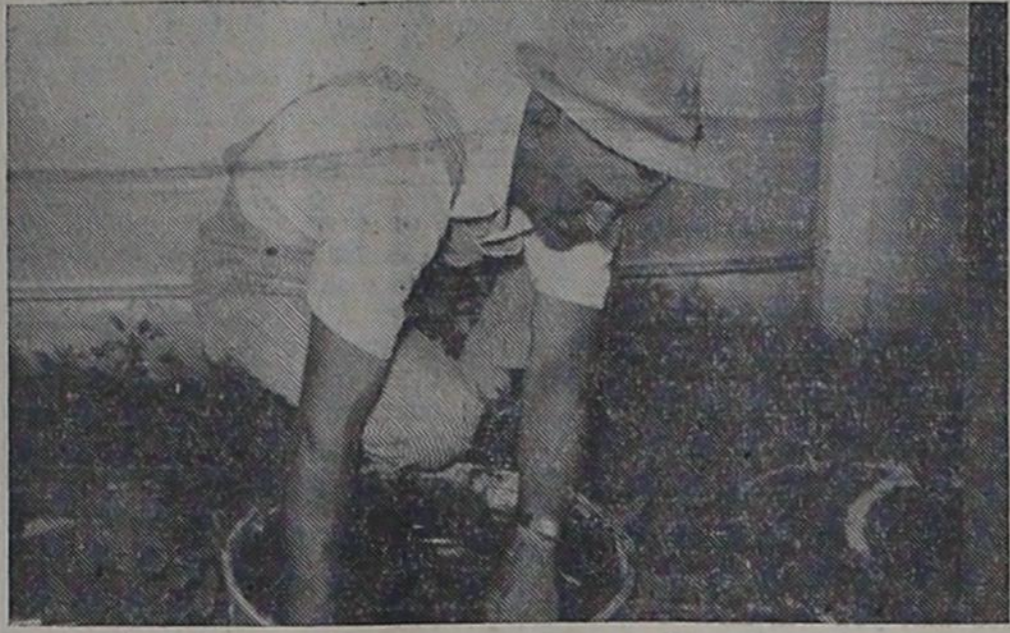

Nonetheless, we revolt at the idea of full dress in uncomfortable weather simply because convention requires it.

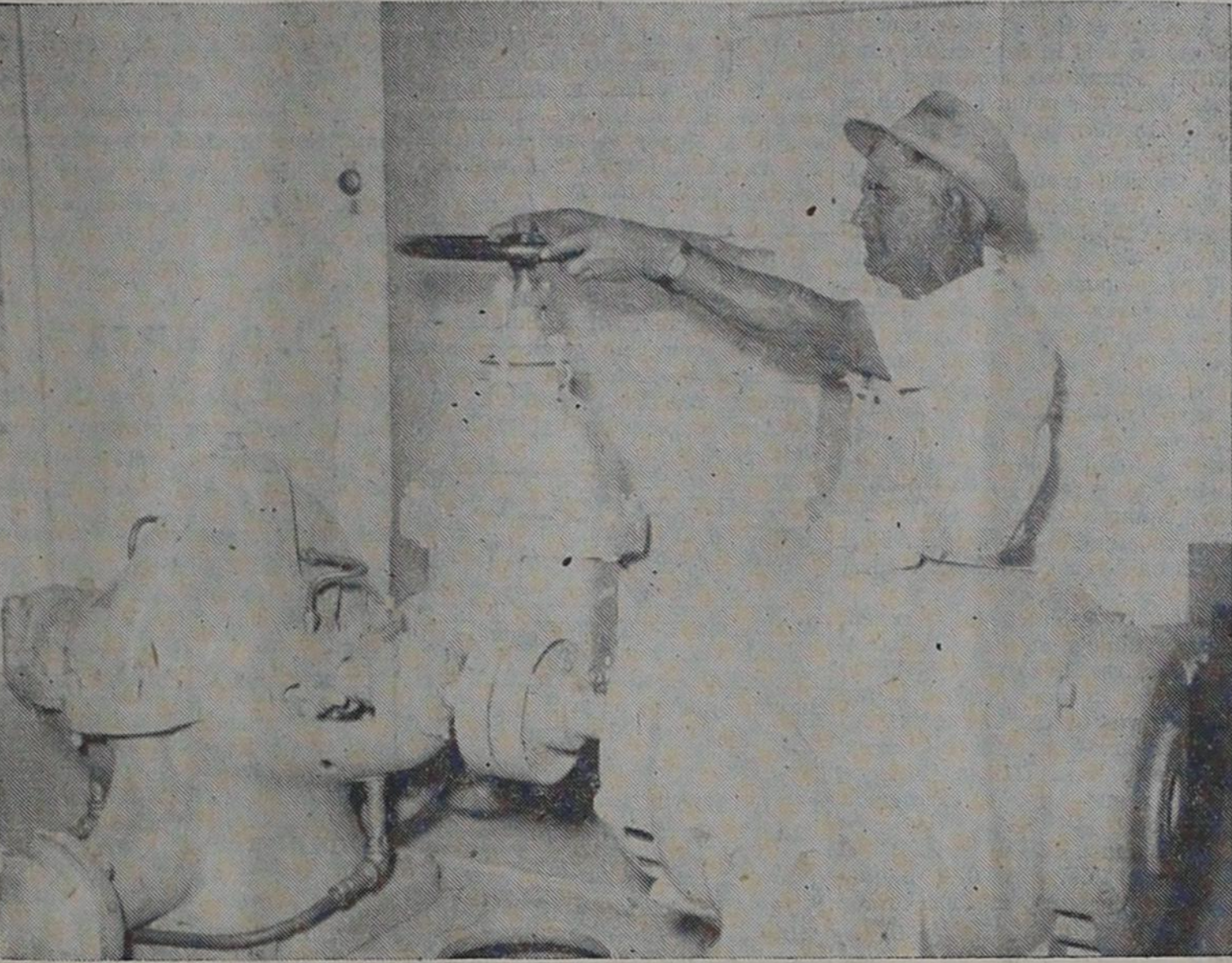
By the same token, we reject the niceties of correspondence, which in business anyway, sometimes result in the writer enshrouding a typewritten wildcat in lamb's skin.

