Seven area students will climax their high school days when they deliver valedictory and salutatory addresses at their respective schools. Two other students, one from Texico and one from Farwell, will also be recognized as honor students when they deliver class histories.

Topping the scholastic list at Texico High School for the 1975-76 senior class are Spencer Turner, valedictorian, and Valerie Fitz and Gia Crooks, co-salutatorians. Turner, son of Mr. and Mrs. David Turner, Valerie, daughter of Mrs. Gladys Fitz, and Gia, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Arlye Crooks, will deliver their addresses at Texico High School commencement exercises slated for 8 p.m. MDT on the evening of Friday, May 21, at the school gymnasium.

Giving the Texico Senior Class History during the commencement exercises will be Rusty Rucker, son of Mr. and Mrs. Johnnie Rucker. Rusty will be recognized as the third highest ranking senior at Texico High School.

Spencer has been active in school programs and activities and has served as senior class president. He was selected as a Homecoming King candidate for football and is a member of the Texico Chapter of Future Farmers of America and the National Honor Society. The valedictorian has also been involved in all phases of the Texico athletic program.

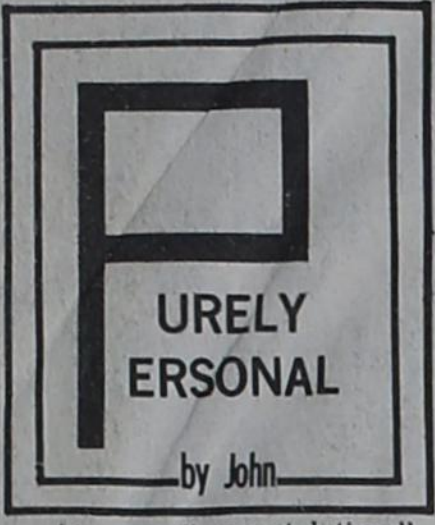

Steerettes Are State Champs

Farwell High School girls golf team defended their 1975 State Golf Championship by winning the State tournament last week. In the two-day tournament, Farwell placed all five golfers in the state's top ten medalists and pushed ahead 102 strokes better than the second place Stanton High School.

Heavy rains played a major roll in performance and scheduling tee off times. Farwell girls led first day play by 52 strokes, shooting a 380; Stanton was second with 432. The final day of the tournament, Farwell girls relied on experience and consistency to gain 50 more strokes and claim the 1976 State Girls Golf title.

West Texas was well represented in the tournament. The State Medalist Crown went to Memphis freshman Tina Foxhall who shot 85-87-172. Second place medalist, Penny Hughes of Farwell, shot 85-89-174. Farwell's Carol Vinton shot 93-91-184 to place third in the state, followed by teammates Claire McFarland, 98-99-197, sixth place; Kathy Booth, 104-97-201,

seventh; and Deana Williams, 110-109-219, ninth place.

"Winning the State Championship for the second straight year is an honor not only for the girls, but Farwell High School and the community," said Coach Don Alana. The girls have played well all year, individually and as a team.

"Congratulations to Penny for her performance at state. Carol did a super job at region and state playing with a broken finger. Claire, Kathy and Deana did well all year by shooting low enough to send our team to the state tournament."

"I received many compliments at Austin regarding their performance on and off the golf course. They are Champions in many ways," he concluded.

2:30-4:30 - Room tours at Junior High, High School, and Home Economics Cottage.

