225 lbs.
6. Open gilts, 225-lbs. and over.
Premiums are, first, \$5; second, \$2, and third, \$1.

Dairy Cattle Department
The following classes will be used for each breed of dairy cattle, both for heifers and bulls.

1. Those dropped after July 1 1949.
2. Those dropped from Jan. 1, 1949 to June 30, 1949.
3. Those dropped from July 1, 1949, to December 31, 1948.
4. Those dropped from July 1, 1947 to June 30, 1948.
5. Those dropped from July 1, 1946 to June 30, 1947.
6. Those dropped prior to July 1, 1946.

Junior, senior and grand champion animals will be named in each division.

Other classes include: get of sire (four animals from one bull); individual herds (5 animals owned by one boy); produce of dam.

Beef Cattle Department
1. Pen of five.
2. Pen of three.
3. Individuals: lightweights, 850 lbs. and under; heavyweights, 850 lbs. and over.

The beef stock will also be classed according to grade: prime, choice, good and fair. Breeding classes will have two divisions: heifers under two years, and those over two.

Special classes have been set up to show daily gain on beef stock, with three groups listed: pen of five calves purchased before July 1, 1949; pen of five calves purchased after July 1, 1949; and pen of three calves.

Red Cross Quota In Sight, Spring Says

"We are within striking distance of our quota," County Finance Chairman of the Red Cross, Frank Spring, of Friona, reported early this week, adding an earnest appeal that all workers over the county do their utmost during the final days of the campaign.

The roll call membership drive ends with the last day of March and Chairman Spring gave it as his opinion that the Parmer County quota of \$1300 could be realized "with a little extra effort on the part of the solicitors".

Friona was far out in front of the rest of the communities of the county, with a total of \$600 reported, he said. In Farwell, Frank Seale reported "approximately \$275" and Mrs. Bev. Buchanan and Mrs. John Hand have turned in \$105.80 from the Lakeview community.

No report had been filed with the county chairman early this week from Lazbuddy, Rhea, Bovina, and Oklahoma Lane.

175 Attend Annual Bovina CC Dinner

With 175 members and visitors present, the Bovina Chamber of Commerce staged its annual banquet at the school cafeteria Monday night with the Women's Study Club serving the meal.

Rev. E. J. Speegle, pastor of the Bovina Baptist Church, presided as master of ceremonies. Visitors from Farwell, Bovina and Clovis were among those seated at the tables.

R. B. McAlister, of radio station KICA, Clovis, was the main speaker of the evening, selecting as his subject, "Cheer up, check up, chin up."

In a short, snappy talk, well supplied with plenty of wit and good humor, McAlister said that if there "ever was a time when we should get rid of our grouches and be happy it is the year of 1950".

"Take a little time out and check up on some of those grievances you have been holding against somebody, and see how insignificant they might be after all," he added.

Speaking about building a town, McAlister observed that "intelligent planning must proceed constructive action," and he went on to advise that "a plan be set up for your city's growth".

Signs Confession On Plainview Break-in

Melvin Gaines, who is being held in the Parmer County jail on a charge of burglarizing the Cicero Smith Lumber yard at Bovina on the night of March 13, has signed a confession admitting a break-in at Plainview on the night of March 9, Sheriff Chas. Lovelace stated today.

A drug store in Plainview was entered through the roof on the night of March 9, and loot including 19 watches was taken, officers said, adding that Gaines had admitted doing the job unassisted. Suspicion centered on the man being held in jail here when a watch was found in the car of Deputy Sheriff Frank Smith. Officers believed Gaines deposited the timepiece in the car as he was being brought here following his apprehension at Bovina, while allegedly engaged in burglarizing the lumber yard.

Jimmie Gaines, brother of the prisoner being held here in lieu of \$8000 bond, is reported to be in the Hale County jail at Plainview, where he faces charges as an accomplice in the Plainview job. Law enforcement officers said that Jimmie Gaines is alleged to have tried to dispose of some of the watches taken from the Plainview drug store at Lubbock.

Health Note

Texas State Department of Health

AUSTIN—The Texas State Department of Health's program of teaching food handlers sanitary methods of preparing and serving food continues to be very popular, according to Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer. It is one method of attack on that great group of respiratory diseases which include influenza, scarlet fever, measles, whooping cough and the common cold, the viruses of which are spread from person to person by the excretions of the nose and mouth.

