Yet, we wonder if this a fair test of his program inasmuch as the dairy cow is in some ways an almost obsolete farm resident. pound? We don't think the cow can be made to produce butter that cheaply, period.

We have talked with people who were all sincere in their arguments on farm price supports who were poles apart in their ideas of how to make the agricultural program work.

Yes, we have even talked with that the administration's program worth a trial.

There are many evils in the present farm situation that are not the direct result of the high price support program. Anyway, we don't think they are the result of the theory of supports.

Wheat Referendum Coming Next Friday; Camp Answers Some Typical Questions What more than anything else has caused all the bad publicity about rigid support prices has been the way that the program has been administered. In other words, we have not been content to allow our legislators to permit the program to work in the manner in which it was drawn up.

With supports at 90 per cent of parity, we are supposed to agree to subject our acreage to control in order that the production of certain basic commodities can be regulated. Yet, whenever we have a very successful year with one certain commodity, and that commodity's acreage for the next year is drastically cut because of the surplus on hand, we too often set up such tremendous objection to the acreage reduction that our legislators are obliged to tamper with the fundamentals of the program to make it more palatable politically. That's why it isn't working, we

Back to our original statement, we are really confused at the present time. We depend more on advice from folks whom we consider well informed for the shaping of our opinions than on any other thing. And we have been amazed to observe how oppositely some of our best informants reason; all of them being what we call well informed, sincere people, too.

As for ourselves, we are interested in finding the best thing for the farmers on a long-time basis. We think it is foolhardy to do what is expedient only at the moment, for we know that somebody (usually us) will have to pay for nearsighted mistakes on down the line.

Our own propositions would not suggest definite ways to arrive at these aims, but we think that here are a few things that the farm program ought to be doing for the country:

1. Eliminating the competition to the farmers from outside investors who have gone into farming not as a hobby but because it has been made profitable for them to do so.

2. Getting our surplus commodities into the hands of people all over the world who desperately need the food and fiber, and who don't have money but perhaps do have goods or services that could

We're plugging for the governor, though, and not because we have any hope he'll get to first base with his program. We think that the more publicity that is given to the problem of excessive personal and corporate income taxes, the sooner the people of America will wake up to the reality that they are being drug ever nearer to a socialistic state.

There Is a Limit On Everything

In America, a land blessed with more opportunity than any other country in the world since its beginning in 1776, there has grown up the conception that there is no limit on how much people can earn. This is basically a good philosophy if, at the same time, it is understood that how much they can earn is governed by how much they can pro-

The closing down of the famous anthracite mines in the Panther Valley in eastern Pennsylvania is a case in point. Unemployment now grips that once prosperous area, and the tentacles of a local depression have drawn tightly around the necks of the towns of over 5000 mine workers.

Under the reign of the United Mine Workers, these laborers have been led to press for greater and greater pay, while they in turn produced less and less coal as time wore on, Coal, a great industrial fuel, is now facing serious competition from natural gas and fuel oil, and the mine owners have been obliged to raise the prices of their coal even higher to keep up with the spiraling demands of the miners.

Now it has reached the point where coal costs so much to get to the surface of the earth that it cannot compete on a dollar to dollar basis with these other fuels. Management of the coal companies has had no choice but to close down the mines. There simply was no longer any reason for keeping them open.

Where, now, are the interests of the coal laborers? What have their continued and excessive

Yes, we will admit that organized labor is a necessity in the world today where agreements are made under pressure. Yes, a union is the only way through which they could bargain effectively with their employers. Yes, the unions have lifted the estate of the common laborer to a point where he can now afford a decent home, a car, and a few of the more common luxuries of life.

of the farmers who vote favor quotas, the full level of price supideas on how to fix up a better port which is authorized for the 1955 crop—apparently somewhere from 90 to 75 per cent of paritywill be available for those who acreage allotments. If less than two-thirds favor quotas, price support will be at 50 percent of parity for those who comply with their acreage allotments. No price support is available for those who fail to comply with acreage allotments, with or without the marketing quotas. In answer to another frequent-

> ly-asked question, Camp states briefly how the farm allotment is determined. First the national acreage allotment is apportioned among States, and then among the counties, according to the acreage seeded to wheat during the latest 10-year period, adjusted for weather trends and other factors. This year the national acreage allotment is 55 million acres, the level specified by law under present supply conditions. Allotments are determined for farms according to past wheat acreage, tillable acres on each farm, crop rotation practices, type of soil, and topography.

Farmers in doubt about their eligibility to vote in the referendum, or any program question, should see their county ASC office.