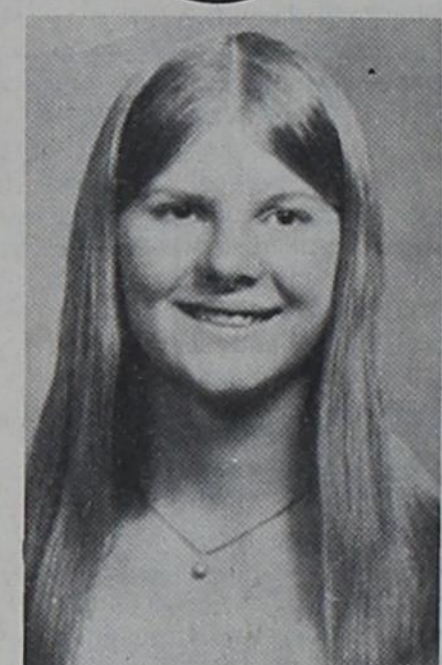

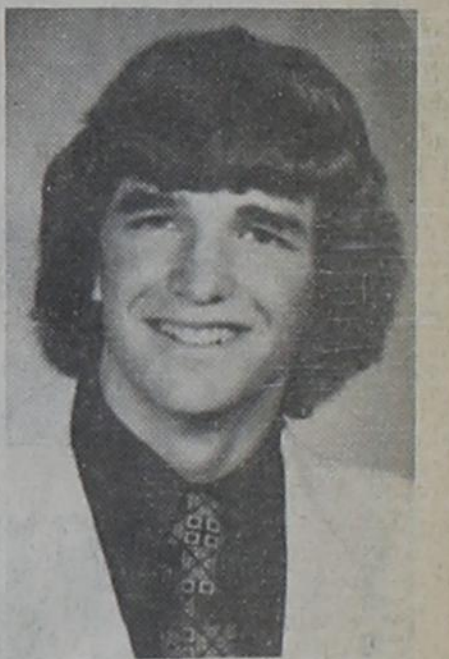

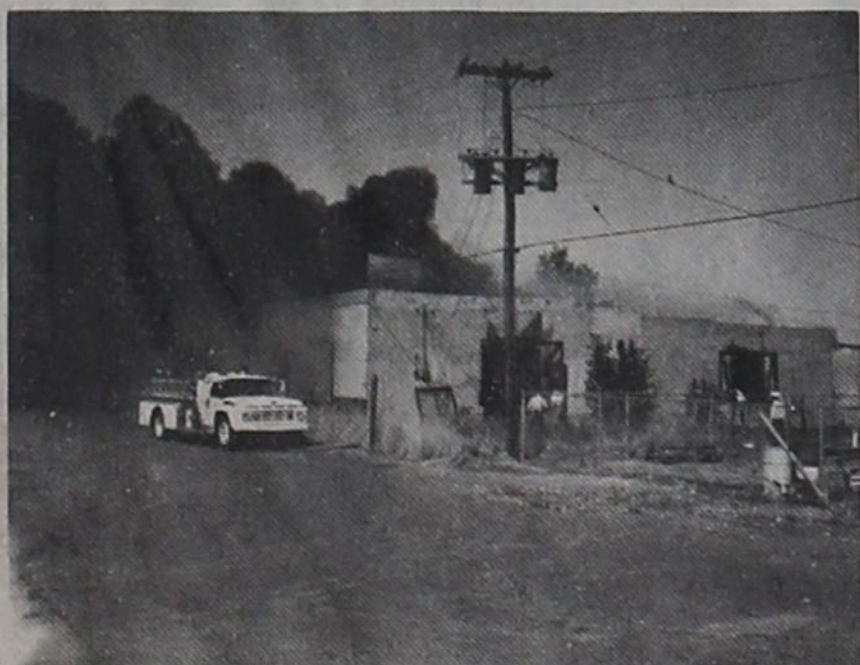

TWIN CITIES VOLUNTEER FIREMEN IN ACTION



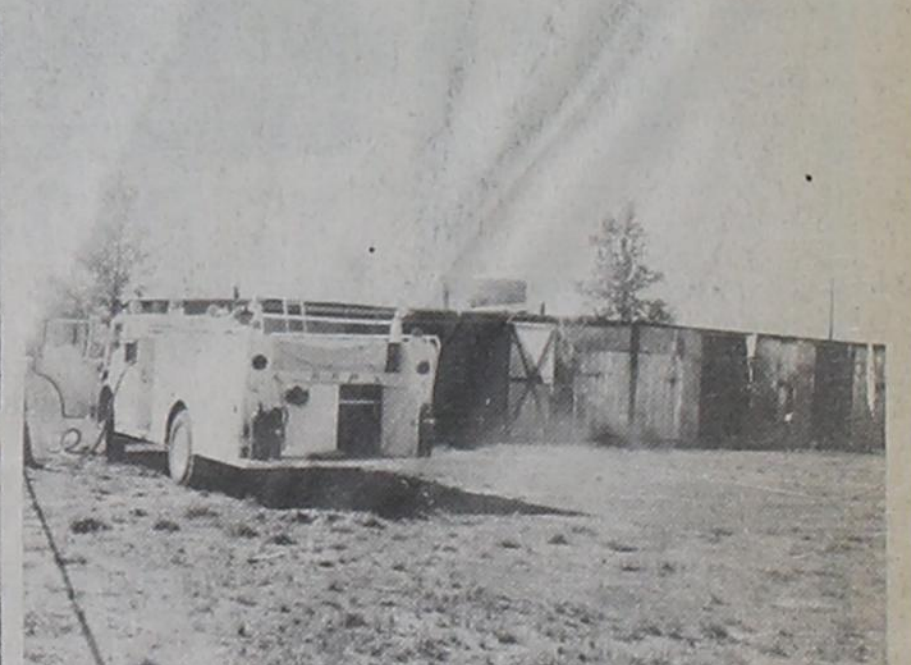
Volunteer firemen from both Texico and Farwell responded to a fire alarm Monday, May 10, at the old concrete block plant located on the Amarillo Highway. It was reported that the building, which was unoccupied, suffered scorch and char damage but was not destroyed by the blaze. The fire