They were fined \$50 and costs.

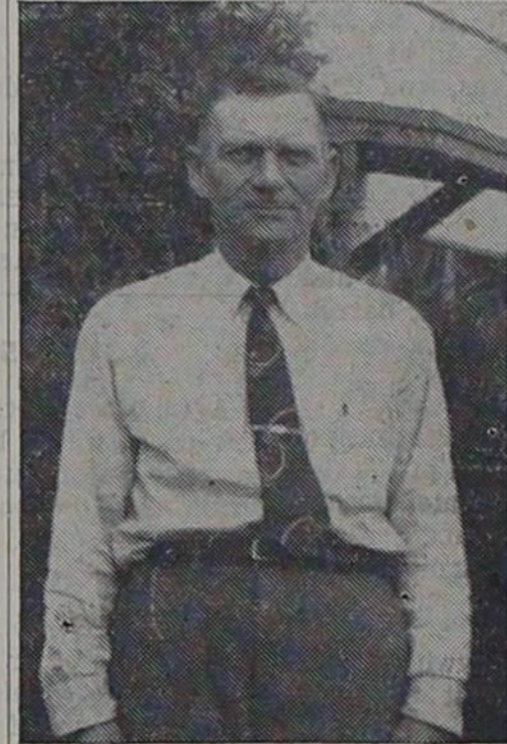

Karl Gast Dies In Farwell Home

Karl Gast, 65, died Friday morning, June 24, in his home in eastern Farwell following a heart attack. His death was unexpected.

The local man, who has lived here since 1934, except for a three-year period spent in Alamogordo, N. M., was active up until the evening when he suffered his sudden sickness.

He had virtually recovered from a previous spell of ill health of several months' duration, according to Mrs. Gast, and was continuing with chores through Thursday evening.

The funeral was held Sunday afternoon at the Clovis Emmanuel Lutheran Church, of which Gast was a member. Rev. E. J. Stelling of the church conducted services.

Interment was in Lawn Haven Cemetery, Steed's in charge.

Parmer County wheat farmers added their voices to those of about one-third million other producers in the nation Saturday, in voting to continue tight acreage controls in exchange for a support price that will average \$1.81.

By a margin of 83.3 percent affirmative ballots, the 457 growers of the county who voted accepted a continuation of the present farm program, although supports will be somewhat reduced in 1956 compared to this year.

