### Let's Plant Some Cotton!

**Parmer County's share of \$15 million federal funds this week designated by President Eisenhower to combat wind erosion in the Southwest will be \$48,900, according to figures obtained from the county ASC office in Farwell.**

Practices such as chiseling, contour listing, field strip cropping, stubble mulching, seeding grain for cover crop, chiseling grazing land, and deferring grazing land will qualify farmers for payment.

Rates for help on these practices range from \$.50 to \$1.25 per acre.

ASC Secretary Joe Camp issued a note of warning with the announcement, however, and said that those persons would qualify who "performed these practices

not as a normal farm operation" only. Thus, a farmer who would ordinarily prepare his land for a cash crop by using one or more of the above listed practices would be ruled ineligible.

Another point that is sure to stir up a lot of interest is that payment for practices has been made retroactive to March 31. In other words, a farmer who performed these practices as a means of preventing soil erosion from wind after March 31 may find himself eligible for payment.

He must show, however, that this was not a "normal" operation. The deadline for applying for such back payment is Monday, May 17, which means that farmers who think they are entitled to payment are going to have to hustle to make it in under the wire.

The state's share of the \$15 million is \$2,322,000, a sum which President Eisenhower has labeled an "initial amount."

Farmers who are interested in qualifying for the program must make application at the local ASC office in Farwell, where further details pertaining to the program may be learned.

Texico is among the schools that shared honors in the New Mexico Class B track meet in Albuquerque last weekend.

Allen Kelley won second in the shot put, with a distance of 43 feet 3 1/2 inches. Winning shot was by a Capitan boy whose toss was 43 feet 5 1/2 inches.

Kenneth Doolittle placed third in the mile run; and Texico was also third in the distance medley.

### Demonstration Agent Arrives

Miss Corinne Stinson, new home demonstration agent for the county, arrived in Farwell last week, and her office was opened Wednesday. She was the home demonstration agent in Dalhart before coming here.

Office hours are from 8:30 until 5, on the days that Miss Stinson is in the office. Other times, she must go over the county to take care of her duties. Mrs. Billie Kittrell, receptionist for the county agent, will also serve as receptionist for Miss Stinson, and any callers may leave a message with Mrs. Kittrell.

Miss Stinson was in Bovina Friday to begin organization of a 4-H group there, and was to work with Lazbuddie and Friona groups this week. She is hoping to get the organizations lined up before school is out.

All girls and mothers who are interested in 4-H Club at Lazbuddie are asked to meet Monday, May 17, at 2 p. m. at the Lazbuddie School. Miss Stinson will be there to explain the 4-H work and to assist with the organization. Bovina girls and mothers will meet at the homemaking laboratories on Wednesday, May 19, at 2 p. m. for the same purpose.

Girls nine years of age and above are eligible for 4-H club work. Emphasis is placed on homemaking, leadership, recreation, safety, health and other training that is essential for better citizenship.

The home demonstration agent will be in Canyon Thursday to assist in planning the recreation for the District 4-H Camp May 31-June 2, south of Amarillo. She hopes to be able to take three girls to the camp.

In regard to the adult program for the county, Miss Stinson asks that women in the county who are interested in organizing home demonstration clubs, please contact her, as she is not yet well enough acquainted to know those who are interested in such work.

### May 15 Deadline For Wheat Report

County ASC Secretary Joe Camp today called attention to a very important deadline for Parmer County farmers: Saturday, May 15.

That is the final day that reports of re-designation of wheat planted in excess of the allotment may be turned in to the local office.

Farmers found to be in excess of the allotment who have not designated their wheat for destruction or use other than a cash crop will make themselves liable to penalty under the price support and allocation program.

### Break-in Reported At Friona Consumers

A break-in occurred Tuesday night at Friona Consumers, reports Sheriff Chas. Lovelace, who says that only a small loss was sustained by the business.

Missing were about four or five dollars in cash and some candy and chewing gum. The incident was not discovered until about mid-morning Wednesday when employees noticed where entry had been gained through a high window on the eastern side of the building.

A ladder had been used by the burglar or burglars to climb to the outside of the window, where a hole was cut in the screen and the window opened.

Lovelace reports no leads on the break-in, the first in several weeks for Parmer County.

## Rain, Beautiful Rain Pays Visit

There really hasn't been too much moisture, but the wet weather has sure stayed with the folks of this part of the Plains during the past few days.