apparently began when flames from burning trash were whipped into the building igniting trash and weeds which had blown into the structure. A member of the Texico Volunteer Fire Department was the first person to spot the blaze. He turned the alarm into the Farwell Department and then



alerted Texico firemen, who also responded to the alarm. Approximately 15 firemen, representing both cities, manned four trucks and contained the blaze in about 30 minutes time. Commissioners Court - -

Vote Split On Moving County Data

During the regular meeting of the Parmer County Commissioners Court conducted Monday, May 10, a discussion was held regarding the placing of old, outdated records of Parmer County with the Archives Division of the Texas State Library, to be stored at Panhandle Plains Historical Museum in Canyon.

It was pointed out that these records would be indexed and used in preserving the history and genealogy of Parmer County and individuals connected with the county.

It was also noted that no active records or confidential records would be stored in Canyon and that if any records stored were needed by the county that they would be returned.

After a lengthy discussion it was resolved by Commission-

ers that no records of Parmer County would be made available to the Panhandle Plains Historical Museum in Canyon.

Voting for the resolution were Jimmy Briggs, Charley Jefferson and Cecil Atchley. Recognized as voting against the resolution were Tom Lewellen and County Judge Paul Fortenberry.

In other business, the Court reviewed a request from the Plains Irrigation Gas Users Association that the Commissioners Court consider a resolution requesting the governor to call a special session to consider certain natural gas legislation.

The proposed resolution was discussed at length with John Aiken, attorney for the Association, requesting that additional paragraphs be inserted in the resolution. It was then

agreed by Commissioners that a resolution proposed by Plains Irrigation Gas Users Association, after approval by the county attorney, be approved and executed by the county judge for the Commissioners.

Herb Evans of the Soil Conservation Service visited with the Commissioners and reported that it appeared that dam site number three, located in the Lazbuddie area, would probably be started around October 1.

David Brown of the State Health Department, located in Canyon, met with Commissioners and informed them of certain services offered by his department and general information as to how the services are operated and of the department's contacts with the local health officials. It was pointed out that the depart-

ment expects to have a nurse working in Parmer, Castro and Swisher counties in the near future.

During a called session held during the latter part of April, the Commissioners Court resolved that payment in the amount of \$2900 be made, from the Farm to Market Road Precinct 1 account, to Boswell and Crofton, Inc., of Lubbock for road repairs and improvements to a county road running one mile north from Highway 60, on the east side of Friona, then one-half mile east.

Payment is scheduled to be made upon completion of work, and it is expressly understood that such payment shall not affect the accounts of any other precinct within the county.

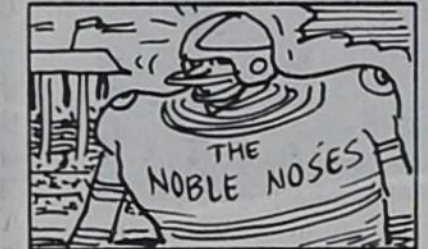
Tickets for the meal have been priced at \$1.25 for adults and 75 cents for children. The menu will include salads, beans, cornbread, tea and coffee.

