Sale of the Hillcrest Addition of Farwell by Jack Stagner, Clovis contractor, to Charles Lenau Lumber Company of Muleshoe was revealed this week. The transaction was affected last weekend.

After many delays, some of the property was sold to Letay Construction Company of Dallas, and after a time, they built the first two of what were to be a number of FFA and GI-financed homes.


Their work bogged down too, however, and eventually, all representatives of the company were withdrawn from the community and things left at a stand-still.





### Let's Keep Dies

A special election which will decide who will fill the senate seat left vacant by nowgovernor Price Daniel will be held, as most readers surely realize, next Tuesday. But the date of the election is about the only thing easy to keep in mind—the voting itself can be complicated.

In the field are 22 candidates who seek the position. There'll be 23 names on the ballot, but Frank Connally has withdrawn. That is sure to result in some head-scratching for the average voter, who'd like to do what's right, but who will have a tough time making an accurate evaluation of the qualifications of the entries in this big field.

Since this has been an exceptionally tame campaign, and voters have not been aroused as they were in the elections of only a few months ago, it is only natural that many names on the ballot will register only question marks in the minds of the voters. Then too, checks of public sentiment seem to indicate a light turnout, so all things considered, this election could certainly have some surprising overtones.

For instance, the mere familiarity of a name is going to be worth hundreds of votes in such an election, and we'll say that Ralph Yarborough, after three throws (all misses) at the governorship, has at least made his name a household word in Texas. This fact alone could give Yarborough his needed plurality in the race—there'll be no runoffs.

However, we choose Martin Dies, congressman-at-large, whose office is about to be done away with. Dies himself is no stranger to politics, naturally, but he's not the free-wheeling politician that some of his opponents are. In fact, Martin Dies just about committed political suicide years ago when in Washington he was one of the first congressmen to turn the spotlight of public opinion on communistic infiltration of our government.

That was at a time when being "broadminded" or chummy with socialistic planvogue of the moment.

When Dies exposed the pinkos in governhim as a mud-thrower, meddler, trouble- is badly needed.

#### Track Rules

This is the last in a series of articles on track and field rules, submitted by Shelby Jobes, Farwell coach. The week's rules deal with questions and answers on varlous phases of the sport.

Q-If the starter fires the pistol and then recalls the runners, can he penalize for a false start?

Q-May the contestant in a race be recalled after the starter's gun has been fired?

A-Yes.

Q-In relay races, will a whole team be disqualified if the first runner of a team makes two false starts.

A-Yes. Coaches should be careful to place a steady man in the leadoff position. Q-May a runner win a race time in the penitentiary.

without breaking the finish tape? A-Yes. Q-What is boxing and is it per-

missible? A-Boxing is a term that describes an attempt of one or more to obstruct a competitor. Natural boxes are often formed but unavoidable.

Q-Will the distance obtained in the shot, discus, and broad jump trials in preliminaries be counted in the finals?

A-Yes. Each competitor shall be credited with the best of all his trials.

Q-If a contestant steps or falls out of his lane, does this disqualify probation is being considered. Wilma Liner

A-Not if he does not interfere with an opponent.

Q-May a high jumper or pole vaulter pass up his right to jump at any height?

A-Yes, but he forfeits his right to jump at the declined height. Q-The discus thrower steps into the circle and during the preliminary swing, drops the discus outside the circle. Is this considered as one of his trials?

A-Yes. 6-Should the short relays, such as the 440 and 880 be run in lanes? A-The 440 should be run in lanes the entire distance, and it is best that the 880 be run in

Q-May a competitor who has drawn a lane far from the pole be allowed to start in back of those and their cases are pending. near the pole?

A-This is, of course, sometimes necessary for longer runs. Contestant must get consent of referee.

Q-After runners have drawn a lane, may they exchange with teammates?

A-No. It is usually wise to draw in the various events by schools and then alternate competitors in the lanes. If drawings are made by individuals they must start in the lanes which they draw, unless shifted to vacant lanes by order of the referee.





### Fair Crop Year Seen By J. W. Indiam' Crim

Not since 1949 has the once-a-year weatherman picked a good year and each year since then it has been bone dry. Last year the wind was blowing out of the south-southwest, which indicates poor year.







1 cup butter 1 3/4 cups sugar

2 cups sifted flour 1 teaspoon lemon extract

1/2 teaspoon almond extract The art of this cake is the blend-

ng and creaming.

Cream butter and sugar just a ittle at a time blending well each time. Add eggs one at a time and beat at least five minutes after each addition. Add all flour at one time and mix well until well blended. Add extracts and pour into nine inch angel food cake pan that has been greased and floured. Bake 45 minutes at 350 degrees. Turn out on wax paper as soon

is cake is baked. You may use either cake flour or regular flour. Cake flour gives you a finer and more tender texture where regular lour gives you more of the old fashioned chewy taste.

### Ralph W. Yarborough **TEXAS** PUBLIC SERVANT WHAT HE HAS

DONE FOR TEXAS:



As Assistant Attorney General: Schools-Attorney General James V. Allred called Yarborough to Austin in 1931 as Assistant Attorney General to represent the Permanent School Fund of Texas and the Permanent Fund of the University. He was instrumental in obtaining the approval of the loan, paid for out of grazing-lease rentals, for the erection of the Main Building of the University. As Assistant Attorney General he recovered for Texans vast sums in money and land values-in the Mid-Kansas case alone, \$1,073,500 for the Permanent School Fund, the second largest money judgment ever recovered by Texas.

Water - in 1931 Yarborough wrote the first Texas law protecting our underground water resources.

Tidelands — In 1934 Yarborough wrote the first opinion resulting in the issuing of oil and gas leases to the submerged Tidelands in the Gulf of Mexico as a part of Texas. From 1950 to 1952 he was a member of the Executive Committee of the Texas Property Defense Association. In 1953 he went to Washington, at his own expense, to testify for the Texas Tidelands claim before the Senate Committee that reported the bill favorably for Texas.

Strappage — In 1934, Yarborough initiated, prepared, and presented to the Railroad Commission of Texas the State's case for the abolition of an arbitrary 1% pipeline "strappage" deduction from the volume of oil produced and sold in Texas. This action has resulted in saving to Texas and Texans tens of millions of dollars per year for the past twenty years.

As Director of the LCRA: Water and Power — As a member of the original Board of Directors of the Lower Colorado River Authority, Yarborough helped bring Texas the series of dams across the Colorado above Austin which has created the Central Texas lakes, conserved Texas water and established rural electrical cooperatives.

#### WHAT HE STANDS FOR:

Public Roads: Yarborough champions the continuation of Texas' farm-tomarket road program and the increased support and acceleration of other public road construction.

Soil and Water Conservation: An authority on water rights law and a pioneer in the conservation of Texas soil and water, with practical experience in LCRA, Yarborough stands for strengthening the soil conservation program and setting up a comprehensive program of water conservation.

Schools: A former teacher, lifelong supporter of the schools, and from 1946 to 1952 attorney for the Texas State Teachers Association, Yarborough champions increased support for better public education.

Public Health: Yarborough advocates improvement in Texas' facilities for treatment of the mentally ill and strengthening of the entire state public health program. Old Age Assistance: Yarborough has advocated, and now advocates, increased