Amounts generally run from just about one inch, up to almost an inch and a half over the area. A flat inch was the total recorded in three days of drizzly weather at Farwell this week. Bovina had over an inch, and south of Friona, nearly an inch and a half had fallen.

Farmers say it would be hard to order a more beneficial rain insofar as the way it fell was concerned. Hardly ever did the

rain approach the density of the typical "spring showers" for the High Plains.

It just drifted down softly and without the usual accompaniment of wind and hail. There was very little, if any, runoff.

The cool, damp weather brought to a halt a young spring heat wave that had moved into the Plains during the week just past, and prompted many farmers to get their cotton into the ground.

Rainfall is held to be very beneficial for the struggling dryland wheat crop, although it might be said that what wheat wasn't holding its own at this date wasn't going to make it anyway, and the rain only helped along the healthier part of the crop.

Pastures are brightening up considerably, with the first verdant green appearing in many months. A few warm, sunny days are sure to bring on the grass following the general moisture.

All in all, it was a beneficial, timely rain, which although hailed in other parts of the Southwest as a "drouth-buster," did not quite reach those proportions here.

### How's This For Wheat?



Few if any wheat fields in this part of the country can match the lush appearance of that of Dalton Caffey, who farms east of Bovina. He and County Agent Joe Jones check over the way the grain is shaping up. Caffey is conducting experiments to determine what effect different seeding rates have on yields. He has 110 acres in Early Wichita planted September 16. He seeded in rates of 107, 79, 50, and 27 pounds per acre on four 25-acre plots, and fertilized last fall with 200 pounds per acre of 16-20-0. Ten acres, planted at 27 pounds per acre, were left unfertilized for a check. Right now, the 107-pound wheat looks the best, say Jones and Caffey, although it's hard to tell where one seeding rate starts and the other begins.

### Cotton, Grain Sorghums Being Planted; Much Irrigated Wheat Looks Excellent

Parmer County farmers were just getting started on their monumental task of producing what promises to be another huge cotton and grain crop last weekend, just before cold, wet weather put a stop to outside operations for a few days.

By last weekend, nearly all farmers who planned to seed cotton this year had planted some or all of it, estimated Joe Jones, county agent, who went on to say that the county will plant 56,000 acres under the allotment program this year.

Of the 56,000, probably only 5000 will be dryland cotton. That leaves a whopping 50,000-plus acres of irrigated cotton for Parmer County this year, and if farmers get even a half-way decent break from the weather, it will be another good year for the staple producers of the area.

Good Preparation Essential "Generally speaking," says the county agent, "Parmer County farmers are doing an excellent job of getting ready for the fall crop this year, having broken their land deep and pre-watered as recommended for best results." There also has been widespread use of fertilizers this spring, another guarantee of good yields.

HIGHLIGHTS AND SIDELIGHTS FROM THE STATE CAPITOL

Austin—Governor Allan Shivers thinks that his opponent, Ralph W. Yarborough, "may be" receiving some financial help from George Parr, the South Texas politico.

It was quite a coincidence, Shivers said, that Yarborough and Parr announced their candidacies on the same day. Parr is running for district judge.

Shivers said he supposes Yarborough will make "the same sort of campaign of personal vilification and name-calling he made two years ago."

After making these remarks to reporters, the governor left with Mrs. Shivers for a vacation in Alabama. Later he will go to Korea with several other governors, returning to Texas June 1.

Thereafter, he said, "there will be a long time for campaigning."

YARBOROUGH'S REPLY To Shivers' remarks about him, Yarborough retorted that "my opponent realizes that the political ground is slipping out from under him and is wildly slinging mud in all directions. Anybody who can manufacture that much mud in one sitting ought to go to work and do something about the drought."

Shivers and Yarborough shaped up as the leading contenders in the race for governor. Other candidates who paid their \$600 filing fee were J. J. Holmes, Austin general contractor, and Arlon Barton "Cyclone" Davis of Dallas, frequently a candidate for state office.

YOUNG DEMOS Young Democrats of Texas squared away into two factions, ready for the coming summer's political battles.

One side, friendly to Shivers, promised a precinct-by-precinct fight for control of the party machinery. The other faction held a meeting at San Antonio, where Yarborough was a principal speaker.