Restaurant sanitation programs have become necessary because of changes which have taken place in our national eating habits. Once upon a time it was customary for most people in Texas and in the U. S. A. to eat three meals a day at their own table. To "eat out" was an unusual and exciting event. Now, all the family, including the baby, eat out.

In this constant mingling of people to eat and drink there exists a vast and complicated arrangement perfectly designed for exchange of saliva via cups, glasses, spoons, forks and fingers that go in and out millions of mouths. There are few hours in the day in any community when these vectors of respiratory and other diseases are not busy.

The prime purpose of restaurant sanitation is to have all dishes and utensils sterilized and to have all those who handle or serve food understand and practice restaurant sanitation every day and all the time.

The public in each community needs to be concerned about the cleanliness of its public eating places. You can help by demanding cleanliness in the places you eat.

Questions & Answers

Q. After I had mailed my last NLI premium by postal note, I realized that I had failed to identify myself on the note. What shall I do now?

A. You should write to VA at once giving the amount of the postal note, date and post office from which it was mailed as well as your name, address and policy number. In future premium payments on postal notes you should make sure you write your name and address clearly on the back of the note and your policy number on the front.

Q. My husband, who is now totally disabled, received a bad conduct discharge. Is he barred from receiving benefits from VA because he was not honorably discharged?

A. Under existing legislation, it is not necessary for a veteran to have an honorable discharge in order to be awarded VA benefits. It is, however, necessary that the discharge be under conditions other than dishonorable.

Q. I am at present receiving \$15 monthly compensation. If I become permanently and totally disabled for causes not due to service, will I be

entitled to nonservice pension?
A. Yes. Payment will be made to you under the benefit paying the higher amount, if you are otherwise eligible.

Q. I have been disabled ever since my discharge from the Army two years ago, but only recently did I make application for compensation. If VA allows my claim, will payment be made retroactive to date of my discharge?

A. No. The general rule with reference to the effective date of award of compensation is that it becomes effective as of the date of application. If application is filed within one year from date of discharge, the award may be made retroactive to date of discharge.

