National Recognition Received by Tribune

Publisher W. H. Graham Jr., this week received notification from the National Editorial Association that The State Line Tribune "has placed in the top three in the Special Issue contest and in the Service to Agriculture contest" for 1955, according to a letter from NEA President Don Eck.

"This means," says Graham "that this newspaper has placed near the top in two contests sponsored by an organization embracing five thousand, two hundred newspapers in America.

It unquestionably is the highest award ever received by this newspaper at any time." People who read The Tribune each week know that heavy emphasis is placed in agricultural coverage, and it now is apparent that The Tribune does

one of the best jobs in the nation in this field.

The special edition was one published in connection with Soil Conservation Week last fall, and which featured many timely local and regional articles on soil conservation.

The exact placing of The Tribune was not revealed by the NEA president, and this information will not be disclosed until awards are handed out at the awards dinner, June 17, at the 70th annual convention of the group in Banff, Alberta, Canada.

As Publisher and Mrs. Graham are expecting their second child in the first week of June, it is questionable whether they will be able to attend the session.

To The Tribune's knowledge, the only other newspaper in this part of the country placing near the top is the Colorado City Record, a newspaper published twice weekly. An outstanding newspaper, the Record last year placed second in the nation in service to agriculture.

Winner of this category last year was a Mississippi daily. There are no restrictions in this contest as to the size of newspapers or the communities in which they are published.

Publisher Graham expressed his appreciation to The Tribune's advertisers. "It is only through your continued support that we are able to consistently publish a better newspaper," he emphasized.

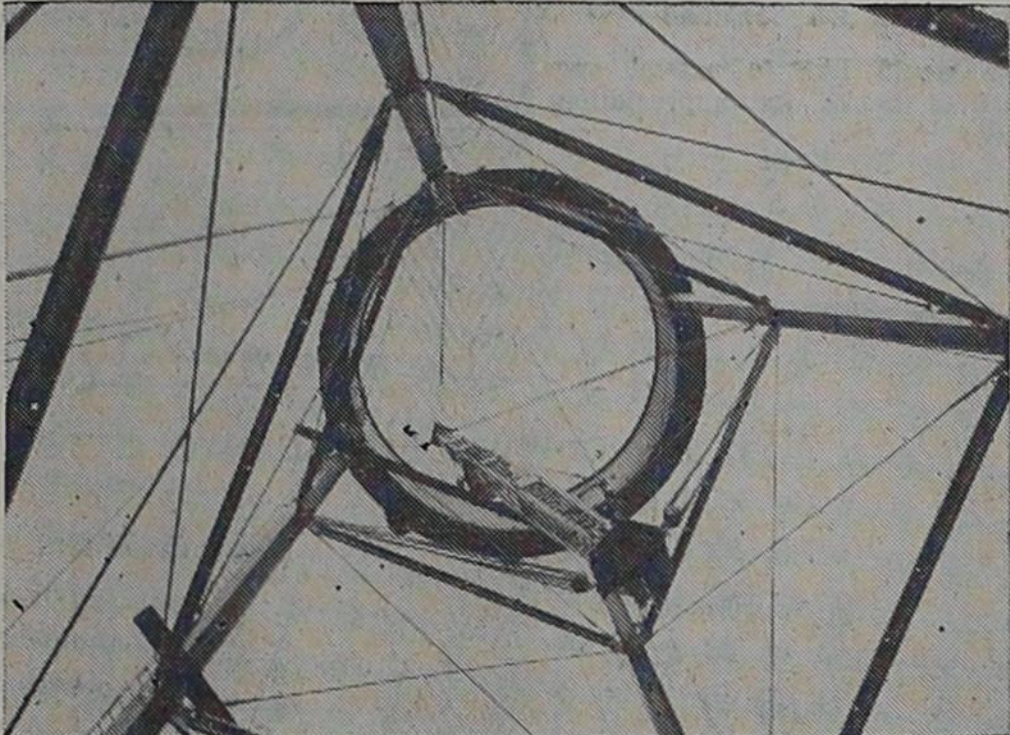

Tornado Activity Keeps Folks Jumpy

Verified sightings of several small tornadoes, and at least one instance of actual damage, has kept residents of this area a little on edge lately. The heavy clouds that brought rain late Wednesday worried them especially.

A small house, unoccupied, was destroyed by a twister which struck 1 1/2 miles east of the West Camp community about 5 o'clock yesterday afternoon. No injuries were reported in connection with this incident.

Johnie Williams was one of several local persons who said the storm could be seen from Farwell. No rain or hail fell in connection with this tornado, but "it sure tore up a lot of dirt," according to Williams.

Mrs. Sam Rundell and Mrs. John Lovelace were frightened when sighting three tornado-like funnels at one time. Both women were at the home of Mrs. Rundell near the Oklahoma Lane community.

As the storm approached and rain and hail began to fall, they headed for Farwell in their car, and soon outdistanced the storm. Returning a little later, they could observe no damage to the Rundell home, but much rain had fallen, they reported.

There were other reports of a tornado between Bovina and Friona. No damage was reported from this twister; in fact, The Tribune has not yet heard of anyone who actually saw the funnel touch the ground.

At any rate, it was a very exciting afternoon, and many families stood on porches or sat in their cars, keeping on the lookout.

As The Tribune went to press, rain was still falling, and storm conditions appeared not to be subsiding.

May Organize Bank In Bovina Next Week

A movement to organize and charter a bank for Bovina made itself evident this week, and for residents of that community, it was a main topic of conversation. There is no bank in Bovina at this time.

An informant, who requested that his or other names not be used until the group backing the movement has a chance to meet and make concrete plans, this week told The Tribune that a federal charter for a bank with \$100,000 capital will be sought.