OTHER RACES A number of state office holders were unopposed for re-election. These included Land Commissioner Bascom Giles, Railroad Commissioner Ernest O. Thompson, Congressman-at-large Martin Dies, Comptroller Robert S. Calvert, Treasurer Jesse James and Supreme Court Justices J. E. Hickman and Clyde E. Smith, and Agriculture Commissioner John C. White.

Attorney General John Ben Shepperd drew a late-filing opponent in the person of Doug Crouch, a state representative from Denton who recently moved to Ft. Worth.

Opposing Judge Few Brewster for a place on the state supreme court are Alfred M. Scott of Austin and Robert B. Keenan of Gladewater.

A three-man field set out in the race for lieutenant governor, with Ben Ramsey seeking re-election and having as his opponents George T. Hinson of Mineola and C. T. Johnson of Austin.

Harry Graves of Georgetown retired from his place on the court of criminal appeals, and the position is being sought by Alan B. Haley of Wichita Falls, Lloyd W. Davidson of Austin, W. C. Graves of Dallas and Sam W. Davis of Houston.

Running against U. S. Senator Lyndon B. Johnson is State Representative Dudley T. Dougherty, wealthy Beville rancher and oil man.

REPUBLICANS FILE All those candidates listed above will seek nomination at the Democratic primaries. The Republicans will have a primary election, too, for the third time in Texas history. Here are the GOP candidates:

For U. S. Senator: Carlos G.

Watson of Brownsville and Willard T. Holland of Houston. For governor: Todd R. Adams of Crockett.

For Commissioner of agriculture: Harold W. Linderman of Houston. For congressman-at-large: Thomas H. Nolan of San Antonio.

More candidates may be permitted to file up to June 7, said Alvin Lane, state Republican chairman.

TWO MILLION VOTERS It is possible that more than two million votes may be cast in this year's elections.

Anyway, there are that many persons eligible to vote in Texas. Comptroller Robert S. Calvert announced that poll taxes paid add up to 1,640,101. More than half a million others may vote by getting exemptions.