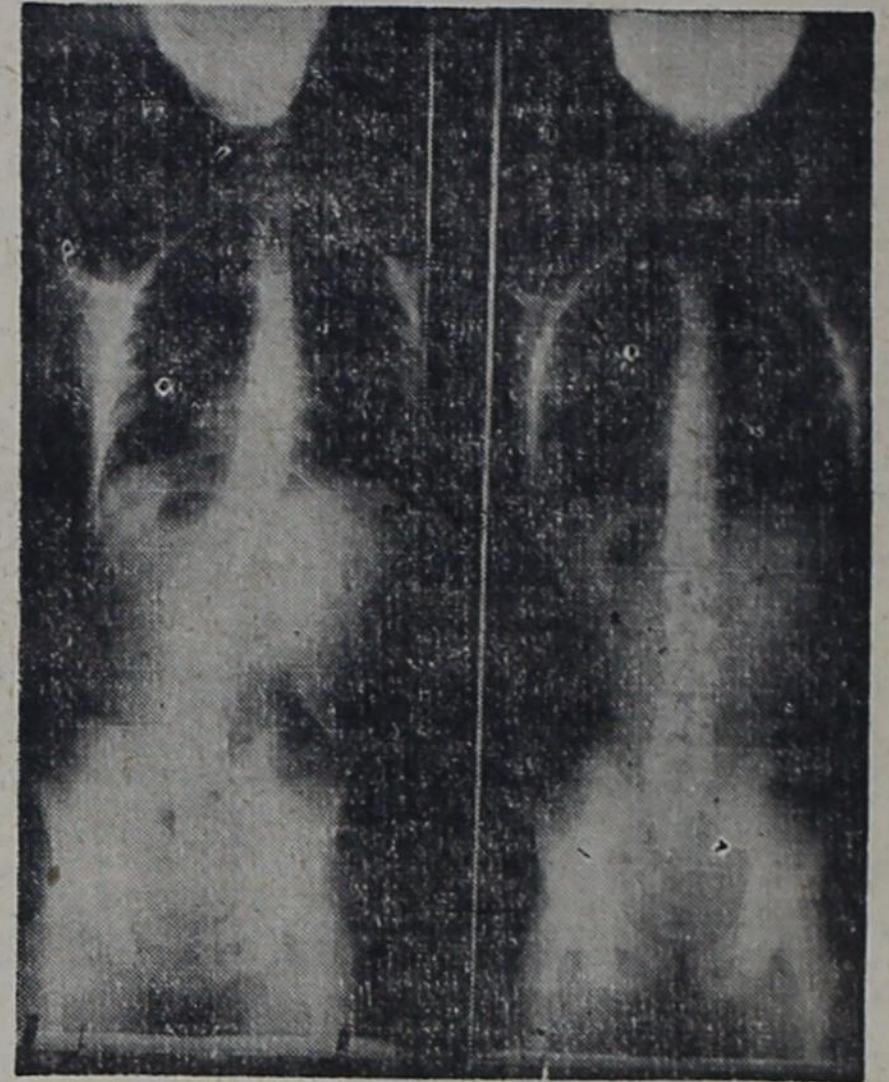
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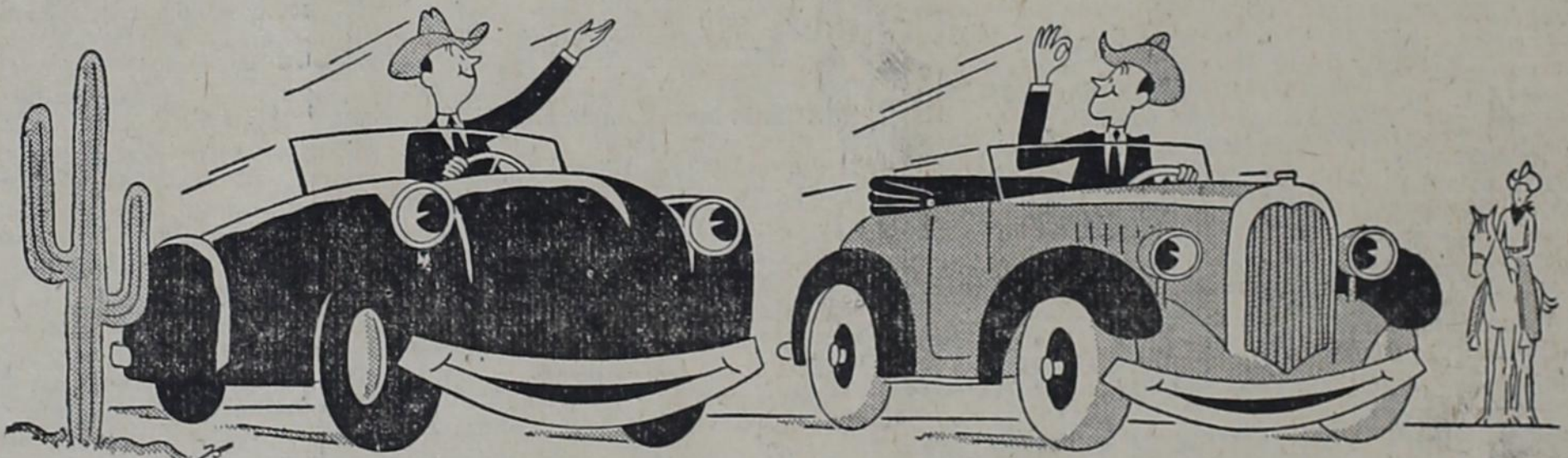

Perryton Man Explains Stand On Vital Issues In Race For Congress

LeRoy (Pete) LaMaster of Perryton, this week authorized The Tribune to announce his candidacy for the office of Congressman of the 18th District.

In making his announcement, Mr. LaMaster explains his stand on some of the issues that most people are interested in at this time, and says that he will be glad to explain his position on other matters of interest to the people of this district.

1. Do you favor the Taft-Hartley Act?—I feel there is a definite need

Do you favor such regional federal projects as TVA?—Yes, there is no private capital available to undertake such an enormous project.

6. Do you favor Federal support for education?—No, I feel that federal support without control is impossible.

7. Do you favor a Veterans bonus plan?—Yes, on the basis of equalizing benefits received by all veterans.

8. Do you favor reducing government costs by reducing military expenses?—Yes, but not to the extent of crippling our defense, but on the basis of more efficient organization. No, I do not feel there is a need for

increasing national defense expenditures.

