Local citizens, who have beem attempting to get a doctor for the Farwell Clinic for the past few months, are back searching again this week, after it was announced that a doctor had been hired.

Last weekend, a physician from Hamilton, Texas, was hired to fill the post at the clinic, and by Tuesday of this week, arrangements had been made to move the doctor and his family to Farwell this Monday.

In a telephone conversation about mid-morning Tuesday, the doctor said he was ready to take over the clinic beginning next week. Everything was "set' and plans were being made for welcoming him here soon after his arrival.

However, about 4:30 in the afternoon, a telegram was received and the doctor said he was unable to accept the local position. The reason given for turning it down was that Hamilton citizens disliked losing their physician and got together and offered to build him a new hospital if he would re-