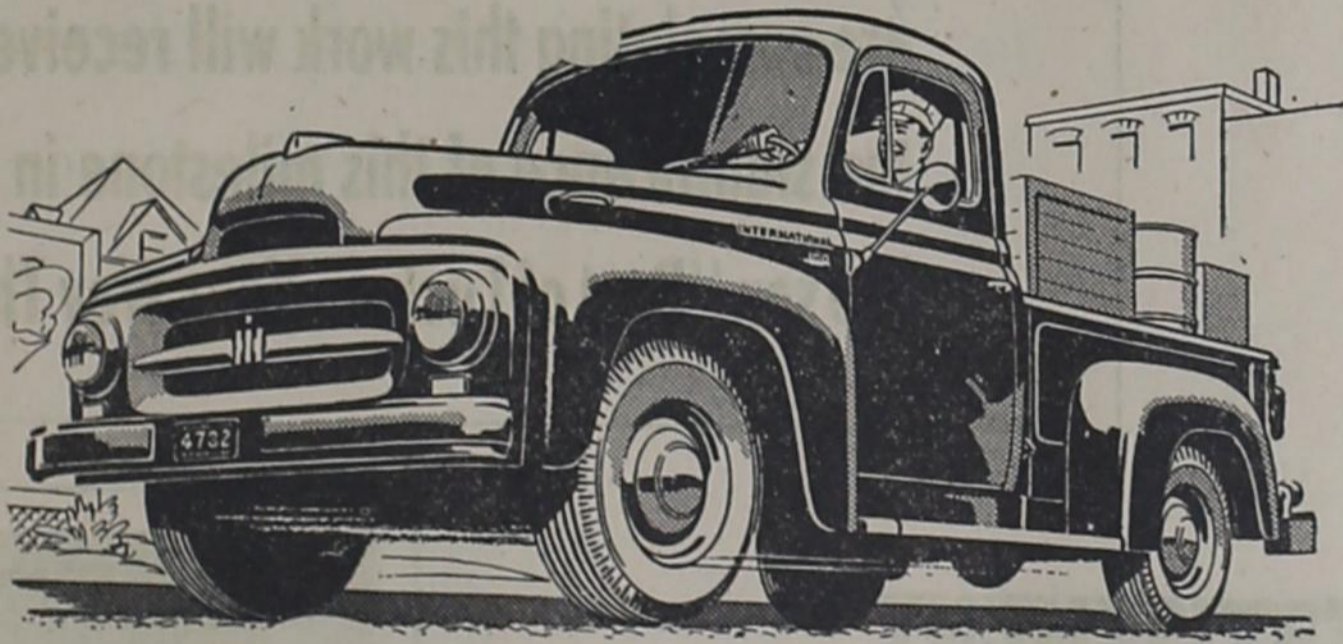

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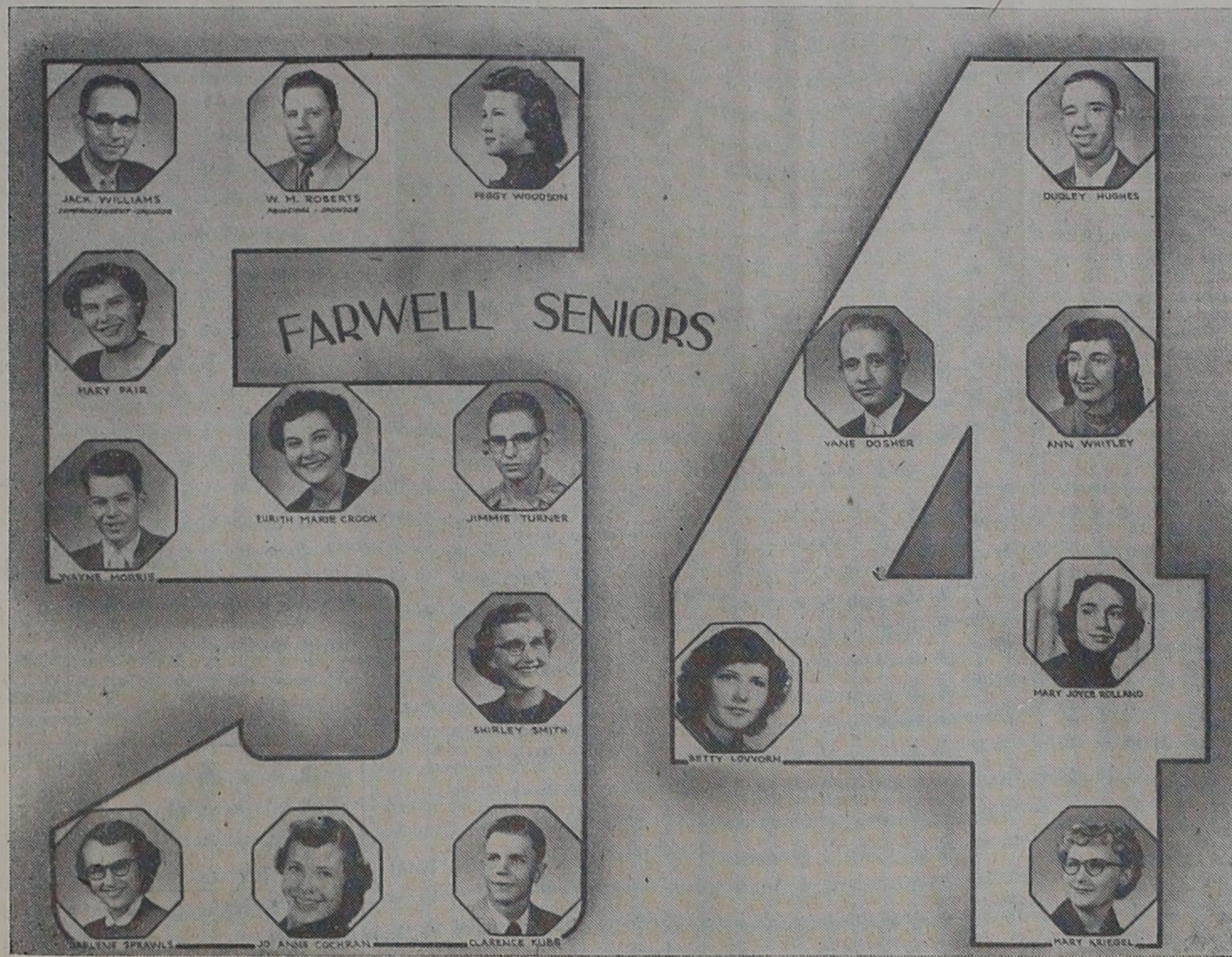