"There are three ingredients to a successful life -- yearning, learning and earning," George Bournes, guest speaker, told Texico's Juniors and Seniors at their annual banquet Tuesday night, May 4.

The Junior Class, which traditionally hosts the seniors at a banquet each year, based the 1976 program on "Yankee

"Due to the large number of kindergarten students expected, we will run two one-half days sessions for 1976-77 as we did for this year," he stated.

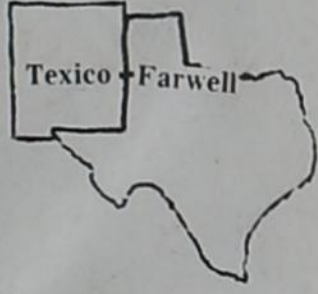

Cotton crop contracting is the total subject of a study now being distributed by one of the research organizations of Texas A&M. Dr. Robert Branson, director of the Texas Agricultural Market Research and Development Center, recently summarized the report by specifying three actions which could improve cotton contracting. Since one of the major shortcomings of crop contracting has been the refusal to honor some contracts, Dr. Branson suggested formation of a central reporting agency . . . one which would provide financial information on buyers and delivery information on producers. Other suggestions called for a crop disaster clause in every contract and development of low-cost Government crop contracting insurance. Woman's Club Takes NMFWC Prizes

The Texico Woman's Club came home from the recent New Mexico Federation of Women's Club Convention with a majority of the state honors. The club took a \$300 prize as the New Mexico club which, from 1974-76, did the most to encourage energy conservation

for the improvement of the community. This was the first time energy conservation has been cited for an award. Texico Woman's Club is now eligible for a national award of \$500 for energy conservation. The award winners are to be announced June 15 at the GFWC national convention in Philadelphia, Pa.

The local club also won first place for its safety project, during which members were instrumental in acquiring railway crossing arms at the Texas-New Mexico border on Highway 60-70-84 and on another crossing in Texico which is utilized by school buses. This project is also being judged on the national level and has already added \$50 to the club's treasury.

In addition to the other awards, the local club won first in district and an honorable mention in state for its Community Improvement Program. The Texico Woman's Club won first in state for its scrapbook and also received one of six certificates of achievement on fulfilling requirements in the various areas of work in the New Mexico Federation of Women's Clubs.

The club was also cited for its preventive measures against energy water. The organization maintains an active recycling collection center and processed almost three-quarters of a million pounds of recyclable items in over a year. Monies received from the sale of paper, aluminum cans, and glass are given to the community institution for the handicapped.

Several individual members of the club received state prizes for entries in crafts, etc. Maurine Caywood received first in acrylic and mixed media and first in quilting; Ann Ledbetter won first in mosaics; Kay West obtained a first in photography; and Marie Christian received second place for her painted leather entry.

In addition, several Texico students who entered the New Mexico Woman's Club contest also placed on the state level, but the names of these winners will not be revealed until May 14 at the school's annual variety show.

The Texico Club has 26 members and has been responsible for many civic improvements in the area. Leaders of the club for the past year have been Marie Christian, president; Teresa Curry, first vice-president; Ann Ledbetter, second vice-president; Bettie Martin, secretary; and Margie Crooks, treasurer.

Mrs. Christian was appointed State Safety Division Chairman at the state meeting to serve for the next two years.

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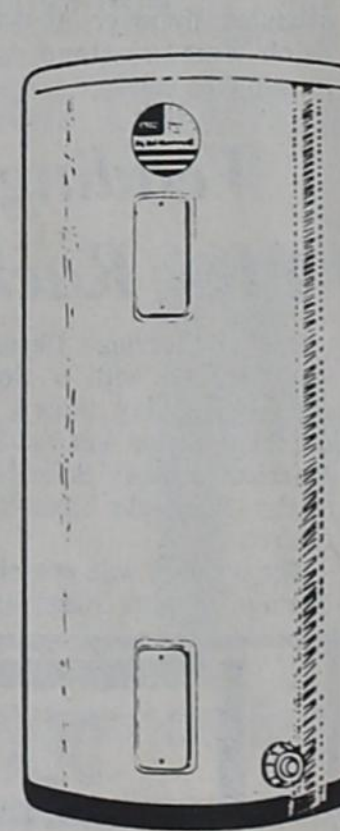
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Athletes Honored At Texico

