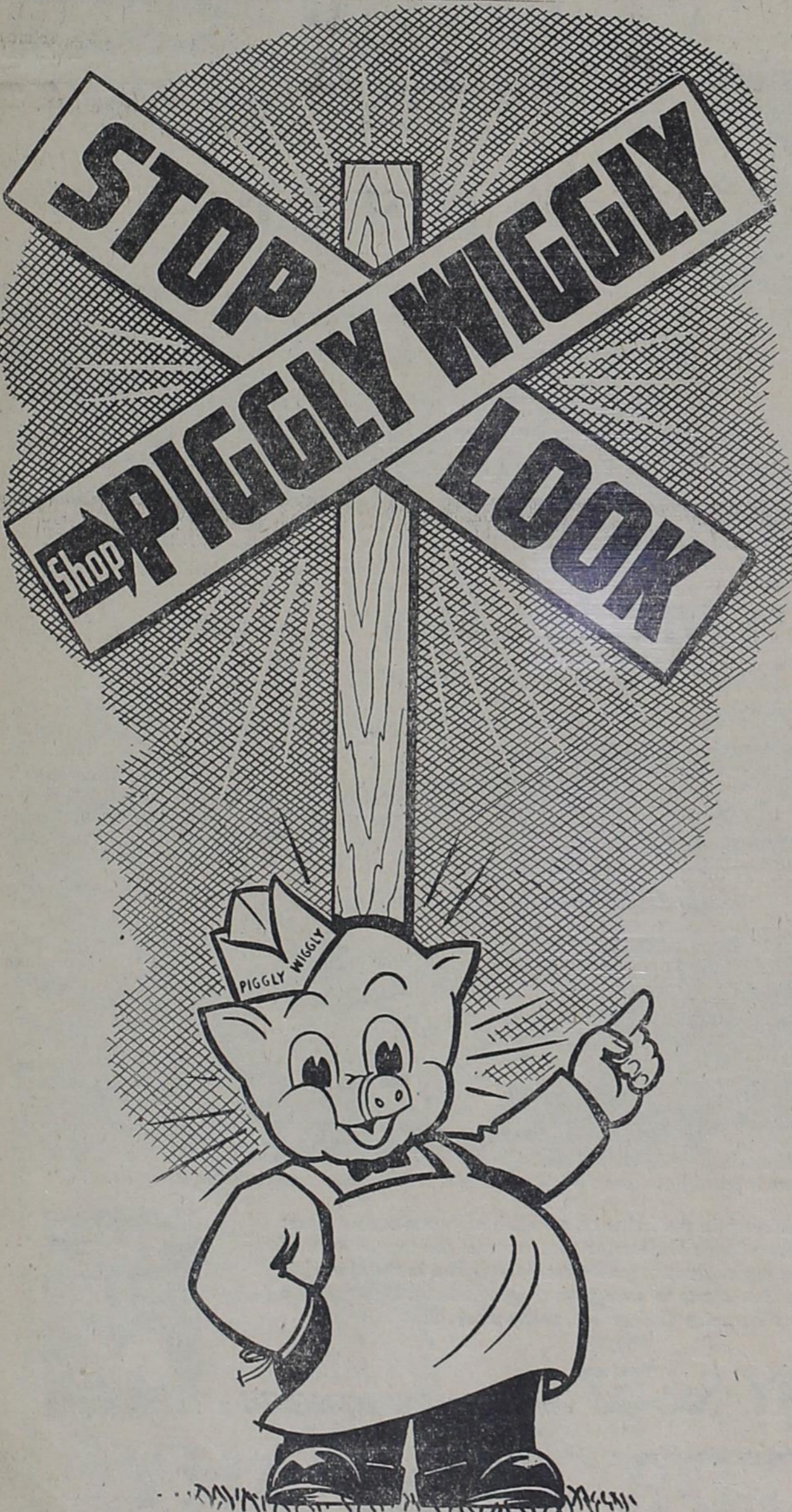

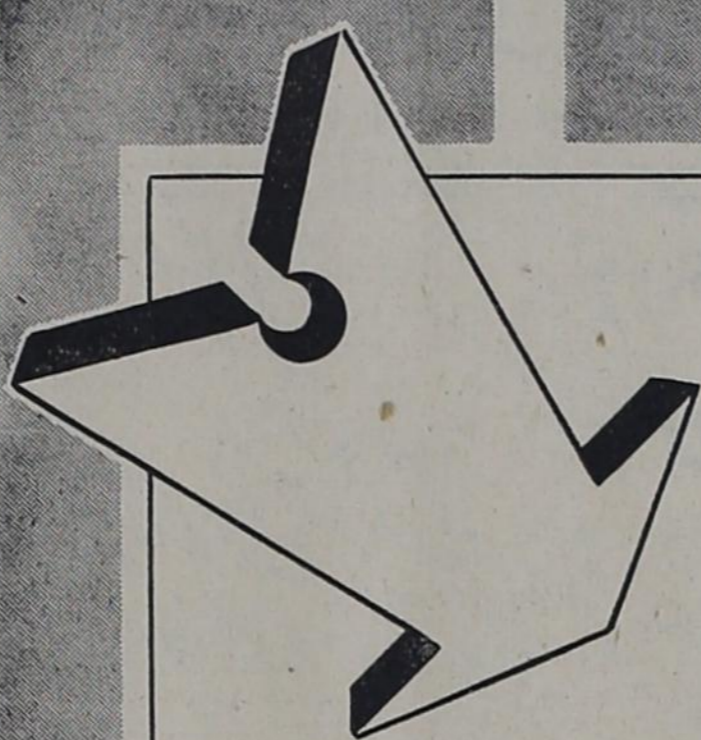

would be required to get the water out of the Basin. Then, too, as we all know, the High Plains is not just a catch-phrase. We ARE on the High Plains—up in the air like a table—about 1500 feet.

Western Kansas, Oklahoma, and all of the Panhandle and West Texas and Eastern New Mexico are captivated by this idea—which probably would cost several billions of dollars to bring into reality.

As they say, "Necessity is the mother of invention," and we would want to remind scoffers of the great dams and aqueducts that supply Southern California with water. The booming population out there didn't give engineers much time to fiddle around. They dammed great rivers, drilled holes through entire mountain ranges, and licked the problem in jig time.

Downstate, folks along the Gulf Coast are talking about a giant intercostal canal to carry the waters of the Sabine and Neches Rivers from the humid areas of East Texas to the parched lands of the Western Gulf Coastal Plain. This big project, by the way, does happen to be one where the topography is favorable—its downhill nearly all the way.