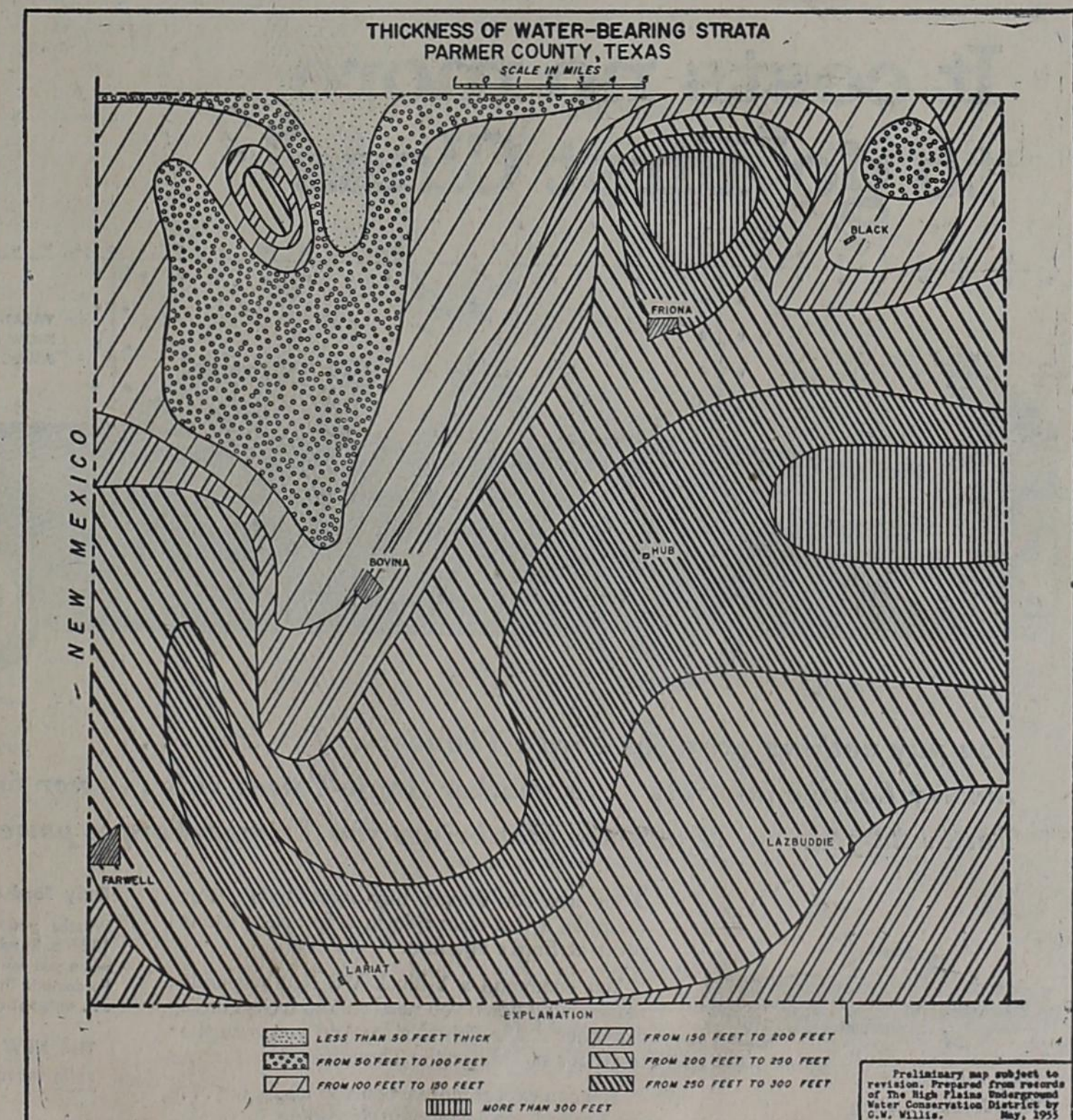
Plans are to call this new business the First National Bank of Bovina, and plans are

to build a building of modernistic design to house the bank.

Reports indicate that about 800 persons in and around Bovina are interested in the venture, although not to the extent that all of them will share in the financing of it.

As to the pro-ration of stock and details of capitalization, these are things which are hoped to be worked out in a meeting expected to be held the first of next week.

At the present time, it appears that the financing will be "about 50-50," with local persons sharing about half, and outside in-



The above map answers questions people have been asking for many years about Parmer County's water. A few generalities can be drawn from shaded portions of the map: The eastern half of Parmer County has more water than the western half; the southern half has more water than the northern half; the central eastern part has more water than any other part of the county; and the northwestern part is the only large area where water is in questionable supply. Note that a small pocket north of Friona, and another area east of Hub are the only locations reporting sand thicknesses of more than 300 feet. As a whole, Parmer County has a greater supply of water than many other parts of the High Plains irrigated area.

Lazbuddie Schools To Vote May 28 On \$180,000 Bonds

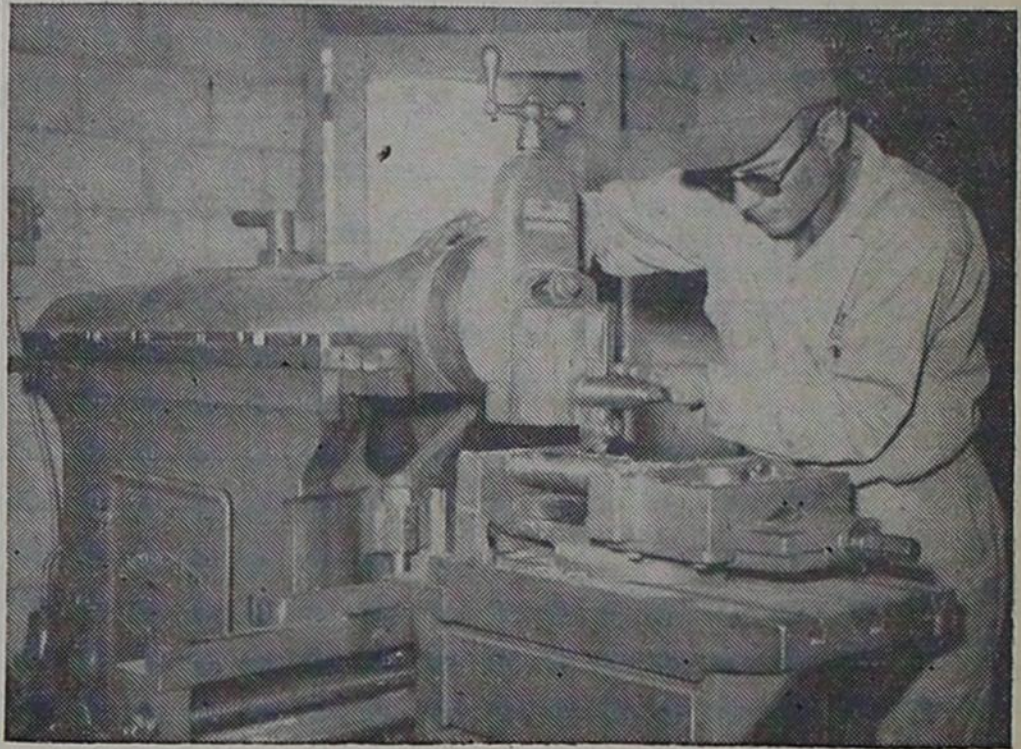
Patrons of the Lazbuddie School District will decide Saturday, May 28, whether to underwrite a proposed expansion program for the system with a \$180,000 bond issue.

Meeting Monday night of this week, the school board cleared the way for the vote, which, if supported by the patrons, will provide a new elementary building, auditorium, and vocational agriculture building.

An offer to buy the proposed bonds at three percent was heard by the board, although they entered into no agreement. The present bonded indebtedness of the district is \$122,000.

Sunday Breakfast Starts Fund Raising

To begin an effort aimed at raising from \$400 to \$600 to finance a summer recreation program for the youth of Texico-Farwell, an early-morning breakfast will be held Sunday from 7:30 until 9:30 in the Farwell cafeteria.

Backing the movement are several civic and church groups of the community, as well as many individuals. The Texico-Farwell Lions Club is attempting to oversee the fund-raising project, and will provide supplies and cooks for the breakfast.