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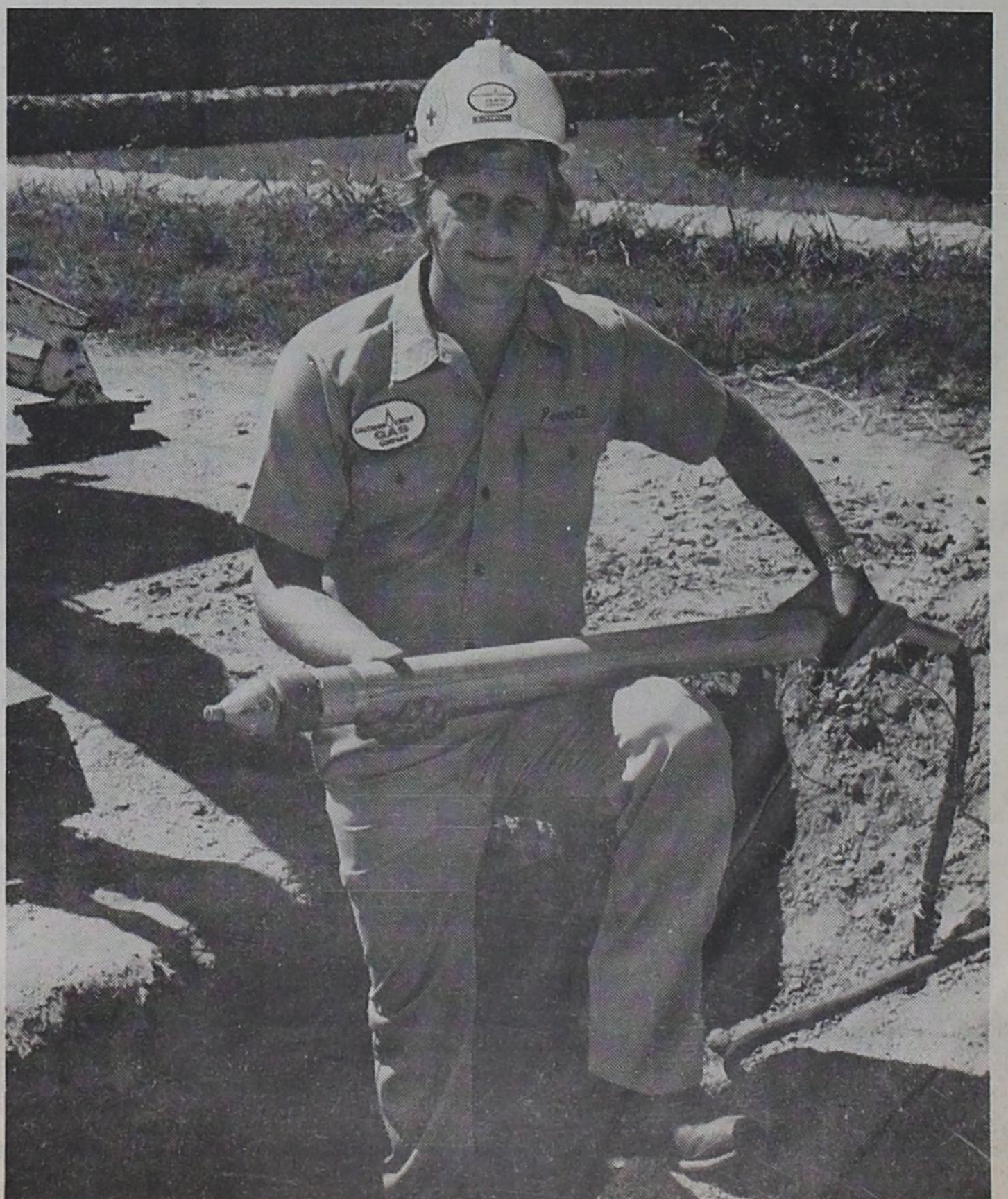
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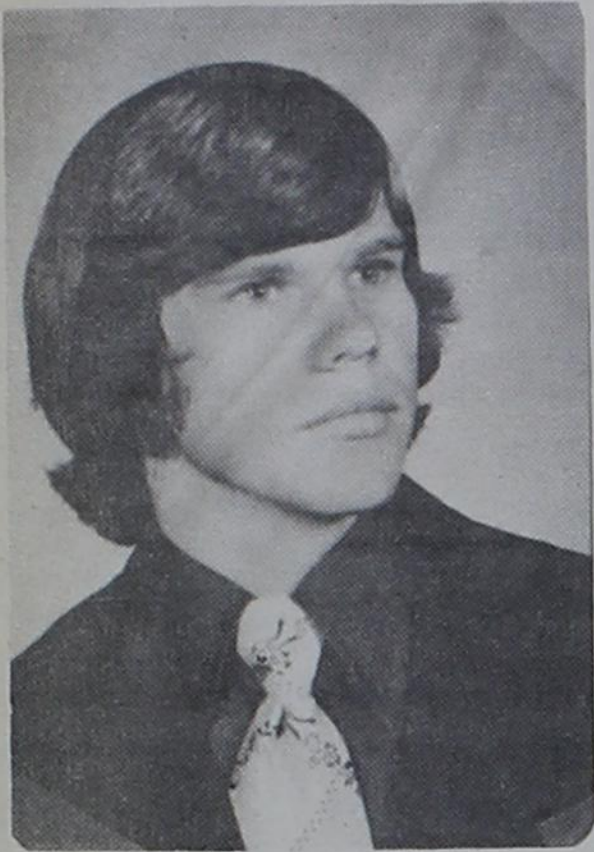

