each day.

Mothers wishing to have their children attend the school should contact Mrs. Cates. Deadline for enrollment of children is May 20. They may be enrolled at the home economics department between 9 and 10:30 a. m. on that date.

School needs for the children planning to attend include a complete change of clothing for each day. Mrs. Cates says that the children should be dressed in clothes that are amply large, warm, light in weight, not easily torn or mussed, and ones with simple fastenings. It is further recommended

that the child be dressed so that he can play on the floor.

Except by prearrangement, the children should not bring food to the play school. Neither should the children bring their toys. Mothers are asked to provide rest rugs and covers for their children. The rugs should be large enough so that the child's entire body will be protected. A small light blanket for covering the child will also be needed.

The purpose of the school is to provide an opportunity for home economics girls to observe children between the ages of two and five years.

Those wishing to enroll their children in the play school should contact Mrs. Cates for further details.

Daily schedule of the play school activities follows.

- 1:10-2:00, Indoor play and arranged excursions.
- 2:00-2:15, Music
- 2:15-3:00, 1. Toilet, wash hands
- 2. Fruit Juice
- 3. Get rugs from lockers and rest 15 minutes.
- 4. Fold and put away blankets and rugs.
- 5. Put on wraps, if cool outside.
- 3:00-3:15, Outdoor play
- 3:15-3:35, Toilet, wash hands.
- 3:35-4:00, Stories in small groups inside or outside
- 4:00-4:10, Dismissal.

certainly put wheat in competition with we grain sorghum growers,"

he said, "There is almost a billion bushels of wheat now in storage, more than half of which is poorer than milling grade."

As to the policies of the Farm Bureau, Kaltwasser made reference to a recommendation made by the board of directors (TFB) and 26 committeemen, in March of this year, acting under instructions from a resolution made at the state convention in 1954:

"We favor 90 percent of parity for basic commodities as long as supplies are in line with demand. If after 1957, supplies of basic commodities are still in excess of demand, we favor a price support level for all commodities that will reduce the support price of the commodity in surplus one percent for each two percent increase in above normal supply.

"We favor 90 percent of parity for non-basic commodities as long as supplies are in line with demand. If supplies are not in line with demand, we favor a price support level that will decrease one percent in support level for each two percent increase above nor-

mal supply."
The directors joined in making a statement that they hoped every farmer would let his congressional representatives learn his opinions, "regardless of whether they are in accordance with National Farm Bureau policies or not."

If the bill passes the House, it will then go to the Senate for debate and vote.