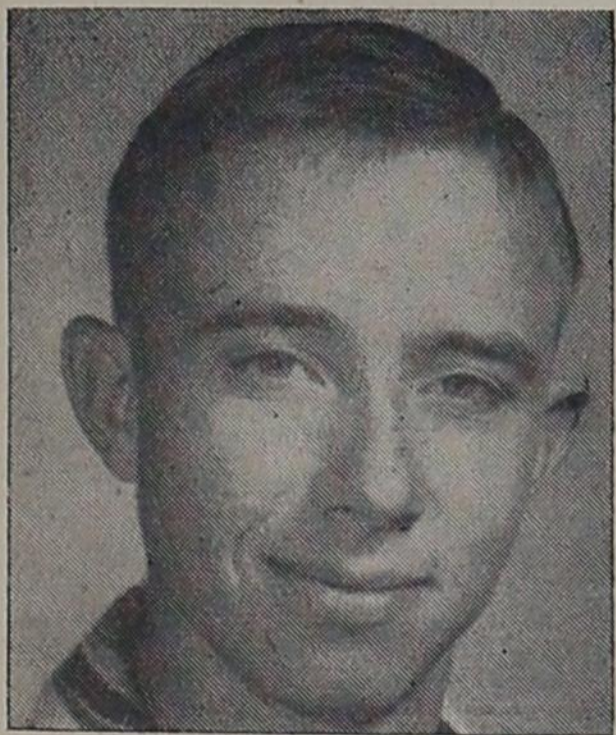

acreage this year was 140,000 acres, of which an estimated 90,000 have been seeded. Official measurements of the county crop have not been tabulated by ASC workers as yet.

Of the 90,000 acres, about 15,000 are under irrigation, and for the most part, the irrigated wheat is doing excellently thus far this spring.

Jones called attention to the fact that as more and more cash crops of which Parmer County farmers are capable of profitably producing, are placed on an allotment basis, it is to the best interest of the county for histories of principal cash crops to be maintained.

As an example, he took wheat. Wheat definitely has a place in the economy of the county, and farmers should be mindful of preserving their acreage, Jones stressed. Less than two-thirds of the 1954 allotment was planted in Parmer County this year, which is an indication that farmers are not taking advantage of preserving their history for this crop.