WHY GOD WAITS

St. Peter was not wrong when he declared at Pentecost that the last days had begun (Acts 2:16, 17). They had indeed begun, but God had a secret purpose to give the world a period of grace before putting down its rebellion and sending Christ to reign. This secret purpose concerning "the dispensation of grace" is the subject of Paul's epistles, but it is interesting to see how Peter's last message explains this interruption in God's prophesied program and the delay in Christ's return to reign. First, he says in II Peter 3:8:

"But, beloved, be not ignorant of this one thing, that ONE DAY IS WITH THE LORD AS A THOUSAND YEARS, AND A THOUSAND YEARS AS ONE DAY."

Mark well, this is not our feeble explanation now as to the delay in Christ's return. This statement was made at the beginning of this time of waiting, at the dawn of the age of grace.

But let us go on with Peter's declaration:

"The Lord is NOT SLACK concerning His promise ... BUT IS LONGSUFFERING to us-ward, not willing that any should perish, but that all should come to repentance" (Ver. 9).

So the delay in Christ's return to judge and reign should not be counted slackness or laxness, but "longsuffering." Thus the apostle goes on to say:

"And account that the long-suffering of our Lord is SALVATION..."

Where did Peter get this information? How did he know about "the dispensation of the grace of God"? Verse 15 explains:

"Even as our beloved brother Paul also, according to the wisdom given unto him hath written unto you." To Paul particularly was committed "the gospel of the grace of God" which we proclaim today (Acts 20:24).

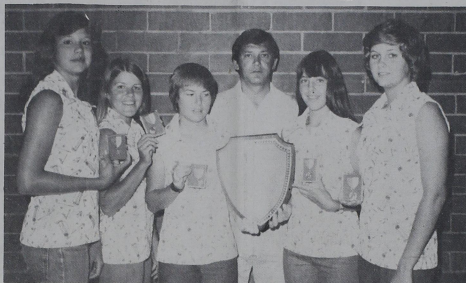

There will be a concession stand for refreshments. All parents are invited and urged to attend the meet.