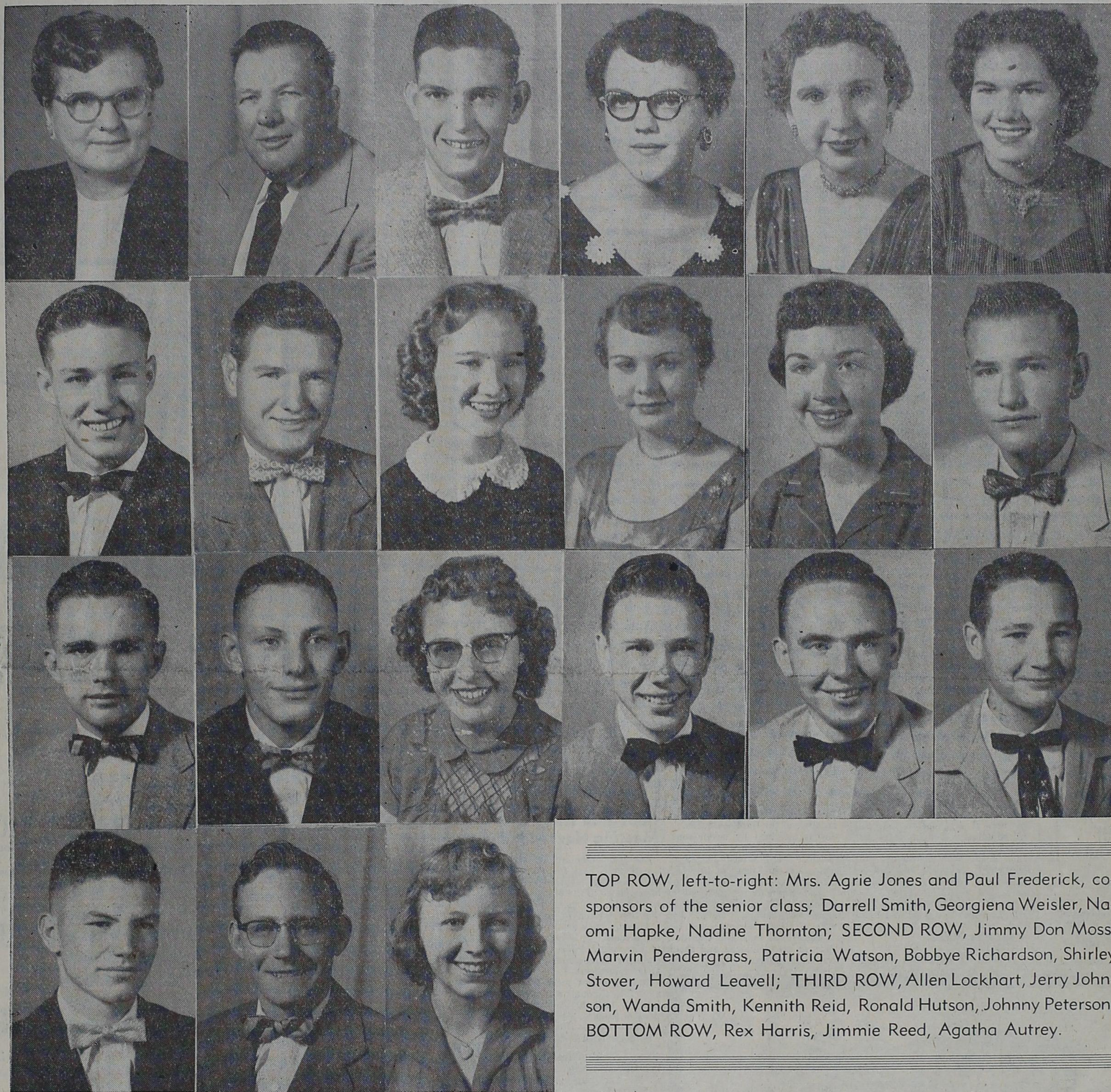

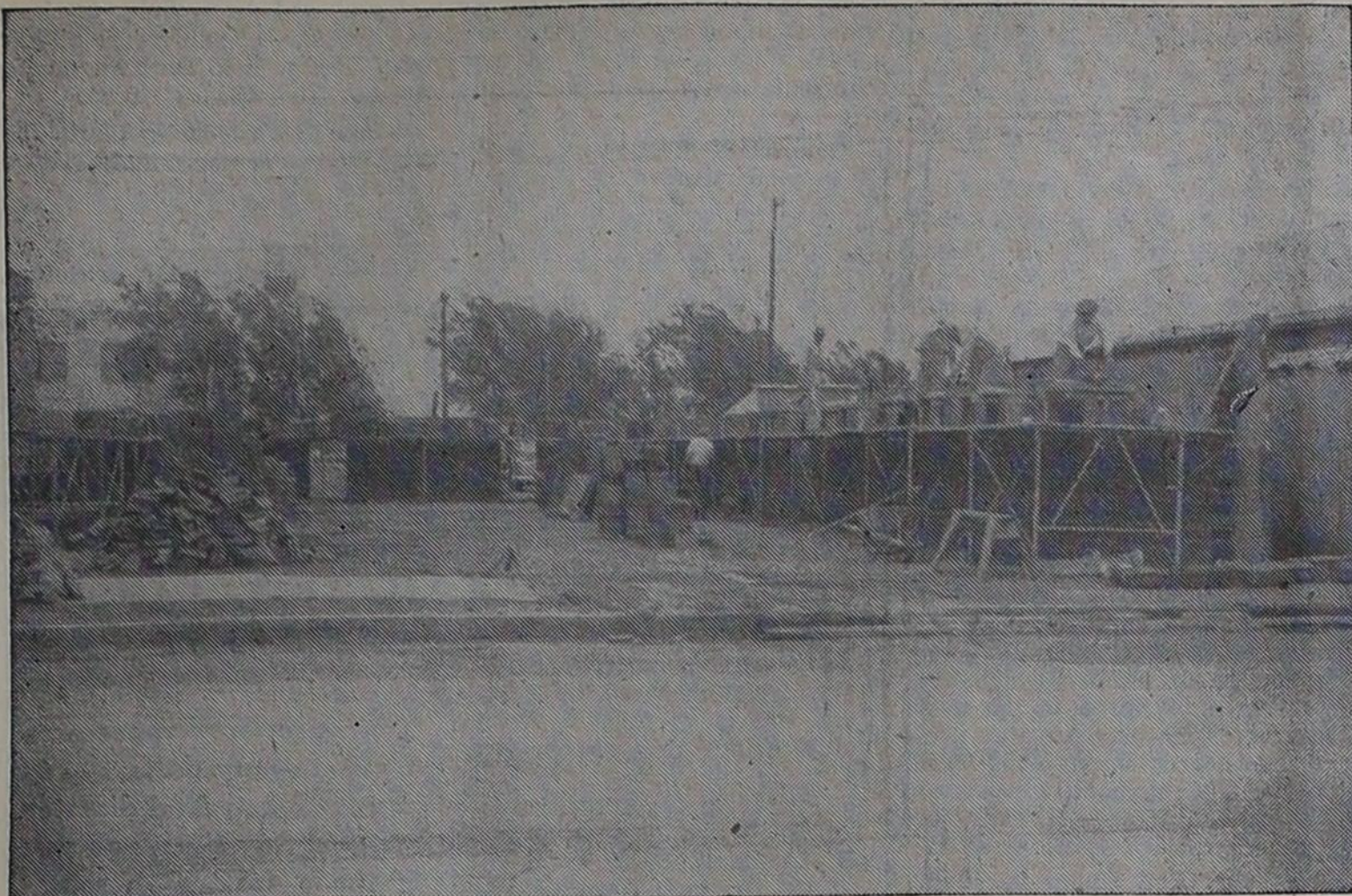