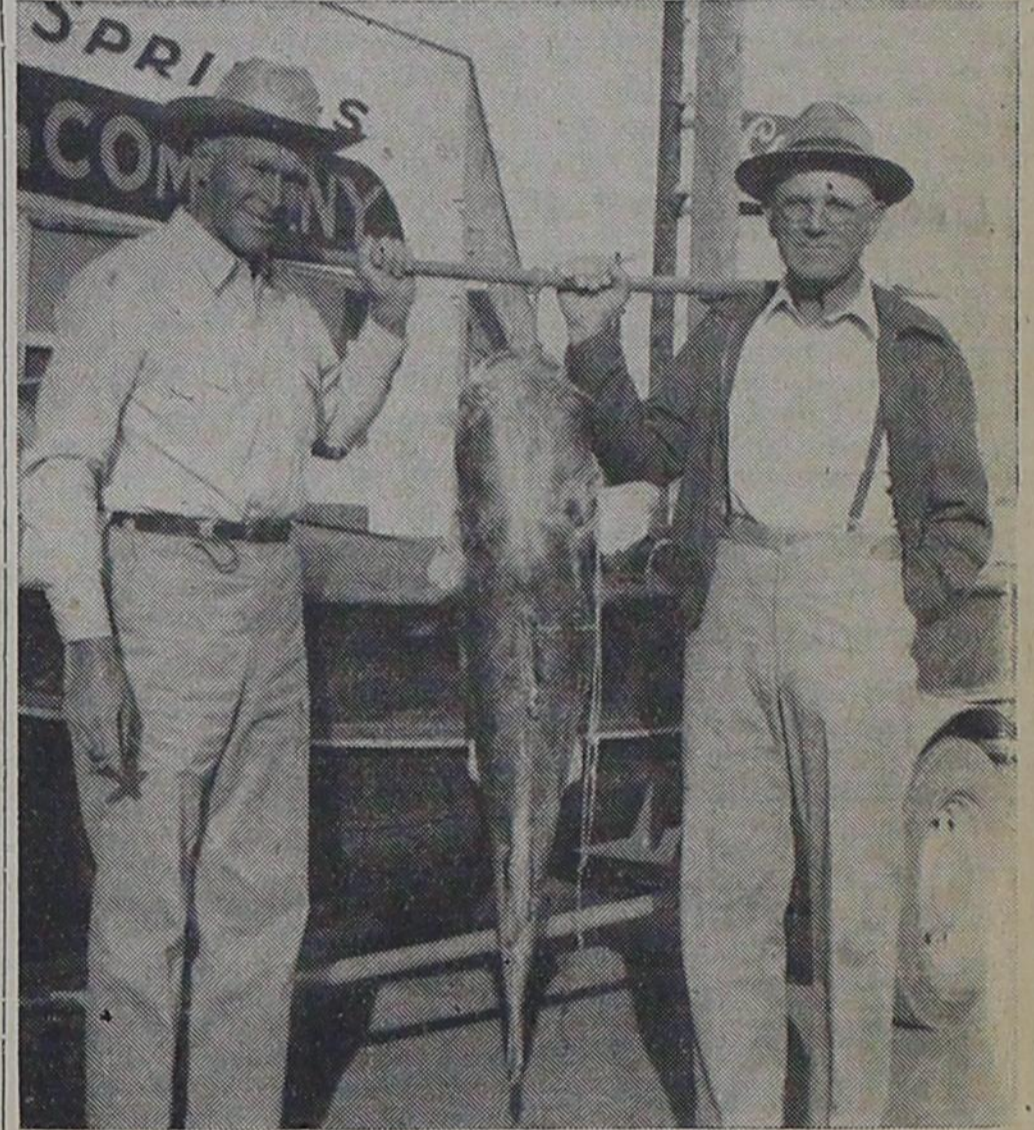

Have you made the arrangement necessary to plant cowpeas in your grain sorghums. The time is drawing near when you should be ready to plant.

New Era, Whippoorwill and Chinese Red Cowpeas grow low on the ground and are adapted to interseeding with combine grain sorghums. Plant about 6 to 8 pounds of peas in the same furrow along with your regular amount of grain sorghum.

The Brabham Cowpeas is well suited to interplant with a silage crop. It climbs the stalks and will be harvested with the silage. Plant about 6 to 8 lbs. of cowpeas with the regular amount of sorghum seed.

You will need a special attachment for your planter to plant the cowpeas. Go by your implement dealer and ask him to show you the attachment. Most of the dealers in the Parmer County Soil Conservation District are handling these attachments.

The seed is available at Howard Gault, Castro County Grain Co. and Roberts Seed Company. Seed may be available elsewhere in the district. So you might check with your local seed dealer.