What happens are currently 82 1/2 percent of parity, which is netting growers \$1.925 at this time. Next year, the support figure seems likely to dip, and is expected to be 76 percent.

Box-by-box balloting in Parmer County:

Friona, 202-31; Bovina, 73-25; Lazbuddie 42-2; Farwell, 64-18. The totals were 381 votes in favor of marketing quotas, 76 against. As can be seen, no box in the county even approached a reversal of the trend.

Parmer County's approval compared fairly favorably with a nation-wide average of 77.5 percent endorsement.

The results surprised some agricultural observers, who had privately suspected that the program might be upset by failing to register a required 66 2/3 percent affirmative vote. Fewer than two-thirds ayes would have done away with the wheat program as it is now known.

Observers based this suspicion on the apparent unrest and dissatisfaction with steadily declining farm income across the nation. Sharp controls have at least in part contributed to this decline, and it was thought that farmers might be ready for a bolt of the system to which they have so long been geared.

In addition, a defeat of the quotas might have been interpreted as a protest against a flexible or "sliding" price support scale under which wheat is now produced. This support program is a product of the present administration and Secretary of Agriculture Ezra Ben-

The majority of the laborers to be employed by this plant will be Latin American or Negro, but will not be migratory or seasonal workers, and for that reason, they will be interested in securing permanent quarters.

Chamber members agreed that the location and feasibility of such a project is one that needs the immediate attention of the city, and urged residents to take under consideration the problem.

The voluntary paving project was temporarily shelved until a shortage of cement eases up.

Odell Poteet, Rall contractor, has enough of the material to complete the 7 1/2 blocks of paving, curb and gutter, for which he is committed at \$4 per frontage foot.

He met with the Chamber board of directors Monday afternoon and asked if they thought it advisable to "hold up" for a while on additional work, or attempt to secure additional paving at a cost of about 33 cents per foot additional.

The board agreed to take it up at the general meeting Tuesday evening, and it was decided to let the matter rest until the shortage eases.

It is estimated that within two months, supply of the cement will be more in line with demand, and that high prices will have declined.

The third item to be taken up during the evening was a discussion of a brochure or publicity sheet for the city—an item which has been bantered back and forth in the Chamber for some time.

The C of C is requesting citizens to submit ideas on what scope they think the brochure should be included in it.

Suggestions are requested to be submitted to Bob Brooks, president; Wilfred Quicke, secretary-manager; or W. H. Graham, Jr., publicity chairman.

A rough-out of the brochure has already been submitted, but the Chamber feels it should be enlarged upon.

Mrs. M. H. Poteet of Texico sends in this recipe for combination roll and biscuit dough. She calls it sour milk biscuit dough and says that after using it for five years she KNOWS it's good!

4½ cups flour
¼ teaspoon soda
4 teaspoons baking powder
1 teaspoon salt
1 yeast cake
¼ cup of shortening
3 cups buttermilk

Mix dry ingredients, add yeast, melted shortening and milk. Roll onto lightly floured board and knead gently. Then the dough may be kept in the ice box for a long length of time.

Beat oleo to a creamy stage, add sugar gradually. Beat extra well. Add melted chocolate and vanilla and blend well. Add one egg, beat 5 minutes, then add other egg and beat 5 minutes. Pour into shell, baked or vanilla wafer may be used.

Abie cautions that only a medium speed should be used for beating, for a fast speed tends to make the filling sticky.

The pie should be chilled two or three hours before serving.