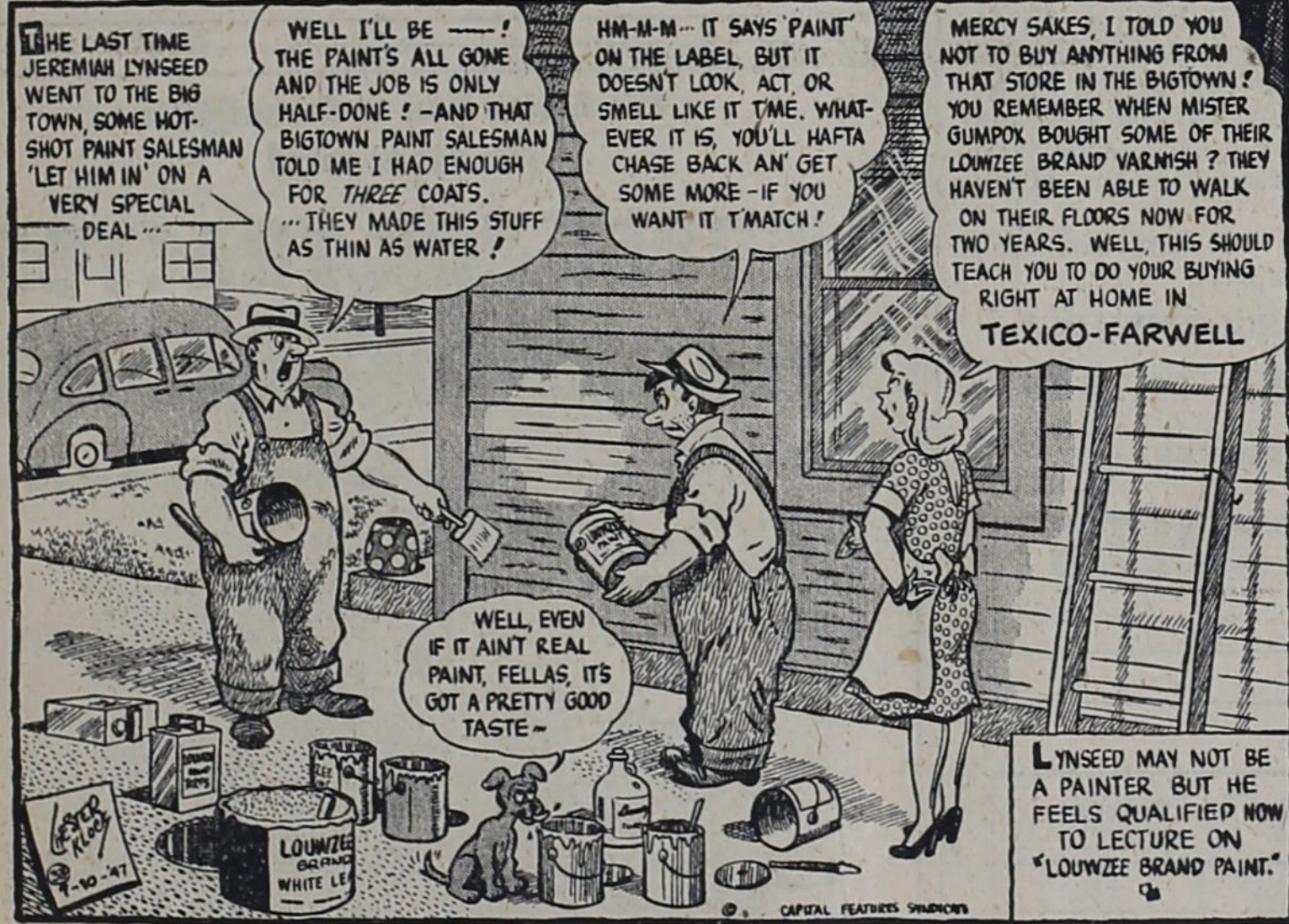

TROUT SEASON SHORTER

A digest of the New Mexico hunting and fishing laws, issued for 1950 and released this week by LeRoy Faville, local license agent, reveals that the trout season in New Mexico has been shortened ten days this year. Previously, the season on trout was opened on May 15, but this year the opening date has been set at May 25.

Other minor changes are noted in the 1950 laws, but the date dealing without trout season is the most important change made for the current year.

Graduate School To Train Workers

AUSTIN—Training workers for social service agencies will be the function of the new University of Texas Graduate School of Social Service, authorized by the 51st Legislature.

The school will open in September. Courses to be offered will be announced later, President T. S. Painter said.

The number of students to be admitted will be limited and the beginning group will be selected by the faculty. Applications should be directed to Main Building 2210, University of Texas, Austin.

