

Crimes In County Solved with Arrest

Several crimes having accured in Parmer County within recent months were solved this week after a visit by Sheriff Chas-Lovelace to Memphis where he quizzed Carl J. Williams, 47, who is being held there on charges of forgery.

The Eric, Okla., man signed a confession admitting he burglarized Nickels' Gin in Farwell and Bovina Wheat Growers, according to Sheriff Lovelace, and will be Mr. and Mrs. Mitz Walling of returned here this fall for grant jury action.

Williams admitted stealing checks from Nickels in April, and from Bovina Wheat Growers las October. He is charged here for burglary and forgery, and warrants have been issued.

Of checks he made use of in this vicinity, several were passed in Clovis, in addition to Piggly Wiggly stores in Farwell and Friona, and Johnson's Grocery in Friona-

He has been charged with similar offenses in a number of other Panhandles counties.

THE TRIBUNE'S EDITORIAL COMMENT

And That's What We Think Of a Guaranteed Annual Wage!

In previous editorials, we have supported the principle of collective bargaining, and have commented that it is indeed a fine thing that labor and management have been able to work out their differences with a minimum of interference from out-

But if we conveyed the notion that we support the theory of a guaranteed annual wage, (or something close to it), which was reached as a result of these bargainings, it was unintentional.

A guaranteed annual wage would be better defined as a system under which employees get paid for doing nothing, because in actuality, that is what it amounts to.

If this philosophy of economics was sound, then it would be reasonable to expect that employers should have a guaranteed annual market. If they lon't, then how could they be expected to pay for comething they don't need when business is off?

The whole thing sounds crazy to us. But worse than that, it smacks of something contrary to the spirit of American free enterprise. It doesn't sound like a healthy move for either group.

Of course we don't want to see auto workersor any other workers laid off for long periods of time. But sometimes no one can control such ad-

What will happen now-in fact is already shaping up in the steel industry—is that other labor groups will make similar demands, and probably be similarly rewarded. This, in turn, will mean a whole new round of production cost increases, and naturally, a whole new round of price increases.