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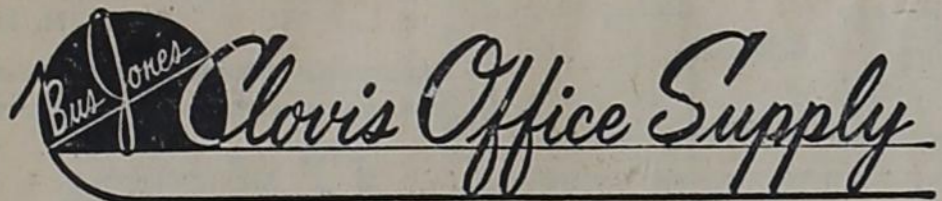
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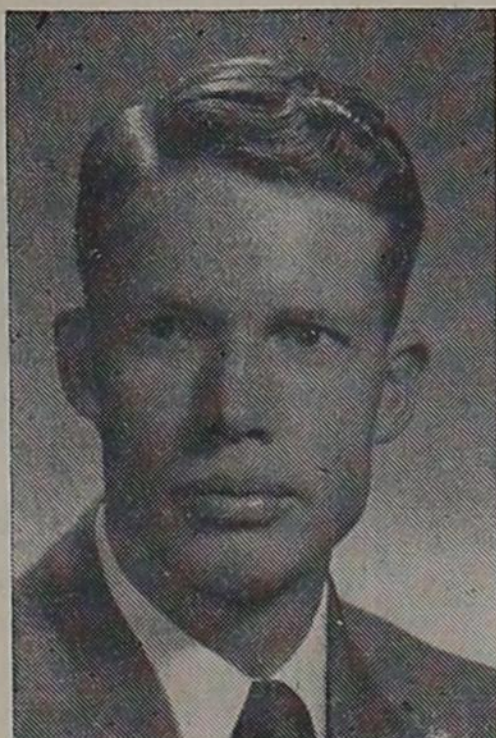
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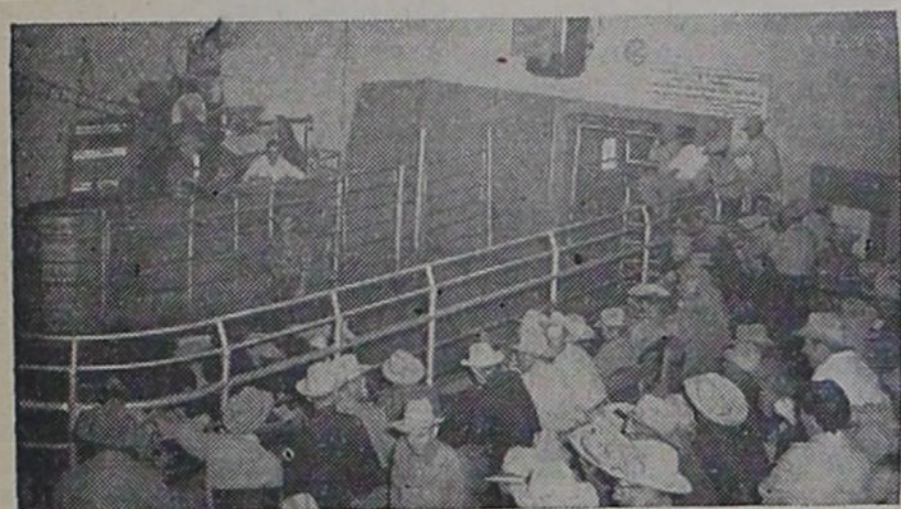

Legal Methods Must In Changing Wills

Changing and revoking wills has involved many an estate in litigation because the proper legal methods were not used and the statutes were not followed.

Take the case of Mr. S. Sometime ago he went into his lawyer's office and laid in front of his attorney a will which had been prepared for him about a year previously. He said that he made a few changes in it and wanted to know whether his attorney thought the changes were all right.

Mr. S. was attempting to change two items of his will by drawing lines through certain words in these items and interlining, in his own handwriting, the changes he wanted. He was not attempting to revoke his entire will but merely trying to change these two items.

If Mr. S. were to die with his will in that condition, the probate court would not recognize the changes that he had made, but would probably probate the will as it was originally written. Mr. S. was surprised to learn this and immediately requested that a new will be prepared.

After the will has been once executed, changes cannot be made legally by crossing out parts of a will and interlining corrections or additions. To change a will, an entirely new will must be written and properly executed or an addition by way of a codicil should be executed.

Since a will does not take effect until the death of the person making it, the provisions of the will should be reviewed by the maker at least once a year to be sure that changing conditions and circumstances have not been such as to require a modification of the

will. It is very easy to postpone doing a thing of this kind, but failure to do so may result in the intentions of the maker of the will being thwarted to a certain extent.

There are many changing circumstances which would be brought to his attention if a person would review his will at least once a year in the light of circumstances at the time.

Such things as deaths among the legatees or devisees named in his will, births, marriages or divorces in the family, accidents or sickness among the close relatives which make it desirable to increase or decrease the amount given certain ones, substantial increases or decreases in the value of the estate of the person making the will, death of all witnesses to the will and many other factors, may cause a person to want to execute a new will or add a codicil to his old one.





son. (Note: the program did originate several years ago, but the present administration is responsible for its enactment.)