By this week, estimates of the number of tickets sold for the first breakfast were placed at several hundred, although no actual count was available.

Lion President John Getz says the club is preparing to serve 500 Sunday morning, so response appears to be widespread.

The project got underway last Thursday evening when the Lions

met. A question was raised as to whether the summer recreation program could be instituted for another year, and the members hit on the idea of Sunday morning breakfasts.

Programs which have been conducted during recent years have cost the community from \$400 to \$600, and the majority of this amount has come from businessmen and a few individuals.

Facelifting Started For City of Texico

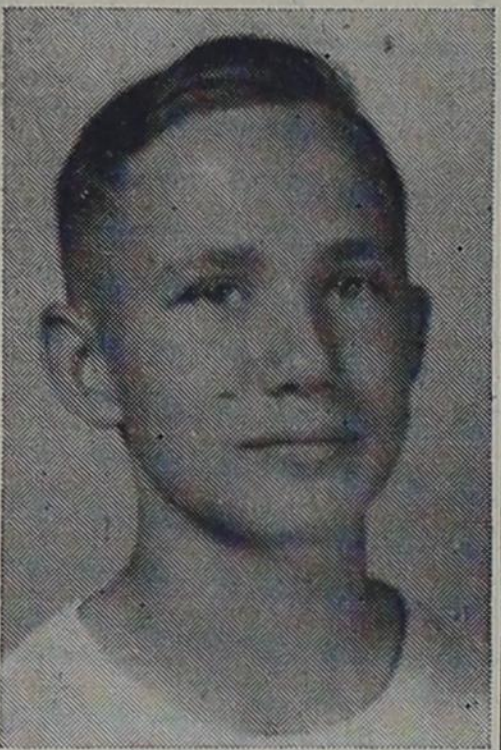
Several phases of activity are currently underway which will greatly change the appearance of Texico within the next few months.

For several weeks work has been in progress on a new sewer system, and on Monday of last week, work began on the water system with construction being started on a tower and 50,000-gallon storage tank; and a municipal water well. What's more, in about 45 days, the city will probably let a contract for about \$75,000 worth of paving for 27 blocks within the city. Engineering work is now being done.

That, in addition to the planned improvements at the school, amount to quite a little facelifting for the community.

Workmen for Pittsburg-Des Moines Steel Works are hoping to complete the big orange water tank this weekend, providing they get cooperation from the weather.

Watts Machine & Pump is drilling ahead on the city's well, and that work should be completed soon, also. Site of both operations is the city park southeast of the Baptist Church.

16,300,000 Acre Feet Water Stored Under Parmer County

How much water do we have? With a drought of four years duration, and with irrigation wells being installed at the rate of from 10 to 25 per week, that's a question that has been highly talked among residents of Parmer County.

Now, at last, there appears to be a fairly dependable figure available on the amount of irrigation water in storage beneath the fertile farms of this area.

The following article, and accompanying map, were furnished by the High Plains Underground Water District, whose personnel have been assimilating and evaluating technical data on

our water resources for the past several months.

This story is a "first" for the High Plains, as Parmer County is the only member of the 13-county Water District to be so studied. Other counties will follow later.

Parmer County contains approximately 16,300,000 acre-feet of underground water in storage available for pumping.

The map of Parmer County shows the thickness of the water-bearing strata between the water table and the top of the redbeds. The patterns on the map show the ranges of thickness of water-bearing

strata throughout the county.

The map and studies of this type are parts of the regular technical work in progress by the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District.

This information was compiled by G. W. Willis, geologist with the Water District, from records of wells on file in the office of the Water District in Lubbock.

The quantity of water available for pumping was determined by computing the total volume of water-bearing strata in the underground reservoir in Parmer County and multiplying this total by the coefficient of storage of 15 percent. (Continued on last page)



# THE TRIBUNE'S EDITORIAL COMMENT

## "Trend" Factor in Allotments Gets Whittling by TFB

Texas Farm Bureau's Board of Directors, through a recommendation made by that body last month, is whittling away at the only chance Parmer County cotton growers ever have of increasing their allotments: the "trend" factor.

In parceling out allotments for 1955, the state committee of the ASC passed along 16,000 acres wholly for trend purposes which otherwise would never have been planted in the county under the present system of allotments.

In so doing, they recognized Parmer County as leading all other counties in Texas so far as new development in cotton growing is concerned. On a percentage basis, this county received the greatest consideration in the state for trend factor.

At a meeting of the TFB board of directors April 12-13, recommendations were made which since then have been passed on to the American Farm Bureau's committee on cotton.

To quote the May issue of Texas Agriculture, official bulletin of the TFB, "Farm Bureau is recommending that state reserves be lowered from ten to two percent and county reserves from 15 to 4 percent."

It is from these reserves that alterations in allotments growing out of unusual hardship cases—and the trend factor—come. Lowering the state and county reserves would unquestionably lower the acreage available for trend, because the reserve is the only thing which can be drawn upon without special legislation.

Without consideration for trend, Parmer County can never hope to substantially increase its allotments as rationing of acres continues through the years. There is no immediate hope seen for de-control, and this part of the country just hasn't

This is not an argument on the merits or demerits of the trend factor. Persons who live in new cotton areas like it. Growers who live in the Southland think it an abomination.

The fact is, however, that reducing trend reserves will reduce allotments for Parmer County.



