THE TRIBUNE'S EDITORIAL COMMENT

Flexible Prop Plan Will Have Opposition

President Eisenhower, in a special message to a joint session of Congress Monday, laid forth the administration's philosophy on the farm program, the principal tenant of which is the underwriting of a "flexible" system of price supports.

President Eisenhower and Secretary Benson are in accord on this particular point, as well as a substantial number of lawmakers. But there is little hope that such an approach is going to be incorporated into the farm program, which is scheduled for wholesale overhauling early in this ses-

The American Farm Bureau is without doubt 3, 1879. the strongest showing of agricultural opinion in favor of a "sliding scale" support system, and its resolutions were not insignificant in forming the administration's announced program.

"Grassroots" opinions, in this part of the country at least, don't harmonize with the flexible plan. At a meeting of cotton growers in Bovina Monday night, where about 200 Parmer County farmers gathered to discuss the problem of the serious acreage cutback, a showing of hands was asked on a proposition like this:

"How many of you are in favor of reasonably high, rigid price supports, with the accompanying reasonable acreage controls?"

There were a lot of Farm Bureau members represented at that meeting, but nearly every hand was raised to indicate endorsement of the present program. One man voted against rigid supports; several abstained.

Ike's new program, conceived in all sincerity, looks as though it will meet with little favor in Parmer County.

Money's Hard To Do Without, But It Won't Buy Everything

Walter H. Mallory, executive director of the council on foreign relations, and an author with wide experience in Asia, writes in the current U. S. News that America and what she stands for is at a low ebb in Indonesia.