Parmer County has a wheat allotment for 1956 of about 108,000 acres. This is about 8,000 fewer than 1955, even though the total national allotment is unchanged at 55,000,000 acres.

This county received its cutback from wheat acreage in a manner similar to the way it has received additional cotton acreage: the "trend" factor.

Secretary Benson estimates that the nation's wheat reserve (including surplus in storage) will reach 1,030,000,000 bushels July 1, virtually all of it being owned by the government under price support operations.

Together with this year's production, the total will be enough

to supply domestic and export needs for two years, the USDA estimates. Wheat is one of the major surplus commodity problems of the American farmer.

Changes Noted In Basketball Rules

Farwell grade school coach, Shelby Jobs, calls attention to the changes made in interscholastic league athletic rules as voted by coaches of class B schools in April. The following changes and additions have been made according to Jobs:

A boy is limited to playing two basketball games per day. No boy shall participate in any bowl game except the Coaches' All Star game. No coach shall assist in any bowl game except the Coaches' All Star game.

In conference B no school shall practice or have basketball scrimmage before October 15 or after the last day of the girls' state basketball tournament.

Basketball rules have been changed to read as follows: Bonus throw ruling to extend through the entire game. A five second dribble limit on stalling. A flagrant technical violation draws two free throws. On jump balls, the clock starts when the ball has been legally tapped. In college and AAU the free throw lanes have been increased from six to 12 feet wide. Other groups may use this on an experimental basis. The six foot lane is official for the 1955-1956 season. For high school and YMCA groups an approved rubber ball will be used beginning with the 1956-1957 season.

In track, it has been decided to allow substitutes in semi-finals or finals of relays provided that the substitute is already qualified in another event of the meet.