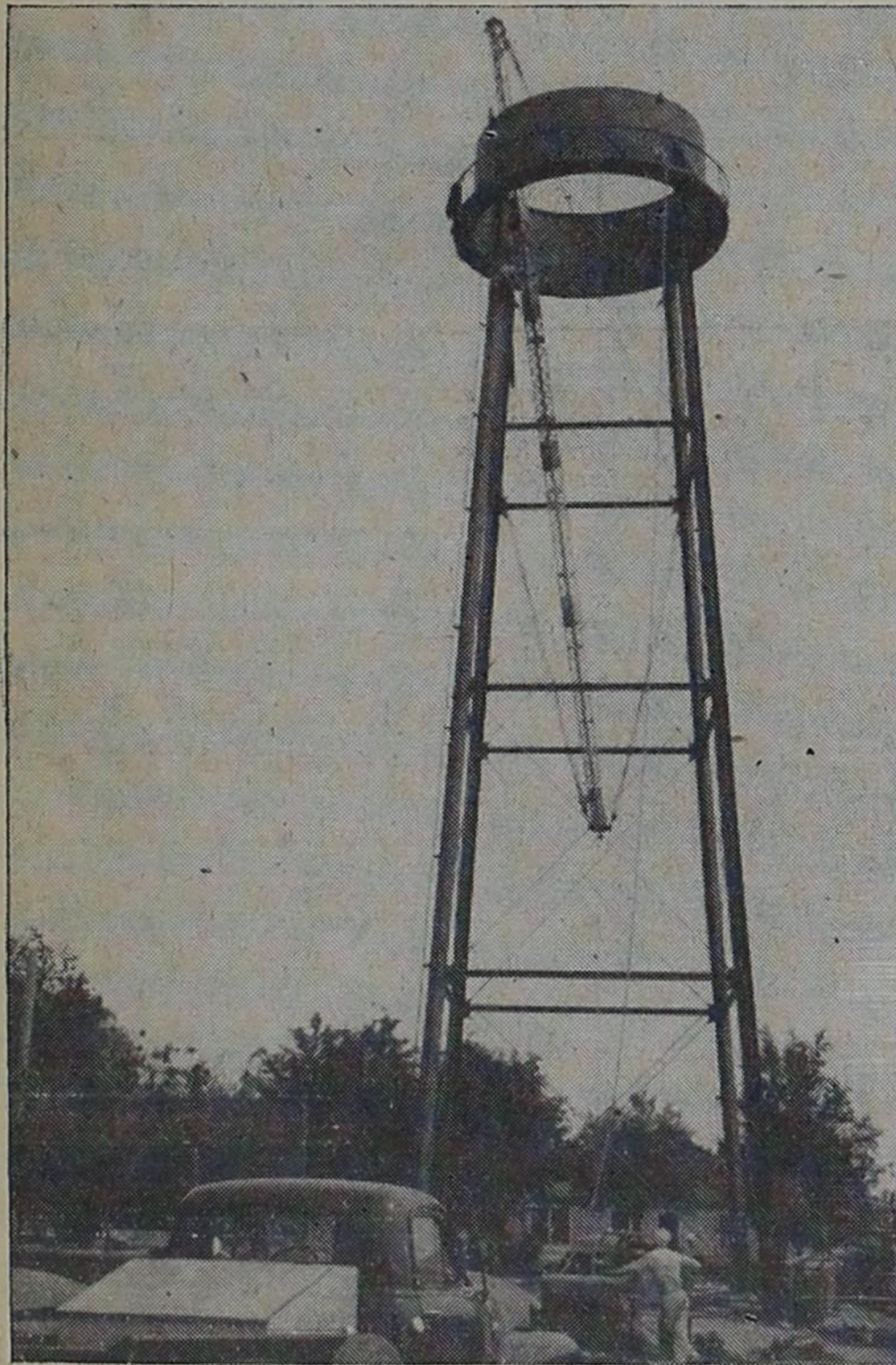

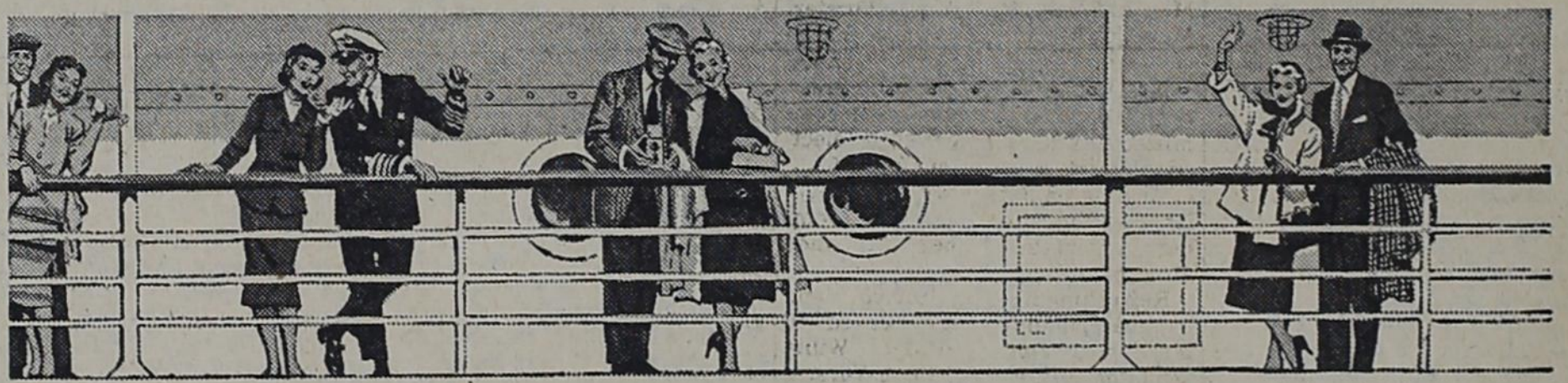

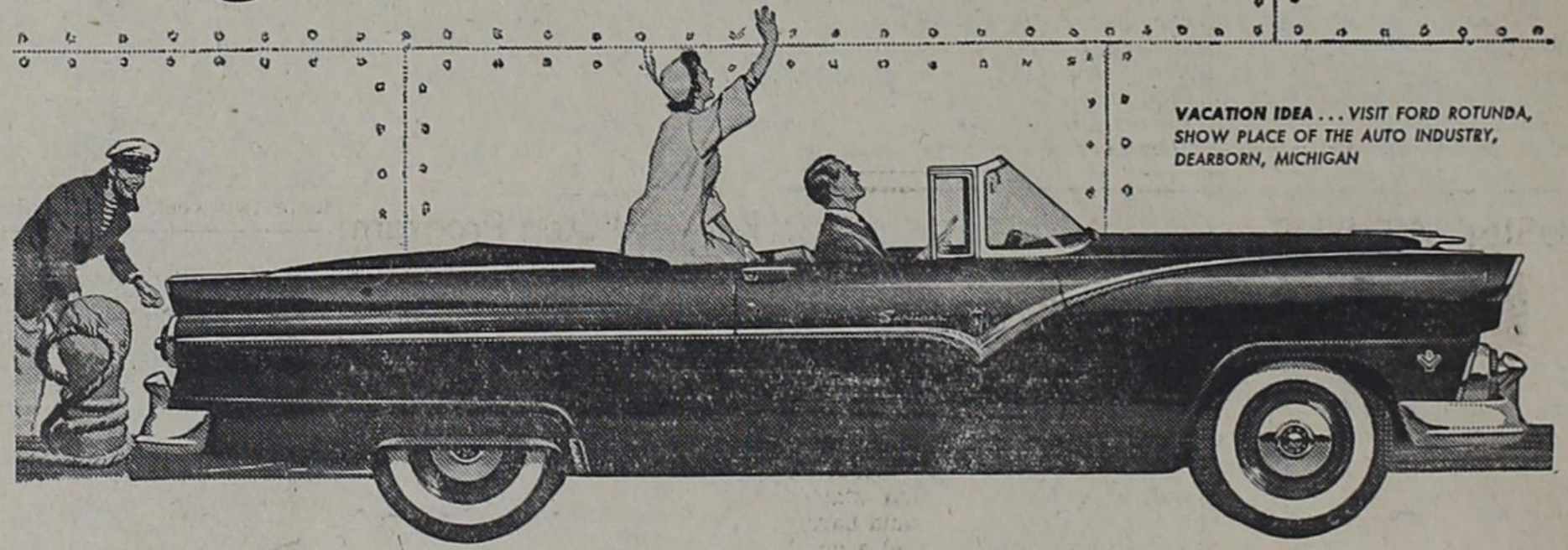

**Bids To Be Opened By Texico Schools**

Bids will be opened June 15, for a builder's contract for construction of two new school buildings for Texico school system, according to Agric Jones, superintendent.