The University's Graduate School of Social Service will be the first publicly-supported school of its kind in Texas and one of very few in the Southwest. The Legislature appropriated \$37,500 for its operation during the fiscal year beginning Sept. 1.

Dr. Walter Pettit, who retired recently after 21 years as directed of the New York School of Social work is serving the University in a consulting capacity in planning the program and administration of the new school.

AUSTIN—Ten University of Texas faculty members will take part in Southwestern Social Science Association meetings in Houston April 7-8. Sociology Professor Harry Moore is president of the Southwestern So-

Speaking at the Association meetings will be: Economics Professors C. A. Wiley and Frederick Meyers. Government Professors Malcolm Macdonald and Stuart MacCorkle. History Professor Robert Cotner, Industrial Relation Professor Keith Davis, Business Statistics, Professor John Stockton and Firey.

Curry Buyers Take \$34,447.50 In Bonds

Residents of Curry County invested \$34,447.50 in U. S. Savings bonds during February, announced Reece Cagle, chairman of the county's Savings Bond Committee, today.

Of this total, \$32,447.50 was placed in Series E bonds. Santa Fe county residents invested more in Series E bonds last month than in any month since 1945. The total of all three Series—E, F, and G—placed in bonds by Union county people exceeded that of any post-war month.

Fertilizers Are Tested Via Irrigation Ditch

LUBBOCK—An experiment to determine the value of irrigation water as an agent for carrying certain fertilizers to the soil in wheat pastures is now underway at Texas Technological college.

Dr. A. W. Young, head of the plant industry department, says anhydrous ammonia is being added to the water and run through the pastures. Soon sheep will be permitted to graze in the pastures.

After the sheep have grazed for a specific period, tests will be made to determine the efficiency of the method.

He invited the local school to send two delegates to a state meeting on the campus of the University during the time of Highlands Day to help organize the chapter.