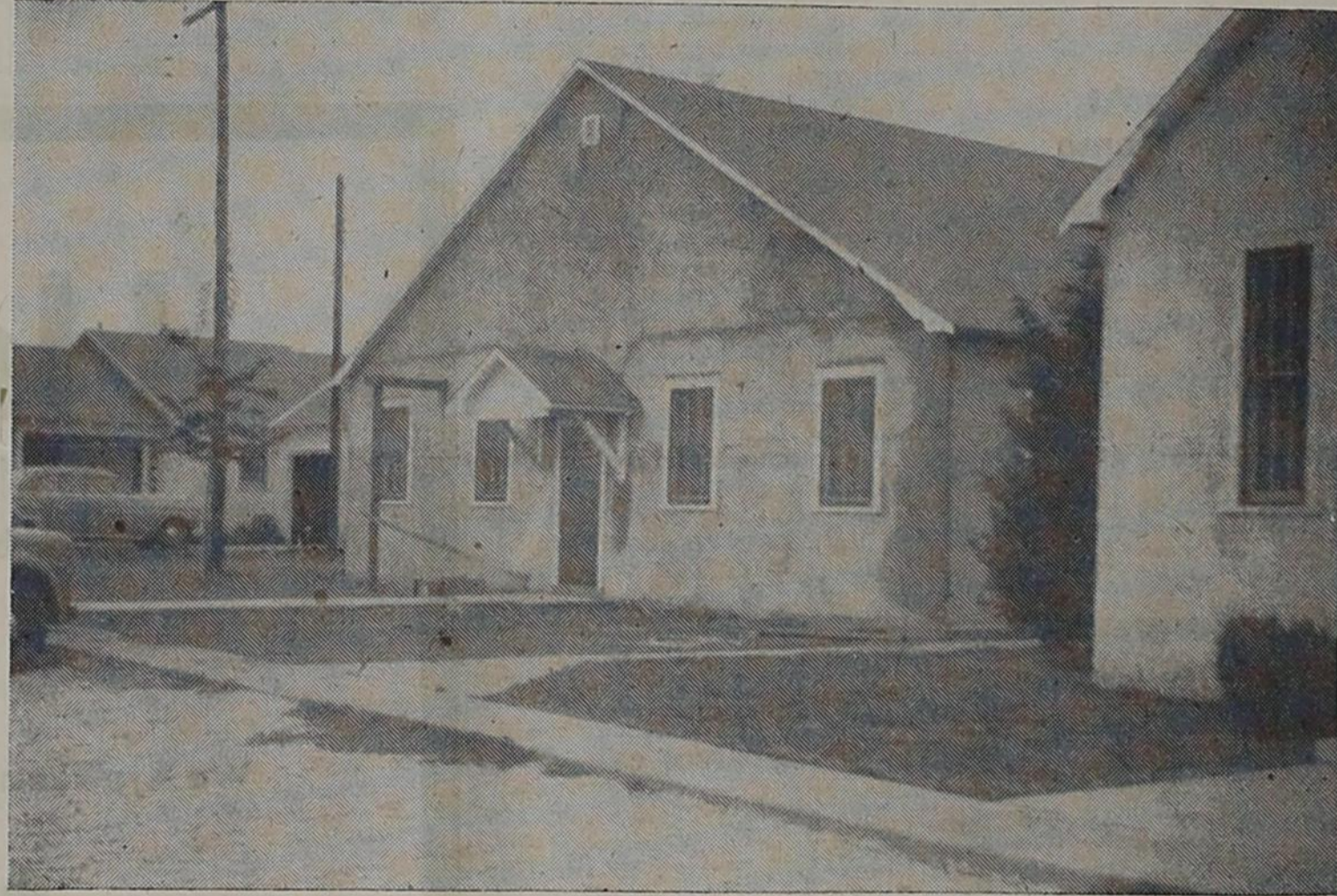

## Violent Electrical Storm, Accompanied By Hailstones, Hits Friona Saturday Night

A violent electrical storm, accompanied by changeable amounts of rain and hail, was recorded over the area the past Saturday night, followed by misty drizzle and intermittent showers throughout Sunday and Monday.

Generally speaking, hail damage was light, but those few farmers whose fields caught the full blast of the icy pellets reported heavy damage to wheat, cotton and potatoes.

Foister Rector, southeast of town, is reported to have sustained considerable damage to his wheat field. John Renner, in the same general area estimates his wheat loss at around 40 percent, and added wryly that potatoes which had just begun to recover from the freeze of some ten days ago were pounded down to little stubs.

Some fields which received heavy showers and some hail may have to be replanted to cotton, producers believe. Seed had just been put in the ground, and severe washing, coupled with the hard pounding of the rain, will likely necessitate re-planting.

Here in town, records at noon Monday showed a total of one-half inch of rain, with no hail. Jim Black, in the Black community east of here, is reported to have recorded an even 2 inches of rain; Oscar Baxter, who farms due west of town, reported about an inch of rain and added that his cotton, just barely in the ground, might have to be replanted.

Back on the south area just out of town, H. T. Magness reported that a field being prepared for row crop planting "looked like sheep had been walking on it" following the pelting of the hail on Saturday night.

Wheat which was not hit by hail, along with pasture land, naturally received the most benefit from the precipitation.

The advisability of going into such a project as large as the building program for a new Hospital in Parmer County, leaves little choice when the need is so great. Be it good times or bad, a wet or a dry season, when the demand for such an essential as health arises, nothing can be so important as to turn us from the thing we have to do—build the hospital for our own health's sake.

When an organization such as ours has been accepted and grown to maturity in as short a time as ours, it must be allowed to keep growing with the demand. We can not do this in our present location.


We cannot because we are overcrowded, we have overburdened our utility facilities, we have an unsafe building according to the American Hospital Association, and placing these facts together as one, we can see they are all due to become worse instead of better. Additional staff members need more equipment resulting in an even greater need.

It would be wonderful (in a way) if some great philanthropist lived in our midst who could finance a project of this sort single-handed. We know this is impossible and think it is to our advantage. Isn't it better the hospital belongs to all of us instead of one? It belongs to all of us because it is here to be used by one and all. We are all building it with our money and effort so it is much more appreciated than if it were a gift and no personal attachments were involved.

Everyone knows that there is no good time for such a large project. The challenge just has to be met intelligently and forthrightly when it arises.