Jones says that construction on the elementary school buildings, one 60x180 feet and one 240 x 60 feet, should get underway shortly after that date.

One of the buildings will be attached to the old auditorium by a porch and will extend south 180 feet. This structure will house six classrooms, bathrooms, a library and office space.

Extending west from this new building will be a structure 240 feet long and 60 feet wide when completed. Half of this building will be finished at this time and four additional classrooms will be added later.

Neither of the two structures will have corridors or hallways. Covered hallways will be on the outside of each building with outside entrances for classrooms and bathrooms.

This figure of 15 percent for the coefficient of storage was determined from studies made by the Texas Board of Water Engineers in cooperation with the U. S. Geological Survey.

Subsequent studies indicate that this figure is reasonably accurate in the Southern High Plains when applied as an average for all of the water-bearing strata, including the fine-grained clay and sandy clay as well as the coarser-grained sand and gravel.

The approximate quantity of underground water in storage, available for pumping, beneath an individual farm may be determined by multiplying the number of acres in the farm by the thickness of the water-bearing strata underlying the farm and then multiplying by the storage coefficient of 15 percent.

Suppose the farm consists of 320 acres and has 200 feet of water-bearing strata underlying it, then 320 acres x 200 feet x 0.15 equals 9,600 acre-feet of water available for pumping.

An acre-foot of water is the quantity required to cover one acre to a depth of one foot, and it is also equal to 43,560 cubic feet or 325,829 gallons.

An individual may use this information to determine, within reasonable limits, how long the quantity of underground water in storage beneath his farm will last.

If he knows the thickness of the water-bearing strata and will keep records of the annual withdrawal and annual change of the water table, he can compute the approximate number of years his supply of underground water will last at any annual rate of withdrawal.

This assumes, of course, that his neighbors pump a comparable amount of water per acre on their farms.

The map and the information concerning the quantity of water in storage will be revised from time to time as additional information becomes available. Similar maps and information will be prepared, as rapidly as practicable, for all the counties within the Water District.

shaping machine costing \$2700, and a Lehman 24-inch lathe costing \$6000.

Other large equipment in the shop includes a LeBlond No. 3 milling machine, a smaller lathe, a drill press, a hydraulic press, and a metal band saw. Much smaller equipment is on hand, also, including a stock of bearings inventoried at over \$2000.

## Fight Bindweed Now, Farmers Are Urged

With the weather, irrigation wells, crop prices, insects, finances, and a hundred other things to worry about, most Farmer County farmers just about have their hands full these days, and for this reason, a serious menace to their entire farming economy is sneaking up on their "blind side."

That menace is bindweed—a small, innocent-looking plant that is gradually, but surely, taking acre after acre of productive farmland all over Farmer County.

Bindweed is almost impossible to eliminate. About the only hope a farmer has is to stop it before it stops him. It's a case of control instead of cure.

County Agent Joe Jones this week sounded a warning that "bindweed is much more widespread over the county than is generally imagined," and he urged farmers to take immediate action to prevent its spread.

Several fronts are united in the fight against bindweed in Farmer County. The State Highway Department has acted in treating infestations along highway rights-of-way, and the county is now participating in control measures to the extent that it will pay for sterilant which is used along county rights-of-way.

Still, the job is up to the farmer as an individual, and Jones says now is the time to get after bindweed. The plants are blooming, and can be easily recognized and isolated. In addition, moisture is available to help dissolve chemicals.

Like cotton, warns the agent, bindweed produces bloom and fruit at the same time, which means that the pest is just about

ready to regenerate itself. "There will be bindweed seed within the next twenty days," estimates the agent.

At present, the only two places in the county which soil sterilant can be obtained are at Farmer County Implement in Friona, where it is available at a cost of \$12.25 per 100 pounds, and Cummings Farm Store.

Sodium Chlorate, chosen as the sterilant, renders the soil unproductive for from two to three years when applied at the recommended rate of five pounds per square rod, or 800 pounds per acre.

For farmers who will make treatments in their own fields, federal assistance through the county ACP program can be obtained. This amounts to an approximate cost sharing of 50 percent.

Like other programs, however, this requires prior approval, and farmers are cautioned to clear with the ASC office.

Parmer County is very fortunate in being as weed-free as it is, emphasized the agent, and the object is to keep it that way.

With bindweed on the increase, one might well wonder how it gets here in the first place.

There are many ways in which the infestation of bindweed is spread. Some of the more common ones include planting seed, custom combines, and hay imported from bindweed-infested areas.

Feed brought in from other areas sometimes has bindweed seed as a stowaway, and seed sometimes clings to wheels of vehicles that pass near bindweed patches.

In fact, bindweed is about as mysterious as the common cold.

opportunity to inspect and identify bindweed," the agent reports. It is also significant that in visiting the four schools of the county, in every case it was possible to find infestations for laboratory work within walking distance of the schoolground.

Concerted effort against the spread of this hardy little plant began last year, and continued to grow until the present program developed. The Parmer County

It pops up everywhere, and is almost impossible to eliminate. Bindweed seed which has lain on top of the ground has been known to germinate after as long a period as 20 years. With this fact in mind, it might be pointed out that a farmer doesn't really know whether he has bindweed or not.

Another thing which makes control difficult is the lack of an adequate set of laws to protect seed buyers. As of now, seed can be sold in Texas which is infested with noxious weeds.

The county agent recommends that farmers buy certified seed whenever possible, and to "read the tag at all times."

Control of bindweed seems to be largely a matter of education. The county agent reports that a week seldom passes when some farmer does not ask him to help identify bindweed.

To reduce the general lack of intelligence about what bindweed actually is, Jones has recently conducted short courses with 4-H Clubs across the county.

"All club boys have now had an Farm Bureau lent its support in the early stages and helped originate a special weed committee which still is in operation.

Today, one entire part of Parmer County is considering waging a war on the pest—the Rhea community. By next week, details of their cooperative effort will be worked out.

