Dr. W. M. Lancaster, Curry County health officer, met with officials of Texico Schools last night, warning them of the possibility of an epidemic locally, and requested that all dogs within the city limits be vaccinated or destroyed within

Mayor M. C. Roberts said this morning (Thursday), that the suggestion will be complied with by the city, and requested the cooperation in this emergency of persons owning pets.

Persons who have dogs should contact their veterinarian in order to get the vaccinations made, Roberts said, and it will be necessary for the dogs to be licensed (as is already required by Texico ordinance).

Action of the same nature is anticipated in Farwell, although Mayor Johnie Williams could not be reached this morning. Advice of the Parmer County health officer probably will be sought, and the city commission is likely to act on his recommendation.

Better Watch Out For New Regulations

Users of irrigation wells in Parmer County had better keep a wary eye on how they use their irrigation water this year, if the new rules and regulations of the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District mean anything.

The new regulations foretell a "tightening up" of policies governing operation of wells, especially where the wasting of water is concerned. Where carelessness or indifference is evident, it may become necessary for district officials to file for an injunction shutting down the well.

These regulations have not been made simply for the sake of passing laws, or for the purpose of demonstrating the power of the district. They are designed as protective measures of all concerned, because the preservation of our underground water resources is a first consideration for us all. Please, Mr. Irrigation man, use that water wisely!

The Inside Straight

What is more important to you than your community's hospital? The churches: we will agree that they are, but where would they be without the health of their members? The schools: we will go along on that too, but where would they be without the proper health of the students? It seems then that one is as essential as the other, and that they go hand in hand.

Let us compare them from another angle: the financial viewpoint. Who finances the churches? The members, of course; the people who go there for worship. The schools are public institutions, and as such are subject to public financing, once again the people who use the facilities are the supporters and benefactors. There are several ways hospitals can be financed: private, public, co-op, and non-profit corporations. Parmer County Community Hospital is of the non-profit type organization.

It is a Hospital not owned by any group. True, it is governed by a Board of Directors who are elected by persons who bought shares when the Hospital was started. That is as far as it goes in that no remuneration is due those people now. Those who still pay membership dues on a yearly basis, get some consideration in doctor fees, room rent, laboratory, and X-ray charges, but no dividends or anything of that nature.

Any money which the hospital should show as profit goes back in the business for new equipment, which always is needed. Through this you can readily see that hospitals are not financed like churches and schools. Parmer County Community Hospital is the only Hospital in the County, and it looks like the comparison stops at that point.

Your Hospital keeps its doors open 24 hours a day from the day it opens for business. It has to be ready to handle any emergency at any time. Race, color, or creed; rich or poor, it makes no difference when they come to the Hospital's door; they are admitted.

Your Hospital has a good medical and nursing staff and has been operating successfully since its inception. It has good equipment and diagnostic facilities. We feel that all we lack is a building comparable with our other assets: a fireproof, semi-soundproof building. The plans we have in mind are to increase from a 19bed to a 25-bed hospital. Additions to our staff are expected this summer when another doctor and dentist join us. We are crowded for space now and with these additions it will be even more so.

With these things in mind, stop and ask yourself this question: "What is it worth to me, knowing the Hospital is there if I need it?" It is an unanswerable question, isn't it? Who can say in a time of emergency, a life and death matter, what it is worth? Even if it is a routine thing, who can say because of time spent, convenience, automobile expense in going to other places?

You, who are Parmer County residents and do not use the Hospital, have that right as an American citizen. We wouldn't want it any other way, but would like to say this: The Hospital is worth money to you in that your Hospital takes care of the biggest part of its transients and indigents without County aid. We received approximately \$1000 from Parmer County this past year, while a neighboring county received around \$12,000.

Yes, churches, schools and hospitals are very important to you and your family. If you are approached for help in this project for humanity, please keep the foregoing points in mind. This poem by Lewis Snyder which appeared in the January issue of "Trustee" has some wonderful thoughts. Won't you consider the message it gives?

THIS IS A HOSPITAL

It's another building you hardly noticed before-Until one day you find yourself inside. Lying there helplessly-

You know now it's not just another building, it's more like a Church

Where no one, except death, is ever turned away. Where life enters timidly, and is coaxed to remain.

Or sitting and standing and pacing and waiting and hoping.

Where men and women spend their lives saving the lives of people they never saw before.

Where who you are and what you are seem rather unimportant, Where forgotten things like the miracle of opening and closing your hand, become new and exciting. 