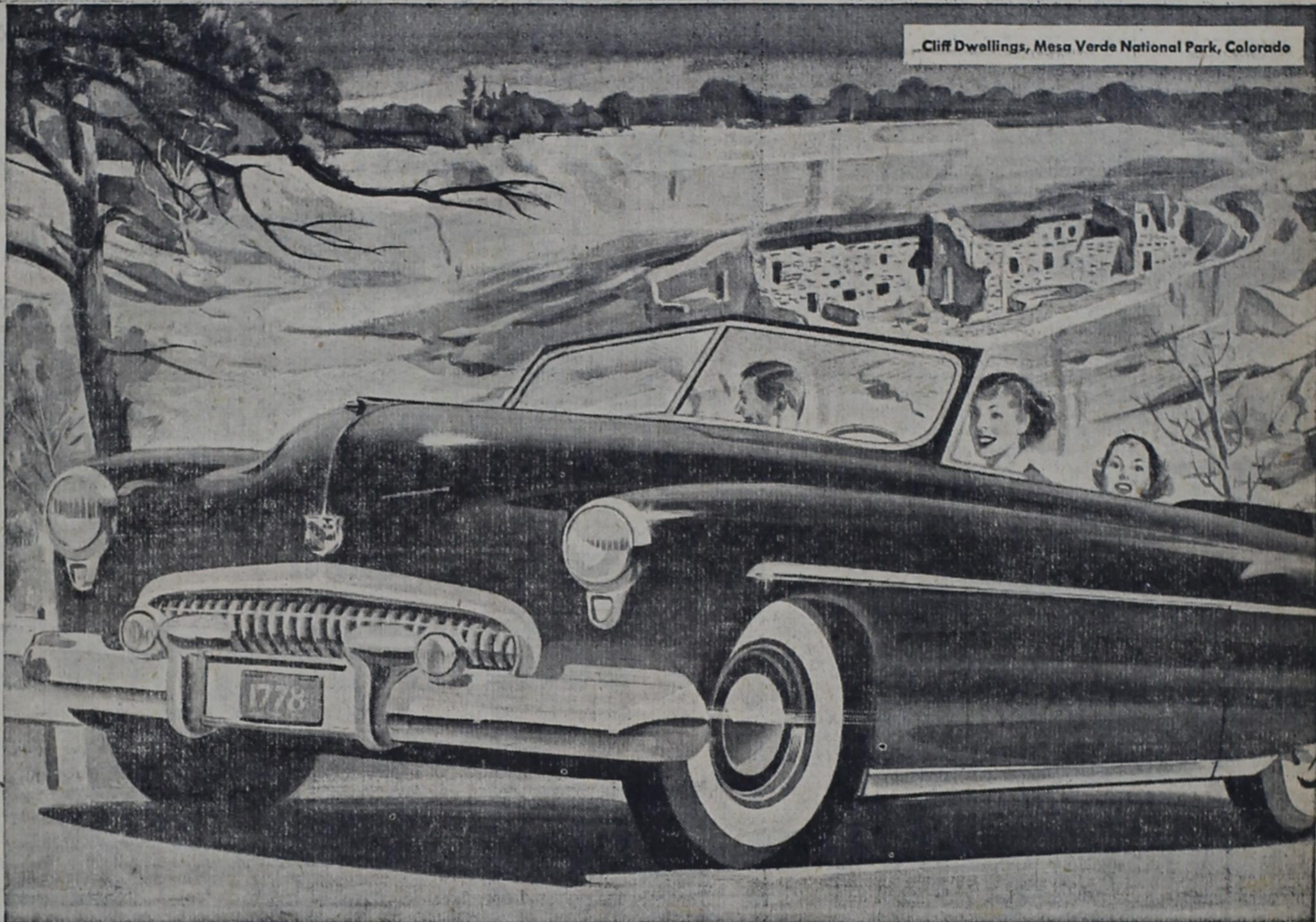

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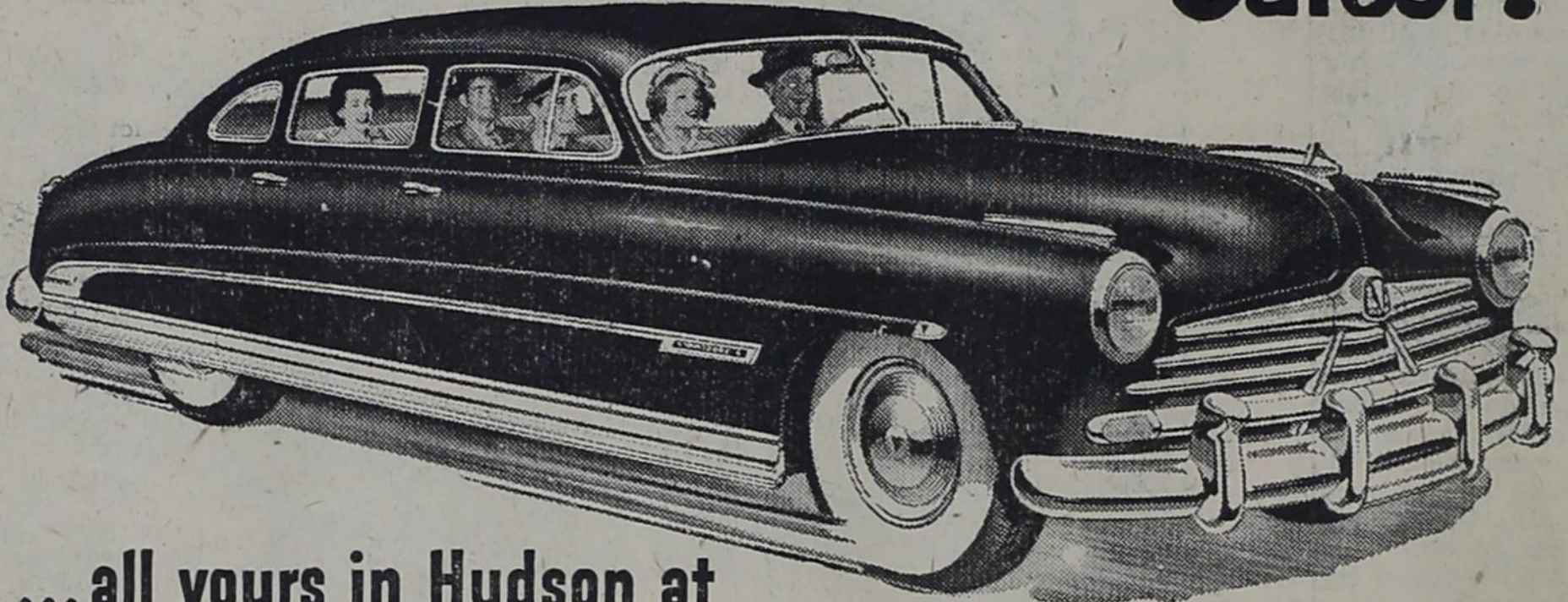