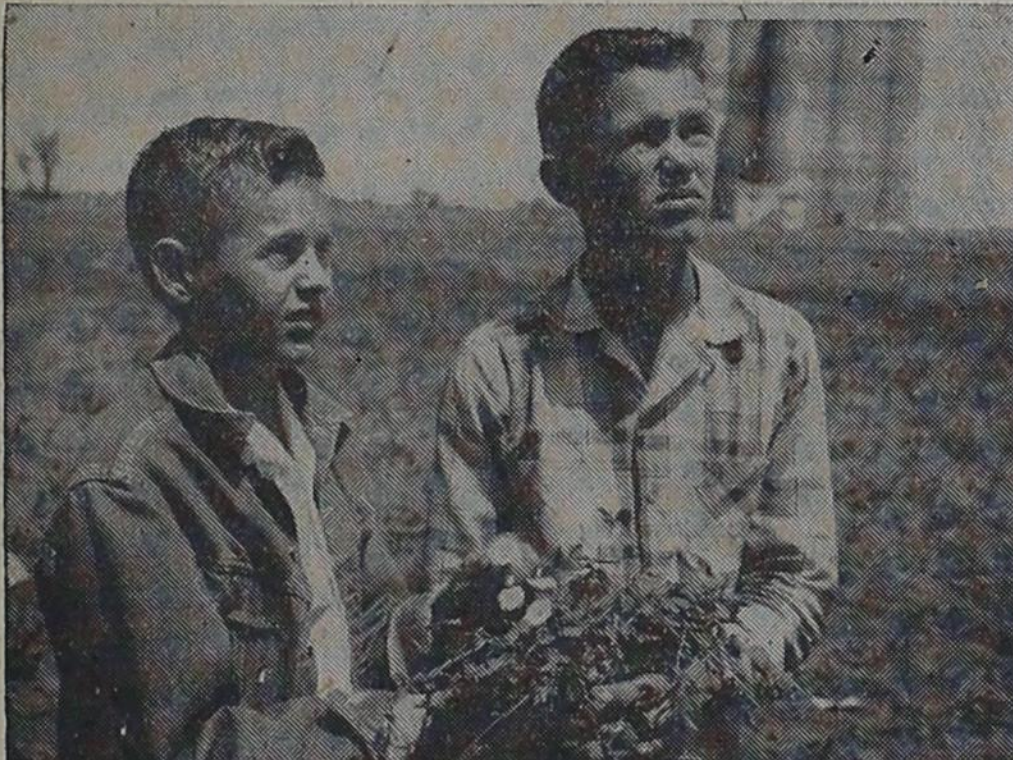

## Formby Is Speaker At Friona Lions

Friona Lions held ladies night last Thursday at the high school cafeteria with approximately 90 Lions and their wives present. The ladies at the cafeteria prepared and served the meal to those present.

Mrs. Eva Miller presented five boys that she has been working with since the first of the year in special musical numbers. The boys are Robbie Osborn, Johnny Miller, Frankie Spring, Joe Reeve and Donald Ray Busby.

Robbie began the program with a vocal, "I Sing as I Sail," followed by a quartet composed of Robbie, Johnny, Frankie and Joe, singing "Anchors Aweigh." Next came Joe Reeve with a solo, "Be The Best of Whatever You Are," then the quartet sang "I'm an Old Cowhand," accompanied by Donald Ray Busby on the guitar.

Also included was a guitar solo, "Red River Blues," by Donald Ray and a vocal by Johnny Miller, "The Big Round-up." A group closed the program with "The Ballad of Davy Crockett" accompanied by Donald Ray on the guitar.

The guest speaker at the dinner was Marshall Formby, district highway commissioner, who recently returned from a tour of Europe with newspaper editors from all over the United States.

Formby now claims Plainview as his home, although he lived in Hereford for some years.

He told the Lions and their guests of the differences between communist controlled countries and free ones in Europe.

Formby said that West Germany is about rebuilt, but that East Germany looks about like it did at the end of World War II. Formby observed that the people behind the Iron Curtain were warmly dressed, but one could see that they were not prosperous.

"People have a fear of expressing their opinions because they can not be sure who they are talking to. Members of the Russian Secret Police are placed throughout dominated countries and people caught speaking out of turn are put in jail," Formby says.

As an example, he told of a member of the American press that went over there last year. This person was talking to a member of the Russian press and the Russian admitted in public that he would exchange 60 or 70 rubles for American dollars. Formby says that when he was in Russia this year this person was in jail and had been for the past 10 or 11 months. The irony of it is that they hadn't had a trial for him and that they probably wouldn't have any time in the near future, he says.

Formby told of the nine man committee that makes the policies and enforces them in Russia and its satellites. This committee has the say over everyone else, he adds.

He added that he was the only one in his group that made the trip that was from Texas, but he met a man that was in the U. S. Embassy in Russia that was from Formby's home state. Twenty-eight persons took the trip to Europe although only 18 of them, went behind the Iron Curtain.

## Will Have Bleachers Soon at Ball Park

John Renner, manager of the hardball team, said this week that the ball park is in process of securing bleachers for the field. He states that the bleachers will be taken from the old high school gym and they have a seating capacity of 500. He adds that the gym will be divided into classrooms and the school needs the room which the bleachers formerly occupied.

Renner says that he hopes both the bleachers and lights can be installed in time for the next home game which will be held Sunday, May 29, Friona vs. Nazareth.

"We would like to have more interested parties express their desire for advertising space on the outfield fence. So far we have sold 40 spaces, but we need to sell about 15 more," Renner adds.