Baptists Schedule Youth Revival

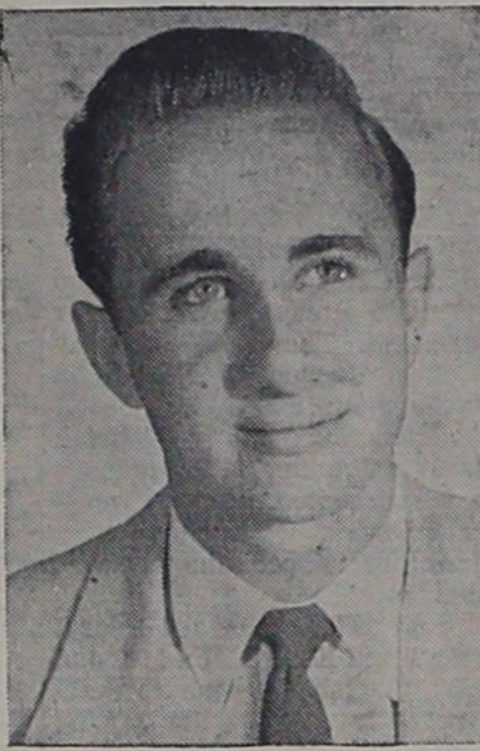

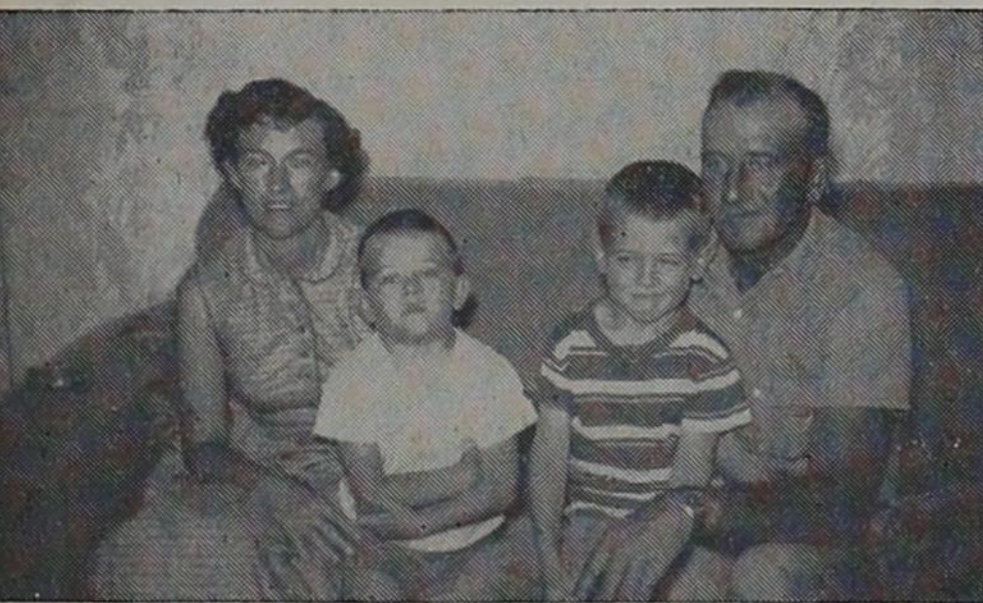

T. J. Presley, operator of the W. J. Stanford farm, in the Black community, has done a good job of mulching a field of wheat stubble. Presley has handled the wheat stubble so as to leave most of the residue on the surface. He used a Hoeme to plow the stubble after harvesting the wheat. Stubble mulching is a good method of handling wheat stubble. As the picture shows, most of the stubble is left on the surface. When handled this way less runoff, less water and wind erosion can be ex-

pected. Also this increases water intake and reduces the surface temperature of the soil. Results obtained in the past show definite increases in yields have been obtained from leaving wheat stubble on the surface, over turning it under. Various machines can be used to accomplish stubble mulch tillage. Some of the best results are obtained using sub tillage machines with sweeps, Hoeme plows, or disk harrows.

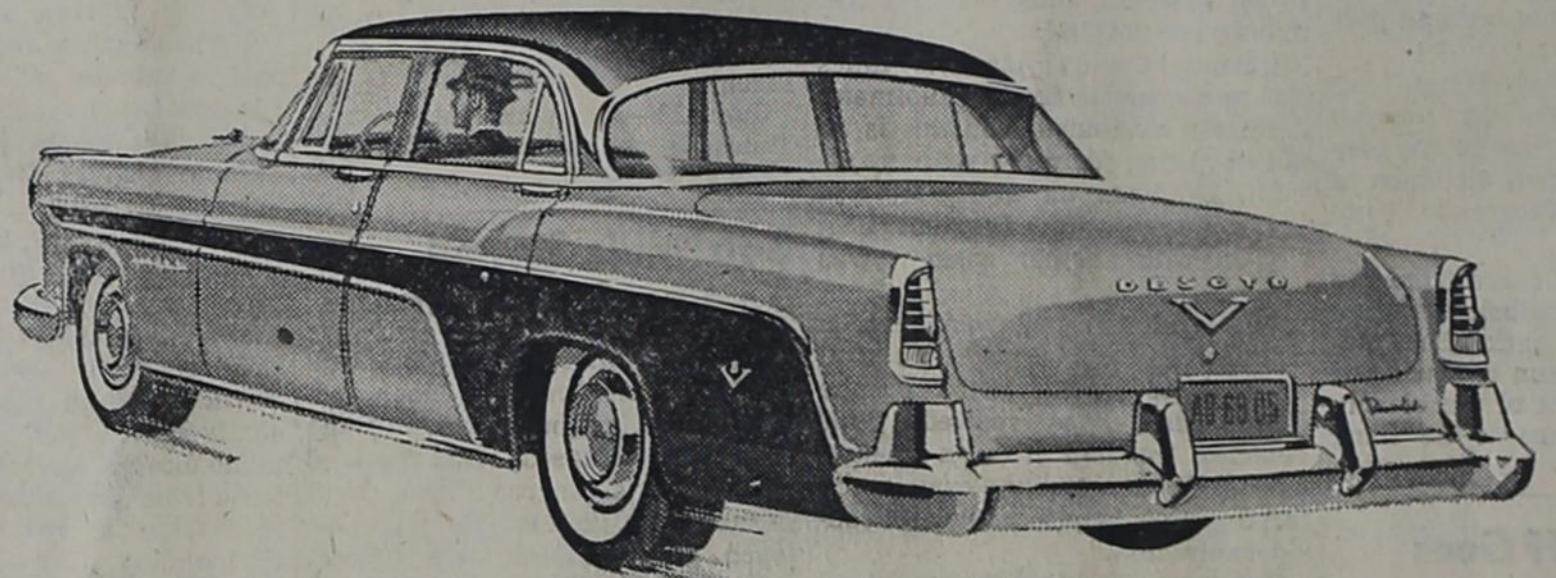
