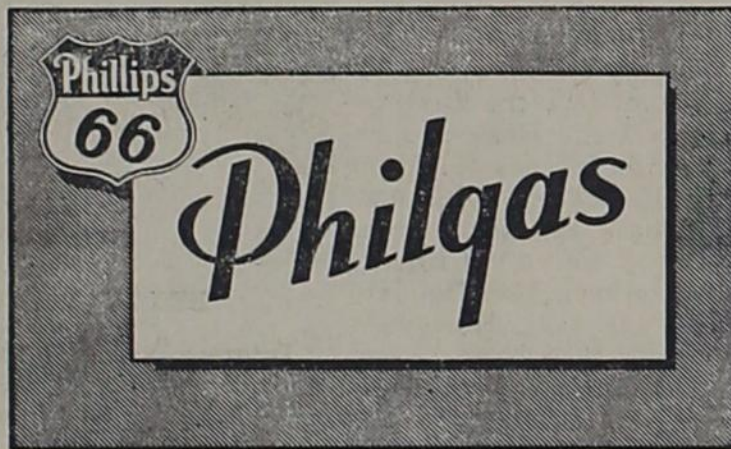

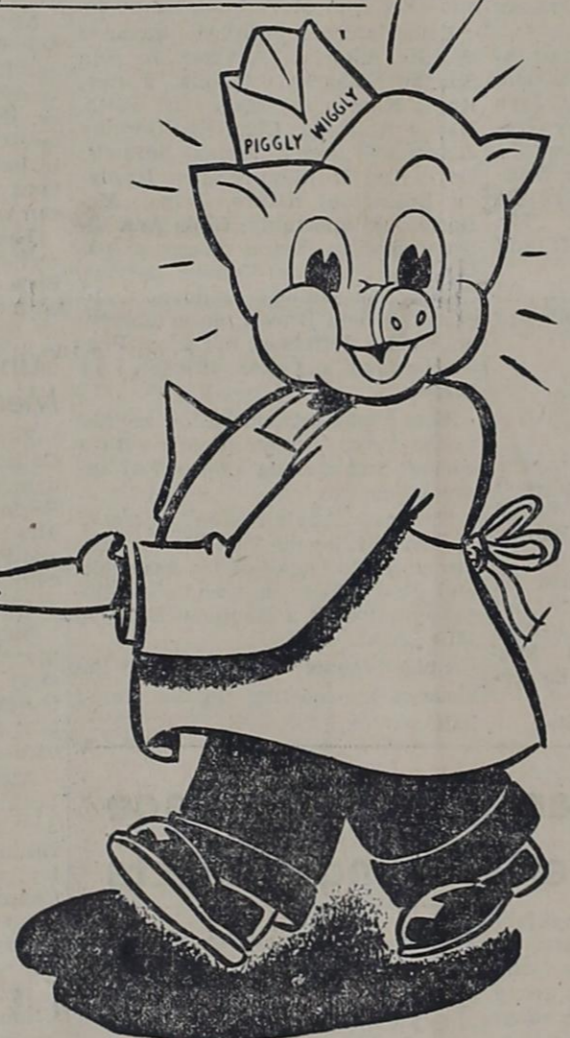

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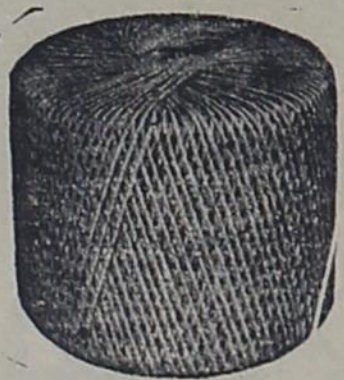

## Bovina American Legion Auxiliary Plans Recreational Program For Young People

Medals for winners in each group will be given. These have been ordered and should be here in about two weeks. When they arrive they will be put on display at the schoolhouse. The high school teachers will judge the essay contests and out of town judges will be procured for the debate," Mrs. Liles continued.

"Then, one night each month the Legion hall will be opened for the teen-age group. There will be ping-pong tables set up and shuffleboard set for games and if the group wants anything else we will arrange for it. Already some of the kids have asked if they can play Folk Games and of course this will be arranged

for. We will have instructors for all these games. Parents will be welcome to drop in and see what we have to offer the youngsters but the Legion and Auxiliary will be on hand to do any chaperoning deemed necessary. This is strictly for the young people and we believe that with the entertainment offered through the school, churches and the Legion that our kids will have ample recreational facilities and not feel that they have to go elsewhere for entertainment. Now to carry out these plans we earnestly solicit the co-operation of every member of the community and hope every man and woman eligible for the Legion and Auxiliary will join us. Our membership campaigns are underway at this time and when you are approached for your membership we hope you will not hesitate. So far, the response to our membership drive and our plans for the year have been extremely encouraging. We are now in the process of making arrangements for a permanent baby sitter to take care of the children during meetings.

"The Legion and Auxiliary will also sponsor two assembly programs at the school during the year. The first of these will be on November 14th when Katherine Magness and Jerry Pool of Farwell will tell of their experiences when they attended Girls and Boys State at Austin this past summer.

"This week, Mrs. Frank Smith and I have made numerous calls on prospective and inactive members and we will continue until we have contacted every eligible Auxiliary prospect. Our next meeting will be October 1st at 8:00 o'clock p.m. If you have not been contacted by then you are welcome to attend this meeting."

In conclusion Mrs. Liles said, "We sincerely hope that the young people will come and take part in our program. Your suggestions will be eagerly received.