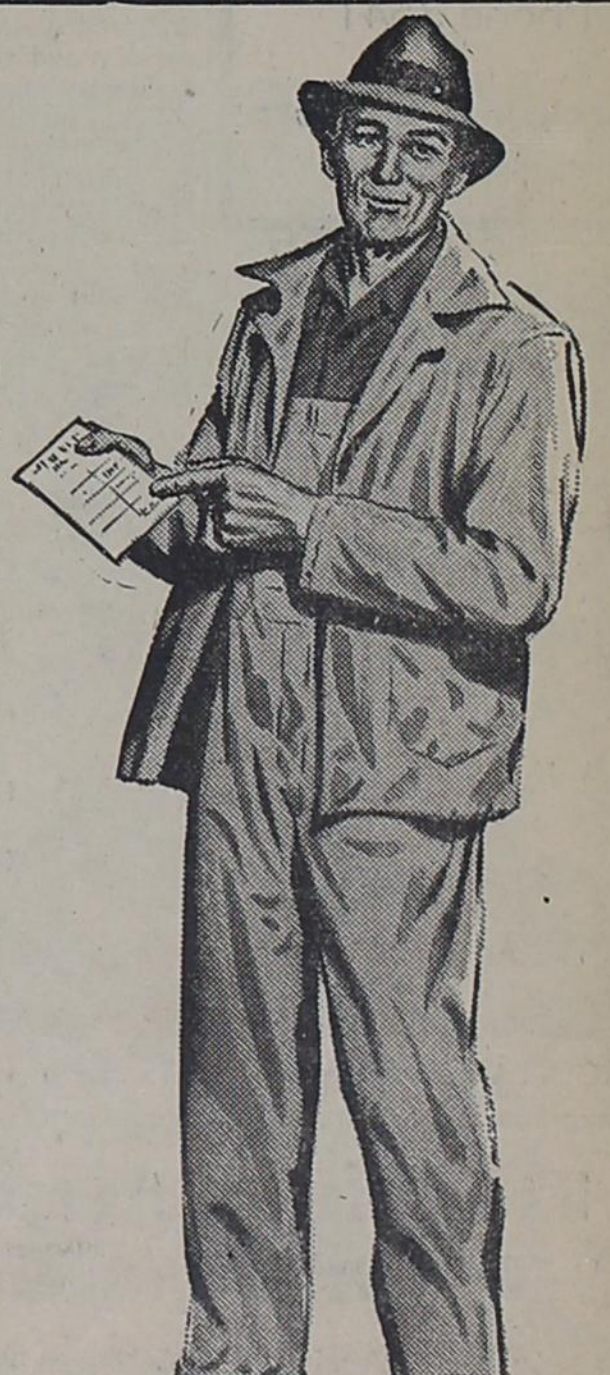

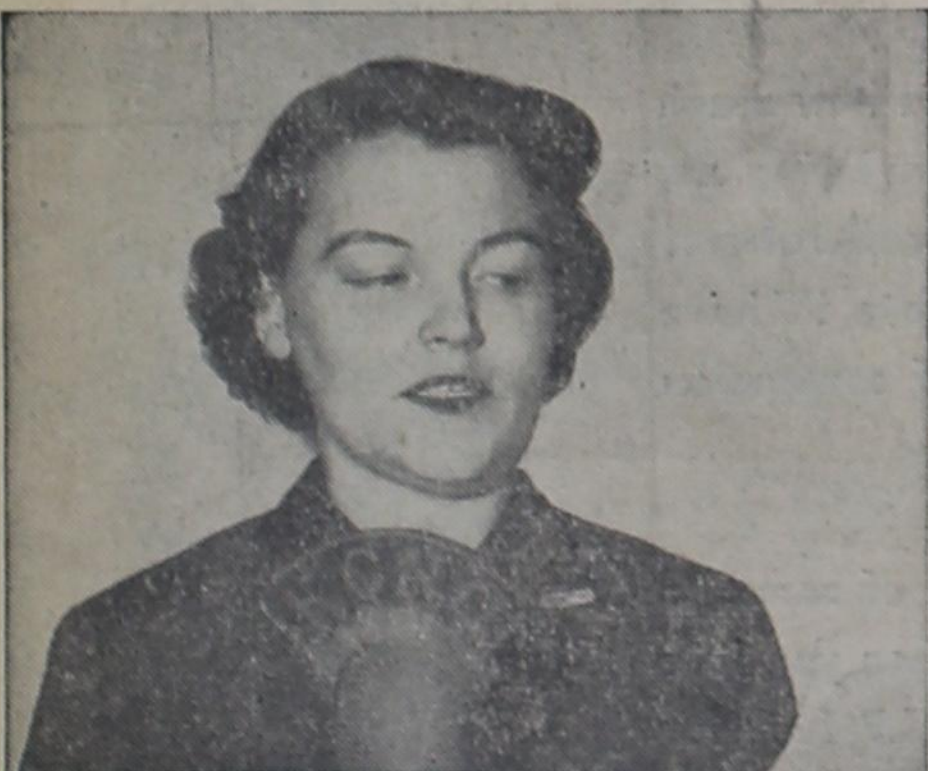

**NEWS FROM THE FARM BUREAU**

By RAYMOND EULER

You will soon be able to drive your pickup 60 miles per hour on Texas Highways and still be within the law. At the same time, you can drive your passenger car 65 miles per hour on two lane highways and 70 miles per hour on divided 4 lane highways. Texas Farm Bureau has been working at least three years for the increase in legal pickup speeds, because they are used as passenger vehicles to a great extent. Present speed limit on them is 45, as some of you may know from experience, as well as the highway signs.

On the national level, H. R. 12 has passed the House under a system of partisan pressure. It is thought that it will not pass the Senate if many farmers will write in opposing it. If farmers do not object, boys like CIO President Walter Reuther will still be in there pitching for its passage. Stop and think, and decide whether he and his constituents are really the ones you know and want what is best for you, the American Farmer.

Commissioner's Court is again cooperating 100% with the weed eradication committee in the summer program directed against bindweed. County Agent Joe Jones is preparing agreement cards for farmers applying for sterilents to be used on county road rights of way adjoining their land. ASC has included provisions for assisting in the program this year, too. So it looks like Parmer County may escape serious damage from these weeds because the program was started early enough. Parmer County Implement is handling the sodium chlorate at \$12.25 per hundred pound can this year.

Texas Friendship for Korea will have some gifts from Parmer County. Friona FFA Chapter is giving a pig; three pigs have been contributed from Bovina, and we hear there are two pigs coming from a church group in the Oklahoma Lane Community. There is a trailer at the southwest corner of the park in Friona where miscellaneous items may be placed for this cause.

We understand that Parmer County Farm Bureau plans to have a county wide policy development meeting prior to the annual convention this year. That is when your ideas will be welcomed for consideration of the full membership. Then they will be drawn up in resolution form for final discussion and vote in October. Keep

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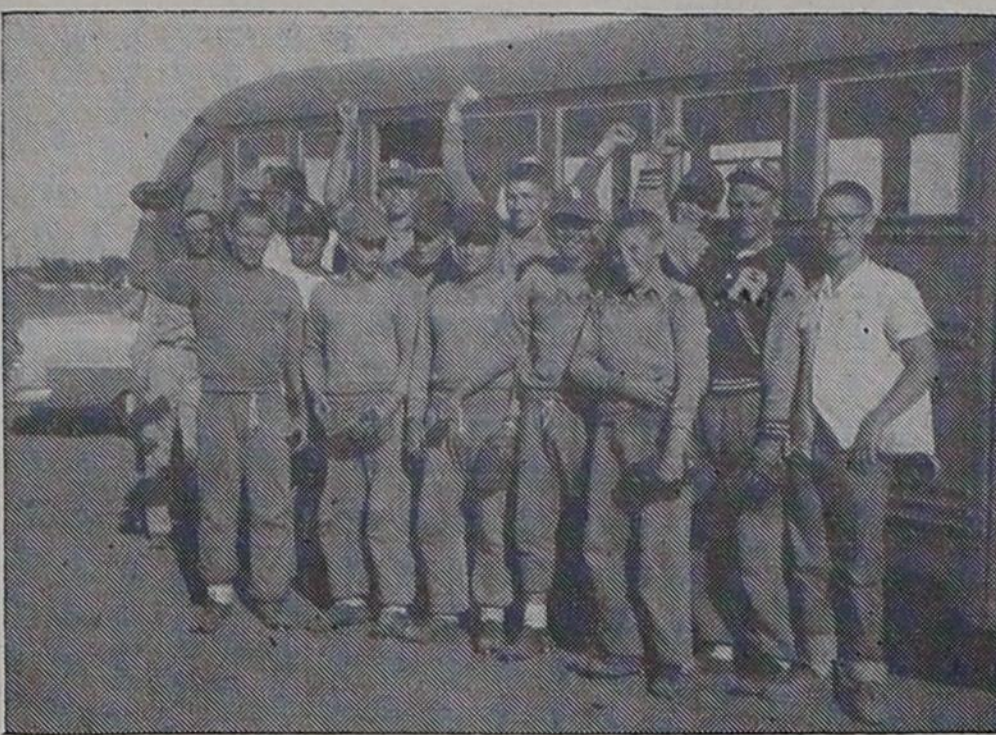

