The corn, feed, and cotton in the rolling blacklands around Austin and Temple are in marvelous condition. The range is making a comeback, too. From Matador to below San Angelo the range is a sight to behold in most cases. Grass has returned to the rolling prairies of deep West Texas.

The seared area between Wichita Falls and the Caprock, including Vernon, Childress, and towns in that vicinity, is looking very good, too. This is the part of Texas, you will remember, where county officials appealed to the government to distribute surplus foods to feed people who didn't have enough money to buy anything to eat.

It all looks different, now. Heavy rains have forced much replanting, and it seems paradoxical that our crops should be way ahead of theirs in growth, but such is the case. That part of the country is certainly getting its stands off to a good start, though, and things are really looking up.

One thing that we would not want to swap them is their terrible week infestations. Johnson grass has completely taken some of the farms. It is hard to find a field that is not infested with at least some of this noxious pest. Their weed control must surely be a major problem.

Both were marvels to the eye and were shining examples of the industrial might that has made this country the most productive in the world. Big business is much larger than some people would imagine. Between three and four thousand people were employed in each one of these plants.

There is a very striking difference between the meat processing plant and the aircraft manufacturing plant, however, and we talked with several of our newspaper friends who were with us to try to unravel the mystery.

The workers at the Swift plant went after their jobs like frenzied bees. They dressed, cut up, and handled the carcasses with blinding speed. There was no lost motion whatever. The finished products poured from the plant in a steady stream.

At the Bell plant, is was a different story. There was no assembly line technique. It astounded us to see about half of the workers standing around or idly leaning on their machines and "shooting the breeze" with fellow workers.

No one seemed to be in a hurry; in fact, no one seemed to be very interested in what he was supposed to be doing. Perhaps we got there at the wrong time of day. Perhaps we caught the plant in a slack moment.

The fact that a product as intricate as a helicopter demands the utmost care in its manufacture may have had something to do with the apparent slow pace of the

THE TRIBUNE'S EDITORIAL COMMENT

Congress Gets Highballed For Quick Legislation

Congressmen, like other Americans, enjoy acation. And congressman, like other Americars, often postpone important work until the East possible moment, and then plow into it in a somewhat haphazard fashion.

Senator Lyndon Johnson reports that the U.S. Serate is "headed into one of the greatest legislative log jams in its history." That great de-Ciberative body is aiming at a July 31 adjournment date, even though many of its members say it can't be done, considering the amount of mark that lies ahead.

It is astounding to remember that more than billion remains to be appropriated by congress during the next five weeks. Of this, about \$29 Million is earmarked for the armed services. Sena-Johnson points out that studies have been going on concerning these appropriations, but we feel that in the final analysis, they will be shoved through the legislature without the careful consideration they so badly need.

The farm price program is now a hot potato, and the congressmen are wary of it. The committee on agriculture has already voted to keep high supports for another year, but what the remainder of legislators will decide is a real question, The administration, of course, is plugging for a Measible price support program. Vote-hungry congressmen from farm states are likely to side with the old guard, however, and an extension of the high supports is more than just possible. Whatever the result, there surely will be a terrible squabble and delay when the question must be

Other such behemoths as foreign aid, housing reciprocal trade, social security, and tax revisions are yet to be hashed out. As the functions government grow more complex with each passing year, it is inevitable that less and less affention will be given to matters that need more more study.


