
Expressing bewilderment, one wanderer questioned a standee by the Guernsey's stall, and the embarrased owner had to admit that Velvet Pink apparently liked the colors. Before she was caught in the act, Velvet polished off her senior champion ribbon, and was starting in on the fancy grand champion rosette. Owner Means salvaged the latter, but carried it off home to forestall Velvet's future appe-

Jerseys, Guernseys, Brown Swiss, Holsteins, Milking Shorthorns and Ayrshires, the latter being recently brought to this section of the country by M. L. Means of Bovina.

Means began his dairy herd near Bovina a year ago. He purchased the Ayrshires from Miles Olson of Wynoka, Okla., only a few weeks past. Asked why he decided to buy the Ayrshire, not a common breed, the owner said, 'They are good cows and I thought it was about time they were introduced to this section of the country." He pointed out one small cow who gives five gallons of milk per day, and added that such a record isn't unusual for the Ayrshire breed of cattle, originally of Scotland.

More cattle in the Shorthorn division were entered this year than ever before, and the number of Jerseys decreased slightly. In other divisions, not many more cattle were entered in competition than were recorded last year. Barns at the fair grounds were overflowing, however, and fair superintendents stated that the quality of livestock was superior to any previous fair.

About 194 cattle and 100 hogs and pigs were crammed into the arena and tied outside for the two-day showing.

Approximately \$318,000 Received Here For Conservation Practices During Year

Eight conservation measures in Parmer County, carried out under the PMA program, have netted the More Store Room farmers of the county approximately \$318,000.00 for 1951 work, it was revealed by figures released today by Joe Camp, head of the local off-

The various projects, most of which have been fairly well scattered over the county as a whole, include both standard and diversion terraces, subsoiling, summer fallowing, contour listing aud chiseling, bench leveling, laying of underground irrigation tile, and permanent pasture sowing.

Bench leveling in particular is something new for the county, with around five or six small plots in the county being listed for this work around \$7.50 per acre, Camp said.

Another comparative newcomer in went surgery. the conservation field is the laying of underground irrigation tile, which is slated to avoid run-off water and at the some time also escape loss through evaporation. A total of 10,-000 feet of this tile was laid in the county, with the payment rate set

at 40c per foot. One of the big paving practices is construction of standard terraces, and during the fiscal year just closed, some 32 miles of such terraces were built, paying \$66 per mile; while diversion terraces topped the payment division, drawing \$130 for each of the 15 miles constructed.

Subsoiling of 60,000 acres, at \$2 per acre, nets a tidy total, as does summer fallowing, with some 10,000 acres listed at 60c per acre. Contour chiseling and listing (6 inches) of 60,000 acres in the county paid off at the rate of 30c per acre, and 800 acres of soil in the county were turned into permanent pastures, paying \$4 per acre.

Some Cutting Of Feed Crops Is Reported, Majority Of Fields Remain Too Wet

Harvesting of the enormous 1951 Seal Coat, Asphalt feed crop has begun in isolated spots over the Friona area during the Toppings Are Laid past week, but in the overall picture, the majority of fields are still not quite ready to get the combines, local observers believe.

Both local elevators report that they received their first cuttings some days ago, with honors apparently going to the O'Brian Brothers, south of town, who got into a dry- ing. land field two weeks ago, bringing their milo to the Friona Wheat Growers Elevators on September 7th. The feed tested 15 per cent moisture, and was believed to be cutting around 1,000 pounds to the

acre. Another delivery hit the same elevator on the identical day, with Mr. Sinclair, also of south of town, hauling in a load of milo from his irrigated field which tested 14.7% moisture and at that time was cutting around 2,000 pounds per acre. Sinclair expressed the belief that the field would cut around 4,000 pounds per acre in the heavier portion.

Calvin Talley brought in the initial load to the Santa Fe Grain Company, making his haul on September 12. The load weighed 4940 pounds, but showed a moisture content of 19% and Talley suspended operations on the irrigated crop until it had had an opportunity to do a little drying.

Dry-land fields, in general, will probably feel the cut of the combine swaths before the irrigated chiefs Win Second stuff is ready, since late August and ea v September heat put some of them in a rather burned condition. However, the general picture over the area seems to be good, for fields of both dry-land and irrigated feedstuffs.