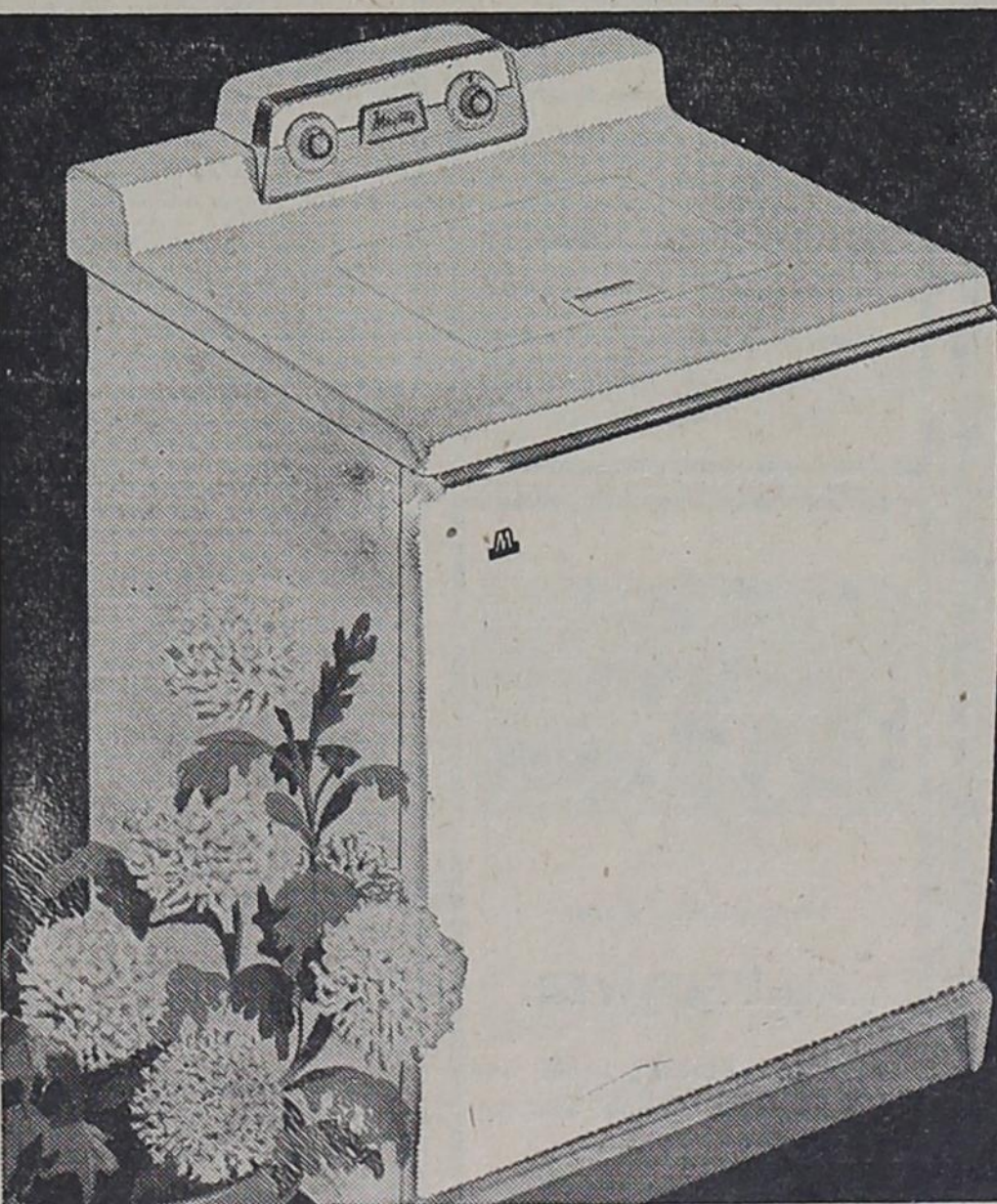
Two of H. D.'s wells are run on butane from Bovina Butane Service and he says that the people at Bovina Butane are "OKAY!"

**Farm Bureau Queen Contest To Be Held Again This Year**

Texas Farm Bureau will sponsor a state-wide queen contest again this year, J. Walter Hammond, president, announced.

Search for the prettiest farm or ranch girl in the state has attracted wide-spread publicity in four years that the contest has been held. This year's queen race is expected to be the largest ever, with more than 100 organized county Farm Bureaus planning to enter contestants in the state-wide competition.

Prizes and honors galore are in store for the lucky girl chosen state queen. Her first prize will be \$500 in expenses for a "Cinderella trip" to the American Farm Bureau convention in December in Chicago.

To be eligible to compete in the contest, a girl must be the daughter or sister of a Farm Bureau member. She must be at least 16, but not more than 22 years of age by September 1, 1955. Daughters of Farm Bureau state directors, employees, county officers and directors, and previous state winners, are not eligible.

"The contest will be an honest-to-goodness queen contest and not a

bathing beauty competition," Hammond said. "The girls are to be judged on all the qualities that go to make up winsome future Texas homemakers."

Three main points on which the girls will be judged are appearance, poise and personality.

**—LEGAL—**

An ordinance of the City of Farwell Texas, concerning "Regulations for access driveways to State Highways"

WHEREAS, The Texas Highway Department has prepared a booklet of "Regulations for Access Driveways to State Highways" in accordance with instruction and policy of the Texas Highway Commission minute order No. 34719, dated September 23, 1953, design to accomplish a coordinated development between the highway and the abutting property for the safe movement of traffic, and

WHEREAS, article 8 page 8 of said booklet sets out limitations to the Texas Highway Department in that the concurrence of the municipality is required when the "Regulations for Access Driveways to

State Highways" pertain to state-maintained highways, routed over city streets or to highways located within the corporate limits of such municipality, and

WHEREAS, the City of Farwell desires to assist the Texas Highway Department in its effort to promote the safe and free movement of normal highway traffic and to assist in the controlling of access driveways to property along the highway through this city;

NOW THEREFORE BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF FARWELL, TEXAS:

1. These "Regulations for Access Driveways to State Highways" are herewith adopted for the public safety and protection of the city and the citizens thereof and all of the provisions herein shall be construed for the accomplishment of that purpose.
2. Any person, firm, or corporation who shall violate or disregard any of the provisions of this ordinance

shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and on conviction shall be fined not less than \$5.00 nor more than \$100.00 per day of existing violation.

3. All ordinances and parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed.

4. An immediate necessity and emergency exists by reason of the public safety and welfare of the citizens and convenience of the citizens of this city and this ordinance shall take effect immediately and shall be enforced from and after its passage and first publication.