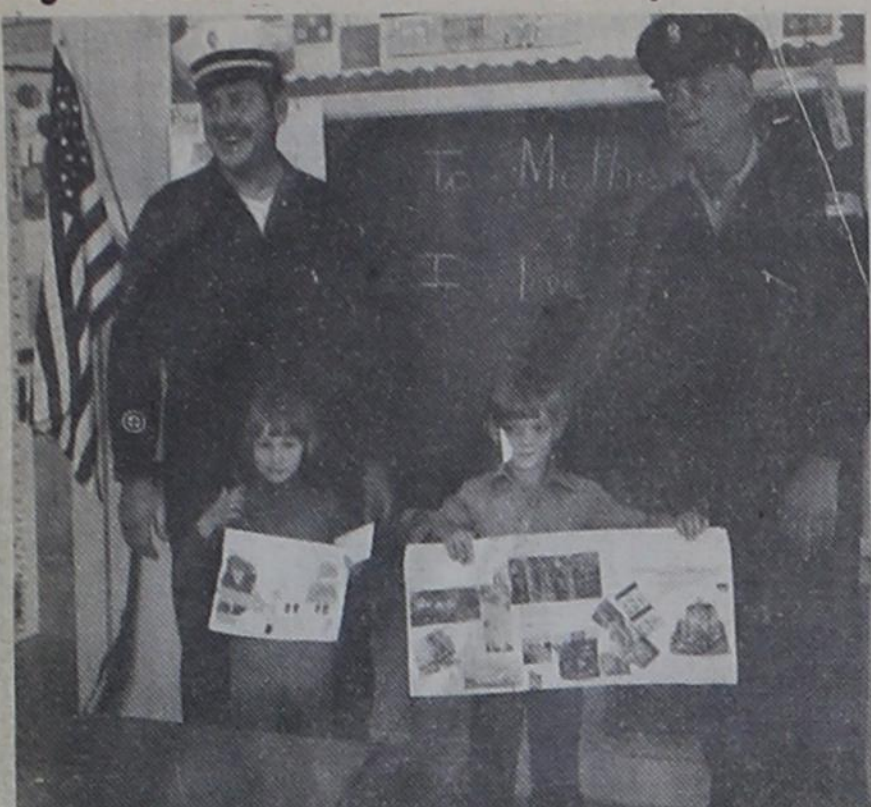
Banquet Scheduled

Winner in the fifth grade competition was Stephen Schilling who was awarded first place.

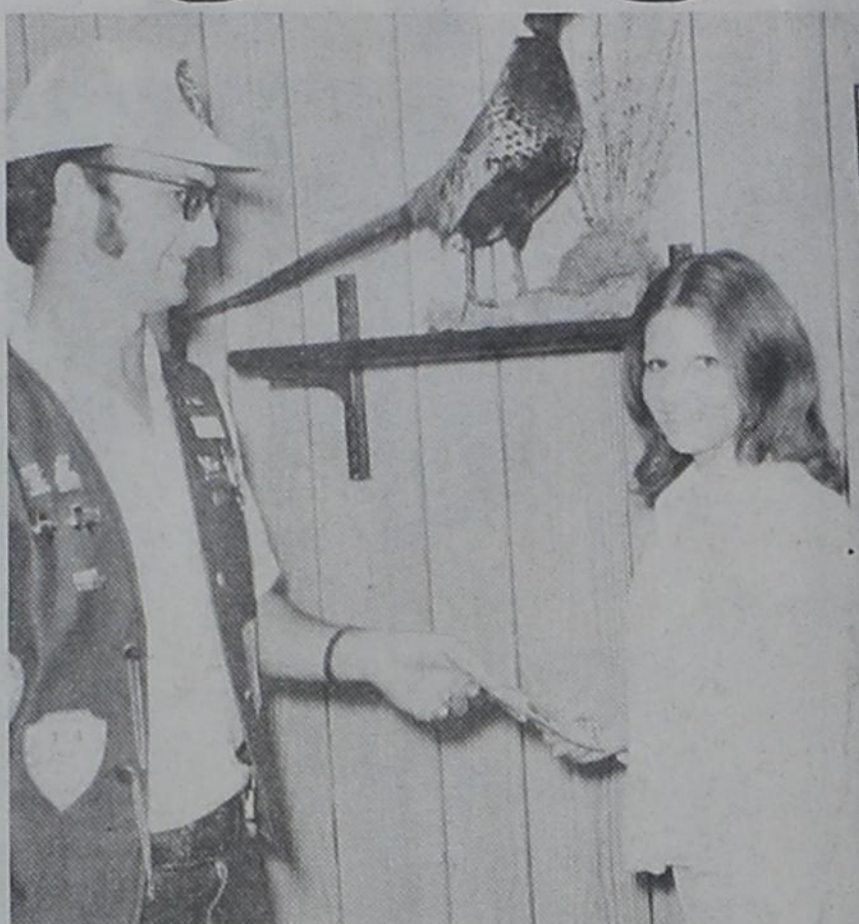
